# Todd's Hall

# So much history, so many memories.

Todd's Hall was first mentioned in the Valuation Rolls in 1896

It all started in Omagh, County Tyrone, Ireland in 1866, when William James Todd was born to William and Elizabeth Todd. The family arrived in St Marys in 1890 and father William leased a shop next to the Criterion Hotel for 5 years to test the market.

William James then built Todd's Hall in 1895, whilst his father William extended the original St Marys

Hotel by adding an extra 8 rooms and a balcony.

In 1990 Cyclopedia Tasmania carried the following description of Todd's Hall:

"He then erected a handsome two story building, Todd's Hall. The store is lofty, well lighted and ventilated and the stock is thoroughly comprehensive embodying jewellery and stationery, besides the usual goods kept by a first class store, viz groceries, ironmongery, drapery, boots and shoes etc."....

In 1917 Todd's Hall burned down and was soon rebuilt.

From the 1920's the Hall was used as a picture theatre and for roller-skating. Keith Bullock remembers the first talking picture, which was a disaster, the only words heard were ..." I don't want any lunch". The next picture was a musical and was much better. Admission 9 pence and 3 pence for a peanut bar. When a Charlie Chaplin picture was being shown Todd's Hall would be booked out.

About that time Garney Perger had a sweet and icecream shop on the right hand side while the Launceston Bank for Savings with Manager Shaven Bayles was on the left, but reportedly had few customers. Waterworths sold 'Warts Whoppers' from an icecream shop.

Later owners and businesses remembered are Mr and Mrs Col Royle who ran the theatre and other business. Mr Jenkins cut every ones hair in one of the front shops and it was a very popular place with the men to say they were going and to buy the 'Express' newspaper when it came in on the late Saturday night bus, and if late home after going to the hotel instead of for a haircut the excuse was that the bus was late coming in !

Peter Rubenach had the Post and Rail Museum for a few years. Thomas and Kristina Moore were there

in 1990 and sold whole foods and operated a Laundromat.

Our last Todd's Hall owners who did so much for the town were Andrew and Jen and that is a special story of it's own.

**The interior**: Hardwood floors, heavy pine doors, architraves and dado. Gold trim pressed tin decoration surrounding the proscenium arch above the sloping stage. The hall had a vast arch ceiling of blackwood and pine.

The original seats were wrought iron and there was a ticket window in the foyer.

### Those were the days !!

The memories I have of Todd's Hall are mainly of the pictures that everyone always went to on a

regular basis.

Saturday afternoon matinees were mostly for the younger ones with cartoons, a serial and a main feature. Of course the serial always ended in suspense, you had to return next week to see the outcome. The wooden seats at the front were always your domain until you became a teenager and then you moved backwards onto the good seats.

Mrs Studt who was the owner then, and usherette, didn't put up with any funny business and many

(mainly boys) felt the tap of her torch on their head.

Wednesday and Saturday nights especially, were always packed out, you would hear the knitting needles clicking away as women continued their knitting in the dark.

If there was a musical being shown, people would be singing and whistling the tune on their way home.

I also remember the concerts with Mrs Dorothy Aldred-Smith giving her wonderful recitations with either a cockney accent or a 'La-de-dah' plum in the mouth one.

For a few years the CYSS held meetings for the young, discos etc. upstairs in what we knew as the supper room.

### Wonderful Balls at Todd's Hall

What memories we have of Todd's Hall.

My memories go back to the wonderful Balls held in this grand hall. Bachelor and Spinster Balls were held every year with the Bachelors and Spinsters arranging all details for their night, then the married folk would hold their ball in return.

In those days, in the 1930's, the orchestra would strike up at 8 o'clock for the 'Grand March' and if you missed the grand march you lost the highlight of the year.

The floor was just magnificent for dancing. Work would go on for a week ahead, waxing and polishing, such a lot of work, but it was worth it. Supper at these balls was served by a ladies committee and all was laid out upstairs with everybody able to be seated. The food was real country style, sandwiches, sausage rolls and then every sweet you could think of. Supper usually took three sittings.

Badminton was played in the hall and later it was turned into a picture theatre when my husband Col and I took over from Bob Studt. We bought the hall and the picture business.

At that time it cost 4 shillings to go in to the pictures but I cannot remember about the price for children. We had Bill Mitchell and my husband in the projector room, Mr Mick Gatty in the Box Office, Ted Hayes on the door and I was the Lady with the torch!!

An afternoon matinee every Saturday was great for the children and some adults too. If we had a very big picture like South Pacific or Exodus, we had to show these for a whole week. We had regular patrons come from Bicheno, Fingal, Mathinna and Mangana etc. These seats would be booked for every show.

Occasionally we would have a break in the film, there would be some whistling and calling out, but not too bad. I always remember the Jaffas rolling down the floor, always at a quiet time in the picture.

We also had some wonderful concerts in Todd's Hall, always with packed houses and with all local people performing. There were to name a few, Mrs Dorothy Smith, Clive Berwick, Dawn Bushing, Graham Neil, Gib Gillies and many, many more, but my memory fails me to name them all. Then along came television. We tried to keep the theatre going but it was not to be.

We had a shop in the front of this building, one for clothing and fancy goods and the other one as a theatre shop. This shop was run by our daughter Judy Spilsbury and it was very successful.

I can still see Ted Munley as the ice cream boy in the theatre.

After the theatre closed we turned the hall onto a general store, stocking most items.

It is indeed a very, very sad day to see Todd's Hall come to such a sad end.

### One wheelbarrow too many!

We purchased Todd's Hall from Col Royle in 1974 and set up a museum, Tea room, Craft Shop and Art Gallery for about three years. We then sold the building to Tas Yates.

My great uncle Tom Stephenson told me a story about what once happened when they were building Todd's Hall. He said that two of the builders got drunk one night and one of them climbed into a wheel-barrow while the other one wheeled him around the block. They both made such a lot of noise that the police were called and the pair were locked up for the night for disturbing the peace.

Beverly and I had our wedding reception in the upstairs reception room on the 1st February 1975 and our daughter Esther celebrated her 18th birthday with a party in the hall.

We have a lot of fond memories of our own involvement with Todd's Hall and such a fine building is sadly missed.

I am part of Townsafe, we need a flagship to put safety issues on the public record and to lobby the appropriate 'authorities to fix safety issues in the town.

Residents of Irishtown know that the junction with Pass Road is unsafe. Also the road markings are dumb, I break the traffic law every time I go home by having to cross an unbroken white dividing line. The so-called footpath to the church is a jokedangerous, badly constructed, badly maintained and unfinished. And where has the roundabout got to at the junction of Main Street and Storey Street. This was the number one priority at the workshop meeting input to the St Marys Townscape Project.

A Safety Audit by the Department of Transport states that sight distances are obstructed, the junction is a non standard angle and there is no channelisation (??). This corner is an accident waiting to happen, and it nearly does at least twice a day.

If we all get behind Townsafe St Marys, these sorts of things might get fixed, because they sure aren't very fixed by the 'authorities' now.

Mr Bob Hersey's letter, Valley Voice 17 July 2003, echoes Voltaire, "I may disagree with all that you say but I will fight unto death for your right to say it". The Valley Voice is confirmed again as an effective forum for dialogue on matters of public interest. After much study over many years, I am now more than ever aware of the grave dangers inherent in our use of agricultural chemicals within town boundaries and public places, should these chemicals enter the human gene pool.

The World Health Organisation report a wide variety of known health effects, both chronic and acute, from exposure to pesticides including cancer, damage to the immune system and reproductive system and birth defects.

Mr Ewan-Street of the New Zealand Government has reported "There are thousands of people who are sick from spray drift and who have no legal redress.

It is the writer's position that a Code of Practice regarding chemical spraying by government agencies and contractors within town boundaries and public places be made mandatory, thus giving the population an area of redress. Also there are vast quantities of documental material available from very reputable scientists and one such person, Mr David Leaman, Geo-hydrologist of Hobart, recently spoke at St Helens on the problem of chemicals entering the underground water resources and the effects of this water when used on the land.

We are all aware of what happened with asbestos at Wittanoom, the authorities knew long before that mine started what dangers there were in mining that material, yet they went ahead, "were those people disposable, for the financial gain that was envisaged by the authorities"? Also the DDT debacle, that was safe too, very safe indeed. It is my contention that the very same scenario is being applied today with the use of agricultural chemicals on the population.

I have been requesting from all levels of Government, a copy of their Health Impact Assessment, and to date nothing, so one can assume that this Health Impact Assessment report has never been done. A similar situation with the American Government who have been requesting such a report from Monsanto and others of like ilk, and they too are still waiting. I would say that this resistance from these chemical giants is all in the name of greed and their world wide distribution of their chemicals and the opportunity to dump onto third world nations chemicals they are unable to dispose of elsewhere.

Should you care to read our very own Break O'Day Council's Handbook on Chemical Safety, you will see there on page 13 and I quote, "Remove livestock and people not involved in the application and sign post if necessary " and "during application, monitor the weather, increased wind, increased driff", it has been my personal experience that neither of these dot points were applied. Since 1998/9 I have been requesting a few safe guidelines for our town, from Council and State Government Department of Infrastructure and Main Roads, their contractors and subcontractors, to apply a few simple rules/guidelines and they are as follows:

- 1. Not to spray within towns and public areas at all.
- 2. Send out to all householders, fliers announcing that spraying is to be undertaken and in which areas/roads etc., thus giving residents the opportunity to lodge an objection, or the choice not to travel on stated roads on that day of spraying.
- 3. Signage at both ends of the roadways etc. being sprayed.
- 4. A logo to be visible on all trucks carrying out such work.
- 5. Emergency numbers to be visible on all vehicles carrying out chemical spraying.
- 6. The name of the chemical being used to be displayed on the vehicle.
- 7. Workmen not to stand on back of vehicle to do spraying, as this exacerbates the situation.
- 8. That no spraying be undertaken in any windy conditions, as spray will drift even on a still day, and St Marys has an average wind velocity of 11 kph.
- 9. No spraying to be carried out near or onto waterways, storm water drains etc. The buffer zone of at least 20 metres should be applied here.

We have a Workplace Safe Policy so why is there not a Townsafe Policy to protect the health of the population and future generations. Patricia O'Donnell St Marys

In response to 'The Say' by Cage Rattler regarding employment opportunities in the Fingal Valley, I would like to specifically address Cage Rattler's suggestion for a coordinated approach to developing 'cottage industries' in the Fingal Valley.

The Break O'Day Community Enterprise Co-operative Soc Ltd. Has been working for several months with the aim of developing community based enterprises, which will provide employment for local people. Currently the co-op is working in partnership with the St Marys District High School to develop a community 'market garden'. The garden should soon be a reality and apart from the very important training and social opportunities it will provide, it is intended that it will be the starting point for a network of gardens around the area growing organic produce. It is well known that there is increasing market demand for quality organic food and the Break O'Day area is well suited to this type of niche agriculture.

The co-op is also working hard on developing a business plan to acquire the Fingal Valley Railway Station from Tasrail. The plan is to restore the station which will then house a historical display of the valley, a visitor information centre, a retail outlet for arts and crafts and also tea rooms.

There has also been discussion of developing a local farmers market, a model which has proven successful in several other regions in Australia and possibilities for tourism and art/craft ventures are also being explored.

I would like to extend an invitation to Cage Rattler and any others who are interested in developing employment opportunities in the area to attend the next Co-op meeting. Meetings are held 2.00 pm on the second Thursday of every month at the St Marys Hall Supper Room. Next meeting is Thursday 14th August 2003.

There is a growing body of evidence which indicates that the small, rural communities that have grown and prospered in recent times, are those that have been proactive in developing their own enterprise opportunities, rather than waiting for governments to step in and 'fix' the situation for them. Residents of the Break O'Day area have all the skills, talent and passion needed to create long term solutions to unemployment – we just have to work together!

# Cornwall days told by Jim Haas

For some time the Valley Voice has been asking me to put pen to paper and talk about Cornwall and it's people. I have been slack, but reading the stories by Jeff Morris in recent additions has spurred me on. Thank you Jeff, they were excellent.

As a boy growing up at Cornwall in the fifties and sixties, the town sported about 80 houses, 2 shops, a butcher, a post office, daily bread delivery, Church of England church and a Salvation Army hall and residence. A place to buy sly grog and an illegal bet on the side was also available. The coalmine at that time was employing 120 or so men, some travelling by bus from St Marys and Fingal.

We now have some 40 houses, no shop, butcher, post office, churches or bread delivery, we do however still have a daily paper and mail delivery - thanks to the ever reliable Deb.

Fingal and St Marys would often play off in the football grand final. On the Friday before the big match whilst the men were at work, a few of the Cornwall ladies would decorate the Fingal bus in St Marys colours. This would always create a big stir, we would see the bus going down the hill with the Fingal blokes throwing black and gold streamers out the windows.

The miners, (they were the men at the coal face), always worked on contract and in pairs. Each pair would only receive one pay and every second Friday the miners would sit in their pairs outside the mine office and share up their hard earned wage. Quite a number of them could not count, so some would get the paymaster Jack Spilsbury and son Peter to help. Others would share up by going "A pound for you and a pound for me". If any kids were about and there was a halfpenny or a penny left in the bottom of the pay packet, the kids would be the benefactors. Believe you me a penny would buy a nice bag of mixed lollies back then.

Many people have said the fifties and sixties were perhaps the best times financially, whilst the money wasn't all that much, it certainly went a whole lot further.

Like most mining towns around the country, Cornwall has seen the boom days and is now slowly diminishing, but it has a great history and it's people have left behind some great stories. Hopefully in future editions I can share more of Cornwall with Valley Voice readers.

A story I often tell which has been handed down from the early part of the century is of a little man by the name of Webber Scales. Webber's family lived at Cornwall, but Webber for some reason had moved to Dublin Town. He lived in a small shack about half a kilometre from the start of Lohreys Road - there are a couple of large pine trees near the spot today.

At the time there was a track which ran from Dublin Town, west of the South Sister and down into Cornwall, parts of the track are still visible. Once a fortnight Webber would saddle up the old horse and ride over to Cornwall to see the rellies and buy his supplies from the shop. When he was ready to go home he would store his supplies in a back-pack made out of a spud bag, load it onto his back, climb up onto a stump and then onto the old horse and off he and the horse would go, back over the hill.

One day the shop owner who was watching the procedure, asked Webber why he put the pack on his own back and not just strap it over the horses back. Webber's reply was quite simple, "Oh, the old mare is getting a bit old to carry us both, so I carry the pack for her."

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

### From the Minutes

The following items are from the BOD Council Minutes for its meeting of 14 July 2003.

- **4.0 Speed Limit, Fingal** because of the speed that trucks, including log trucks, are travelling through the town, Fingal residents have asked Council to advise DIER that they require a 50 kmh zone.
- **5.2 Council Vehicles** the General Manager stated that as a vehicle was part of a salary package, a 6 cylinder car was more attractive to prospective employees than a 4 cylinder vehicle.
- **11.1 Tourist Association** Council allocated \$82,000 plus GST for the Break O'Day Regional Tourist Association (BODRTA) for 2003–04.
- **11.2 Enterprise Board** Council allocated \$14,000 to the Break O'Day Business Enterprise Board Inc. for 2003-04
- **12.6 State Fire Commission** Council agreed to adhere the titles to 20-22-24 Main Street St Marys to resolve any boundary anomalies if and when a new fire station is constructed.
- **13.0 Strategic Plan 2003-2008** the Plan was advertised extensively in newspapers and the BODFM, was forwarded to fifty community groups, displayed on Council Website, available at Post offices, and two senior officers conducted a workshop. Council received 8 submissions. (5812 residents did not make a submission).
