Police report offenders being charged

It was very pleasing to see that the recent events held at St Marys on Saturday 21st June 2003 went off without any incidents being reported that required Police intervention. I refer to the Winter Solstice on Faulkners Green and also the function at the Hotel afterwards. I congratulate both organisations on their management of these events.

in terms of crime, there have been two incidents reported since the last Police report, being:

The theft of a Stihl 026 chainsaw from Mathinna, stolen overnight between 13th June '03 and 14th June '03. The theft of farm equipment from a farm at Four Mile Creek. The property stolen included, two super spreaders, a rotary hoe and a ripper, and occurred between 5th June '03 and 19th June '03.

Police have received information from the public relating to two burglaries which occurred earlier this year. As a result of this information four offenders have been charged with two separate burglaries. One of the burglaries related to a business at St Marys and the other to a farm near Seymour.

Online Access for all

The Bacon Government should be congratulated on providing \$1.73 million funding for the Tasmanian Communities Online in the current State Budget. This was revealed in a Budget preview announcement by the Minister for Education, Paula Wriedt in May at the Sorell Online Access Centre.

Now the certainty of ongoing funding means that Online Access Centres can, with confidence, build on their past successes. This is welcome news for Bicheno, Campbell Town, Fingal, St Helens and St Marys Online Access Centres which play an important role in supporting local communities.

State-wide the Centres have not only provided the obvious email and Internet service but have become a place where people meet in the community, a place where ideas are exchanged, a place where other projects have been spawned not only those connected with computers. They fill a void in the community left by the demise of former institutions such as Church, CWA and many other associations in which community once met.

Online Centres can support the jobless, engage the elderly, connect family who are far away and foster educational opportunities for those who feel isolated by distance. Rural youth have especially become connected with one another through modern communication technologies.

The Editor Valley Voice Dear Sir/Madam

I would like to respond to letters published in the June 19 Valley Voice by Mr David Clement and "Cage Rattler"

Both raise pertinent issues about charges and rates levied by Council on St Marys residents, and Council's ongoing commitment (or lack of, as implied by Mr Clement in his letter) to capital works spending in the town.

Firstly, to address a couple of points raised by Mr Clement. He says that Council is not 'accountable' simply because all householders do not personally receive a detailed financial breakdown of St Marys water scheme operations. There is not a single Council in Australia that provides this depth of detail to every resident in the municipality on an ongoing basis. However, as Mr Clement well knows, this information is 'public information' and is (mostly) contained in Council's audited financial accounts and budget, available to any person on request. The fact that we do not pop daily financial updates into Mr Člement's letterbox does not make Council unaccountable, in fact after 10 years in the private sector I have never personally known any industry to have to be more 'accountable' than local government!

Secondly, if Mr Clement bothered to seek facts before he 'shot from the hip' complaining about \$200,000 allocated to the Volunteer Resource Coordinator project, he would have found out that this project is fully funded by the Commonwealth Government, with no cost to Break O'Day ratepayers. This project will deliver fantastic support for the hundreds of volunteers who work in our community.

Similarly, there is no <u>proposed</u> aquatic centre as Mr Clement writes, but rather Council is assisting with a <u>feasibility study</u>, as requested by hundreds of ratepayers, to look at improved aquatic access and facilities in the municipality. At this stage, there has been no further financial commitment than this by Council. This study will include looking at possibly expanded community use for both St Helens and St Marys school pools. Surely this is a positive initiative responding to a community need, and should not be slated simply because Mr Clement is reluctant to strip off down to his speedos?

Finally both Mr Clement and Cage Rattler raise concerns they have about the direction of Council spending in general. It's a good point - Council is 100% accountable to the community and it is the community who should dictate exactly what they want Council to do. Every Council in Tasmania is required by law to work to a 5 year Strategic Plan, which tells us what to do and how it should be resourced. This plan covers everything Council does, from water schemes in each town to animal control to community grants.

Council's current plan, covering the years 2000 - 2005, has this year been revised as many of the objectives within that document have been achieved (such as the community radio station) or need revising.

With this in mind, Council sent out a new draft plan for 2003 - 2008, seeking general community input. We asked the community to tell us what they wanted included, what they wanted removed, what they were happy with, what they were not happy with.

There was a 60 day period where we sought feedback from the community, and we advertised this heavily by:-

- Advising people of the plan in our Council newsletter, which goes out to every ratepayer;
- Advertising extensively in the Valley Voice and the Suncoast News;
- Advertising extensively on BO'D FM;
- . The plan was available on Council's web-site during the 60 day submission period;
- Sending a copy of the plan to nearly 50 community and business groups throughout the municipality, not only requesting feedback and submissions but saying we would be happy to provide further information and guidance on any matter if at all required. In St Marys, we directly mailed this to Grassy Bottom Regional Arts, St Marys Community Childcare Centre, St Marys Online Access Centre, St Marys Association for Community Development, Cornwall Community Committee, St Marys District High School, St Marys Lions Club, and St Marys Community Health Centre.

Copies of the draft plan were available during the 60 day period at the St Marys Post Office.

Mr Clement says in his letter that the draft Plan is "up the duff', which at least shows that he has read it. But we cannot find your submission Mr Clement, nor do we appear to have received one from Cage Rattler.

It is well and good for Mr Clement and Cage Rattler to complain about what they are not happy with regarding Council's operations, but if they are not prepared to offer any input whatsoever into our plan when it has been extensively advertised, then what do they expect? Cage Rattler - you say that 'we are watching you' to Council - why don't you do a little bit more and actually participate in the process (we want you to - really!) rather than just sling a bit of mud around afterwards? If you have good ideas, be positive and share them around. Get involved!

Mr Clement has come up with his own unique ideas over the years on what he thinks Council should be doing. Increasing our municipal population by offering free burials to anyone moving here (town logos could be 'St Marys' - one step closer to the grave'?? St Marys - till death us do part'?) and reducing

Council's workforce by 48% are just two of his innovative suggestions.

Council WANTS the community to participate in decision making and setting our goals and objectives. But the community needs to take some responsibility in actively participating in setting local agendas.



The Break O'Day Council's five year Stategic Plan 2003 –2008 sets an objective of encouraging the creation of additional employment within the Municipality, to be achieved by 7 strategies, and the success of those strategies in achieving the Objective will be measured by 13 Performance Measures. Fairly typical of the performance measure is to be a member of the St Helens Chamber of Commerce, to attend meetings, approve draft inputs, be involved in partnerships, initiate initiatives, facilitate and develop stuff, and provide reports on a quarterly basis. All highly commendable, but nowhere do these performance measures actually mention "counting the number of people employed" to see if there has been a change!

It might be better to spend the \$120,000 or so to be spent on memberships, subscriptions, etc., on employing gardeners/maintenance staff in the townships, to encourage new settlers to settle in these beautifully maintained towns and boost the local economy and increase the numbers in employment. After all, the ones attending meetings, providing reports etc. are already employed, providing Draft Plans.



Rhubarb - plant now

The crowns of rhubarb should be planted in garden beds raised about 15 cm high. Work in a generous amount of well rotted down animal manure through the bed and then plant the rhubarb crown. Plant in a sunny, relatively wind free area if possible. Water regularly throughout the summer months. Rhubarb may be left undisturbed for four years or more.

The stalks of rhubarb, pulled away from the base of the plant, make wonderful winter deserts.

Townsafe

As a consequence of the Forestry Commission's proposed logging at St Patricks Head and the advice by Gunns Ltd that it will cart the logs to Triabunna via St Marys Pass, a submission has been made (11/6/03) to the Secretary, Department of Infrastructure, Energy and Resources that the junction of Irishtown Road and Esk Main Road "is a deficient and unsafe access which does not have an acceptable level of risk in relation to the avoidance of collision between vehicles travelling along the Esk Main Road and those which are turning".

55% of Tasmanian road accidents occur at intersections or accesses. Accident Indicators for the St Marys Pass show that heavy vehicle involvement is over represented by state norms. This junction is not designed for long vehicles such as log trucks.

It was printed out that the access is dangerous in 10 respects, including inadequate Intersection Sighting Distance, speeds in excess of the marked speed limit, line markings which allow overtaking at the access, and inadequate road width to allow long vehicles such as log trucks to turn from Irishtown Rd within a safe time.

It was submitted that these factors, both individually and in combination, make this access unsuitable for log trucks, and that such vehicles be prohibited from using this access until remedial action has been taken to ensure a safe junction.

For Townsafe St Marys

St Marys 1903

"Some eight years ago there was a public meeting convened to discuss establishing a public cemetery for St Marys. A subsequent meeting announced that suitable ground had been found and steps taken to secure it; the ground in Gray Road was commenced three years back, consecrated firstly by the Methodists in 1899 and the Catholics and Presbyterians two years ago. As yet the Anglicans have not done so. There are two Undertakers in the township, Mr Mitchell and Mr McHugo, apparently keenly in competition, with rates of ten shillings for a grave and five pounds for a burial. Last year, Mr Mitchell complained in the "Examiner" that "it is virtually impossible to find vacant ground in Cullenswood Cemetery. Some times three attempts are necessary to find ground that does not contain other bodies." Mr Mitchell urged that now there was a public cemetery in the area, burials at Cullenswood should be ceased, except for reserved sites." 1.

"Lest we forget" rings a little hollowly, when the St Marys Cemetery is still nameless after 104 years !! Council should engage a craftsman to design and construct an entrance gate and signage, "St Marys Cemetery 1899", adding dignity to the cemetery and recognition of the forbears of the district; it has previously rejected a proposal that cemetery fees be waived for ratepayers and their spouse who have lived in the area for 25 years or more, as a gesture of community respect - not putting a name on the Cemetery is even more dismissive. Last year Council budgeted \$10,771 for Cemeteries for the municipality, compared with \$52,917 for the control of animals.

It was only at the suggestion of the Town Theme Committee that Council placed a 'CEMETARY' sign on the signpost at the Main St / Storey St corner. It seems that "out of sight, out of mind" applies to the residents as well as to the town of St Marys, yet another reason to consider secession.
