Five years on

'St Marys Celebrates Lymphoedema Clinic', was the headline of The Examiner article published on 29th February 2000. Now five years later St Marys celebrates the Lymphoedema Clinic again.

So much has happened since I first developed lymphoedema following successful treatment for cancer in 1999, it is hard to know where to begin.

Over the week of the 14, 15, 16th February 2005, Professor Neil Piller, Lymphologist from Adelaide's Flinders University came to St Marys once again to assess patients with this condition.

As Professor Piller writes on 21.02.05 – "We hope that the assessments were useful to all those who attended and that they help gain better and more targeted treatment. We were also very happy to see that people at risk of lymphoedema were also attending – really that is what we should be doing more often, checking out people before they get their problems!"

We from the TLC were also very happy to see such a number of people attend those very busy days. It was lovely to see so many familiar faces and friends, and catch up with all their news; but also very pleasing to see many new faces and hear how pleased everyone is about the clinic. The very positive comments about the area and what it has to offer these individuals and families. Though no-one is ill with this condition, it nevertheless has totally shaped the rest of their lives and TLC is what is required – some excellent treatment and a short holiday in beautiful surroundings.

The TLC Inc. Committee had hoped that Professor Piller could have been available to help celebrate the big five year event, but unfortunately he will be on the move again. This peripetatic scientist is in much demand the world over, so we were pleased indeed to have Neil and wife Toni here for the assessments and we will celebrate our birthday on 21st March. We can do that! Were my thoughts in Adelaide in 1998, but I was naïve, pleased and excited by the ideas. Some 6 months later, in April '99 we in St Marys hosted the first lymphoedema workshop. St Helens Water

Stephen Salter Mayor of Break O'Day Council calls for all those involved in the adverse and damaging statements by the AMA regarding the quality of the water in St Helens to apologise.

The water report had been submitted by water scientist and local GP to AMA Tas and AMA Australia. Dr Michael Aizen in his press release dated 28 February 2005 states that there were a number of serious methodological flaws in the report and that there was no evidence of adverse health effects.

Mayor Salter said that a totally irresponsible position had been adopted and widespread damaging publicity has resulted all over Australia.

Dr Aizen claims that it has sparked wide interest in issues such as water and health and that this was a good thing.

Mayor Salter said that the health and wellbeing of our community has been and always will be number one priority.

What about the effect the emotive nonsense had on our community and the impact on the economic well-being of Break O'Day.

Mayor Salter said the AMA and those prompting this nonsense should apologise. The remarks have lacked professionalism and credibility.

Flinders Medical Centre came, spoke, demonstrated their methods to some 70 patients and their carers, and 22 healthcare professionals. The weekend was so successful that we commenced fund raising for the laser straightaway. Within 6 months, following many a soup and sandwich fund raiser we were the proud owner of the first 3B bio—stimulation laser in Tasmania.

To make a list of all those who contributed would fill the next ten pages of the Valley Voice! Many will remember the ups and downs with red tape, nevertheless 28th February 2000 saw the Grand Opening, our laser in pride of place and the therapists ready for their first patients.

Later that year the TLC Inc. won the National Australia Bank award for Health in Tasmania, and in August 2002 we presented the National Convention and CDP program on Lymphoedema, with keynote speaker Professor Neil Piller BSc (Hons) Ph.D and a host of local and interstate speakers and attendees. A great success!

2003 the TLC was awarded the Break O'Day Australia Day Award for the event of the year. 2005 lymphoedema assessments and more celebrations.

Strong community commitment; to participate in ongoing research and management of lymphoedema; to work in cooperation with other Health Professionals and to recognise the special training of our Therapists has led to a centre of excellence! The behind the scenes efforts are no less exceptional. As erstwhile Tasmanian Liberal Senator Jocelyn Newman stated in her opening address "....I am proud of you and what you have achieved and you should be too!"

Apart from Neil Piller and his belief in our ability to set up a centre of excellence, I am not going to single out anyone for special acclaim – there are too many, but thanks one and all for a truly great experience.

CORNWALL NEWS: from Jim Haas.

Cornwall Community Development Group had a pleasant surprise on Friday 25th February when Chris Hinds, President of the Tasmanian Branch of C.E.M.E.U.'s Mining and Energy Division met with some of our Members and Councillor John McGiveron to discuss the Miner's Memorial Wall, which is hoped to be built at Cornwall this year.

Chris was introduced to Mrs Una Camplin who explained that the Wall was a long time dream of hers, not only as recognition of all the miners who had worked in Mt. Nicholas, Jubilee and Cornwall from 1888 to the closure of Cornwall in 1964, but also as a tourist attraction for the town and indeed the whole Fingal-St Marys area. Mrs Camplin gave her ideas of what she hoped the Wall would look like with the six hundred or so names she has collected displayed on a plaque with a special plaque for those who had lost their lives in the mines during that time. If enough funding comes forward she envisages a statue of a miner with his pick and shovel and old carbine lamp on his head and at his feet a plaque with a brief history of Cornwall and its coalmining heritage.

Chris then told the meeting that his Union operated a coalmine in N.S.W and all profits from the mine are channelled back into mining communities for young achiever scholarships and worthwhile community projects.

He said he was extremely impressed by the Wall proposal put forward by Mrs. Camplin and Cornwall Community Development Group and as all other states except Tasmania had received funding, he was looking for a suitable project to start with here and he would recommend it for funding.

By the next edition of Valley Voice we hope to be able to give a time frame on the Wall and some definite details of the "Back to Cornwall Day" planned for the opening.



Police Report

Road Rules

There have been several recent queries in relation to the use of skateboards on public streets, helmets, child pillion passengers on motorbikes and children in front car seats. There has been a change in Legislation for uniformity on a National Road Rules basis, as a result I will provide a brief overview of the general rules from the Australian Road Rules & Regulations - Legislation Acts (Tasmania. (For full details and information you can access the internet site on www.thelaw.tas.gov.au Rules: 238(1,2), 271 (2), 240(1,2,3) 241(1), 242(1), 250(1,2), 256(1,2), 257(1), 266(1-7), 268(1-7), 370(1-3), 371E. Available free of charge to the public.

Please remember that these Rules and Legislation are for your own safety & protection.

Wheeled Recreational Device (includes skateboard/rollerblade-skate/scooter etc.)

(Does not include pram, trolley, bicycle, wheelchair).

A person on a Wheeled Recreation Device is deemed to be a <u>pedestrian</u> (Rule 238)

Cannot be ridden on public roadways with centre white line markings, or on open roads with signed speed limits above 60km p/h or by children under 12 years of age. Helmets not required but recommended for all wheeled recreational devices.

Wheeled Toy (child's pedal car/scooter/tricycle or similar toy)

Applies only when used by a child under 12 years of age. Never to be ridden on roadways.

Motor bikes: Safety of child / pillion passengers (any age)

All pillion passengers (including children) can sit on rear bike seat as long as their feet are fully rested (not just touching) on the fitted pillion "pegs".

Wearing of seatbelts by passengers in a motor vehicle

(over 1 year of age)

Children must be restrained in a suitable "approved child restraint" that is properly fastened and adjusted, or occupy a seating position fitted with a suitable seatbelt, (conducive to their age and size). (It is recommended that children sit in the rear seat of a motor vehicle).

(Under 1 year of age). To be restrained in a suitable "approved child restraint" (capsule) that is properly fastened and adjusted.

All restraints must be compliant with Australian Standards AS 1754.

Helmets

Must be worn by <u>all</u> motorcycle and pushbike users at all times (this includes pillion riders)

All motorcycle helmets must be compliant with Australian Standards AS1698-1988. Pushbike helmets must be compliant with Australian Standards ASNZS 2063.


I also put it that whilst an initial hearing is pending at the moment and due to be heard at the end of this week that both the protest group and the logging proponents cool their heels so to speak.

Forestry Tasmania – South Sister

South Sister, a peak near St Marys on Tasmania's East Coast, lies within a patchwork landscape characterised by a variety of land uses, such as agriculture, coal mining, tourism, the township of St Marys, and state and private forestry. South Sister has been sustainably managed as State Forest for many years, and selective harvesting in the past has created a landscape that is now valued by the local community.

Recently, there has been some community concern about Coupe NI 114A, which Forestry Tasmania plans to harvest in 2005. The coupe, which lies below South Sister peak, is managed as multiple use forest, and is available for sustainable production forestry under the Regional Forest Agreement. South Sister peak itself is within an informal reserve, to protect flora and landscape values, and will not be harvested. The coupe will be selectively harvested (not clearfelled) and will be naturally regenerated back to native forest. No chemicals, including 1080 poison, or high intensity burning will be used to assist regeneration.

The planning prior to harvesting has been extensive and has considered all of the special values to be managed within the coupe, such as flora, fauna and landscape. As part of this special values management, we have reduced the planned harvest area from 163 hectares to 108 hectares. This has resulted in foregone revenue to the Tasmanian economy of \$0.5 million, but has ensured that non-economic values are balanced against the need for wood production.

Forestry Tasmania has consulted closely with the community while planning the harvesting operation, and has taken all issues raised by the community into consideration in preparation of the forest practices plan.

Forestry and conservation

Under the Forest Practices Code, Forestry Tasmania is required to carefully plan and supervise harvesting to ensure that rare or threatened species are not adversely affected. Accordingly, areas of the coupe have been reserved as habitat for the blind and giant velvet worms, and *Eucalyptus brookeriana* will be entirely excluded from harvesting. Key sites for the eyebright *Euphrasia collina* subspecies *deflexifolia* have been identified, and will be avoided during road construction. However, selective harvesting will not be detrimental to this species – it requires disturbance, such as burning or logging, to regenerate and may even spread to other areas of the coupe post-harvesting.

Water management

Harvesting at South Sister will not decrease the amount of water available to local residents. The water taken by regrowth trees will have a negligible effect, if any, on the St Marys water supply, as the harvest area is only 4% of the catchment area for the township's bore. Similarly, streamflows in watercourses that are tapped by properties adjacent to South Sister are well in excess of residents' domestic water needs. This means that any water taken up by the regenerating forest will not noticeably reduce the amount of water available to local people. If anything, residents will experience a slight increase in water availability for the first several years after harvesting. Water quality is also unlikely to suffer any detrimental effects from harvesting, as the coupe's dolerite soils are not prone to erosion, particularly with selective harvesting. As with all harvesting operations, the Forestry Practices Code protects watercourses by excluding harvesting from streamside reserves.

Landscape management

Forestry Tasmania has conducted extensive landscape analysis, using sophisticated computer simulations, of the proposed harvesting at South Sister. This analysis has demonstrated that harvesting will have minimal visual impact on the surrounding tourist roads and attractions, including the Seaview Farm bed and breakfast operation.

Forestry and tourism

Forestry Tasmania is a major stakeholder in Tasmania's tourism industry. We have made considerable investments in growing regional tourism through ventures such as the Forest EcoCentre in Scottsdale, which directs visitors

In fact, visitation to the North East and East Coast of Tasmania has continued to grow while its state forests have been managed for sustainable timber production. Under the Tourism and Forestry Protocol agreement, we liaise with accredited tourism operators regarding forestry operations.

Forestry and regional employment

Forestry is a significant employer in the Break O'Day municipality. According to the Break O'Day Natural Resource Management Strategy, there are 115 direct employees in the industry locally – a figure that does not include indirect employees, such as roading contractors. The value of the timber from the coupe is some \$0.8 million. Sawlogs from South Sister will be milled at McKay's Sawmill in St Helens, which provides employment for nine local people.



South Sister Summons

SOS (Save Our Sisters) update

Residents at South Sister and St Marys have been successful in applying to the Resource Management and Planning Appeals Tribunal (RMPAT) to issue a Summons to Forestry Tasmania.

The Summons requires Forestry Tasmania to attend a Hearing to show cause why an Order should not be issued stopping it from carrying out any further forest operations on coupe NI114A at South Sister.

The Summons was issued after residents had submitted evidence to the Tribunal that Forestry Tasmania had failed to carry out adequate planning and risk assessment to protect local water supplies and prevent possible landslip occurring from the impact of forestry operations.

In support of their application for the Order, residents submitted scientific and professional reports and opinions from experts such as Dr David Leaman, Dr Owen Ingles, Mr Ralph Rallings, Mr David Stapledon, Dr Leonie van de Maeson, Mr M Latinovic, and published reports on the area from Mineral Resources Tasmania.

This evidence and any submitted by Forestry Tasmania will be assessed at a Hearing before the Tribunal, at a date to be set at an Initial Hearing this Friday 4th March, and a decision handed down as to whether forest operations should proceed on the Coupe, or whether an Order will be issued that stops logging until Forestry Tasmania have complied with conditions set down by the Tribunal to prevent environmental harm.

The reaction from members of the Save our Sisters group that has been lobbying to protect the water supplies of the area since 2003 is that the Summons has taken the issue out of closed loop of the self regulating Forest Practices System, and brought the issue into the open, independent, jurisdiction, where at least the evidence will be seen, assessed, and weighed.


