The earliest settler in the St Patricks Head District was Robert Vincent Legge, who arrived in Van Diemans Land on 17 August 1827. As reported by Karl R. Von Stieglitz "R V Legge named "Cullenswood" after his old home in Ireland, and while the first house was being built, lived in a large hollow tree".

The accompanying photograph is not of R V Legge, but gives an idea of the standard of accommodation enjoyed by our pioneer settlers.



## River bank rehabilitation

It has been disheartening to observe over the months that many plants have been removed from the bank along Wombat Walk St Marys Rivulet where beautification work is being carried out. However these areas will be replanted and it is hoped that members of the community will keep an eye out to protect the plants from being removed and thus allow them to mature and upgrade the appearance of this lovely town.

Species have been chosen to maximise ground cover and which will not detract from the overall effect of the river and resident's views. Any person wishing to join the group of workers are invited to join in on Wednesday mornings and also enjoy a great social time as well!

Mr Greg Stewart who is a weed strategist manager has come on board and is putting in much valuable time to help with this project, together with the flood mitigation works and it is these works that have necessitated much of the regeneration program.

Conservation Volunteer Australia members will be on site at the end of August to assist with the regeneration of the banks of the rivulet for stabilisation which is necessary since the removal of the willows. The area covered is about 1.3 kms from The Flat bridge to the School bridge.

#### Letter to the Editor

There are plans for the logging of around 400 acres of bush up Irishtown Road this Spring/Summer. As a resident of Irishtown Road and a frequent user of our roads this causes me a great deal of alarm. Coupe ELO34A (the Mill Ridge) visible from St Patricks Head and the Tasman Highway will alone involve some 960 truck movements not to mention the 8 log trucks per day from the Forestry/Gunns Coupe ELO38B (90 acres approx.) and the unknown number of trucks involved in the clearfelling of the recently granted 'Private Timber Reserve (50 acres) - either side of ELO34A which was purchased by Lilydale loggers from the BODC recovery auction.

If you've driven to the end of Irishtown Road you would understand my concerns. The road is very narrow with unsafe corners and no room to pass a log truck. I can't believe the existing state of Irishtown Road is substantial for 1000+ trucks and I can't begin to imagine the dust that such heavy vehicle traffic will generate.

Don't forget if they make it safely out onto the main road they will then travel east down the St Marys Pass or west through the town and up the Valley, so we all will be affected.

I wonder if the tourists on the 'Adventure Tours' buses who walk up St Patricks Head will still mark it down as the highlight of their trip when the view to the East will be that of devastation?

This should not be allowed to go ahead and as a ratepayer I demand representation from our council and an explanation as to why we should be placed at such risk for no apparent gain whatsoever.

## **TownSafe**

Gunns Ltd have advised 29/4/03 re "Timber Haulage for Coupe ELO38B":-

- harvesting of timber is scheduled to commence in August 2003
- cartage will occur along Irishtown Road, accessing Esk Main Road at the junction with Irishtown Road, and proceeding over St Marys Pass to Triabunna.
- timber will be hauled 6 days a week, between 6 am 8 pm Monday to Friday and 8 am - 2 pm on Saturdays, with a break between 8 am - 9.30 am and 2.30 pm - 4 pm on weekdays.
- harvesting with machines and chainsaws will occur 7.30 am - 4.30 pm, Monday to Saturday.

A conservative ratio of truck movements per hectare of coupe is 10: given the currently advised coupes of 32 ha and 95 ha at Mill Ridge, the existing harvest plans will generate 1270 log truck movements over the forthcoming months, out of an unsafe access at Irishtown Road and across St Marys Pass.

Gunns Ltd have advised that the company "would like to thank those who have taken an interest in forest management, and look forward to working closely with the community in the future".

In the event of an accident involving a log truck working out of these coupes, copies of all correspondence to DIER, Gunns Ltd and Forest Tasmania have been lodged with Police Tasmania as a matter of public record.

## The Hills of St Marys

As the town signs say "St Marys, Town of the Eastern Highlands and Break O'Day Plains", echoing a newspaper description in 1903 " St Marys is ensconced on the north-east corner of an immense basin of agricultural and grazing land, the Break O'Day Plains, in length about five miles and breadth three miles. On either side rise mountainous rugged ranges, with bluffs and peaks of basalt and sandstone, heavily timbered, their sombre hues throwing into bold relief the brightly green and fertile valley stretching its length at their foot".

The Break O'Day Planning Scheme 1996 is currently under review, and the new scheme will be placed on public view in due course, for comment. When the 1996 scheme was advertised, I made a representation, which was opposed by the Break O'Day Council. The representation was that the "values" of St Marys, as defined for the purpose of the Scheme, to be protected, include: "the high visual amenity of the surrounding vegetated hills." Not an original concept - I pinched the words directly out of the "values" included in the scheme for Scamander! I did not want to demean the hills of Scamander but I did believe that the hills of St Marys were of at least equal visual amenity - I still do.

Of course it is obvious why the Council would not want the hills to be included in the "values" - it could cause a difficulty for logging contractors when development applications are made.

I hesitate to suggest that residents should join together as "Hillsafe" St Marys", some people get really upset about that sort of thing - it smacks too much of passion, and caring and commitment, which is definitely not to be encouraged if it leads to criticism of those set in authority over us, even if we do pay their salaries and pay for their new cars. But I would ask all those who care about our town, and the surrounding hills which are so much a part of it, when the new Planning Scheme is "exposed" for public view, please make a written representation to Council that the values of the St Marys include " the high visual amenity of the surrounding vegetated hills".

# What is Break O'Day Volunteer Resource Centre?

You can choose to volunteer for as little as one hour per week and volunteering is now much more about people within the community looking after each other. There are many exciting options available and giving a small amount of your time can really touch someone's life.

Some other ways the Volunteer Resource Centre can help you or your organisation is through;

- Free training
  - includes training specifically aimed at volunteers (new and mature)
  - guarding your organisation against insurance claims
  - co-ordination of any training your organisation may need ie Food Safe, Conflict Resolution, Self Care etc.
- Setting up new community initiatives
- Help with policy and procedures, position descriptions and submitting for grant applications.



## Cornwall by Jim Haas

It was a typical morning on the Cornwall bank-top in the early sixties, about seventy or so miners were waiting for the 7-30 whistle to blow, the cue for them to head down the mine for another day under the hill. Some were cleaning or filling their carbine lamps, some stood around talking while others just sat on their haunches or leaned against a building.

The whistle finally blew and the miners headed off down the tunnel, which was carved into the side of the Mt. Nicholas range. A kilometre or so down they came to what was known as the "Flat". This was where the endless rope ended. The endless steel rope ran on rollers along two sets of rails. It pulled the skips as they were called or small railway carriages in and out of the mine. There were two kinds of skips wooded and steel, each carrying between one and two tons of coal. Two men worked at the flat one to unclip the empties and one to clip on the full skips.

From the flat the tunnels went off in all directions to the coal face; here the miners, who always worked in pairs, would be faced with a heap of coal that had been blown out with explosives before the shift by another crew called the "Shot firers". As well the "Wheelers" - or horse handlers - would have pulled the empty skips from the flat to the coal face with ponies - these sections where the miners worked were called "Boards". Each wheeler would have four or five pairs of miners to look after and he and pony would have to pull the full skips back to the flat and keep the miners' in empties. Another crew called "Shiftmen" were responsible for laying rails, putting up timber supports and various other jobs to make the mine safe. Then there were the Fitters, electricians, surveyors and mangers in and out of the mine performing their given duties.

The miners would break the coal down to size with their picks and shovel it into the skips. Because it took time to change the skips over from full to empty and because empties were not always readily available they would build them up above the top of the skip some half a metre with big lumps of coal. These were called "Setters". Then a number stamped into a piece of leather for identification was tied to the skip and it was ready to go to the surface where it was weighed and the tonnage accredited to the miners number.

It was hard work, the carbine lamps did not show all that much light, it was always hot with little air, claustrophobic and of cause dangerous, but the miners loved their work, most of them would never have considered another profession. So much so that in 1964 when Cornwall closed and they were all offered jobs on the forestry they still fought tooth and nail to keep the mine open and most went on to be uncomfortable with work in the outdoors.

Every so often I walk along the old Cornwall bank-top and to me it comes alive, I can still see the winch houses, the weighbridge, the shower house and work shops, the skips overflowing with coal. I can smell the grease, sweat and coal dust. The smell of sulphur from the coal fired shower boiler and black-smith's forge was always present. A sniff from the stables fifty metres down the track will drift up in the breeze and the shower house with a unique clean smell will always mingle with all the rest.

I can see blokes like Bruce "Gunner" Nailer clipping the skips onto the endless rope, I can see Mick-Gatty weighing the coal, Keith "Splinter" Spilsbury the blacksmith making shoes and shooing the ponies. Gordon Freeman is building and repairing skips; Curly Calvert is in the electrical workshop talking with Jack Lind the under-manager. Perc Llewellyn is driving the winch; Noel Bradbury and Jim Shepherd are loading timber. Ken Worsley is cleaning out the stables, the smell of horses entrenched in his clothes.

They were great times and I'm so grateful that my memory allows me to relive the times we most treasure and to share them with those who want to listen.

I'd like to think that somewhere somehow in the coming years that a tooth fairy might land and help to replace the gap. One thing is for sure though, let us not see the site one day just be a vacant block where a few cars get parked.


That would be a real tragedy. What do you think?
