Successful test transmission

During the period 19th to 26th February, your new local radio station broadcasting on 93.7 and 100.3 on the FM band, successfully completed its test transmission. You will have heard music and announcements from the studio in St Helens as well as other programs from the Community Broadcasting Network.

The coverage of the transmissions from Flagstaff and South Sister was well up to expectations. Apart from a clear signal in the main centres of St Helens, St Marys, Scamander and Fingal, centres like Bicheno, Binalong Bay, The Gardens, Swannick, Cressy, Symons Plains and Avoca reported good reception.

If you were unlucky and unable to get the signal you expected, the reasons may have been that:

- you had a poor quality receiver
- there was no external aerial (or antenna) to your radio
- the transmission was in stereo and your radio was set for mono.

As the station develops we shall extend the range of our present equipment to overcome most of these deficiencies but obviously this is dependent on our income.

We shall soon be back on air *full time* but being able to do this is entirely dependent on volunteers both for on air presentation and for technical and other duties. If you can help in any way, we would urge you to contact Station Manager Sam Anglesy on 6376 1306 as soon as possible. If your organisation, business or group wants to assist with sponsorship, then *Sam's your man*!

Remember that throughout the broadcast area, which is really very extensive, you should experiment with both frequencies, 93.7 and 100.3.

Listeners in the coastal area are likely to find that 93.7 will be better, and those inland in the valley may find that 100.3 brings better results.

Bush fires and barking dogs

It is well and truly into another year. There has been many happenings over the summer break, in fact too many to mention. One reoccurring incident which posed the largest threat to the township and its folk were the bush fires.

As most people are already aware, we had a problem with person or persons lighting small scrub fires, some of which were rather large. The fires were lit at random in various areas of the town. There was no real pattern that emerged to predict where the next fire would begin. Over the period of summer, there were up to twenty scrub fires reported, most of which were only very minor, however some of the larger ones threatened homes and may have posed a threat to life.

Enquiries over the period have revealed a number of suspects, however because arson and unlawfully set fires are very difficult to prove, there needs to be more evidence. A number of people have already come forward with information. If anyone has any information regarding fires, as detailed or as simple as it may be, please report that information as it may be pertinent to the investigation.

On a different note, there have been a number of complaints regarding dogs. The complaints have ranged from barking dogs to dogs that are roaming free. The problem has worsened in the last three months. Under the Dog Control Act, if a dog is roaming free (or at large), it will be seized and impounded. The owner will be charged for allowing the dog to be roaming and will also have to pay a fee to the Council for the release of the dog. Dogs that are continually barking can be reported directly to the Council. Make a note of the date and times that the dog barks and then contact the Council, a hefty fine to the owner will usually follow.

If anyone has any questions regarding any matter, please do not hesitate to ask. As far as dog complaints go, if you have a problem with a neighbour's dog but are hesitant to act because you feel that no-one else has the same problem, it will usually be that somebody close by will have the same complaint and feel the same way you do.

Ramble through the records

When was Mt Elephant officially called "Mt Elephant"? Although locally referred to as such since at least 1864, the 1905 Electoral Roll still shows electors there as resident of "Mount Logie", named after the nearby 'Logie' property of Dr Alexander Thompson, the original name of Harefield, which was named such in 1843 when the property was regranted to the Groom family. The adjacent Dalmain Rd and, or Thompson's Marsh Rd, as it was called until not long ago, was also referred to in baptism records in the 1850's as "Thompson's New Country"

Peta in North & South Carolina

Charlotte is in the state of North Carolina in the south east of the United States. The houses in Charlotte are mostly double story or even had a 3rd level. The majority of houses were all brick or were a combination of brick and weather board. All housing had air conditioning and trust me, with that humidity they should. Charlotte is very pretty, lovely tree lined streets and is about 15 minutes from the South Carolina border. The streets of the city of Charlotte are not designed on a grid but circular, there are no shopping malls or centres in the city itself but are out in the suburbs. Business, museums, galleries and a few restaurants are in the city centre.

To begin with the food and I did not get along well, and I lost 11 pounds in the first 3 weeks of being in the States, I actually had Mum send me over some survival packs of Weetbix, Tim Tams, 2 Minute noodles and other goodies. There is an abundance of fast food outlets if that is what you want. I found that I liked Chinese and Japanese food and found some favourite restaurants. For breakfast I would have waffles with maple syrup and hash browns. The price of food was much the same, except for meat, magazines were much cheaper as were the movies, clothes were expensive but I could not help myself.

Now driving in America is pretty easy, nearly all cars are automatic, you sit on the left side of the car and the right side of the road! The only confusing part is when you are taking a highway and you need to make an exit. For example, you don't always find a sign which points you in the direction of the city you want to go to, instead you will mostly find a sign which says "485 EAST or 485 WEST or 77 NORTH or 77 SOUTH, you really need to know what to take before you set out.

The people in the South are very polite, they call you Sir or Ma'am. Crime is still a very large factor, you are taught to lock your doors as soon as you get in your car. There is a large hispanic population in Charlotte and in most banking institutes and libraries there are sections for both Spanish and English.

North Carolina and the Southern accent there was pretty prominent, but if you go to Georgia, the accent is even stronger.

I did notice that Americans are very much into their religious faith. Most people attend church twice a week, Sundays and usually one night through the week. There are a lot of churches in Charlotte and are very large and can hold hundreds of people. The church service which was held for Nascar driver Dale Earheart was held near my home, that church was the size of a stadium!

While living with my second family I was taken on many road trips. The first was to Blacksburg Virginia where Randy is a basketball coach. The drive took three and a half hours. Soon after we left Charlotte the temperature began to drop, being still February and in winter, the closer we got to Blacksburg the colder it got. Virginia reminded me of Tasmania and the fog that hung around was definitely like home. We spent the night at a motel and after a breakfast with a choice of cereals, eggs bacon & sausages, hash browns and grits, waffles or muffins, we went on to see University Tech play University of Connecticut. The stadium was very much like the Silverdome and I could not get into it quick enough as it was so cold! It was pretty amazing sitting there, big screens for you to watch the game on, I was lucky as we were just seated courtside. The game itself was okay, I am not a big basketball fan but could appreciate it for what it is, University of Connecticut winning by about 20 points. After the game we went to an 'after party' and met the other coaches and some players. Later we had to go by Randy's place and pick up my car, a Buick, then had to drive Debra's car back to Charlotte and she drove the Buick. I thought I did a great job of driving all that way and was able to enjoy the scenery on the way back to North Carolina as there was no fog.

On the road again the next day, a few of us were off to Savannah in Georgia. Debra (my host mum), Kelly (my Au Pair buddy) and Blair in a mini van and my friend Leigh-Ann and myself in the car. As we headed from North Carolina to South Carolina I noticed how flat the landscape was and Georgia was much the same, but as we got closer to Savannah the area became more swamp like. After driving through some very poor areas we came to gorgeous old homes, sweeping trees with Spanish moss, these trees lined the streets and it was beautiful. We did a good job finding our way back to the highway out of Savannah then found a grocery store called 'Piggly Wiggly', bought some food and headed-for a motel. Downtown Savannah was beautiful, well cared for old homes, small parks, the main street called Abercon St. River Street is full of restaurants and little shops, cobbled paving and a tram which runs through. The Savannah River runs parallel to River Street, so you see huge white/blue/red river boats docked in or steaming up the river. Savannah is a very old, charming city.



Butterfly habitat protected

An agreement to preserve an area of private forest in Tasmania's high country will help the long term survival of a threatened species of butterfly. The area known as 'the Den', is on Connorville Station, a property in the Central Plateau owned by Roderic O'Connor.

The land provides habitat for the Ptunarra Brown Butterfly, a threatened species found only in Tasmania.

The butterfly takes it's name from the Aboriginal word for extreme cold and lives mainly in cool, high-altitude areas.

It depends on grassy vegetation like that found in the Den for it's survival.

Primary Industries, Water and Environment Minister David Llewellyn said the area would be protected under the terms of an agreement signed with the Private Forest Reserves Program.

'This program is making great inroads into ensuring that vegetation types not protected in existing reserves are preserved for the future.

By working with landowners to conserve areas like the Den, the program is meeting the conservation requirements of whole ecosystems, encompassing a diversity of species, habitats and natural communities.'

The Connorville agreement protects 300 ha of Swamp Peppermint (*Eucalyptus rodwayi*) forest and several priority species targeted by the Private Forest Reserves Program for preservation, such as the rare Hooker Fescue (*Austrafestuca hookeriana*), a sedge-like grass.

The area also includes the largest known population of the vulnerable Midlands Acacia (*Acacia axillaris*), a dense and prickly shrub found primarily in central Eastern Tasmania.

A separate covenant has also been placed on 10 ha of Black gum (*Eucalyptus ovata*) forest on Connorville. This rare and depleted forest community has been reduced to 2% of its original distribution in Tasmania.

The program has now secured protection for more than 11,000 ha of native forests on private land, through the purchase and donation of 14 properties, conservation covenants on the titles of 44 properties and management agreements on two properties. The program is currently negotiating with 400 landowners to secure protection for a further 43,000 ha of targeted forests.
