

COURTESY SERVICE GETS PEOPLE OUT AND ABOUT

On Thursday 21st October the Break O'Day Health Resource Association and Healthy Community Project launched the new Courtesy Wheelchair and Shoprider service.

This service is open to anyone requiring the use of an electric chair or motorised shoprider, the aim of the service is to reduce social isolation by providing individuals with access to the community. Priority will be given to individuals receiving palliative care and can also be used by individuals; waiting on wheelchair repairs, on a waiting list to receive a chair or visiting the area.

The service was launched by John Denman, Vice President of BODHRA. "The wheelchair and scooter each have a trailer for transport to anywhere in the Break O'Day Municipality. The new service has been made available through Regional Health Service funding from the Commonwealth Department of Health and Ageing. This funding allows communities to address health and wellbeing issues and identify local solutions for local issues." Mr Denman said.

It is my belief that no-one walked away from the seminars (some may have run!) without being affected or even afflicted? by four of the most highly, and internationally acclaimed motivational speakers this country has to offer.

Congratulations to all who attended, especially the youth of our municipality and to the venues for looking after us so well.

With the recent warm weather and the spate of both large and small fire in the region, it appears that we are unfortunately in for a busy fire season.

Those who are members of the numerous Volunteer Fire Brigades do a magnificent job juggling work and family commitments with responding to fires at all hours of the day. Their work is unfortunately made more difficult by people who deliberately light fires, sometimes in areas which are hard to access to purposely prevent the fire being extinguished too quickly.

Last season a small percentage of the fires in the St Marys area were determined to be deliberately lit and the Criminal Code carries severe penalties for those found guilty of unlawfully setting fire to vegetation or property. I would ask that with the weather warming up for everyone to be vigilant for those seen in and around areas of fires and report any suspicious activity.

Students viewing themselves as writers; as having something worthwhile to communicate; and providing a forum for their contributions to be heard and celebrated was our vision for literacy week 2004. During the last week of term, all students K-10, engaged in a range of writing workshops, with a focus on a variety of genres aimed at both writing for pleasure and as a professional pursuit.

Through the structure of our workshops we aimed to recognise, value and celebrate the contribution that each person makes to the literacy learning of our community.

The first step in achieving this was to utilise mentors from within the school. We had older students sharing their literacy skills with younger students in activities such as storytelling, online literacy tasks and bookmark making. This extended the older students' personal learning within a safe environment, while also presenting positive literacy role models for the younger students.

We also acknowledged the importance of developing a love of writing and the role this plays in literacy development; therefore, we canvassed our staff for their talents and passions as well as invited community organisations to be involved. This aspect allowed students to see significant adults in their lives modelling both a love for writing and a commitment to life long literacy learning. Workshops included poetry, creative writing, song writing and story telling.

Exposure to potential career paths is extremely important for students in our isolated community and we viewed this week as an opportunity to raise awareness and

promote the variety of possibilities within the writing profession, through giving the students access to experts, such as journalists and illustrators.

The week was enjoyed by all and provided opportunities for students and teachers to see themselves in new and challenging roles – as learners, as writers or as educators, regardless of age and experience. Megan Gillard - English Teacher & Writers Week Co-ordinator



Neighbourhood Watch

If you have not joined Neighbourhood Watch please contact a zone leader in your area so that arrangements can be made for you to join and for your valuable items to be engraved so they may be easily identified in case of theft.

All zone leaders have a police clearance and identity badge.

In order to protect your property:

- 1: Lock your vehicles and remove keys.
- 2: Lock your home and outbuildings when absent. Do not leave keys hidden near your home.
- Record serial numbers of valuable items and photograph those that cannot be marked with a T and your licence number.
- 4: Consider installing intruder alarms and security doors.
- 5: Sensor light; these range in price from \$30 -\$90 depending on style, brand and quality. Sensor lights can be left on all the time and can be connected to time switches, heat or motion sensing. This makes burglars and trespassers visible to neighbours and passers-by increasing the risk of identification. It is also immediately apparent to police on patrol that there is activity in the area.
- 6: Write down the registration number of any suspicious vehicle and inform police.

Dedicated people helped to save our local banking facilities when a solution and a site was found and so the Rural Transaction Centre was set up and is providing many extra services as well as retaining a bank in town.

All these services have been achieved simply because enough of the community wanted it and the respective committees fought long and hard, and importantly negotiated outcomes to achieve final results.

Unfortunately for a number of reasons the original Streetscape design could not be implemented.

This why I write this article as I do.

Lets get rid of conflict between our 'experts'. Perhaps its time that they sat and talked on the variety of battlegrounds we seem to have at the moment.

In recent times fantastic results have been seen in Bus Safety on the St Marys Pass, future upgrades to our roads, and the volunteer efforts on Wombat Walk and recreation areas around the town. Potentially the same can be achieved in regard to Town Hall management.

Rational discussion might also find a result with the possible logging issues if conciliation is the key.

I believe most of us are sick and tired of the armchair experts with their facts and figures. Give it a rest and talk. We don't want or need constant arguing, and if criticism comes, provide a solution or alternative to the problem and remember this; no-one is right all the time - no-one.

LOGGING OF SOUTH SISTER ICON DESPITE COMMUNITY UPROAR

The Tasmanian Greens are disappointed and outraged that their attempt to save popular tourism icon, South Sister, near St Marys from logging has been defeated by the combined efforts of both the State Labor and Liberal parties in Parliament today.

Greens Member for Lyons, Tim Morris MHA, said that it was heartbreaking for the local community that despite their pleas for South Sister to be protected, neither Labor nor Liberals saw fit to support the motion for the proposed logging to be abandoned.

"When will the Lennon Government stop cuddling up with the big business end of town and actually listen to the local St Marys community who have highlighted the economic, social and environmental benefit of preserving the South Sister."

"This particular logging proposal puts to doubt the effectiveness of the Forestry-Tourism Protocol Agreement, which should have prioritised the protection of existing tourism operations as well as ongoing tourism investment, over the logging proposal."

"The coupe in question contains at least six threatened species and is a water source for surrounding properties, and local tourism operators already depend on South Sister as a local attraction, having been encourages by the state government to invest in tourism."

"How can the Government on one hand tell the community that they care about threatened species, water catchments and tourism, and then with the other hand destroy an area significant for those reasons?", Mr Morris asked.

Greens' Motion defeated on Wednesday 29th September 2004

That this house notes with grave concern the proposed logging operations on South Sister near St Marys, which will have negative effects on the future viability of the St Marys community and will also adversely affect, amongst other things:

- 1. At least six threatened species on the currently proposed logging coupe;
- 2.The visual landscape;
- 3. Tourism opportunities;
- 4. Water quality and quantity;
- 5. Council infrastructure including roads and bridges; and

That further this house directs the government to abandon the proposed logging of South Sister, which is against the wishes of many in the local community and notably opposed by former Labor forestry minister Dr Andrew Lohrey in correspondence circulated on 7 September 2004.

Sir

South Sister Gate

Recent controversy about the quality of advice and intelligence provided to national leaders about such issues as "Children Overboard" and Iraq suggests a culture of lying, deception, ignorance, incompetence, indifference and self-interest permeates our political system.

Much is made of the heinous crime of misleading Parliament which should incur the sanction of resignation. However the device used to avoid the sanction appears to be that the "Honourable Minister" was "acting on advice". The adviser is never identified, both Minister and adviser get off scot free, the big lie remains on the record, and the decisions taken on the basis of the shonky advice unchanged.

In replying to a motion to abandon logging of South Sister (Oct 20 2004), the Minister for Infrastructure Etc., Mr Bryan Green, told the House of Assembly (Hansard) "we are not talking about pulpwood here, we are talking about high-quality sawlogs – this is the advice I have, that is what it says ... "logged for high-quality sawlogs".

One wonders from whence cometh his advice. The previous and current "Hardwood Three Year Production Plans" for the Bass District are consistent in showing a pulpwood take of 9600 tonnes from the coupe, while Mr A Corbould, then Acting District Forest Manager for Bass, advised in writing (24/09/04) "the proposed harvest will yield 10,000 tonnes of pulpwood". Mr Corbould further wrote "the proposed harvest will yield 1500m3 Category 1/3 (high quality) sawlogs, and 800m3 Category 8 sawlogs". Whichever rubbery Forestry Tasmania source is used, pulpwood will constitute 80% -90% of the coupe

Mr Green and Mr Corbould both emphasise "high quality" sawlogs, but "we are not talking pulpwood here" seems to be stretching poetic licence a bit much. Still, it seems to have hit the target with Messrs R Hidding, D Lewellyn and K Bacon, MHA's for Lyons, because they voted to continue logging South Sister (Mr Polley as Speaker does not have to vote). Three votes for 5 hamburgers per hectare, you can't get better value than that for flawed advice. David Clement, Gray Road, St Marys
