The number of children in care in the first week was very promising for the future, on most days there were at least six children attending the Centre at one time. The Centre is licensed for ten children at the one time.

The St Marys Town Theme Committee has formed a subcommittee of Jennifer Binns, David Clement and Kevin Faulkner to identify an appropriate town development project of significance for the Sesqui Centenary year, so that it can be planned, costed and budgeted for in the meantime.

The project needs to relate to the 'physical and built environment' of the town, for the safety, convenience, amenity and economic well being of residents'. All suggestions welcomed.

## 83 CASES OF MEASLES

Geoff Page urged all young adults in the East Coast communities to take advantage of the free immunisation service provided by the Federal Government to be protected against measles, mumps and rubella.

Mr Page said the Federal Government has set up a Campaign to get as many young adults immunised against these common diseases as possible within the next twelve months.

'Young people between the ages of 18 and 30 often forget that they are vulnerable to the highly contagious measles, mumps and rubella, wrongly believing that they are only children's diseases, but this is not the case. In the first six months of this year Australia has recorded 83 cases of measles, most of which were young adults.'

Mr Page said that Health Authorities find that the 18-30 years age group are the most difficult to reach when it comes to health messages. That is why the State and Territories will be conducting their campaigns through mobile immunisation vans as well as at Colleges and Universities and at work places. Other places where there are large numbers of young people such as youth hostels will also be targeted.

'Australia has been very good at immunising young children in recent years but not so good when it comes to older children and young adults.'

'The Government's aim in this campaign is to address this imbalance and ensure that we have as many young Australians protected.'

Mr Page urged all families to take an interest in this health issue and to get their young people to take advantage of the offer free immunisation as a matter of urgency.

## GOOD SIGNS BAD SIGNS

'Good Signs' are those that do something for St Marys, while 'Bad Signs' are those that don't!

Three new signs are shortly to be erected which, hopefully, most residents will think will enhance the town, and further improve its identity and 'sense of place'. These will be town entrance name signs, to replace the black and white things on top of the 80 kph speed signs which currently are the only identification of our community.

The new signs will show St Patricks Head, hills and the river, with the words-ST MARYS 1857, TOWN OF THE EASTERN HIGHLANDS AND BREAK O'DAY PLAINS, within a circle BREAK O'DAY MUNICIPALITY.

The Town Theme Committee has also specified that the back of the signs be painted green, to eliminate the ugly aluminium look usually visible on directional signage.

The entrance signs will be located on Gray Road between the Cemetery and the tip (unfortunate, but the best location!), on Pass Road (the best place has been stolen by the new 'ST PATRICKS HEAD' sign), and along the oak avenue approaching the railway station.

The 'Bad Signs'? The one on St Marys Pass stating '7 km winding road', when in fact the 'end winding road' is only 5.2 km distant. How about replacing that with 'St Marys only 8 minutes', which might attract people, rather than putting them off with wrong information.

And the 100 kph speed sign on the bend of Londavra is totally useless, and potentially dangerous. The speed limit is 100 kph; a sign is not necessary to tell people, especially on a corner where there had been two accidents on the past year, and only 900 m before an 80 kph sign.

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## Catholic Church of St Marys, Cullenswood

In 1864 Walsh's Almanac published a detailed description of the newly proclaimed Fingal Municipality. It noted, approaching 'Cullenswood', "near the road stands a neat wooden building, the Roman Catholic Church". The building had been constructed during 1858, under the guidance of Father John Fitzgerald, on one acre of land given by Mrs Thomas Ransom of 'Killymoon' and 'Millbrook', and consecrated on 30 January 1859.

The Catholic congregation of the district was initially served from Campbell Town by Father Fitzgerald, whose pioneering work extended over seven years of extensive horse-back ministry between 1857-1864.

The church was closed in 1899, forty years after consecration, reflecting the gradual replacement of the Cullenswood area by the township of St Marys surveyed in 1857, as the 'capital' of the Break O'Day Plains.

A new church was dedicated at St Marys, two miles away, on 9 November 1899.

The old building was removed and forms part of a private residence in Newman Street St Marys, although it is not recognisable in its original form.

## Country Districts Cullenswood

(From a Correspondent)

*On Sunday last, the new Catholic Church which has just been erected in our little Village, was consecrated for Divine Service by the Lord Bishop of Hobart Town, assisted by the Rev'd Mr Fitzgerald.*

*The little Church was densely crowded in every part. There were between 250 and 300 persons present, all of whom seemed to listen with breathless attention to His Lordship's discourse, in which he dwelt most strongly on the evils of intemperance, a vice which is, unfortunately, too prevalent in this district\*.*

*After the sermon a collection was made and the magnificent sum of £78 was realised. It is highly creditable to the Catholics of this District that they have succeeded so well in this undertaking. A great deal of praise is due to the zealous endeavours of their worthy pastor, who during the last two or three years has labored most indefatigably for this object. And when it is considered that Campbell Town is more than 50 miles distant from our Village, over a very bad road, some idea may be formed of the difficulties which have had to be contended with.*

*The Church which is of an extremely chaste and simple style of architecture is amply fitted for the present wants of the congregation; 40 feet long by 20 broad.*

*At one end, a beautiful bell turret has been erected, and we were pleased to hear the merry sound of it's little bell on Sunday last. A fine Gothic window fills the east end which, we are told, it is in contemplation to have painted.*

\* (The 'Tasmanian Inn' was located 200 yards up the road from the new church!)

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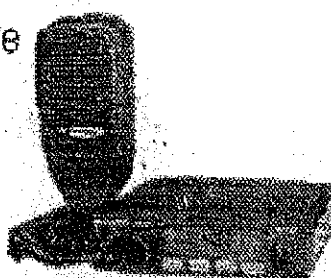

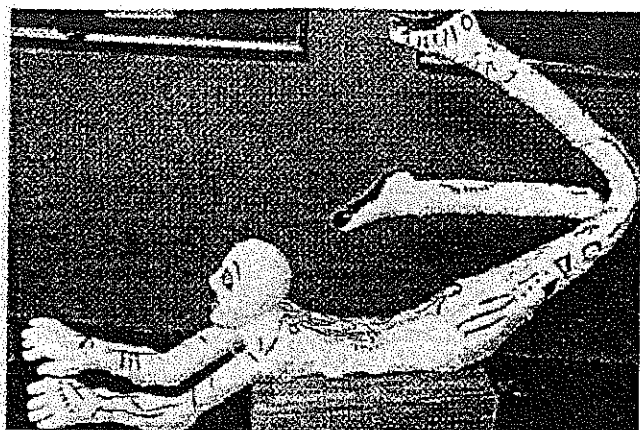

## Wonderful lemons

Lemons are plentiful at this time of the year and here are a few of the suggested uses taken from **The Australian Women's Mirror July 1926.**

### Uses for Lemons

- \* Heat the lemon thoroughly before squeezing and you will obtain twice the quantity of juice.
- \* A teaspoon of lemon juice in a cup of black coffee will afford a sure and speedy relief from a bilious headache.
- \* Lemon juice and glycerine, half and half, on a piece of absorbent cotton is the best refresher known with which to moisten the lips and tongue of a fever parched sufferer.
- \* Taken in hot water on awakening in the morning the juice of a lemon is an excellent liver corrective, and is better than all anti-fat medicines for stout women.
- \* A dash of lemon juice in a wineglass of water removes tartar, is an excellent toothwash and breath-sweetener.
- \* A teaspoon of lemon juice in a cup of warm water makes a splendid manicure acid. It removes stains from the nails and loosens the cuticle more satisfactorily than can be done with a sharp instrument.
- \* Lemon juice and salt will remove iron rust from linen without injuring the fabric. Wet the stains with the mixture and put the article in the sun. If the stain is of long standing two or three applications may be necessary, but the remedy never fails.
- \* When cooking rice, a little lemon juice will keep it white and stop the grains from sticking to each other.

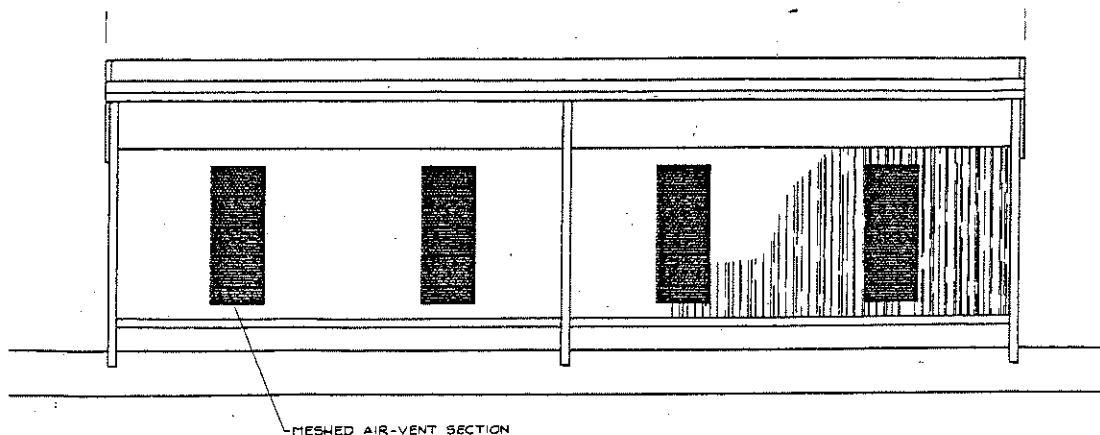
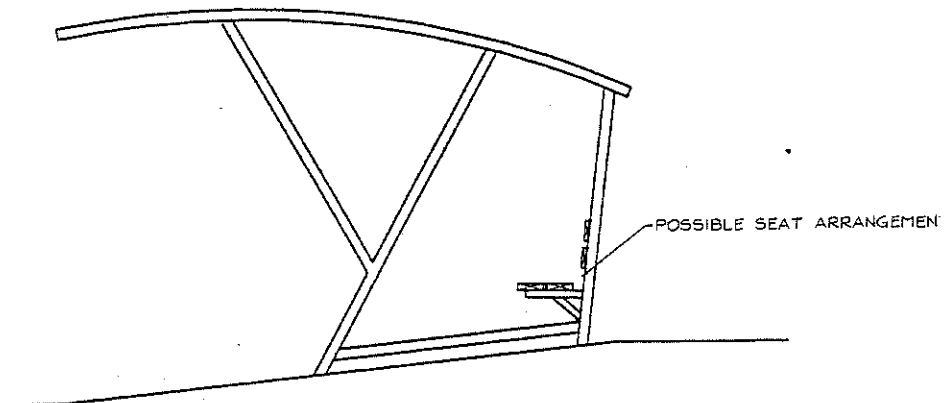
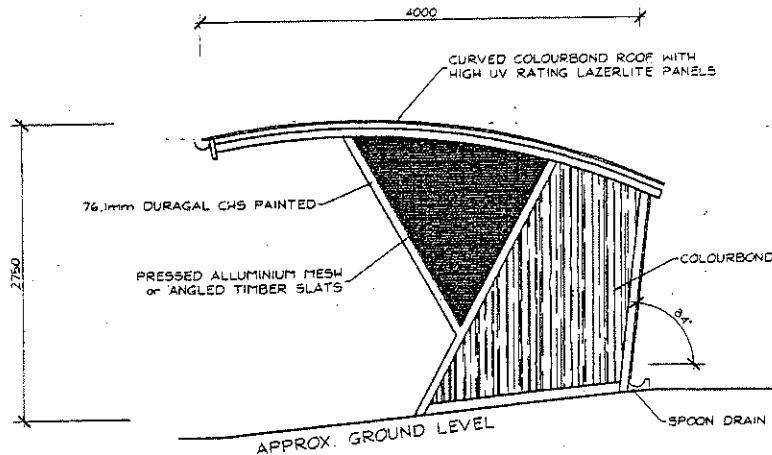

## Project helps visitors enjoy popular falls near St Helens

The Minister for Primary Industries, Water and the Environment, David Llewellyn today announced that the Parks and Wildlife Service had recently completed a fencing project at the popular St Columba Falls near St Helens to improve visitor enjoyment of the area..

He said 140 metres of fence had been installed along the walking track to improve safety along the walk.

The Minister said the project was one of a number of similar State Government funded Parks and Reserves maintenance projects across the State.

'It is one of the most popular waterfalls in Tasmania and so obviously we are always looking at ways we can improve visitor comfort and safety' he said.

The fencing had been installed along the steepest part of the track and was completed by St Helens staff over a six month period.

'With its beautiful views of what is one of Tasmania's highest waterfalls, the improved track conditions will assist in allowing people to enjoy this area.

The ongoing program of upgrades and improvements to our walking track networks are an important part of encouraging visitors to return to these areas.

'The works achieve the double outcomes of providing a good level of infrastructure to encourage visitors but also to help conserve the values that people come here to enjoy by encouraging them to remain on the tracks.

St Columba is one of the 60 Great Short Walks in Tasmania and has had some new signs installed as part of this program.'

## CHEMICAL TRESPASS

The recent flyer by the Break O'Day Council did not identify the streets where spraying was to occur in September and October. Neither did it make clear that the purpose of the flyer was to advise residents that they may request Council not to spray in front of their boundaries or within a reasonable distance of their property. Such advice needs to be made within the week to ensure that it is registered.

Residents should also be enabled to request that there should be no spraying of kerbsides, around trees and hydro poles etc within the town centre, or spraying of storm water drains and that this work should be done by whipper snipper or edging.

Council has not included central town streets, as apposed to residential streets, in their spraying protocol, but any residents of Main Street or Story Street would be entitled to request no spraying outside their property. Similarly, the central streets belong to us all, and we should be entitled to request these be spray free.

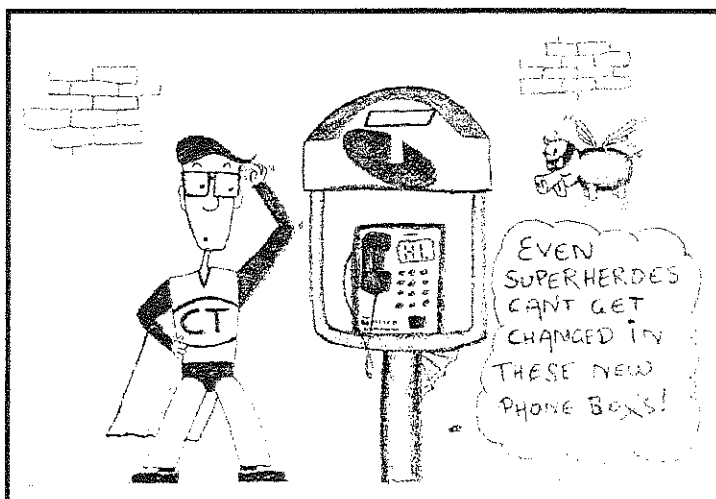
