30 Years is a lot of meals

This being the Year of the Volunteer, it is an excellent opportunity to look at the humble beginnings of Meals on Wheels. Now in its 30th year of providing meals, the Fingal Valley Meals on Wheels Group can be proud of their record.

It all began with the inaugural meeting that was held in the St Marys Institute on the 4th of May in 1971 under the auspices of the Red Cross and the Fingal Valley Welfare Committee for Senior Citizens.

Interesting to read in the records that the present day secretary Mr Jack Miller, was at that first meeting and has been very involved with the group ever since.

The committee elected at that meeting in 1971 was President Mrs Ruth Gill, Secretary Miss S Young, Treasurer Mrs M Targett, Committee: Mr W Haas, R Legge, J Snodgrass, J Miller, K Cook, Mrs N Roddick, Miss A Gerrie and Matron D Simpson.

Monday 28 May, and the first meals were delivered, St Marys 3, Fingal 2 and Cornwall 1.

Generous support was received from Glenorchy MOW who donated the soup containers and ladles, also the first affiliation fee of \$5. Meals on Wheels Hobart Inc. gave the loan of other equipment and free insurance to get the Fingal Valley Meals on Wheels up and running. During the first year 1852 meals were delivered and in 1992 a record number of 6000 were supplied.

It was once recorded in past minutes "it is not the number of meals that was important but that adequate meals are being delivered to all recipients on our register who require them for their health needs."

There are so many people involved to ensure that MOW's continue to run so efficiently: committee, cooks, kitchen, drivers, shops, bus line, servos, and there is sure to be more.

A wonderful community effort which is certainly appreciated, judging by the welcome given to drivers when a meal is delivered.

Monster auction success



60th Wedding Anniversary


Olga & Selby Targett of St Marys will be celebrated on Thursday 2nd August 2001.

A phone call to each centre of the parish and a decision was made to celebrate Father Bill's 40th Anniversary of his Ordination with Mass at St Marys followed by lunch in the Presbytery - very low key for our 'oldie' who is thinking of wheelchairs!

This was not to be, the numbers grew!

The Community Hall was needed to accommodate the multitudes, with people travelling from all corners of the State, a bus and several car loads from Father Bill's former parishes, Invermay, Newnham and Ravenswood and his proud family.

To feed the multitude was a true 'loaves and fishes' story. The abundance of appetising food that kept coming was amazing.

The balloons were hung on the walls and the wheelchair was in place for the 'oldie'. There were brief, well presented speeches, many a thank you, and a presentation of a scroll 'The Year that was' - beginning with the Ordination of two young Tasmanian Priests in 1961 and proceeding through the milestones of the following 40 years.

Worthy of mention is the hair raising trip around the hall at rapid speed in the wheelchair, amidst much laughter.

What a joyous event. A moving, prayerful Mass led by an inspiring Parish Priest, followed by our 'low key' lunch together.

Red tape delay for community radio

The Management Committee of BODFM Community Radio is becoming frustrated with ongoing delays to the launching of the radio station due to bureaucratic "red tape".

An application for a temporary license from the Australian Broadcasting Authority takes 12 weeks to process. This does not assure one that a license will be issued at the end of this period, it only means that's how long it takes to process the application. A process for the strategic planning for long term broadcasting in Tasmania is currently being done and until this has been concluded (maybe later this year), the matter of licenses for broadcasting is not fully known.

An application for a temporary license for BODFM was made in early May this year, but it may take until Decement before any real information may be known. This type of delay makes it unclear for the committee to proceed with confidence.

The station will need to transmit from both South Sister and Flagstaff to reach the entire municipality. The committee is currently finalising an agreement to operate from Flagstaff, however at South Sister it appears that problems may arise in negotiations with Forestry Tasmania.

The committee has had positive results from government grants - State and Federally and in particular with Break O'Day Council who have been totally supportive, financially and in-kind, in the establishment of the community station. It seems a shame that on one hand governments can assist with funding then on the other have process systems that can cause lengthy delays.

Contacting your local politician to express your support at these frustrating delays would not go astray. A community radio station has for a long time been advocated as a means to resolve the lack of communication issues the municipality suffers through its isolation. The BODFM committee is very close now to making a reality-'community broadcasting'. The community of the Break O'Day municipality has in the past shown their persistence and resilience to overcome whatever bureaucratic hurdles are placed before them. Is this another test for the community?

Advertising for a Station Manager has been well supported.







We really need all our members to support the event so we can keep it viable for the future.


The week after that we commence the Club Championships, so there is plenty to look forward to
