

Ralphs Falls (Mt Victoria Forest Reserve)

Access:

Turn off the Mathinna Plains Road onto New River Road 1.5 km east of Ringarooma. Continue for 4 km before turning right onto the Mt Victoria Road. This well graded road was constructed during the Depression and some of the original stonework can still be seen. The upper section passes through rainforest containing celery top pines estimated to be 750 years old. The road finishes at a carpark where there is a shelter.

The walk:

A delightful walk through open rainforest ends on a viewing platform perched over a huge drop with spectacular views across the chasm to the falls.

Facilities: Shelter, picnic area, toilets.

Mt Victoria Forest Reserve (Altitude 1213m)

Access:

Take the Mathinna Plains (Ringarooma) Road for about 20 km north of Mathinna. Then turn east onto the Mt Albert Road and travel 4 km to a parking area.

The walk:

The track enters high altitude rainforest after 200m of buttongrass plain. The climb through delightful open rainforest continues for about 1 km. At this point the rainforest gives way to alpine grass and low scrub and the full extent of the summit ridge becomes visible. A couple of patches of myrtle intermixed with dolerite boulders have to be negotiated before the final climb to the top.

Walking time: 3 hours return
