St Marys Police report

Fingal Valley has remained crime free for the past weeks.

There are several important issues that need mentioning and bringing to attention.

1. Dangerous driving and "hooning"

Several complaints have been received of dangerous driving and "hooning" within the St Marys and Scamander areas. The names of several offenders were passed on and they have been spoken to about their behaviour by police. There seems to be a belief amongst the younger male drivers of the area that it is accepted behaviour to speed, do burnouts and generally hoon about our streets. A prime example is the top of the Pass and at the Cemetery. Be warned that it is not acceptable and action will be swift with severe penalties. New Legislation states a person must not operate or control a vehicle in a public place

*In a manner that makes or emits unnecessary and unreasonable noise.

*In an exhibition of speed, acceleration or sustained loss of traction.

If caught a driver will have his vehicle impounded for two days, face a long disqualification of his licence and could face a term of imprisonment not exceeding three months.

2. School Leavers Parties

With school finishing soon no doubt there will be some celebratory functions and parties held by our school leavers. Police ask that our younger ones be responsible with their behaviour both at parties and when leaving. Parents also have a responsibility to ensure adequate supervision is maintained to stop unruly behaviour or gate crashers.

St Marys Police have a limited supply of "Party Planners" and can provide advice on how to safely run a party.

3. Speed limits at Road Works

Road works are still continuing on the Esk Highway at "Killymoon" and St Marys Pass. There are reduced speed limits in place both for the safety of the workers and all motorists. These changed speed limits are applicable 24 hours a day and attention will continue to be given by police. Why loose demerit points and money through impatience?

4. Trail Bikes

An ongoing problem of trail bikes being ridden on streets is still occurring in the towns. It is an offence to ride any recreational vehicle which includes trail bikes within 500 metres of a dwelling house.

Most are unregistered and the riders unlicensed.

It is also worth mentioning that should "Santa" bring a present of the small replica motorcycles with the 45 cc engines to children, that these are also not allowed to be ridden on the streets.

A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: by Jim Haas Cornwall Community Hall:

When we look back on the history of our wonderful State and study the way in which towns were built we find that in most cases the first community buildings to be built were their churches and then their community hall. The churches, of cause, were important because of the deep religious belief that was imbedded in our ancestors, and a place to worship their God. Fellowship with fellow believers on the Lord's Day was an essential part of their week.

Then there was the Community Hall which provided a place to meet as a whole community. Here they were all equal. They could have fun, meet and talk, raise money for their organization, play their music, dance or play sport, conduct meetings and form





Whilst this meeting place was rather small, it served its purpose until 1930, when times became quite hard for Cornwall and its miners. It was the start of the Great Depression, and the local miners were following their Mainland counterparts in lobbying for better wages and conditions. The Cornwall Coal Co. too, was finding it hard. Costs were escalating, and markets were falling due to the Depression. The story goes that "Foreigners" (mainly Scots) came to Cornwall and offered their services at the mine for less money than the locals. Many were employed over the local miners, causing turmoil that would see abuse and fighting in the streets almost daily, leaving a thick tension hanging over the town that could be cut with a knife. All of which led to many houses being burnt down. Legend has it that the hall was burnt down after the "Scabs", as they were named, held a meeting in it.

Most of the "Scabs" were driven out of Cornwall in the early 1930s. Locals were re-employed and wages and conditions began to improve despite the state of the economy. But the town was without a hall until 1934 when a public meeting was held in the school and a committee was formed to build a new hall.

Mr. George Tickle, a mine manager at the time, told the meeting that a hall, 36 feet by 24 feet, with a stage of 17 feet by 12 feet with two ante rooms each 12 feet by 9 feet, would cost approximately 225 pounds for materials. However, he pointed out that there was already 30 pounds in hand and Mr. Ted Nicholson was prepared to donate a piece of land in the centre of town almost opposite the school.

Mr. Tickle also proposed to the meeting that all families in the town who had a member working should donate one shilling per pay for 25 pays to raise the money needed to complete the hall. This was approved, and collectors were appointed to collect promptly each fortnight. On top of this, Cornwall Coal Co. gave a donation, and the State Government gave One Hundred Pounds towards sealing the road in front of the new hall.

The hall was completed solely by volunteer labour towards the end of 1935, but it wasn't until March 1936 that a Grand Ball was held for the opening. Before the big event the floor was covered with saw dust, sprinkled with kerosene, left for a few days then sweep up leaving the floor squeaky clean. Then candle grease was shaved into small pieces and spread over the floor and the kids would have great fun sitting on bags and dragging each other around the floor to rub in the candle grease. This of cause, was all necessary to make the floor slippery and suitable for dancing.

The big night arrived. Local musicians the Nolans, Strochnetters, Maddens, Broughs and Targets, were all up on stage tuning their instruments. All the locals, dressed to their nines, were joined by their neighbours from St.Marys, Cullenswood, Gray, German Town, Irish Town, Dublin Town and Fingal. Everyone was on their best behavior, as the then Premier Robert Cosgrove and his wife arrived and joined in the Progressive Barn Dance. At 10.00 pm the ladies brought out a massive spread for supper, and Premier Cosgrove officially opened the hall making special mention of the magnificent community effort that had gone into this wonderful facility.

For decades following the opening, Cornwall Hall was the focal point of the town. Every week it catered for meetings, band practice, card evenings, fairs, kitchen teas for every local girl who was to be married and the local musicians would play for a dance once a month or so. And, of cause there were the sports: badminton and indoor bowls in particular provided great entertainment for young and old alike. The first kitchen tea to be held in the new hall was in 1936 for Cornwall's now oldest living resident, Mrs. Una Camplin, who was married that year.

But times have not always been easy. In the early 1960s a dispute broke out between the badminton club and the hall committee. The badminton club claimed that they were the main users of the hall at that time and needed a full size court. The only way this could be achieved was to take out the stage, which, they claimed, was never



used. Arguments were thrown back and forth, meeting were held with police presence to maintain order. The town was split in two for months, but finally the badminton club won out and the stage was removed.

Sadly, times have changed. Less people seem to go to church, so our buildings are pulled down or removed and turned into houses. Maintenance, they say, is too great for a facility with little use. Our halls are going the same way. Small country towns are finding it more and more difficult to upkeep buildings, pay rates and keep them covered with over inflated Public Liability costs. Although with modern trends our halls are not used to their full potential, they are town icons, and are a significant part of our town heritage. The loving workmanship our forefathers put into these buildings should not be forgotten or cast aside like futile garbage.

To walk away and let them rot or sell them to the highest bidder is a sin, and a slur on those who devotedly worked so hard to build a facility that they believed would serve their families and the community for generations to come.

Cornwall, like many small towns, has lost enough in recent times, and to lose their Community Hall would be a sad day to say the least. Surely such buildings are worthy of heritage listings, so that they can be protected. Surely for the little costs involved, Local and State Government could pull together and stand by their small towns people, and help preserve the town icon which is the Community Hall, so that they too don't become a pile of broken concrete and stone like our churches.

PS: Neither the Lands and Titles Office or the Break O' Day Council has any deeds or record of title of the land on which the hall is on. The only conclusion is the land was given by Mr. Ted Nicholson in 1934 and signed with a hand shake; a practice quite common in those days.





Local artists will be engaged to work with geographically specific communities and local businesses to develop the projects. The resulting artworks will be part of the of Ten Days on the Island 2007 program with an event being hosted during the 2007 festival. Donna Jackson of Hubcap Productions will be the projects Artistic Director, the project will be co coordinated by TRA with a local co -coordinator appointed in each community to support the artists in each community.

All three projects will be characterised by

- Resonance and response to it's place
- A project launch that links to a community celebration as part of Ten Days on the Island which incorporate the local produce of the specific region
- The resulting art work is at least 30m by 30m
- Can be safely viewed by the public from the road
- Does not damage the landscape sustainable

Project Partners

Ten Days on the Island (TDOTI) burst onto the cultural scene in 2001 with a unique celebration of island culture and firmly established itself as Tasmania's premier cultural event in its inaugural year. Strengthening Tasmania's position as a place that is culturally vibrant, innovative, creative and unique Ten Days on the Island has something for every taste and pocket across the state, including dance, theatre, music, opera, film, literature, exhibitions and installations, inspiring discussions, gastronomic feasts and much more, showcasing Tasmania's diverse landscape and encouraging visitors to explore remote regions of the island.

Ten Days on the Island has produced a number of projects, which invite artists to create new works with different communities in Tasmanian. These projects include artists in residency (Overheard at Inveresk) and skills development (Choral Island). Ten Days on the Island has also had an active relation with Tasmanian Regional Arts (TRA) in touring and supporting a range of initiatives for the festival. For the 2007 festival Artistic Director Elizabeth Walsh has invited Donna Jackson of Hubcap Productions to explore a process based project with TRA as the main partner.

Tasmanian Regional Arts (TRA) reaches over 60,000 people annually through it's three program areas: Arts 2U (visual and performing arts touring), Arts Assist (regional arts fund grants / volunteer training) and Arts Plus (community development). Every three years TRA undertakes a major community development project across a number of regional locations. projects aim to increase the professional skills of regionally based artists / arts workers and increase wider community engagement in the arts through consultative process. In late 2005 the community development project 'Island Life' will be completed. Devised by TRA 'Island Life' first received funding in 2003 and sought to give voices to different issues that communities face. 'Island Life' locations were selected through a Expression of Interest process. The communities selected were Swansea, Launceston, Meander and Dover. Through 'Island Life' over 1,200 people participated and over 7,000 viewed a diversity of arts activities in their local communities. TRA are very excited to have been invited by Ten Days on the Island to work with leading artistic director Donna Jackson. Donna is well known to regional arts having worked closely with Regional Arts Victoria on a number of large projects including Such Fertile Ground, Bute Utes and Meeting Place (Regional Arts Australia's National Conference 2004)

MAYPOLE DAY ADDRESS

ST MARYS 6 November 2005

Why are we celebrating here in St Marys, in November, a traditional European ceremony held in May in the northern hemisphere? The connections are fourfold - Springtime, Hawthorns, Nature and Magic.

May Day in Europe celebrates the return of Spring, the rebirth and blooming of flowers after the winter, a day in Roman times honouring Flora, the Goddess of Spring.

So, with the 6 months difference in the seasons between the northern and southern hemisphere, May Day in Europe is celebrated here in November. But our Grassy Bottom Regional Arts celebration is MayPole Day, rather than "November Day"! We use the traditional activity of Maypole dancing as symbolic of the day itself, whether it is in May or November, celebrating the return of Spring.

In Europe, the May flower represents the flowers of Spring, as at this time of the year the May flower is in full bloom across the countryside. "May" is the common name for the Hawthorn, because it blooms so widely in the month of May. Here in The Valley, particularly between Fingal and St Marys ,the roadsides and landscape at this time of year are redolent with Hawthorn blossom, a heritage of the European settlement of the district from the early 1820s, so it is appropriate for us to celebrate May Day in the floral sense.

MayPole Day is the second event in the Grassy Bottom Regional Arts calendar which is linked to the natural calendar. The first event is the Winter Solstice, held on the shortest day of the year, celebrating the return of the Sun as the days start to lengthen. The natural calendar is based on the sun, and the division of the 24 hours between day and night, and recognises 4 significant times, the Winter Solstice, the Spring Equinox, the Summer Solstice and the Autumn Equinox.

At the Equinox, day and night are of equal length, moving towards longer days in the case of the Spring Equinox (21/22 September), or shorter days at the Autumn Equinox (21/22 March). The Solstice are the days when the day is shortest (the Winter Solstice at June 21/22), and longest (the Summer Solstice at 21/22 December).

May Day is not held at the Spring Solstice, but is a recognition of a natural cycle in the year, the emergence and blooming of flowers, of rebirth and renewed fertility. May Day has its earliest associations with pagan fertility rites, and with magic. The maypole is thought to represent the link between earth and sky, or even to be a phallic representation of fertility. The Hawthorn is believed to ward off evil . Joseph of Arimithea in his mission to bring Christianity to Britain invoked Divine help when he thrust his Hawthorn staff into the ground and it burst forth into leaves and flowers. The natural cycle of life is recognised by all faiths, beliefs and philosophies.

The St Marys town sign states "Town of the Eastern Highlands and Break O Day Plains". We are linked here between earth and sky by the mountains that surround us, Mount Durham, the Nicholas Range, South Sister, Cheeseberry Hill, St Patricks Head, Mount Elephant and the Gray Hills, that amphitheatre of mountains that cradle the stage on which we live our daily lives, which form an integral part of our townscape and which is the focus of our "sense of place".

We live in a magic place, a place of forests, mountains, passes, valleys, plains, and rivers, and it is appropriate that we celebrate a day that recognises the natural cycle of life, and the values of our natural surroundings.

In celebrating MayPole Day here at St Marys, we are not just celebrating the start of Spring, but are acknowledging our sense of place and the natural values of the place in which we live. Maypole Day is a reaffirmation by us that this is a place to be protected, a place to be handed on unspoiled, a place to be enjoyed for what it is, not for what can be ripped out of it, a place to be protected for its long term natural values, not exploited for short term dollar returns.

When we return home of an evening, we are welcomed by forested mountains, each with its own individuality, its own personality, which we recognise as much as we recognise the individuality of our friends and neighbours, a personality which can change as circumstances change, with cloud or sunlight, under blue skies or in rain, in early morning or at twilight.

R L G Irving, an English mountaineer, wrote:

"A mountain becomes great as a human personality does, by extending its influence over the thoughts, words and actions of mankind".

John Muir, a Scottish naturalist, declared:

"Thousands of tired, nerve shaken, over civilized people are beginning to find that going to the mountains is going home; that wilderness is a necessity: that mountains are not just fountains of timber and irrigating rivers, but fountains of life".

While Psalm 121 rings through the ages:

"I will lift up mine eyes to the hills from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord who hath made heaven and earth".

We live in a Magic Place. Today we celebrate it.
