Volunteers score 100%

The Tasmanian Ambulance Service has been given an overwhelming vote of public confidence, with patient satisfaction survey released showing 98% were happy with the service. In country Tasmania the accolades were even greater, with 100% satisfaction levels in volunteer and rural branch stations.

Minster for Health and Human Services David Llewellyn said the survey results were outstanding and a credit to the expertise, professionalism and dedication of the Tasmania's ambulance personnel. 'Patients throughout Tasmania have given the Service a huge vote of confidence', Mr Llewellyn said. 'It's a clear message for the Service's 200 career staff and 500 volunteers, they do a wonderful job.'

The Patient Satisfaction Survey 2002 was conducted by the Tasmanian Ambulance Service from a random sample of 551 patients Statewide who used the service in March this year. Patients were sampled for every station in Tasmania.

'It is particularly pleasing that the public's views about the quality of services provided are high throughout the State and in every facet of ambulance operations-from handling emergency calls in the Communications Centre, through to responding to and caring for patients.'

Mr Llewellyn said it was obvious Tasmania now has one of the nation's best ambulance services. 'That we have some of the finest people capable of delivering a first-rate service is borne out by this survey.

The Government has strengthened the foundations of the Ambulance Service by appointing additional staff and has made a major financial commitment to a safer, more efficient and better equipped Ambulance Service.

There has been a spate of crime in the Scamander

area over the past few weeks. The crime has predominately focused on vehicles and their contents. Commonly stolen items include cash, wallets and mobile phones. Most of the vehicles targeted have been left unlocked. There are a number of suspects for these crimes and investigations are continuing. If any one notices any suspicious activity occurring in Scamander, or in St Marys for that matter, please let us know.

As the warmer weather approaches, so do the tourists. Most road crashes occurring in and around the East Coast over the past two years have involved interstate and overseas tourists. Most of these 'crashes' (they are not accidental !!) have been the result of inattentive driving or speed. Therefore, you can expect to see the radar gun in and around the area on a more regular basis. Consider this a privileged piece of information and a friendly warning!!

Just for your own personal reference, speeding offenders will attract the following penalties for the following speeds:

- up to 10 km/h over = 1 point and \$50
- between 10 -14 km/h = 1 point and \$80
- between 15 22 km/h = 3 points and \$110
- between 23 29 km/h = 3 points and \$140
- between 30 37 km/h = 4 points and \$190
- for speeders exceeding the speed by 38 km/h and above, an instant disqualification can be expected to be received.
- And for those that do not speed, we have a list containing twenty eight pages of other offences which occur on our roads! Please be careful.



Disappointing closure

A meeting was held at the St Marys Hotel on the 27th July at 6.30 pm to try and establish the amount of interest in continuing with the Chamber of Commerce.

No charge for bicycles

Bicycles will now travel free across Bass Strait except for in the peak holiday period, courtesy of a \$21 rebate secured by the Tasmanian Liberal Senate Team, Senator Richard Colbeck announced.

The new arrangements for bicycles would come into force from 1st September 2002 coinciding with the operation of the new twin passenger ferries. The rebate will be administered by the TT-Line through its ticketing system.

Bicycles tourism contributed an estimated \$15 million to the Tasmanian economy every year.






LIBRARY NEWS



Mt Puzzler Forest Reserve Meadstone Falls

Access:

Turn south off the Esk Highway onto Valley Road 4km east of Fingal. Follow for 16km and turn right into MG 28 and go 5km to the parking area.

The walk descends into a small gully before entering the forest. The rocky track then slowly descends through open forest to reach a point just above the St Pauls River. The track then sidles along above the river as it enters a steep gorge which dissects Mt Puzzler and Cut Off Hill. At a point just downstream from the falls the track drops quite steeply to a viewing platform. Here there are excellent views of the falls and downstream to Mt Misery.
