## 25 September 1905 The Lighting of St Marys

(from an occasional Correspondent)

The work of lighting the streets of St Marys has been completed and the lights were turned on, on Tuesday. Messrs Kemp and Company have had the work in hand for some time, but owing to various causes were unable to carry out their contract till last week.

The consideration of the best means of lighting the town was left in the hands of a committee appointed at a public meeting. This committee decided on adopting acetylene gas as the luminant on account of its brilliancy, small cost of installation and maintenance.

At the invitation of the lighting committee the principal citizens assembled on the evening of Tuesday to hear a short address from the Warden Mr Napier, apropos of the occasion, after which his little daughter was invited to turn on the gas, which she did amidst cheers and congratulations on the success that the efforts of the lighting committee had met with, both in choosing the illuminant and fixing the positions of lights.

After the ceremony was concluded those present adjourned to the Sunday school room, where light refreshments provided by the ladies, were partaken of, and more congratulatory speeches made.

Mr Kemp, who was present, gave much interesting information as to the value and cheapness of acetylene gas, both as a light-giver and heat-producer.



#### Greenie label?

Sir

Jim Haas is mistaken in his knowledge of regrowth. Firstly, eucalypts are known as "water pumps" as in the first few years of growth they use enormous quantities of water. In places where the water table is too close to the surface eucalypts are used to lower it. When hundreds of hectares are clearfelled and regrowth will substantially reduce the available ground water. Also, on clearfelled slopes surface water run off is much faster, with an added problem of turbidity and erosion. Knowing that vast areas have been and still are being constantly clearfelled, it is quite obvious hydrology has not been greatly considered by Forestry.

Perhaps Mr Haas should read his history books again. For thousands of years the Tasmanian aborigine lived in harmony with the environment maintaining a sustainable ecosystem. They did not, in the space of two hundred years, denude the hills around Queenstown, turn the King River into a dead sludge, degrade the midlands, kill off the Thylacine and make many species of flora and fauna endangered. Ignorance and short term greed, however, still continue to cause havoc.

I question also the stereotypical profile Mr Haas has of a 'greenie'. It is one that is outmoded and generally used to mean 'long haired, tree hugging layabout' - a shorthand derogatory term to use towards anyone who questions the chop it down dig it up mentality. I wonder how I fit this profile? I would like to protect the environment for future generations, leave the planet in a slightly better state than when I entered it, and chose to listen to experts who have no vested interested in woodchipping. I also earn 'an honest living' 70 to 80 hours a week, with hardly a day off!

If 'greenies' had been around in the 1930's we might still have a Tasmanian Tiger. Without 'greenies' Strahan would not be the thriving tourist town it is now and our hydro debt would be astronomical. If 'greenies' do not take action over what is happening in this State, we will lose an extremely precious future asset. There are many ways of developing this for a sound and really sustainable economic base that would provide jobs and keep the profits in this area - but that's another discussion.

Mr Haas is mistaken on one last point. This has not been one of the wettest years on record. However, the question of the continuity of available water is far more complex with many varied factors, including rainfall, to be taken into consideration. It is simplistic to assume that having a wet year solves the problem.

### **TownSafe**

In response to enquiries, the Mission Statement of TownSafe St Marys is 'Goal 2' of 'Tasmania Together':- "A community where people feel safe, and are safe in all aspects of their lives". The Strategic Plan is "to lobby the appropriate authority or agency to remedy, amend or change an aspect, practice or policy relating to the physical infrastructure of the area which may jeopardise the safety of residents of St Marys".

The BOD Council was asked (21 Aug. '03) "What issues have been considered as a result of Council's Risk Management Assessment of the use of Irishtown Rd. as a timber haulage route?" Council replied (26 Aug. '03) " Council does not agree in anyway with your comments that it has failed to address safety concerns in relation to Irishtown Rd. Council, as a matter of course, consider both safety aspects and financial impacts on the community from increased heavy vehicle movements on municipal roads". Following an FOI Request (29 Aug. '03) for information about any Road Safety Audit and/or Risk Management Assessment conducted by Council on respect of Irishtown Road, a reply from Council (10 Sept. '03) provided a document "Internal Audit Irishtown Road 21.2.03" which stated "Few potholes. Good"

Councils attention has been drawn to the proactive requirements of road managers to fulfill their Duty of Care, arising from the High Court decision (2001) in Brodie v. Singleton Shire Council.


