An Order of Australia Medal for services to the community, was awarded to Mrs Margaret Osborne of St Helens.

Congratulations also go to Neville Peake of St Marys, who was recognised with a Queen's Birthday Honour, being awarded an Ambulance Service Medal.

Neville's involvement with ambulance work goes back to when he moved to St Marys from Dunedin in New Zealand. In 1978 he was asked if he would be interested in becoming an ambulance driver, and was happy to become involved in community work, and so began his career in ambulance service.

The following year, Neville became Secretary of the St Marys Red Cross Branch, a position which he held until 1993, after which he took on the position of President of Red Cross in St Marys, and was involved in the changeover from St Marys Red Cross Volunteer Ambulance Service to Tasmanian Ambulance Service, St Marys Branch.

Neville is a current member of the Volunteer Ambulance Officers Association of Tasmania Inc. and had been a Treasurer for the Association until his move to Launceston in November 2004, for work as a Patient Transport Officer for the Launceston General Hospital.

On being congratulated on his award, Neville said, "I was surprised and happy that I was nominated for the Ambulance Service Medal, and I thank the St Marys Volunteer Ambulance Group both past and present, Vollies and Paramedics, for their support and friendship over the years."

#### POSSUMLY FASHION

A possum fur coat with hat and gloves to match?

Or a bikini of silky possum skin?

In New Zealand the anti-fur protesters have given these garments the thumbs up. In fact, they support any use for these cute marsupial immigrants because they, along with all New Zealanders, consider that the only good possum is a dead one.

Their only natural enemy is the car, whose numbers don't match the 90 million possums destroying the forests.



#### ST MARYS SALVAGE

Taken from the official Derwent Valley Railway newsletter.

On Saturday 16 April, a team of eight keen members set off very early in the morning to reach the East Coast former Fingal Line terminus of St Marys, in time to put in a full day's work.

The team's assignment was to lift a hundred yards of rails, place them on top of two wagon frames and lash everything together in readiness for their pick-up on Monday morning by a transport contractor.

The wagon frames were the remnants of a couple of mobile camps that had been purchased by a local land-owner. The camp bodies were removed and the under-frames became part of the display at the old station, which also included diesel-electric loco X 30. The loco is now resident at New Norfolk.

An arrangement was made with the wagons former owner and the Lions Club was happy for the DVR to have the rails that were still laid beside the platform.

By 1615 hrs, all work at St Marys had been completed and the tired little bunch headed home, but not before a much-earned refreshment stop at Campbell Town. The wagons and their rail load arrived by Kellara Transport semi-trailer on Monday morning (18 April) and were rolled off the tilt-tray trailer onto the D.V. line, but not without incident.

Difficulty in maneuvering the trailer over the tracks to enable a straight run-off for the wagons, caused the trailer to tilt slightly. The heavens decided to open and the wagons slid to one side of the trailer on the slippery deck. A fork-lift was quickly acquired and the unloading went smoothly thereafter. Rails were unloaded that afternoon and the wagons re-entered service for a short run around the yard to a siding.

A wagon, nor necessarily one of those mentioned above, is to form the centre-piece of a tourism display at Lawitta on the Lyell Highway, just west of New Norfolk. Sponsorship has been obtained for that project, and part of those funds was responsible for the transport costs. By swapping bits and pieces between several wagons at New Norfolk, the vehicle destined for display will be the one with the least operable equipment remaining on it.

Many thanks are extended to the wagons former owners, Dale and Audrey Wright of St Marys. Audrey is also a volunteer of the local newspaper "Valley Voice", and D.V.R. is maintaining contact with the people of St Marys through this newsletter and via the local paper.

The two wagons were not readily identifiable except that one was a small goods wagon of 1885 vintage (builder's plate still in situ) similar to the A class, and the other a former 6-wheel vehicle (inner wheel set missing) which makes it an old carriage.

Some quick research and hasty e-mailing seems to have identified the 4-wheeled vehicle as formerly being OF 13 (flat wagon). It had been extended slightly at each end to accommodate the camp, and became 76-N-1. The other under-frame was Camp 106-N-1 and its origins are still being traced (it may be a B-class carriage).

On Saturday 23 April, the old body of 208 was transferred to OF 13 from its long-term residence on under-frame PC 3. The latter was then placed in the engine shed for preparation for use as an advertising display at Lawitta.

D.V.R. congratulates the effort of the St Marys team in being able to quickly organise and carry out the aforementioned tasks.

#### St Marys Police Station Change of office hours

Mike started his career at St Marys as a young junior constable a few years ago, so he knows the area and will be a considerable asset to the community.

Earlier this year, we also welcomed back Linda Faulkner after a period of maternity leave, and Charlie Cormack left us for a short time and has now returned to fill in a few gaps in the Customer Service area.

Speaking of which, there will be a change in the opening hours of the St Marys Police Station over the next couple of months. This has been caused by one of our staff at St Helens taking a fall down some stairs, that has put her out of commission for a while, and while Charlie is available to fill in the gaps.

So from next week the station hours will be:

Monday, Wednesday, Friday 9am 4pm (lunch 12-1pm) Tuesday & Thursday 9.30am - 4pm (Lunch 12-1pm)

If this causes any problems please let me know at St Helens and we will try to fully accommodate the needs of the community. Thanks for your time.



#### Day 1

We left Coombabah at the top end of the Gold Coast at 9am, and traveled north on the Bruce Highway through Brisbane, Caloundra, Maroochydore, and Noosa Heads, which were all very touristy and expensive. The coast is very pretty and the palms are an accepted sight. Then we continue on to Gympie, Maryborough, Hervey Bay, Childers, and Mirriam Vale, stopping at Rockhampton for the night, arriving at 8pm. Each night we checked out the towns and their industries.

779 km

Departed Rockhampton early and breakfasted at Kunwarara. Truck stops are great for meals, cheap, clean and plenty to choose from. We then continued on to Mackay, Proserpine, Airlie Beach and Bowen. Great views from high cliffs on this part of the coast and very heavily used by tourists from every state. We arrived at Townsville at 8pm, a large, very busy part of the coast.

Even though we had rung earlier accommodation was hard to get.

810 kms

#### Day 3

Day 2

Left Townsville at 8am and on to Ingham, Cardwell, and Innisvale then visited the Opal Gem Factory at Cairns, and then on to Daintree. A very high class Motel at Port Douglas, however we were more interested in the early Pub in the Daintree. A Pub, come Store, come Tearooms, with a lot of history. Very lush vegetation in this part of the coast and still reasonably busy traffic wise. Then we returned to Cairns on the Captain Cook highway to our Motel, arriving at 5.30 pm. 503 kms

#### Day 4

Departed Cairns at 8.30am and returned north to Smithfield, then turned southwest over the Atherton Tablelands to Mareeba. We were now on the Kennedy Highway and here the terrain was very different. It was certainly high and more of a farming area. Next, Mungalli Falls at Camp Mungalli. When you experience the St Columba Falls and the likes we take for granted in Tassie, these falls were a drop of about 5ft.

We then came to Three Rivers where there is a very noted country song by Slim Dusty called Three Rivers Hotel. The motel has a large painting of Slim and Stan Coster on the front wall. There is also a monument to Stan Coster at the front of the Pub with inscription from Slim engraved on it.

At the rear of the accommodation area there is a large tree with a strange name but better known as the sausage tree. It has green foliage and large, brown hanging fruit, not unlike sausages. There are only three known trees like this in Australia. One here, one in the Botanical Gardens in Adelaide and the other on the Queensland coast. We went over the Great Dividing Range to Charters Towers, arriving at 5.30pm.


There is a cluster of bronze horsemen at a pond in a park here in memory of the early settlers. The shops and hotel buildings are very old.

670 km

#### Day 5

Departed at 7.45am to head west on the Flinders Highway to Hughenden, where there is a large Dinosaur center complete with re-erected skeletons of different sizes. Outside this building there is also a coolabah tree.

We continued to Richmond and here the feature is Kronosaurus Corner. A large fibreglass Kronosaurus is outside and it is a lovely place for a cuppa and to view more prehistoric bones. Then we went on to Cloncurry. A very friendly town, we were told of the history surrounding the area so we decided to deviate the next day in order to view the birthplace of the Waltzing Matilda song and the Blue Heeler Hotel. 665 km Cont'd in next edition.

#### A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE By Jim Haas

How many of us today would survive if we had to endure the "Great Depression" which began in 1929 and continued until the outbreak of the Second World War in 1939? Whilst it began in the United States it quickly spread World wide and by 1932 stock exchange prices had fallen to only 20% of their 1929 value.

Millions upon millions of workers in the Western world became unemployed. Millions of people died of starvation and the many rampaging diseases and our little part of the World was not exempt. Our parents and grandparents had to endure some of the hardest times in modern history. Employment was scarce and Government benefits were almost nonexistent.

But they survived, perhaps, much better than their city counterparts, because they were able to grow their own vegies, milk a cow, and fortunately, rabbits and wallabies were plentiful for food, as well as their skins, and along with possum and ringtail could be sold to the main skin buyer of the time, E.B.L. Dawson, who owned and operated what is now the Top Shop at St.Marys, as a general store.

Ringtails were the most valuable skins at that time and many of the men folk would walk up to ten or fifteen kilometers into the mountains and spend days, sometime weeks, camped in the bush trapping.

Some would camp in hollow trees, others under canvas held up with a frame made of bush poles, and a few made huts of bark, split palings and stone chimneys. Many ruins of these trappers' huts can be found in our surrounding mountains today.

There was an unwritten law that each town had its own area to trap in. St.Marys men went to what was called "Legges Hills", the mountains to the south of Cullenswood. Cornwall men went to "The Huntsman", a St. Patrick's Head shaped mountain just north of the Mt. Nicholas Range.

As well, each man had his own "Run" to trap in and it was war if anyone crossed a boundary or touched another man's camp or gear. Because of the weight of skins on their backs coming home, their traps were normally left in the bush.

Back in the 1960s when the road was first formed from Mt. Nicholas township to the Huntsman, I took my old Uncle Walter Haas for a drive. As we drove around the base of the Huntsman he began pointing out land marks of his trapping days, and trees that ringtails always lived in. Then suddenly he called me to stop. He got out of the car, walked fifty metres into the bush to a big, old hollow tree, moved a few rocks away from its base and revealed a couple of dozen ringtail traps, still in first class condition.

"Well, look at that, boy," he smiled, "I left them there thirty years ago."

Ringtails are scarce today, but in the nineteen thirties they were a blessing to many families.



Anyway until next time good hitting and rolling.



Unfortunately of course this year it was only a one round competition, which disappoints everybody. A special thank you to everyone who played in the team, and helped to secure the flag.


