Police Report

These reports being provided by our Police Officers at St Marys Police Station are becoming a regular feature of the Valley Voice and it is hoped that by keeping the community informed, the

community will assist our Police by providing them with valuable information relating to any crime and acts of nuisance and vandalism being committed within our communities.

Quick apprehension of Offenders

Since the last Valley Voice, several crimes have been committed in our Division. Two jerry cans of fuel were stolen from a farm at Four Mile Creek on Sunday 6th July 2003, then three days later on Wednesday 9th July 2003 a burglary occurred of a dwelling in St Marys which resulted in a male being charged.

More burglaries occurred at a business in Fingal on Wednesday 16th July 2003, in which a large quantity of cigarettes was stolen. A further related burglary occurred at a business at Scamander which resulted in another large quantity of cigarettes being stolen. A third burglary involving the theft of alcohol occurred at a business in St Helens. Police subsequently charged a male offender from the Hobart area with these three crimes.

It is essential that we realise criminals frequently cross municipal boundaries to commit crime and can not stress enough the importance of recording descriptions and registration numbers of any strange/suspicious vehicles sighted.


Proposal for Irishtown

'St Marys Police Station-Disabled and Elderly Access'

Thank you for your letter dated 3 June 2003 concerning the issue of disabled and elderly access to the St Marys Police Station.

As part of its Strategic Asset Management Plan, the Department of Police and Public Safety is conducting assessments during the 2003/2004 financial year on all departmental buildings regarding compliance with the building code and Discrimination and Disability Act.

This review will identify urgent maintenance requirements. St Marys Police Station will be assessed during this period and if, as indicated in your letter, access for disabled or elderly persons is inadequate, measures will be taken to rectify the situation.

This issue is of concern to me and I assure you that Tasmania Police is fully committed to providing adequate access to all police buildings for every member of the Tasmanian community.

Thank you for bringing this issue to my attention and I trust this letter answers the concerns you have.

The Editor Valley Voice

Sir

Recent letters published in the Valley Voice have caused me to respond to some of the issues raised.

Firstly those relating to seceding from the B.O.D Council. What a great idea (I don't think)! Are we expected to follow this idea like sheep, a great deal of soul searching and common sense must have gone into thinking this through? Some basic questions for the proposers of this concept.

- (a) Where do initial set up funds come from, the ratepayers of St Marys (not likely)
- (b) Where is the infrastructure to do so, there are no assets such as council buildings, sports grounds or machinery/equipment let alone employees to carry out duties or tasks.
- (d) How is the concept to be managed and by whom?

So the real issue appears to be to raise funds to stand alone for the management of St Marys or others that may join this scheme. What studies have been done that show without rates collected by our current townships in the B.O.D how it will be sustainable for St Marys to stand-alone? I think most of us would get a shock at the costs involved in doing this, with a probability our rates would be significantly higher than those currently paid. Can you imagine any State Government allowing a break away of this nature to happen simply to please the chosen few? It is not all doom and gloom, if successful we can have important issues resolved such as the color of wheelie bins, like choose your own, pink orange etc and forget that they are actually there for the collection of household rubbish. That wouldn't matter because if we seceded - we won't have a rubbish tip that takes waste collection, the ratepayers of the B.O.D - not the new group, will own it.

Of course there are lots of other issues both legal and those requiring common sense which indicate strongly this is simply a pie in the sky scheme which would require much more time, space and effort to address the various issues involved apart from the basic ones I have raised.

One last blast, we do have a democratic way of addressing these issues. If you want change and you do really feel strongly enough about it, don't just bag the Council, you can nominate for election or use your voting power to assist in removing those you think are not doing the job. Pretty simple really, I wonder who will nominate themselves to actually do something, instead of sitting on the fence like some of us do and just be critical.

My next question is who is 'Town Safe', a single person, two or three people or a group as such. I ask this because I have never seen any notices about their formation or meetings that may have taken place, yet correspondence has been written to various organisations about road safety issues at St Marys. So who do they represent, certainly not me, because as a resident I have never been consulted publicly regarding ways we could have any input into these matters? I do have a matter that they could consider, what would be their policy if any person removed speed signs within the town boundary without any authority, thereby placing all residents at severe risk, simply because a protest has to be made for a cause.

It is obvious to blind freddy that removal of these signs would place this community at a far greater risk than any justifiable protest action (but I could be wrong).

My next concern relates to a recent letter drop about weed spraying. The author should be congratulated about the public notice retraction made in the Valley Voice because it clears up any misconceptions that may have occurred over this issue. However, again I am confused because the retraction states clearly the issue involved is a 'community initiative'. The question is what community. I again have never seen any notices seeking our concerns or input requested from community members. So is it a community concern or simply that of those who have no sanction from the general community to represent them (again I could be wrong). I appreciate everyone is entitled to their individual views and causes, but attempts to paint a different picture to that other than reality when using the word community, or anything which implies a group is involved, is potentially misleading, especially when the community has not been consulted or given input. So are they crusades of a single person or a very few (I wonder).

Let us not worry about something like a real issue, for example the state of the Esk Highway which is in need of major works throughout the valley. It is in fact a danger and embarrassment, not only for us who drive it but see so many other Tasmanians and visitors doing so (ever been in the back of an ambulance on it). With the advent of more ferries to this State it will mean more tourists, more turnover for businesses in this town, possibly creating more employment. But that would not suit some people because we may actually have tourists. Business proprietors may have an opportunity to get a decent return for their investment and risk taking. This may also have the effect of some of that income flowing on, with their continued support of service groups and other organisations by way of assistance or donations. Perhaps that is something to really think about (but again - I could be wrong).

After the War by Jeff Morris

So, the war was over. Everything was booming, I had tried everything from baking, butchering and for the last twelve months or so in a grocery shop working for Mr McGeary delivering groceries and carting goods from Railway Station for a while with an old grey horse and cart until one day the horse bolted and smashed the dray. Mr McGeary then got an old canvas topped car, cut the back down to a ute, got me a special licence to drive because I was under age for a driving licence. I have driven ever since, roughly sixty years and never had an accident (touch wood!).

Stories can be told about those times, plenty of them, like going to Scamander one evening to pick up a load of vegetables. On my way home, came on dark and the lights would not work, so my old friend Clive Berwick who had come with me, sat on the front with a torch that we were lucky enough to have with us and I drove all the way up the Pass and home at about 'no miles an hour' and could see only a yard or two in front of us.

Another day I went to Cornwall delivering, when I got to Mrs Williams she asked if I could possibly get her a little bit of rice (which was terribly hard to come by then) because Leon was coming home next week and he always loved rice. Now Leon was a sailor on the HMAS Perth which was sunk with the American ship "Houston" in the battle of the Coral Sea, he was picked up by the Japanese and served the rest of the war in Changi. He only weighed around 6 stone when he came home. After some trouble I did get a little bit of rice for Mrs Williams. Some time later she told me the first day Leon was home she served up the rice and perhaps you can guess what happened. Out the back door went the rice, plate and all with the words, ' I've lived on bloody rice for the last three years and I don't want to see the damed stuff ever again', or words to that effect. I always felt terribly sorry for her.

But, did I get into some rows during that time when the tobacco rations and other food stuff that was rationed did not arrive on time. About this time I was in the 'Call up', only away for a couple of weeks, but when I came home my job was taken so had to look for something else.

Being winter at that time rabbit skins were a good price, about twelve shillings a dozen, so I would go three days a week out across the 'back run' until I got a dozen then skin and peg next day, which was about 30 shillings to two pounds a week. I would pay Mum ten shillings board and was still getting more than one pound five shillings. I was paid working and certainly enjoying myself more but of course winter came to an end but the Dawsons who were skin buyers offered me a job in the skin shed learning to class skins and pack them in bales under the eye of Bert Dawson and Albert Brown.

When the skin season was over Geoff Dawson gave me a job in the shop and delivering groceries in an old rough Bedford truck - more stories there to be told, like the day I brought a big barrel of mutton birds up from the railway. Geoff said to bring then into the shop and take the top off, when I did - oh the smell - they were rank. Bert said to put them back on the truck and take then up the bush and burn them. So I did put them back on the truck, Geoff rushed out and told me to take them back into the shop, so I did. This happened at least three or four times until eventually Bert won out, so away I went, tipped them behind a log and set fire to them. I have never seen anything burn like them and I have not been able to eat mutton birds since.

Every Friday night Mr Silas Jones used to come into the shop like everyone else but he would go straight to the biscuit tins and grab a handful of biscuits and eat them. Geoff got sick of this so one Friday he got a tin and filled it with real big hard dog biscuits which were a new product.

Noise annoys, particularly when we want to relax and enjoy our leisure time at home. It can affect the nervous system, disturb sleep, spoil concentration and damage hearing. Neighbourhood noise problems are amongst the most frequent causes of complaints received by local Councils, the Police and the Department of Primary Industries, Water

and Environment.

Noise in the community has a variety of sources of which power tools, trail bikes, industry, entertainment, lawn mowers, heat pumps and animals are the most common.

Chainsaws and Power Equipment - (i.e. Power Tools, Pool Pumps)

•	Monday to Friday	7.00 am to 6.00 pm
•	Saturday	9.00 am to 6.00 pm
•	Sunday, Good Friday and Christmas Day	10.00 am to 6.00 pm

Lawn Mowers

•	Monday to Friday	7.00 am to 8.00 pm
•	Saturday	8.00 am to 8.00 pm

Off Roads / Recreation Vehicles

There are however specific restrictions on where chainsaws and off-road / recreational vehicles may be used.

If you are annoyed by noise:

If you are annoyed by noise created by neighbours, there are a number of approaches you can take. The first thing to do is to try to solve the problem amicably by talking it over with the person causing the noise. Often they will not have realised they are causing you a problem and in many cases they will be only too happy to do what they can to help.

- ◆Formal action may be necessary where the noise is a recurrent problem. You may lodge an individual complaint or where the noise affects a number of neighbours a combined complaint, with your local Council.
- ◆Council has the power to investigate and ease many of the offensive noise problems in the community.
- ♦If the noise is a 'one off' problem (especially at night) you should consider contacting the local Police.



Slushing around in the mud.


Slush is quite a big pig nowadays. As soon as Sherbet left she began to grow and develop her character.


She enjoys a tickle behind the ears, and sometimes a scratch on her back. Like most pigs she loves it so much that she lies down with the sheer delight.




Preparation for the show

MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID COURSE

Life's fellow traveler-Monica Neulist

Last week I attended a two day workshop at the Community Health Centre which was Mental Health First Aid. My interest was personal, professional and community orientated. The information in the manual is appropriate to equipping the average person with the basic understanding of self, intimate's and those we meet in the community and in professional circumstances, with an understanding of health issues of the mind. This realm is usually clothed in stigma and mysticism and an area we usually find hard to share with others let alone understand or accept certain aspects of. Neglect of ours and others well being of the mind is common and this is becoming rectified with the holistic approach to health care, encompassing the physical, psychological and spiritual. The course taught us to know the symptoms and some of the reasons (based on current statistics and research) behind anxiety, depression, suicide, substance abuse, psychosis and the treatment options. Cognitive Therapy was explained to us as a good alternative to medication for such disorders as anxiety and depression. It is reality thinking rather than positive thinking and can help to change some of the negative self talk we choose to tell ourselves which can contribute to worsen our situation's. It also taught us the protocol for the situation of trying to help a person having a psychotic episode which minimizes the harm they can do to themselves or others whilst not being rationale. I think we all have our eccentricities or have the proverbial 'Mad' relative in the family but when there is an extended problem coping with everyday issues then the problem needs to be addressed. In this information technological trend and ME'ism society we are evolving with, a common theme comes through, self empowerment; but this needs to be tempered with the understanding of ourselves and others with empathy and tolerance.

Keeping them here

My dad once told me something that I never forgot. He said that when he left school at age 14, getting a job wasn't the issue. The issue was working (within reason) somewhere that you wanted to.

It goes without saying that half a century ago occupations were much more labour intensive and manual work was exactly that. Some might say good riddance to that amount of hard physical work but at least everyone had a pay packet to look forward to. Unfortunately those days in that regard are long gone, probably never to return.

Even in my time there was substantial employment at the Hydro, Telecom, DMR, Railway, farm work,

forestry industry and mining.

Just look now in the Fingal Valley. So many of our young people have to move just to even get close to finding a job. Quite a few succeed but it is highly unlikely that we will see them back here again. That is a real tragedy. It is one way traffic.

Perhaps it is about time we seriously asked our Federal, State and Local Government officials to try a lot harder encouraging decentralisation of services to rural communities like ours. For an instance why do computer based jobs necessarily have to always be located in cities. With networking like it is now, it would be just as easy for much of this to be done in the bush.

Our area has a large and ever growing older population. Why not lobby our politicians to alleviate the load from Medea Park and develop an elderly home and home care service based out of our hospital / health centre. I am sure that there would be plenty of our local aging population, their families and also a number of our young folk who are working there, who would welcome being able to stay in the familiar territory of their valley.

Thank goodness for our NEET Centre and the quality training it provides, however once again why not seek a much wider and more detailed training facility based here. Perhaps this may encourage not just the young people to stay but also bring people in as teachers or lecturers, to country life and possibly involving locals, organisations and clubs in providing locations and supplies, e.g. horticulture.

Maybe even a co-ordinated approach to local talent, arts, crafts, market gardens, skills advice and

new cottage industry could be based in our town or close by.

It is about time our politicians took a punt on us country folk. I can guarantee they would not be disappointed. What better example of a non city based service being a success than our Lymphoedema Centre. It says it all.

This could happen in all sorts of areas, but it needs imagination, foresight and knowledge, something we would have bundles of in our young ones. Wouldn't it be great to see the pollies and local government giving our valley a real leg up again. We can only ask can't we.


