Esk Main Road to receive \$7.6 million

Upgrade of the Esk Main Road was included in the recently announced State Budget with \$7.6 million being earmarked for the road over the next four years.

- * \$2.5 million will be spent to widen, strengthen and improve the Esk Main Road east of Killymoon Bridge.
- * \$3.2 million will be spent on upgrading the road between Ormley and Avoca.
- * \$1.9 million to be spent on upgrading the road between Ormley Culvert and Heffords Road.

This announcement would be the first real commitment given to the Esk Main Road for many years. The East Coast has become one of the big growth areas in tourism with the Fingal Valley being the gateway to the coast.

St Marys Recreation Ground

On the 18th November 2002, we received an independent audit on the condition and safety of all structures on the Recreation Ground. Part of that report was that the coaches boxes and the heater in the Football Clubrooms plus the Scoreboard did not comply.

A few weeks ago Grassy Bottom Regional Arts requested the use of the Recreational facilities for the Winter Solstice Festival. As a result of that request the following decisions had to be made:

- 1. The Coaches boxes had to be removed
- 2. The unsafe heater is to be removed (but will be replaced)
- 3. The Scoreboard was to be demolished.

Due to the fact that some members of the community considered that the scoreboard could be repaired, Council will render it safe, no entry will be possible and Council will then give those interested 6 months to bring the scoreboard to a standard that complies to building regulations.

As there now appears to be a great deal of interest in the Recreation Ground and the St Marys Hall, a meeting is scheduled on Wednesday the 23rd June 2004 at 4 pm at the St Marys Hall to discuss management options with members of the Council.

X30 GONE TO A GOOD HOME

The Gazette - Voice of the Valley & Highlands Wednesday 6th May 2004 reported on the arrival in New Norfolk of locomotive X30.

From the Gazette:

The Derwent Valley Railway has added to its fleet of locomotives with the acquisition of an engine from St Marys.

A small group of railway members and Work for the Dole personnel were on hand last Friday morning to welcome locomotive X30 to the New Norfolk station.

Owned by the St Marys Lions Club, the engine had been driven to the North East town under its own power, shortly before the line from Fingal was closed.

Derwent Valley Railway president Craig Farrell said the diesel-electric was in surprisingly good condition.

The 1950s vintage engine was one of the last built at the Dick Kerr works in England and is thought to be the last of its kind in existence.

Two similar engines at the local railway, X10 and X18, were built at the Vulcan works, also in England.

The acquisition brings to four the number of locomotives removed from Tasmanian parks and reserves by the railway society.

The use of asbestos in their construction has rendered many old trains unsafe for continual use as playground equipment.

Previously the DVR has salvaged engines from Margate, Ross and Granton, and ultimately all will be restored to haul tourist trains.

The Derwent Valley Railway depends on the support of volunteers and new members are always welcome.



If you haven't already entered, don't panic because it's not too late yet. Just make sure you're there.


