

David's son Andrew has a pilot's licence and as David had flown with him previously he thought it was time to give his sister a treat. I had walked in the Boyes Basin and Denison Range areas and had visited Lake Pedder etc but I had always wanted to visit the areas that I still had not been to. Mill Ridge Walking Track Proposal

I hope that no one else got the impression that I am trying to rewrite the history books. I'd have to read them first and haven't come across many. For a new person in town, the local history is not evident. I have been in this area for a rough decade and five of my seven children have spent from most to all their lives here. My son Otis was born in Fingal, possibly a rare claim to fame in these times.

My interest is in creating ongoing sustainable local employment in St Marys as at present we lose young people due to lack of employment opportunities. As we haven't a municipal pool or a skating rink, putting some thought into the potential that we do have seems like a good idea. Surrounded as we are by bushland, the development of walking tracks is obvious.

There are a number of different avenues that we could access for funding and other support but there is definitely a need for some volunteers to get the project off the ground.

On the morning of our walk, Gerald Aulich arrived and filled us in on some of what turns out to be a very vibrant history of the area. I would like to thank Barry Aulich for his contribution and as he pointed out in his letter, it is the Hopewell Road that we were walking but it does pass, as I said, under the flanks of St Patrick's Head and is an easy walk which could be made accessible for a good stretch to wheelchairs, prams and those not fit enough for the marathon climb up the actual St Patrick's Head walking track.

What I had in mind is that the Hopewell Road track could be joined to the actual Mill Ridge Track which I believe could be extended to reach the sea. I don't know what progress has been made with the Fingal to St Marys railroad walk but I am willing to bet money that people would come from halfway around the world to walk from Fingal to the sea.

As for the Mill Ridge Hut, it is indeed a mystery. I have a map which I obtained from Forestry which has an 'X marks the spot' identifying the site of the historic Mill Ridge Hut.

We did find a pile of old boards and guttering which pretty well matched the description but as I now understand, we had the wrong pile pegged as 'the hut'! So, I am still interested in any information about that area, up to and including the mystery hut and hopefully beyond - names and dates are good but stories are even better - what actually happened in the lives of the families that lived there?



Timber Communities Australia Record numbers attend conference

Sixty-five Tasmanians have just returned from the highly successful Annual National Conference of Timber Communities Australia held in Albury April 1 to 4. The conference highlighted the need for continued sustainable forest management.

The Tasmanian delegation included three St Marys branch members, being Craig Cox, Dana Smith and Gerald Aulich.

With the Federal Elections drawing near the 65 Tasmanian delegates were joined by other regional TCA representatives from around Australia. Delegates were briefed on the devastating impacts of poor government forestry decisions in Western Australia, Victoria and New South Wales.

TCA delegates from around the Nation supported the Tasmanian ALP government's balanced approach to forest reservation and the continued harvesting of mature forests for high quality timber products. Mainland delegates were also very appreciative of the forestry policy position of the Tasmanian Liberal Opposition.

"Delegates from our region welcomed the total support of other State TCA branch's following a broad range of speakers from our national network." Mr Gerald Aulich President TCA St Marys branch said upon the delegates return.

Our delegates received an important report on the outcomes and of the Federal Parliament's bushfire inquiry " A Nation Charred" from the Chairman Gary Nairn MP.

Tasmanian Resources Minister, Bryan Green MHA, was able to provide mainland delegates the facts about Tasmanian forests and how they are managed for the environment, social values and the

"Senator Ian MacDonald the Federal Minister for Fisheries, Forestry and Conservation reaffirmed the Federal government's commitment to the Tasmanian Regional Forest Agreement."

The conference was a great success, and showed the importance of communities working together to promote the importance of maintaining rural values."

"Next year the TCA National conference will be held in Tasmania and we will be showcasing our region to visiting delegates." Mr Aulich concluded.

If anyone knows anything about the suitability of this crop please let us know.


Thanks to Erin Miller for her efforts in getting the lavender hedge started, it is really taking off now.




