Coming up roses by Jan Sparkes

Roses are red, violets are blue, so goes the old nursery rhyme, but we all know that violets come in shades of pale mauve to deep purple and from white to pink; and roses, roses come in an amazing array of colours, hues, shades and tones of yellows, reds and pinks and more.

In the 12th Century BC roses were grown in Persia, now Iran, and the Rosa gallica was a religious emblem. From there they spread across the Middle East and Greece. During the time of the Roman Empire roses were cultivated and used for festivals. Roses were grown across Asia and were spread by Arabs from North Africa to Spain where they are still grown in many court yard gardens. In Southern Europe the cultivation of roses continued in Italy and France. The Empress Josephine made a large collection at Malmaison and probably had acquired most of the varieties then known. In the 19th Century roses came mainly from England and

Today repeated crossing of the original forms make it difficult and often impossible to know the roses parentage, but present day roses are descended from about 12 species, or ancient cultivated forms, and many countries have been active in the creation of the many varieties available.

Garden roses are the most popular flowers grown today and seem to do well in a range of climates and conditions.

When I'm confronted by rose books and catalogues I'm in a quandary - do I go for just a few of the well known and tried or do I attempt to grow a romantic rose garden to fill the air with scent and colour. Hybrid tea roses, R. rugosa, floribunda, climbers, mini roses, standards, and carpet roses - they are all hard to resist.

But what about the possums? You may well ask. Am I preparing a picnic, a feast, a banquet for all the possums in the area? Probably. Nethertheless I may give it a go. Frustrated to date, lets give it another go.

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ALCOHOLISM AND ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS

Alcoholics Anonymous welcomes men, women and children to a recovery program from alcoholism, where understanding that alcoholism is a disease. It is a disease accepted by the medical profession, and in America it is the fourth largest killer disease.

If you are an alcoholic the choice to drink is not in your control, once you start it is difficult to stop drinking. An alcoholic does not necessarily drink every day, you can be a bender or binge drinker, going out on binges and then swearing off the booze for a while.

Bender drinking has become a huge problem with our youth – weekend drinking can be the start of early alcoholism.

Blackout drinking, which is functioning without any memory of what you are doing, is one of the symptoms of alcoholic drinking. This type of drinking destroys brain cells which cannot or may not recover.

Drink driving, extreme headaches and stomach nausea, spending a night locked up in a police cell for abusive, aggressive or suicidal behaviour, extreme depression between drinking binges, are all common symptoms of alcoholism, the list is endless.

Family and friends are also widely affected by this disease, it not only involves the person drinking, which is why Al-anon Family Groups are there to support the family, friends, co-workers etc. of the alcoholic.

Fortunately there is help for alcoholism – it is a disease that can be arrested on a daily basis, provided the alcoholic is willing to receive help for his or her drinking.

Alcoholics Anonymous have daily meetings worldwide, and has the largest success rate in arresting alcoholism.

Alcoholics Anonymous has recently begun in St Marys. It is held every Friday night at 8.00 pm in the hall at the Holy Trinity Anglican Church, Main Street St Marys. Here you will find help, understanding and compassion with the help of other A.A. Members. It is totally anonymous and Alcoholics Anonymous is not allied with any religion, sect or denomination. Save Our Sisters by SOS

Local residents made an application to the Resource Management and Planning Appeals Tribunal (RMPAT) in late February claiming that roading and logging activities on South Sister would cause environmental harm i.e. changes to water quantity and quality and increased risk of landslides.

An initial hearing on Friday March 4, 2005 took place with the Chairman concluding that "there is a prima facie case established by the evidence tendered on behalf of the applicants". Despite this, no temporary order was issued because "... no undertaking is to be offered the temporary order sought is refused".

The Applicants had proposed in the application that an undertaking should not be required in the present case. Given the limited recourse available to the community to address concerns regarding forestry operations, the Applicants submitted that it would be appropriate that the Respondent bear any expense resulting from a temporary order rather than Applicants acting in good faith where the potential harm is significant and where the application was supported by sound scientific evidence.

In addition it was stated that the Respondent bear the burden of the expense rather than the Applicants because of:

- the comparative financial positions of the parties
- the time frame for forestry operations within the Forest Practices Plan (roading operations expected until July 1, 2005 and harvesting completed by December 31, 2005 thereby having time to harvest the coupe in the said time).
- the expected royalty value of the coupe (estimated by applicants to be approximately \$138,000)
- the potential effect of the environmental harm on the Applicants and the broader community of St Marys
- the strength of prima facie evidence presented by the Applicants

the Respondent's failure to undertake appropriate risk assessment prior to commencement of the forestry operations

Finally, requiring the Applicants to give an undertaking to cover losses pursuant to a temporary order presents a substantial deterrent against applying for such an order. The principles of natural justice support the Applicants being afforded an opportunity to address the matters they raised in the Application. Imposing such a burden on small community groups and individuals seeking to protect the environment on the basis of strong scientific evidence effectively denies this opportunity. Objective 1 (c) Part 1, Schedule 1 of the Environmental Management Pollution Control Act (EMPCA) states "to encourage public involvement in resource management and planning"

Forestry Tasmania claims that losses would be \$50,000 per week for 9 to 10 weeks i.e. half a million dollars! (\$20,000 loss to Forestry and \$30,000 loss to harvesters and contractors per week) YET as mentioned above, the Forest Practice Plan states that harvesting can continue until December 31, 2005.

A Final Hearing is currently scheduled for June 6 – 8, 2005 with no possibility for an earlier hearing. However, the Final Hearing is under threat after FT made an application to the Tribunal. Applicants are required to show they have a "proper interest". FT also argues that the "conduct" of harvesting will not lead to environmental harm but may be a consequence of the "conduct". The Chairman will decide before February 22 whether the Final Hearing will continue as planned. Forestry Tasmania says that "..harvesting will commence in the week of 21st March....."

The Tasmanian Attorney General has been asked by applicants to "consider seeking orders to restrain forestry operations on Coupe NI 114A until the Tribunal has determined this matter". SOS members await her reply.

A letter from Mr Ralph Rallings (Consultant Engineer) to Hon. Bryan Green (Feb 7, 2005) says that "the cost of stabilising a large slide may be in the order of millions of dollars" and "failure to properly investigate the slopes below the coupe is imprudent and borders on negligence". He recommends that "No operations should be undertaken on this coupe or any coupe within the Nicholas Range until the slope stability issues have been appropriately investigated" and that "Mineral Resources Tasmania should be given responsibility for the investigation with the authority to define logging exclusion zones, based on land stability" At the time of printing, Mr Rallings was awaiting a reply.

How can harvesting activities begin when a legal case is pending? Where is the justice for residents protecting the environment from harm?

Why can't the State government impose a six month moratorium as asked by SOS members to enable further assessment of the coupe?

SOS calls on Forestry Tasmania to *voluntarily refrain from logging* this coupe until the Final Hearing in June. SOS members hope that the Council or the Attorney General will step in to assist in the public interest.

CORNWALL NEWS By Jim Haas

Due to circumstances beyond our control a couple of problems have sprung up to hold up progress on the Miner's Memorial Wall project. However, you can be assured that we are working through the issues and we will publish any progress in The Valley Voice as it happens.

The Community Hall is still causing some concern, although Grassy Bottom Regional Arts have shown interest in using the hall, more use will be needed to meet the running costs required.

One of the projects Cornwall Community Development Group Inc. has for the future is to seek expressions of interest from other Community Groups to work on a joint venture to establish walking tracks in the area.

One walk would be from Cornwall to South Sister and for the more enthusiasts continue on to the coast via the large oak tree. Other walks would take in the old coalmine workings of Jubilee, Cornwall and Mt Nicholas. The fitter could walk to all three from either Cornwall or St Marys and for those not so fit, it is a relatively short walk to Cornwall's old workings.

All the walks mentioned already have tracks that only need a little clean up and marking. The Jubilee to Mt Nicholas via Cornwall walk takes in magnificent bushland including rainforests with spectacular fern gardens and here and there you are treated to stunning views of the Fingal Valley.

Dear Editor.

I would like to make some comments about the Forestry Tasmania article on South Sister in the previous edition.

FT says that their planning has "been extensive" however they failed to consider and mention in their plan numerous special values that the coupe has including:

- the numerous landslips which have occurred on the coupe (at least three), in close proximity (Jubilee Mine, Cheeseberry Hill) and the surrounding area (Mt Nicholas, Huntsmans Cap)
- the Jubilee Mine which sits below the coupe (>1 sq km)
- the heritage stumps which represent the interaction of local forestry resources, local sawmilling and the local railway history.

FT are quite correct when they mention that they have consulted closely with the community however they terminated the consultation process prematurely and failed to take "all issues raised by the community into consideration". FT and Forest Practices Board have ignored six expert reports which outline the risk of landslides in this already landslide prone area. Logging will lead to initial increases in groundwater which is the perfect recipe for landslips when "stable" dolerite talus sits on coal and mudstone. Ralph Rallings, Engineer with 40 years of experience considers it "imprudent and bordering on negligence" not to consider the slopes below the coupe. David Stapledon, Geotechnical consultant for 53 years states that "it is wise to assume a high risk of reactivation" in areas where slides have occurred previously. He states that 75% of old slides will reactivate if disturbed by clearing and excavation.

FT's Valley Voice article states that "harvesting at South Sister will not decrease the amount of water available to local residents" yet FT's report by Sandra Roberts (Dec 2004) states that after an initial increase during the first nine years (which increases the risk of landslides), there will be a reduction in the water quantity for the next 56 years!! FT also claim that the harvest area constitutes only 4% of the catchment area for the town's bore however no scientific research has been provided by FT to explain how they reached this conclusion. Mineral Resources Tasmania have recommended that monitoring of groundwater level, water quality and usage should be conducted to achieve a better understanding of hydrogeological conditions in the area.

FT also claims that the Forest Practices Code protects watercourses by excluding harvesting from streamside reserves. This is interesting considering FT failed to record 24 springs, soaks and wet areas on Coupe NI 114A which have been recorded by local residents! Surely that oversight indicates their "extensive" planning was less than thorough!

Despite "sophisticated computer simulations" of the expected visual impact of logging, FT failed to mention that views from the summit will be adversely affected by logging. I doubt many residents or tourists would consider the view from above having "minimal visual impact".

Finally, I find it interesting that the entire article excludes *any* information on landslips. Is this perhaps an admission that FT haven't been as "extensive" in their planning as they mention?





On the Road Again

One of these days the East Coast might get a road that the area deserves. Unfortunately, for decade after decade successive Labor and Liberal Governments have failed to address the need for this ever growing area of ours a road upgrade to cope with larger volumes of diverse traffic.

Perhaps the most urgent area that needs addressing is the Falmouth/Four Mile Creek junction to St Helens section.

Just about all of us who travel it often, would love to see the government address the problem, or at least pledge a time frame for upgrade work. After all, this is supposed to be a major tourist route, and on any holiday period the road's inadequacies are extremely evident to all. Quite apart from the direct safety aspects, there are the aesthetics, the maintenance issues, and the efficiency of the road surfaces that currently could only be described as a patchwork quilt.

Just the widening in certain places would make a significant difference. At least five sections fall into this category, most notably, the approach to Upper Scamander, the twisty area near Beaumaris and at the top of the incline approaching St Helens.

In real terms the awful road between Avoca and St Marys through the valley is in dire need of major resurfacing now but at least it's open clear road that allows good flow and overtaking opportunities if safe.

This is certainly not the case for the East Coast in any way, shape or form. The Chain of lagoons to Swansea sections are in my opinion marginally better in this regard.

The St Marys and Elephant Passes are also linked to this, and thankfully some safety matters are being addressed, at least for School bus concerns. But there's a long way to go yet.

In reality it may be years before the East Coast or the Fingal Valley see a major improvement to the roads, such is the demand in more densely populated parts of the State, but let's keep lobbying our politicians. We do deserve serious consideration.

It's too important to deny forever.
