Deputy Premier's visit to Cornwall

On Friday the 16th of September almost thirty people turned out at Cornwall Park to meet David Llewellyn MHA., Deputy Premier, Minister for Health and Human Services, Police and Public Safety, who came to Cornwall to present a Certificate of Congratulations plaque to Mrs. Una Camplin and the Cornwall Community Development Group Inc., in recognition of dedication and commitment to developing the Coalminers Heritage Wall, and preserving the history of coalmining and the important roll it has played in Tasmania.

David presented the plaque, coupled with a commitment of funding and in doing so thanked the Cornwall people for the chance to be part of this wonderful project, and also the opportunity to once again return to his old home town and catch up with family and friends, most of whom go back to his school days, which started at Cornwall on the land where the Wall is to be erected.

David went on to remember 1950, when he, along with the school building, was moved to the current St.Marys High School site.

The Cornwall and old St.Marys school (which was situated where the town hall is now) were moved to the new St.Marys Area School and became the woodwork, sewing and home arts rooms.

Mayor Stephen Salter, on his last official function before heading off to China an hour later, responded to David, and thanked him and his Government's contribution to the project, along with Cornwall Coal Co., Break O' Day Council, Tasmanian Community Fund, private donations and the many individual efforts that has so far gone into a venture that has grown bigger than anyone ever expected.

The Mayor said he could see the wall being a huge benefit to the Cornwall Community, and indeed the whole Break O' Day region, and his council would continue to give support where ever possible.



Around Australia in 48 days by Dot French Day 28

We left Perth and took the Albany Highway south. Here the farm land is flat, and we came to an area where the paddocks were covered in volcanic rock. These rocks are light and look a bit like petrified wood. Most of the towns now have 'UP' on the end of their name, as in Kojonup. Apparently 'up' on the end means water.

We continued south to the Walpole – Nornalup National Park. Here we experienced the walk through the tall trees. This walk is called "Treading through the treetops". Unlike the Tassie tall tree walk. You walk high above the tall trees here, but on very much the same metal structures.

We arrived at Albany at about 6pm.

Day 29

Albany is large, and has many industries and also a couple of lookouts for visitors to get a feel of the layout of the area. We left Albany and headed east on the South Coast Highway towards Jerramungup and inland to Ravensthorpe. The road dips south coastward and the views are really great, however Tassie's East Coast takes a lot of beating.

Munglinup is back on the coast after which we arrived at Esperance. The coast here is very rugged in places but I could understand why so many coastal shacks dot the coast-line. Esperance is very small, just a beach rest for holiday breaks.

Day 30

We headed now for Kalgoolie. Along the Mallee there is a Memorial for Leslie Stuart Thomas, the first soldier killed in the Second World War. We turned north on the Esperance Highway and came to Norseman. This was of interest to me as some of my family, Annette, Corey and Dooley lived here for some years. A bronze monument of a horse in the center of the township depicts the horse that turned over the gold nugget that set the town on the map.

Here we tasted the first decent cup of coffee for some time.

There is a building at the southern end of the township with many small chimneys of different shapes and sizes. We did not manage to find out any information about this, however I often wonder if it was some kind of laboratory connected with the mine. This town is not large but sports a reasonable school, and swimming pool.

We continued to Kalbalda North and on to Kalgoolie, arriving at 2.30pm. Well what can you say about a town like this. It has almost everything. There is a street just off the town center noted for it's glassed viewing windows for 'Ladies of the night' (or day). Large old hotels and buildings full of history. The largest open cut mine I have ever seen, and for tourist's comfort a large viewing platform can be used. This can be viewed also at night, which is an experience not to be missed.

The heavy equipment looks like tiny matchbox toys in this enormous hole in the ground. There is also a highway leading west to Perth used by the passenger bus, and transporters heading west.

Angle parking is a must here and I parked amongst about forty cars on a street in front of one of the oldest hotels. On return from shopping I had two guys velling at me from the roof of the hotel, so I waved back. However they were not being too friendly as they were electricians working on the roof and a gust of wind caught a sheet of iron and, guess what? Yep it landed on my car. Forty cars to pick from and it landed on mine, doing about 2 thousand dollars damage. Only surface, so it didn't stop our journey. It was agreed I'd get it repaired later. 414 kms

Day 31

Left Kalgoolie at 8.30am in the rain and headed south to Norseman, had a cuppa, and headed east on the Eyre Highway for Cocklebiddy. Because the road was miles of nothing we decided to go on further as the weather was good.

We called at the Cocklebiddy roadhouse and cancelled our accommodation and continued to Eucla. This town is situated just inside the Western Australian border.

935kms

Day 32

Thirteen kms on, we passed through Border Village and we were now in South Australia.

The Nullarbor stretched 293 kms to Nullarbor Road House and we were expecting absolutely nothing to see but sandy desert.

Although this highway follows closely along the coast, it is not bare of vegetation. At one spot I had to ease up and give way to a red fox. Low vegetation and tumbleweed cover the land and there are lookouts all along the highway.

As we crossed the Great Australian Bight we were surprised to see some of the very early road making equipment on display. The grader was equipped for horses, and at this point a great view of the Bight can be photographed.

Yalata Roadhouse is predominately an aboriginal settlement and souvenirs are obtainable here. There are small places along this highway but I doubt you'd call them towns.

We arrived at Ceduna early. That gave us the opportunity to have a good look around that day.





Police report

A number of firearm incidents in the Fingal Valley area have prompted me once again to remind people of the relevant rules in relation to firearms.

It is important that if you do have firearms that they are stored correctly in a locked safe, and the firearms are not left loaded. The ammunition needs to be stored in a separate locked container. It is also important that other people cannot get access to your firearms or ammunition.

If you have firearms, you need to have a licence, and the firearms need to be registered. It is an offence to have firearms, ammunition or parts of firearms if they are not registered, or you don't have a licence.

To assist people who may have unregistered firearms, there will be an amnesty on firearms surrender starting next Monday, the 3rd of October, 2005, and continuing until the 31st of December, 2005.

This means if you have firearms that are unregistered or unused, they can be handed into a police station and no charges will be laid.

Break O' Day Concerned Residents Against Plantations

Brooklyn at St Marys is to be converted to a Eucalyptus plantation, and at least 3 other properties surrounding St Marys may soon follow. Some 700 hectares of grazing land may go under plantations, additional to those already planted on Harefield and Cullenswood. More than 25% of the St Marys water catchment, and all within 2km of the town water supply.

North-West communities have already died from farms being turned into plantations. Pyengana has now lost 6 farms, Evercreech has been turned from dairy to plantation, and now it is the turn of St Marys, whose residents have already heard the shooting of wildlife, the helicopters overhead, and seen the napalm burn-offs involved in establishing local farm plantations.

Another 700ha of plantation surrounding St Marys would represent 1,600,000 trees at a 2m x 2m planting, sucking the water from the groundwater aquifer which supplies St Marys, and drying the Break O Day River. Rainfall over the past 10 years has already fallen by 16%pa, and as the tree canopy grows even less rain will reach the ground due to evaporation, and the trees will transpire the rest.

Local water will be hijacked by the plantations, chemicals can contaminate groundwater, aerial spraying can drift over houses, town, school, hospital, carried by the valley winds and eddies caused by the mountains. Valley views will be blocked, wildlife shot and poisoned, river ecosystems damaged, and property values and tourist income affected.

This is not the place for plantations-it is not degraded or marginal farm land, the water catchment is too small, the town is too close, the chemical risk too high. The Planning Scheme must be changed and the use of land for plantations regulated in the public interest, the interest of the people and the place of the Break O Day, not investment or timber companies.




In the Handicap section, John Miles won A Grade, Mark Birch in B Grade and Col Payne just won in C Grade.
