A matter of involvement

On a recent visit, Mrs Campbell-Smith said, and we quote 'There is no need for a dwindling population to become apathetic or depressed'.

We agree wholeheartedly. There are many compensations for those who live in country areas. Apart from the obvious ones of fresh air, sunshine and cheaper housing, there are the less obvious. It is good to know most of the people in a country town, and the simple act of passing the time of day to the baker, the butcher or Mrs X in the street is a joy not to be scorned.

But a town needs - it needs a soul, and this requires involvement by all those who prefer to or for other reasons, live in country areas.

The American novelist Thomas Wolf, once stated it was more an involvement to converse with a dunny-man at 4 am in an empty Brooklyn Street than to be one of the thousands who throng Central Station New York in the rush hour.

So it is not a matter of population, it is a matter of communication. Undoubtedly most country areas are well represented by sporting activities, but sadly, this is where it often ends. Country centres often exist in a cultural vacumn. Not necessarily high-brow either!

No one needs to be a professional to act in a play, sing in a local concert, or join a discussion group. Many latent talents can often be realised by doing an Arts course or taking and Adult Education class.

These are the things a country town needs most, to be a more rewarding place in which to live. If outside entertainment is scarce, then it becomes important to be able to make your own.

'Wheelies' dangerous to others

In the past few weeks we have seen a number of 'wheelie' marks left on Gray Road near the school and a little further on near Royle's Lane. On Friday 7th May another 'wheelie' was left near Royle's Lane which has added to the unsightly marks on the road. Not only does it leave a mess, it is also highly dangerous for those involved and anyone travelling on the road.

Last year a Police Report was included in the Valley Voice which highlighted the concerns both the public and police have in relation to traffic offences. Although in most cases Traffic Infringement Notices are issued as a result of offences viewed by Police, any information that you may have in relation to the matters discussed here or any other traffic matters, even if it is anonymous, is greatly appreciated.

On a lighter note, there has recently been a change in the process for obtaining Police checks/ clearances for employment purposes etc. The fee for obtaining a clearance is now \$49.50 which covers checks from all Australian States and Territories. If you need to obtain a police check for work as a volunteer, such as Meals on Wheels, the check is free provided that the organisation is registered with Tasmania Police.

We have a full list of all registered organisations at the station if you have any doubts.



Drug Education Network Inc. (den) Thriving Communities Project May 2004

Thriving communities are not built by neglecting community health and wellbeing issues. They are built by constructively addressing the issues that pose a threat to healthy community life and by enhancing those things which protect and promote community. There are some commonalities in building thriving communities including building connectedness, promoting and enhancing resilience and addressing health and wellbeing issues at the individual, family, and community levels.

Tasmania has had some of the highest rates of alcoholinduced health issues in Australia, over the last ten-fifteen years. Widespread misuse of alcohol is the 'tip of the iceberg' of a range of health and wellbeing issues linked to depression, relationship breakdown and violent crime. Drinking rates among young women are rising; for men of all ages, the story on almost all issues connected with alcohol use is even more problematic.

What can be done to support community members to deal with challenging life issues such as problematic alcohol use?

Communities can assist their members to make positive, well-informed and healthy decisions about how to live their lives well. One of the best protections against personal, familial and social ills is to develop thriving, resilient individuals, families and communities.

Identifying and working with the mental and wellbeing issues that underlie problematic alcohol use in north-eastern Tasmania, is the focus of a project co-ordinated by John Alford from the Drug Education Network Inc. during 2004.

John is recruiting interested community members to be part of a focus group to identify and work with these issues particularly as they apply to rural communities and men's health.

Supporters - The competitors found themselves well supported by a great crew of fellow St Marys students for both the Launceston and Hobart performances. A wonderful time was had by all!!!







The X 30 and all things rail

The Say by Cage Rattler

Mixed emotions a couple of Tuesdays ago, when two massive cranes hoisted old X30 onto the low loader for its journey to the Derwent Valley Railway. It was a necessity that this occurred for all manner of reasons, not least the gradual deterioration of the locomotive with not many options available to the Lions Club for it's ongoing benefits to the town.

Many years ago the visualisation was to have it as part of a machinery museum with possibly even the chance it may have a short run on tracks. Unfortunately it seems many restrictions, insurance and red tape prevented this from happening much to the Clubs disappointment. While it sat for so long, vandals caused major damage. As the years passed old X30 was slowly falling into a state of disrepair as movable parts were either removed, broken or stolen, so in their wisdom the Lions Club let her go to greener pasture with the proviso that she will be fully restored and carry their St Marys Club logo on her side. It is just a shame it is so far away that many will not be able to see her being restored. That said it was the only rational decision that could be made.

Until the disappearance of the other infrastructure at our old railway station, namely the water tower, the turntable, other items and of course the track, it may have been feasible negotiating with ANR to revisit some sort of access to St Marys by rail as in the 'good old days'.

I suppose the really sad thing about this whole matter is when you consider that what if that buy-out and rationalisation by the parent American company that took over Tasrail had taken place a decade earlier, maybe there would never have been a need to close the Fingal to St Marys line in the first place.

We all complain quite rightly about the state of our highway which is in a diabolical state, but all those coal and log trucks that daily ply the road can only be bad for an already terrible surface. If cartage of coal and logs could have been continued twenty years ago predominately by rail you can only surmise

how much less stress our roads would have had to endure. In it's heyday in the late 70's, I have been told that 3000 tons of coal and 3000 tons of logs per day were shipped out by rail.

Those figures if accurate are mind blowing over several years and in comparison how many truck movements are required to cart similar tonnages. No one can convince me that rail could have cost more than continuing road maintenance.

These truck operators do a fantastic job in the main but if circumstances had been different and X Class and later the W Class locos had continued from St Marys to Fingal, I'm sure our road would have been a bit better than they are now.

Perhaps one day a museum or photographic display can still be established of the St Marys link with it's rail history that lasted for at least a century and could be part of our town's sesqui-centenary celebrations in 2007.

I still have vivid memories of the morning and afternoon trains shunting, coupling up and moving off with station staff organising freight and rail workers maintaining the 32 mile section of our track. I can even remember the gang motors buzzing up and down. I only hope we can record this as part of our history.
