Two seasons in one

Autumn has come in right on schedule, at least for the first few days, then along came a few rather hot humid days left over from summer then a few days of rain, and now back to lovely autumn again. A few weeks ago Ron and Bettie were caught up in snow but still in summer.

Better funding for aged care

Senator Guy Barnett has assured the aged care sector that he would fight for better funding of aged care in Tasmania.

"I expect that the way aged care is financed will change and hopefully improve as a result of the Hogan inquiry into the sector, and it will be my aim to make sure Tasmania benefits from any reforms or changes, "Senator Barnett said.

As secretary of the Australian Government's Health and Ageing Policy Committee, Senator Barnett was speaking in Hobart at the launch of the inaugural Tasmanian edition of the DPS Guide to aged care, a comprehensive publication which provides detailed information for the elderly.

The guide details every Australian Government funded aged care facility and community aged care package provider, plus other editorial information to assist older people and their carers to be better informed about the range of choices available.

"I believe our treatment of the most respected citizens of our society is fundamental to our unique character as Australian. If we short change the elderly then we are short changing ourselves and future generations," Senator Barnett said.

"I remain hopeful that the Hogan inquiry into aged care will be published soon and acted on by the Government. I am keen to see reforms proposing a better funding and indexation system for aged care. We currently rely on an outdated indexation system as a basis for funding, rather than a more realistic indicator which covers the actual increase in costs," he said. Total funding for aged and community care has increased from \$3 billion in 1995-96 to a projected \$6 billion in 2003-04.

The number of people in Australia aged over 65 is likely to swell from 2.4 million now, up to 4.2 million people in 20 years time. Tasmania currently has the second oldest population of any state or territory. Within 10 tears the population will become the oldest in Australia.

"In the next 20 years the proportion of the Tasmanian population aged 65 years and over is expected to increase from 13.75% to 22.51%. Tasmania will be the first state required to deal in depth with aging related issues across all aspects of community living." Senator Barnett said.





Local supermarket leaps ahead

I would like to congratulate the St Helens Festival Supermarket on its courageous decision to convert to fully biodegradable plastic bags, even though it meant a slightly higher cost. It is great to learn of a small business that has taken it upon itself to be proactive when it comes to its environmental responsibilities.

I strongly urge other businesses in the area to visit the Festival Supermarket to see the new product and start investigating whether they might be able to do something similar.

We still need to do much more to reduce the number of bags used, whilst still leaving shoppers with some sensible way of getting their purchases home. The calico bags that they have for sale are the best option.

The Howard government's solution to our plastic bag problem has been to put supermarket chains in charge of a voluntary reduction and Federal Environment Minister David Kemp recently hailed a 3% reduction in the number of plastic bags as 'magnificent'.

Dr Kemp's praise of the minimal results achieved by supermarkets ignores the fact that far better outcomes have been achieved in other countries by levies or bans. Why would Dr Kemp be happy with such a poor result when a reasonable levy could provide a 90% reduction in six months (as happened in Ireland in 2002), and a ban would eliminate plastic shopping bag use altogether?

There is now an opportunity for the new State Environment Minister Judy Jackson to demonstrate her commitment to her new portfolio by taking effective action on plastic shopping bags with a levy or a ban; action which surveys have shown would be supported by the public, rather than once again buckle to a big business.

Again congratulations for showing leadership on this issue.



Lilliums

Liliums will grow in acid or slightly acid soil, but need effective drainage, sunshine and shade in equal amounts.

Fertilise with a generous amount of properly made compost, with the addition of a handful of complete fertiliser to each square metre. For pot culture use a good grade potting mix, and add complete fertiliser or slow release fertiliser to ensure the plant is well nourished when in growth

Do not allow Lilium bulbs to dry out. The worst pest of Liliums are slugs, snails and aphids. Scatter pellets every 3 weeks, particularly after rain. In Autumn and Spring spray for aphids.
