Two arrested for street offences

It has been a month now, since I started at St Marys and can say I have settled in well.

Over the next few months I hope to get out and about a bit more and meet a lot more of you all. I have been getting the feeling that the St Marys Community is quite a close-knit community. I have been impressed with what I have seen so far in terms of positive attitude towards others in the Community. I refer specifically to several recent incidents of anti-social behaviour. Whilst two recent incidents have resulted in Arrests of the Offenders, I have been pleased to see the positive community support given to those responsible.

A Police Service can not do it alone when if comes to maintaining public order or detecting and preventing crime. It relies a great deal on information from the public. It also relies on a community having a positive outlook and commitment towards helping, not only your Police, but also others in the community.

As mentioned there have been two males arrested for street offences recently. There has also been another person charged in relation to several house break-ins along with a person charged with assault arising from a domestic related incident.

I have been pleased to see the willingness of some people to provide information and hope that more people follow this lead. All information is handled confidentially.

I am disappointed to hear of the on-going Vandalism to the Library. A Library is a service which is enjoyed by many in the St Marys area, and what a disappointment it would be to see it lost to the Community through the actions of the minority. I ask you all to be vigilant in reporting what you see to Police so the offenders can be dealt with.

I also remind everyone that Consuming Alcohol in a Public Street or Possessing an Open Container of Alcohol in a Public Street is an OFFENCE. It is also an offence for a person under 18 years to be in the Lounge area of a Hotel, except if having a meal or in the company of a Parent.

Follow-up to Rivercare

In heavy fog but with sunshine beginning to peep through on Wednesday 28th May, the Wombat Walk Weeding Group held an inspection of the river with Consultant Daniel Sprod, Greg Stewart Facilitator Upper South Esk Catchment Group and Greg Louden of Green Corp, to ascertain the effects of the removal of the Crack Willows along the banks of St Marys Rivulet and the subsequent flow of the river after the heavy rains of the 15th to 18th of May 2003.

Much input and knowledge was imparted to us from Daniel and the two Gregs. This inspection being the progress toward the third stage of the flood mitigation program co-ordinated by Daniel. The outcome of the riffle below the stormwater drain from Frank and Grant Street will be upgraded to stop the erosion into the bank opposite and a second riffle will be repaired below the Main Street Bridge and towards the end of Groom Street, this riffle will renew the town pool which drained because of the wash away which occurred during the rains of May.

The sewerage line which crosses the river to Mr Clement's land from the property previously owned by Mr Ray White, was inspected and it is planned to be reinforced by sand bagging and rocks to stabilise and prevent any further erosion and damage to this pipeline in flood circumstances.

As to the river flow, it is apparent that the excess water was able to get away quickly due to the larger under bridge storm water drain and the removal of the willows and thus no flooding of private land occurred during those rains. For those landholders who have a river boundary, some 2,000 native plants are available, these plantings are the second stage of Daniel's programme. We invite any one who wishes to plant out some of these plants on their own land adjacent to the river and /or who may care to help with the overall planting, or any community member who would care to help with this beautification of St Marys, then the Wombat Walk Weeding Group would be grateful for their help. Mr Greg Stewart is formulating an overall planting plan, say in three stages, for the planting and we shall follow his suggestions on this.

We trust that all this work will beautify the township of St Marys, and in particular the river area, thus making it an inviting place for tourists and locals alike, to stop a while and enjoy this wonderful part of Tasmania.

Growing up in St Marys in the 1930's **During the war years** by Jeff Morris

I was born on 26th May 1927 at the bottom end of Cameron Street, the same year as the St Marys District Hospital was built. Mother had meningitis and when I was brought out from the bedroom and put in the arms of 16 year old Tot Margison (who later became Mrs Alec Cornish), the doctor thought she was my older sister and said "a little brother for you but I don't think you will have him for long". But as you can see I defied the odds, and grew up very close to this lady for the rest of her life.

At the age of six I started school. The school was in the Main Street where the Town Hall now is, next to the old RSL Hall which I believe was built by public subscription as a remembrance to soldiers of the First World War 1914 -18 and the Boer War.

At school we sat two to a desk, my first desk partner was Grace Warren, daughter of Rev. Warren, Minister of Church of England and I clearly remember the day when they came to get Grace from school because her father was lost somewhere in Bass Strait. He was a passenger in the aeroplane "Miss Hobart" which disappeared and was never found. Rev Warren was on his way back up to Arnhem Land NT where he had been a missionary, to try to bring back an Aboriginal who had gone bush after spearing someone (story can be read in 'North of Capricorn'.

Grace became Dr Grace Warren who was in Australia a couple of years ago. I believe her life was as a Missionary Doctor in Indonesia or Malaysia. Our Headmaster was Mr Dagleish who was removed during Second World War and with quite a few others of German origin was interned for rest of the war. At the age of fourteen I left school, that was the leaving age then,

The main topic between us boys at that time was "which mine are you going to work at ?", because there was plenty of work at the mines, Cornwall, Jubilee and Mt Nicholas, as Clippers, that is attaching the skips that the miners had filled, onto the endless ropes on the incline down to the screens and also out of the mine. There was also work driving the ponies underground dragging the skips. Dad worked at the mine and I had made up my mind quite early not to work there, so I started as an apprentice to learn the baking trade with Mr Ted Chapman, his bakehouse and shop was next to the RSL...

The war had been going on in Europe for a couple of years and I was staying at 'Fern Dale' the Cornish farm near Bicheno on school holidays when I was 12 years old. One Sunday night listening to the wireless, which were rare in those days, when the Prime Minister came on to say "England has declared war on Germany, so Australia is also at war.' Alec and Tot's brother Bill said they were going to join up, Bill did immediately and served in the Middle East at El Alamein, Alec joined later and went to New Guinea, and that was the pattern of most young men at that time except for those who were medically unfit or who were in essential services.

This left a shortage of young men and women for shop work and such, and that is how I came to change my job to be an apprentice butcher with J A Smith and later with Alf Dawson in the shop that was situated on the corner where the Information Centre now is, the shop burnt down in 1966.

Robertson's Bridge on Wielangta Road

The Robertson Bridge is on the road between Orford and Nugent on Tasmania's East Coast, and is well worth a visit just to see its gigantic proportions.

A chance conversation with Claire who was at work at the Orford Library when I called in one dark, wet night when staying in the area, led me to being given the background and the logistics of the building of this spectacular timber bridge.

Claire's father William Robertson was the Supervisor when the bridge was constructed between December 1987 and January 1988, the period of actual construction was 3-4 weeks, spread over six rain interrupted weeks.

The height to road level, above the creek bed, is approximately 8.6 metres with a span of 6.5 metres. The volume of logs used was approximately 1200 c metres.

Logs used were Blue Gums salvaged from Wielangta Road clearing of road line on Blue Gum Spur. They were fallen parallel to the road line by Dick Gregson and dragged to the bridge site by David Walker of Nugent-Forcett area with a log skidder. The largest of these logs is estimated to weigh 14 tonnes. During the whole operation of falling, only two trees fell downhill and were lost due to the extreme steepness of the hillsides. This testifies to the skill of the faller who had to contend with, not only the steep side fall of the hills, but also the very rotten stumps of some of the trees he had to fall.

The D6 bulldozer would drive across the river, taking care to stay within the line that had to be cleared. Any trees that had to be pushed, were pushed straight along the line and within the confines of the finished road edges. After clearing a dump area well clear of the river on the south side of the stream, all the timber was then dragged away from the river bank. When this was finished the D6 was joined by a D8 and an Excavator. The southern base logs were placed in position and the Excavator crossed back to the northern side and laid the base there.

Both the abutments were built together as all the logs were on the one side, (the northern side), and it was necessary to keep both sides level and skid the logs across to the southern side as the bridge progressed.

125 mm of rain fell during the building period, and of course there was also the Christmas holiday break, this reduced the real building time to 3-4 weeks. A distance of 250 metres of road excavation on either side of the bridge was completed during the construction.

A few stats for those interested in big machines!

It is worthy to note that the Forest Practices Board sent a letter of congratulations to the road building crew for a job well done. It was very much appreciated by all as everyone had tried their very best to protect the ferns and trees adjacent to the bridge.

Thankyou to Mr William Robertson for this information.

The name 'Wielangta' was an Aboriginal term meaning tall timber. Thousands of years later it is still an apt name for the forest. The original pronunciation was probably more like 'wulungta', the original spelling.

Growing up in the war years by Jeff Morris

So begins the war years, we went through the same restrictions as they did in the cities, all windows had to be blacked out, no lights to be shown, no street lights, cars (what there were of them), had blackouts fitted to head lights, all you had was a very fine sliver of light through a fine slit to see with. Some cars were fitted with and ran on charcoal burners because petrol was rationed. Other goods were also rationed, essentials like tea, sugar, meat and such. We had coupons allowing so much per person each week. Many things were impossible to obtain, even clothing coupons, tobacco and cigarettes were very

hard to come by-even beer at the Pub was rationed.

We had Air Raid Wardens and Plane Spotters, at which I took my turn at the Spotters Office in the front room of the last house on the right side of Groom Street. There were picture silhouettes of aeroplanes around the walls of the office, a direct telephone to Control which I believe was in Hobart, and of course we had binoculars. There was one report of a Japanese plane flying over, and I think this is quite probable as at the same time one was reported over Hobart, a reconnaissance seaplane that was supposed to be launched from a Jap submarine that was sighted on the surface in Coles Bay area. I was also a runner message carrier for the Home Guard which was mostly made up of old veterans from the First World Ear and a few younger and medically unfit chaps. They were camped on guard at the top of both Passes with roads blocked and the top side of each Pass mined with explosives so they could be blown down and blocked off if necessary. Dad did most of the setting off of these.

We had a great Boy Scout Group at that time and we collected anything and everything, tyres, aluminium, books, old paper, anything which was wanted for the 'war effort'. We sent quite a few railway truck loads away, but after all we were still teenagers and still found time to go to the pictures in Todd's Hall on Wednesday and Saturday nights, dances every Friday night in the 'Top Hall' which used to be next to the Top Hotel where the Units are now. Some times a dance would be at Cornwall hall and if not

then at Fingal or even St Helens where we would sometimes ride out bikes.

We thought things were great in those days and we were young, but I can't erase the bad memories and the telegrams that used to arrive from the War Department.

Telegrams would inform next of kin, 'this one missing, believed Prisoner of War, killed in action, or wounded'. Everyone seemed to know immediately when the telegrams arrived in a small district. We

knew all the boys who were away and there were a lot of them.

I could name most but refrain from doing so because I'm afraid of missing someone, but I recall one instance. The Butlers lived about opposite the Golf Club, they had two sons in the Air Force, both Air Gunners in England. One day they received a telegram that one son was missing believed killed over Germany. Next morning Mr Butler came into the butchers shop and Mr Smith said to him how sorry he was and his answer was that 'at least I have one boy left'. The very next day another telegram arrived with exactly the same message for the other son, yes, they were sad times.

At last the war came to a sudden end with the dropping of the bomb on Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945 and we teenagers celebrated down at Harry Rawnsley's hotel at Scamander, I still don't know when I got home. I was still 17 and turned 18 in the May and had to face call up at the Barracks in Launceston where I stayed for some time until one morning I was called into the Captains office and told that I could

catch that days train home if I wished, as I would not be needed anymore.

The boys started coming home from the war and there were 'Welcome home's' arranged. That's a bit what it was like, there must be others who have stories to tell, let's hear them.

I draw to the attention of your readers the following item from the Break O'Day Counci Meeting Minutes 12 May 2003.

9.3 St Marys Drain - Gray Road File 032/005/015

Works Committee item on piping a drain on Gray Road

"This capital works item was raised last year and deferred until the following Budget, it is up for consideration again.

The project consists of piping and filling a drain along the edge of Gray Road to allow more parking and safe access for children. An amount of \$10,000 was allowed.

The item was discussed in the Works Committee meeting where it was recommended that Council should seek funding from the Department of Education to assist with this because it mainly benefits school children and (their) parents. CIr H Holder / CIr J Warren seconded. Carried.

Presumably our Council will ask the Department of Health to fund a footpath along Gardiners Creek Road on the grounds that it will mainly benefit sick people going to the hospital, the Department of Sport & Recreation should mow the nature strips on Gray road because it will benefit golfers looking for their balls, and the Department of Infrastructure should maintain the goat track from Irishtown Road to Newman Street because it will save people from being killed on their Highway!

Council recently voted \$600 to pay for new street signs in Dili, and \$1000 for a consultants report into employment prospects in Scottsdale! Now they want the Education Department to pay for our drains!

The reason this drain should be filled in is that it is dangerous to pedestrians walking along Gray Road, and that it is a breeding ground for mosquitoes. Open drains on built up areas without guard rails are also dangerous for vehicles in the event of an emergency stop or swerve. It is now 145 years since the town was established, ample time for Council to have filled in all open drains within the town!

The unused area of the school grounds between the swimming pool and Gray Road would make an ideal carpark, with safe access, far preferable to uncontrolled parking along the nature strip of the road.

It is good to learn that the request for a \$100,000 tractor for the Works Department was refused, now they can use \$1000 to get on with their job of looking after resident safety without setting up the excuse that they had no funds to do the job because the school couldn't pay for it!

Council might also explain why the Reserve Account of the St Marys Town Theme Committee is empty. Council advised (12 April 2002, Ref 010 / 006 / 002) that "the existing reserve balances be maintained and township committees be able to make recommendations for capitol works until the balances have been cleared" The St Marys Committee recommended that the entire Reserve Account balance of \$27,000 be applied to constructing a footpath from Irishtown Road to Newman Street. A gravel path was constructed at a cost of \$13,000. The path was a goat track from the start and has not been finished, upgraded, or maintained since, and yet the balance of \$14,000 has gone. Where ? The reserves of the Fingal and Scamander Committees are apparently still intact.

It seems that this years Works Budget contains very little for St Marys.

Possibly your readers may like to suggest some footpaths that need maintenance, some footpaths that need building, some flooding that needs to be alleviated, some kerbs that need adjusting, some potholes that need filling, some pedestrian crossings or refuges that are needed. Now that the Council has abolished the Town Theme Committee, there is nobody to speak for St Marys, and the Works Department don't give a stuff - they're too busy building up a warchest for an Aquatic Centre at the expense of basic infrastructure up here in the Highlands!

SMACD replies to the Rattler

In response to the issues raised by Cage Rattler (surely the most subdued ever to go to print) 22/5, that St Marys Association for Community Development has had a fairly low profile over the last 18 months.

With a new management committee, the loss of significant (aren't they all) committee members and with them the historical perspective, continuity and experience of SMACD, the current committee has gone through quite a period of introspection. We **too** have asked ourselves what is SMACD?

Our rules of association define the objects and purposes to be: To promote, encourage and develop a spirit of enterprise within the St Marys community that will stimulate economic activity and employment opportunities.

At a recent workshop, the committee expressed that the previous roles (by definition and action) were dollar oriented and now the role is one of education, spirit of co-operation, township revitalization, capacity building and information technology. In addition, SMACD <u>could</u> be a link to resources for community, take on a role of leadership in integration and funding, be a point of contact for the community and conduit for community organizations to develop individually and collectively.

So....what have we done about it?

We thought we would ask the community so we contacted other local groups and invited them to discuss their current situation and the way forward as they see it. We then followed up by sending out Pro-forma listing contacts, objects and aims, opportunities and challenges. Hoping to receive greater representation from the group's committee/members.

The response was: Funding, Resources, Membership, Community Support/Strength.

The meetings continued and out of this after some time emerged the Parents and Friends OP SHOP. This was not for the greater glory of SMACD, far from it, but just an example of what can happen when groups communicate, identify needs and strengths and move forward, At this stage a suggestion was put forward to all groups to submit a profile of their committee to the Valley Voice so people would be better informed of existing and future projects (a great idea that we did not act upon). Since this process, at least two groups that I know of have wound up.

The Online Centre, your online centre, acknowledged by SMACD to be a tool <u>for</u> community development, has commanded the lion's share of focus and energy of the committee for some time now.

Last Friday 30th of May a public meeting at St Marys Community Hall voted in favour of support for a North East Coast Online Cluster Management proposal. Meaning that the one board made up of representatives from those centres community would manage Bicheno, Fingal and St Marys Online centres. This would allow the online centres to better target regional needs, reduce administrational and insurance costs and help to overcome the current parochial culture that exists. It would also relieve SMACD of its management role therefore opening up possibilities of new pursuits. It must be said that no loss of equipment of ownership, reduction in funding or service will result, in fact the State Government, has recently announced in it's budget an ongoing allocation of \$1.773 million (a slight increase) to continue the role of online centres in Tasmania.

Other projects include the St Marys entrance to the Douglas-Apsley National park and Tourist Information and Interpretation Centre, which are still being thrown around.

All in all now is an excellent time to review old and new and any suggestions would be most welcome by either letter or attend our next meeting a St Marys Online Centre, Wednesday June 18th @ 12 pm.

I must commend Cage Rattler, not for the views expressed, but for simply engaging the community amidst a culture of counter involvement. For without representation there is no involvement in the process towards the agreement of ownership and identity.

So here is a little rattle you might say:

Of all our active membership for SMACD only 50% reside in St Marys itself, the other 50% reside at Cornwall, Irishtown and Scamander, leaving representation for St Marys in the hands of three individuals.

Is this good enough?

The Corruption of Richard

Family historians sometimes focus on a property or town name as a clue to the origins of Great Grandfather William. In the case of Conara, forget it!

Conara is a corruption of "Corners', which is the name that applied to that location during the 19th Century. 'Corners' in turn is a diminutive of 'Will's Corners', itself an abbreviation of 'Wills's Corners', which derived from 'Richard Willis' Corners', the name that came into common usage after Richard Willis was granted land at that place. However, he called his grant 'Wanstead'!

For the historically inclined, Edward Curr in 1820 referred to the location as 'Humphry's Waterholes', but that is another story.

One has to wonder why a perfectly logical, pleasant sounding, and historically justified name such as 'the Corners' was abandoned for a bastardisation? Either the land Survey officers of the time couldn't spell, read, write, or talk proper, or it was determined that the shorter name would be cheaper to put on maps and signs.

But it does explain the origin of the colonial nursery rhyme:

Little Dick Willis sat at his Corner Watching the coaches go by, He pulled out his gun, And rattled his Drum, And said 'Do stop for a lager and pie'
