## Well served for 56 years

After 56 years serving the St\_Marys and Fingal Valley area the Australian Red Cross will shortly be transferring the responsibility for its ambulance service to the Tasmanian Ambulance Service.

The decision to transfer responsibility to the Tasmanian Ambulance Service has been taken in the best interests of the St Marys community as the Tasmanian Ambulance Service is better able to provide operational, logistical, training and administrative support to the volunteers who are now required to undertake comprehensive training to fulfill their functions as Volunteer Ambulance Officers

Australian Red Cross will still have an active role with the Ambulance in the community. Events such as football matches, races and the Coal Shovelling Festival will continue to be manned by the Red Cross volunteers with the ambulance.

The Australian Red Cross commenced the ambulance service in 1946 following recognition for the need of such a service by the local community. Dr D Walker was responsible for establishing the service and securing the support of the Fingal Council for the purchase of the first ambulance.

Over the years the service has earned the respect of the community by providing an emergency service, transporting hospital patients and attending sporting and community functions. The community has provided practical support by contributing to appeals including the purchase of Tasmania's first Heart Start machine for any ambulance. The Cornwall Coal Company also provided support by purchasing a second ambulance and contributing towards the erection of a garage an the hospital site in 1988.

In the early days staff from the St Marys District Hospital attended emergencies with the volunteers but with the additional training the volunteers now receive, their assistance is not required as frequently. Support is now received from the Tasmanian Ambulance Service through permanent paramedics stationed at Scamander.

During-any year the service has attended between 200-250 incidents or transports. Over the past 50 or so years this totals in excess of 10,000 services.

Australian Red Cross is pleased to have been of such practical assistance to the St Marys and Fingal Valley communities over a long period. It will continue its close association with the communities through attendance at future sporting and community events and the Branch will look for other ways of assisting in the community.

Australian Red Cross is confident that the community will continue to be served well by the Tasmanian Ambulance Service. Already two replacement vehicles have been provided for the service, and I would like to pass on the thanks of Australian Red Cross to the many dedicated volunteers who have served, (and will continue to serve), the St Marys and Fingal Valley communities over the past 56 years.

# Travelling WW 1 Exhibition

The original exhibit was developed by the AWM specifically for remote and regional venues. Such an Exhibition has never previously been to Tasmania. The AWM offer was gratefully accepted by the St Helens History Room Board President Mr Leon Kohl, because it would provide a unique opportunity to combine local memorabilia (including many items from the History Room's collection) with Australian War Memorial artifacts, in a comprehensive display for the benefit of the public and, in particular, east coast schools.

The exhibition features relics from the First World War including a silver bugle carried by C Company, 13th Battalion; pieces of German uniforms captured by Australian soldiers; flags and other fascinating objects. It reaffirms the strong bond formed between Australia and France during this period.

St Helens History Room Volunteer and former Royal Australian Artillery Officer, Tim McManus, has been nominated as Local Convener. He is presently collecting and collating WW1 items from Tasmanian museums and private collections, to complement the AWM display

### WHEELIE BINS

As part of Council ongoing Waste Management Program, "Wheelie Bins" will be introduced to the following urban areas of the municipality;

Cornwall, Fingal, Mangana, Mathinna, Scamander, St Helens and St Marys.

The service will commence in the first week in July with different collection days and times for each area. The service will consist of a 240 litre bin that will be collected each fortnight by Jones' Waste Management. Extra services will be provided weekly during school holiday periods, on the same days and times, for a total of 33 collections per year.

Full details, together with a calendar indicating your collection days and times will be provided with each bin when they are delivered in late June.

In general, the service will cover the water district of each area except Mangana where the town area will be serviced.

All properties within the collection area will pay the new Wheelie Bin service charge while those outside the collection area will retain the current charging structure.

# The farmer and his cow on the supermarket shelf

The future of retailing in Japan may see the farmer's photo on each bag of carrots and a mugshot of a cow (and maybe its parents) on each tray of meat.

Minister for Primary Industries, Water and Environment, David Llewellyn said talks with trade partners and prospective customers in Japan had revealed the future demands for the food industry were quality and a food safety guarantee to the customer.

"Resistance to GMO's, a growing interest in organic products, reduced chemical usage and more detailed and reliable labelling are all messages coming from food retailers in Japan.

"Most importantly, customers in this demanding consumer market are after an assurance that food is safe.

"They are telling us they want truth in labelling and transparent trace back of products, such as meat, right back to the paddock, the animal and even its parents.

"The implications for Tasmania are significant because our food products have everything Japanese customers are looking for.

"We have quality products, relative freedom from pests and diseases and relatively low chemical usage.

"Perhaps most importantly we have a moratorium on GMO's and a ban on hormonal growth promotants in beef.

"To capitalise on these natural advantages, our customers are telling us that we should provide maximum information about the production chain and back it up with transparent, quality production systems and reliable supply chains"

Mr Llewellyn said Japan remained Tasmania's most important export market and it was important that our food industry remained up-to-date with its needs.

"We need to ensure we are in a position to capitalise on the convergence between Tasmania's natural strengths and the trends in the consumer market" Mr Llewllyn said.

# Fox trials underway to protect Tasmania's native species

The Department of Primary Industries, Water and Environment is working with the University of Tasmania to ensure a fox-baiting program would have minimal impact on native species. Nature Conservation Branch Zoologist Dr Sally Bryant said the trials using non-poisonous baits had been underway since early April.

The trials are being conducted in collaboration with postgraduate students from the Environmental Studies Department at the University of Tasmania.

"The information we gather from the trials will help the fox eradication program minimise the impact on native species," Dr Bryant said.

All the information from fox programs on the mainland has shown that 1080 poison baiting is the most successful fox control measure.

"However, Tasmania is unique in having a greater number of carnivorous species, such as the Tasmanian devil and two species of quoll, that may be tempted to eat 1080 meat baits.

"We want to reduce that happening so we don't impact on the very species we are trying to protect".

Dr Bryant said the trials involved comparing two types of commercially prepared baits and two types of bait placement, either buried or raised off the ground.

"Work in other States has shown that foxes will take both types of bait.

"New research is now looking at how effectively foxes will take baits raised from the ground.

"The experimental design has to be realistic and offer landholders and fox field staff an effective yet easy-to-use baiting procedure.

"The trials have so far been running at two sites in Tasmania as well as in Victoria."

Dr Bryant said the Fox Task Force was grateful for the assistance of the Defence Force and other landowners in the southeast who have allowed access to their land for the research.

"It's been great to have government, students and landholders combining to play a part in the fox-free program," she said.



To finish off I'd just like to say watch out for our "Take a Break" raffle offering some great family accommodation passes around the state and remember all funds raised go directly back to the children.


