It is an offence when there is no clear and visible tread pattern on any part of your tyre. This includes tyres that may only be worn on the inside or outsides due to wheel balancing and alignment problems.

If a car accident is not enough to encourage motorists to replace worn tyres, then a \$110 fine may be, reports Constable Luke Rockliffe.

Cold weather deserves a tasty hot soup

Potato Corn & Ham Soup 2 level tablespoons butter

- 1 large onion peel & slice
- 2-3 leeks trim wash & slice
- 1 ham hock
- 6 cups chicken stock
- 750 g large potatoes
- 2-3 corn cobs
- chopped parsley

Put butter in a saucepan, add onions & sliced leeks, cook over low heat for 10-15 min.

Cut a few gashes in fleshy part of ham hock and add to pot. Do not add salt at this stage Bring to boil, simmer about 20 mins.

Peel potatoes and cut into large chunks, add to pot.

Simmer about 40 mins.

Using sharp knife scrape corn niblets from cob, add to soup during last 10 mins of cooking. Remove hock, discard skin, bone & fat.

Return meat to pot and reheat. Add salt if necessary.

St Marys Police report

To answer a couple of questions about the running of the St Marys Police Station. The hours of the station are 9.00 am to 4.00 pm Monday to Friday. The station is closed each day between 12.30 pm and 1.30 pm. Secondly, we still do process licenses. However, if you wish to renew your licence on the day it is due, you will be issued with a receipt which is valid for a period of 21 days. The paperwork which we send away may take sometime before it is processed and a licence is sent back to you. Sometimes this processing time may take longer than 21 days, which means that your licence may not be valid for a short time after the 21 day period. Therefore, we encourage you to renew you licence at least one week before it is due.

I will also remind people that members from the Northern Traffic section will be in our area from time to time, particularly over the next few months. Their task is simply to concentrate on traffic and associated offences. So please be careful on the roads.

Finally I encourage people to approach either myself or Colin if you have any concerns or would like any questions answered. We will endeavour to lead you in the right direction!

East Coast Natureworld Wildlife Park Funding

Senator Eric Abetz welcomed a Federal Government grant of \$90,000 for East Coast Natureworld Wildlife Park near Bicheno. Senator Abetz said that the grant would assist in the pgrade and replacement of some of the facilities currently provided for animals, visitors and veterinary surgeons.

The enhancement involves providing new education and entertainment facilities for visitors including a themed play area for children and a small animals interaction building.

Mr Bruce Englefield owner of East Coast Natureworld said that the interpretation centre will have seating for 50, utilising leading edge audio visual equipment. Visitors will be able to email photos of themselves with 'residents' of East Coast Natureworld to friends and family while at the Park.

'A new Bonsai Centre will also be established to help teach Tasmanians young and old more about our native plants through the 'hands on' artform of Bonsai,' Mr Englefield said.

The Park will be displaying koalas, snakes, wombats and Tasmanian Devils in unique enclosures mimicking their natural environment. The addition of the snakes and enhanced Devil facilities together with the birds of prey centre will enable 'Dangerous Animals Theme evenings' during the summer months.

We must promote a truly Tasmanian experience to tourists, Senator Abetz said.

More survey results

We live in a supportive community

One of the answers we wanted when first initiating this survey was to find out to what extent people in a rural area are isolated because of lack of public transport and what kind of support networks they have on which to rely in time of need.

It was found that 89% of those surveyed have reliable family transport. So even though petrol costs are high, most have the means of getting out and about and are not dependent upon public transport. Of those who said they did not have reliable transport, almost half said what transport they did have ie. with friends, family or neighbours, was very reliable. This is not to deny the fact that a certain percentage of people are severely disadvantaged because of lack of transport.

An interesting, if not surprising result, was the overall stability of the population. 46% have lived in the St Marys /Cornwall area for over 20 years. (59% of the sample have lived here for over 10 years, 11%: 6-10 years, 21%: 1-5 years and 9% less than one year). Consequently a high proportion responded that they have close family members living nearby on whom they can rely for support. For those who do not have family support a large number reported that they have very good friends and neighbours. These would appear positive indicators for a supportive community.

A well as family, friends and neighbours, 71 people said they could call on their G.P. for help, 19 said community nurse, 14 said priest or minister and 12 said social worker.
