





A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: by Jim Haas.

I'm sorry folks but I'm dreaming again. I'm driving through the Valley, its spring and the paddocks are as green as the Irish on St. Patrick's Day. Everywhere there are sheep in their thousands with their snow white lambs jumping and diving here and there like cotton balls in the wind.

Its shearing time at Tullochgorum and the shed is full of activity as rousers, pressers, classers, cooks and farm hands go about their chosen tasks. And the shearers fill the air with colourful words as the blood, sweat and tears flow in their bid to become the "Gun".

At Fingal stockmen on horse are herding their sheep to paddocks close to Malahide homestead because they are the next shed in the run. Their shed will provide work for dozens right up to Christmas.

Further on towards St. Marys and the scene changes to herds of dairy cows. Jerseys with their light brown and white coats and faces full of contentment, mingle with black and white Friesians, with their huge bags almost touching the ground, and their heads down grazing the rich grass, all of which makes a colourful foreground to Mt. Elephant and St. Patrick's Head.

I pass Geoff King in the milk truck as he drives to pick up the milk from Cullenswood, for the cheese factory at St.Marys. His morning has been busy picking up milk from Falmouth, Gray, Irish town, German Town, Dublin Town and down the Valley.

I could picture all the little dairy farms milking twenty or thirty cows, their owners working from dawn to dusk, seven days a week. But it is a happy, fulfilling lifestyle, monetary values are not an issue, the fact that they were contributing to the community and that their little family business was theirs and had been for generations was what mattered.

A train pulling a string of goods wagons has just headed off towards St. Marys after shunting empty coal trucks into the Cornwall Siding for loading.

At the old bank homes a row of Hydro trucks were parked and eighteen men worked repairing power lines. Behind them, eight P.M.G. (Post Master General) men worked on telephone cables.

There were people everywhere in St.Marys. The two banks were a hive of activity as people moved in and out like bees. The two general stores, the two butchers, two pubs, chemist, clothing stores, shoe shop, newsagency, takeaways and four garages were all doing well.

I was looking forward to a game of hockey, volley ball or footy on the weekend and go to the pictures on Saturday night. On Sunday I could take the family for a long drive in my new FC Holden.


But, oh damn, I've woken up again and there's no cheese factory or dairy farms, there's only half as many sheep, half as many businesses in town, no pictures or Todd's Hall, no P.M.G., the Hydro is cut to a third, the train line has been pulled up, no footy or cricket, fuel is too expensive to take the kids on a Sunday drive, the young have all left town to find work and the farmland is being turned into forests.

Oh please, let me go back to sleep!!

St Marys Police report

There always seems to be some excitement for Police in the valley, especially in the past four weeks, with horses wreaking havoc on the streets of St Marys.

Police have received three call-outs, of horses on the streets, with one incident at 2pm in the afternoon like a scene from the "Man from Snowy River" the horse galloping at full speed down the centre of Main Street, where it then did a left turn down Storey Street.

While it may have provided impromptu entertainment to the shoppers and motorists, it may have had dire results to pedestrians, vehicles and the horse itself, had it slipped over.

Approximately one month ago at about 10pm, two horses escaped their enclosure and one reared up and collided into the side of a vehicle passing through St Marys outside the Post Office. Damage was caused to the vehicle and left one very startled driver.

Stock owners have a responsibility to ensure that their horses or cattle are properly secured, and fences are in good condition, to prevent stock from straying.

Should stock roam on the streets and be involved in an accident with a motor vehicle they may be sued for damages.

On Wednesday afternoon last week, two dogs attacked several sheep in a paddock in St Marys township. The sheep were terrorised for some time, but escaped any serious injury due to swift action by the owners of the property. As a result of the attack the dogs were caught and later had to be put down.

This is a reminder to all owners of dogs that they have a duty to ensure they are not at large, and ensure they do not attack any person or animal. The owners can face prosecution for these offences. Those dogs found offending or at large on rural land may be destroyed on that land.

It is extremely distressing for land owners who have sheep mauled and in turn for the owners of dogs to have them destroyed. In most cases these dogs are family pets but once involved in attacks they can continue to return and kill or maul sheep.

As for crime in the valley, there have been several incidents of diesel theft from machinery at logging sites in the Tower Hill area. The amounts stolen were quite substantial and there is no doubt the offender/s have gone prepared with a large container to transport the fuel.

A request is made for residents to remain vigil for any vehicles sighted, or suspicious activity occurring in isolated areas such as logging coupes.

The public may call Crimestoppers on 1800 055 555 or their local Police Station. While the perpetrators are benefiting from others the theft of the fuel from the machinery has a huge impact on the daily operations carried out by the contractors. Police enquiries are continuing into the thefts.



Rate Tenures

Break O'Day Mayor Stephen Salter is pleased that Council has agreed to withdraw charges recently applied for tenure properties.

This action was taken due to a number of extreme results that had been identified by ratepayers.

General Manager Brian Inches said that Council Officers had no way of knowing the impact of some of the results until all the data was processed and rates notices were issued.

On investigating some of the reasons for these results, it became apparent there were inconsistencies with the valuations causing similar properties having vastly different rating levels.

It was also apparent that Council's minimum rate impacted on the application of tenures more than anticipated.

Mr Inches said that as soon as the extent of these anomalies were known, we immediately started to address the problem which led to Council's decision taken.

Mayor Salter said that it was unfortunate that this problem had arisen, but was pleased that it had now been resolved.

New rate notices will be issued to all affected property owners in the near future.

Back in 1997 there just happened to be a State Government of the day who tried (and initially succeeded) in taking away our fantastic country hospital. Certain politicians then, in principle, supported but reversed suddenly a Private Members Bill, to retain the hospital on its second reading, which seemingly led to the ultimate demise of our much needed facility. We have long memories of those times.

If the politicians of that day had truly given their original consideration to the imminent closure an around the clock service, a great deal of anguish may have been avoided at the time.

During the process leading up to the decision I was asked to give evidence to a Legislative Council Inquiry, along with about 90 other people. I was asked questions on what impact I felt a hospital closure would have on our area, and I could only recall the brilliant help and care this hospital had offered to my extended family for generations, and how if lost, a void would surely exist, even possibly dissuading new people to our area because of a lesser medical capability.

Those Legislative Councillors seemed to be sympathetic to our views, but eventually the doors were closed as a full on hospital later that year, as we all remember. How many of us sat in the freezing weather as a protest vigil at the time, to show our personal disgust in the decision. Many did.

When it finally became a 9 to 5, 5 day a week Medical Centre, it was like a red rag to a bull for our much vaunted Hospital Support Group, and they kicked into action. The Government didn't know what hit them.

The Hospital Support Group raised community awareness, they were dedicated to the point of exhaustion, and they engendered all sorts of evidence and support, and reminded the Government that we weren't going to go away.

During the 1998 State Election campaign the then Labor Opposition made a promise, if elected, to try and eventually re-establish a 24/7 service to the valley, and that's exactly what happened after a doctor was finally found from South Africa. Once again this was achieved with much of the legwork done by the Hospital Support Group. It took a little while but it actually happened. Who said you can't fight City Hall and win? The next as you know is history.

Perhaps in a way those 1997 beaurocrats and politicians who rationalized a closure of the hospital did us a rather large favour.

It brought out a country fighting spirit and community pride that initially meant a newer hospital that was rebuilt, an avenue to a more expanded Tasmania Lymphoedema Centre, within the hospital, and now a fantastic re-development again that is currently in progress, that will service this community for generations to come.

The point of all this is:

- (1) Never give up the fight for something you truly believe in because look what can happen.
- (2) Those politicians and health department officials, I'd respectfully suggest, they may have been incorrect closing down our 24/7 facility.

Otherwise how could all this have happened since.

Around Australia in 48 days continued Day14

Today we headed to Kakadu. Paid the entrance fee, but was not informed you may not visit all the area without prior arrangement with the aboriginal groups.

Here we were amazed at the size and height of the termite mounds. These anthills we found were a different shape from other states. Apparently these are built with the door always facing the rising sun. In the Territory they are all tall and slim where as in the west they are fatter and not nearly as high ,and can be seen even on the lip of the highway.

We arrived at the large crocodile shaped motel and had some refreshments and a look around. To appreciate Kakadu properly you need to fly over it or take extended boat rides. This was not one of my favorite places especially the distance needed to travel for what we saw there.

On our return trip we stopped at East Alligator River for a cuppa. This is where twice-daily boat rides are available to go crocodile feeding. On our return to Darwin we toured the city and paddled in the water on the northern tip of Australia.

We had tea, and our unit looked over the Botanical Gardens, the Casino and Mindil Beach. At sunset the contrast of green grass white sand pink/purple sunset was magnificent.

Day 15

A free day checking out Darwin. Visited the big gun sections around the coast where Australia was protected from invasion in the Second World War. There are also many abandoned airfields around Darwin as reminders of this time.

To visit now, it is hard to believe this beautiful city was flattened by cyclone Tracy in 1974. The city centre has lots of alfresco eating, and shops galore. This is a very large city, and very commercial. There is a large Army, Navy and Air Force presence in Darwin. It's home to the largest Army base in Australia at Robertson Barracks. Quite a place to revisit.

Departed Darwin early, and arrived at Katherine for lunch, and filled up with fuel, as our destination was Kununurra on the Victorian Highway just over the Western Australian border.

Next stop was Victoria River, then onto Timber Creek, where we found our first 12kms of winding road through Gregory Gorge, and saw our first Boab tree. Boab trees are a stunted tree with very potty trunks and funny limbs like thin arms.

We arrived at the border of Northern Territory and Western Australia at 5pm N.T. time, 3.30pm W.A. time. Just 30k more to Kununura.

The motel there smelt like stagnant water Apparently this is because of bore and reticulated water.

The smell was so bad it remained in our clothes, that were out of our bags, even the next day. This was a small town and seemed to have all the industry in the main street.

Day 17

Left at 7am, still heading west, but now on the Great Northern Highway, and first port of call was Wyndham, the most northern town in West Australia, and then we returned to the highway west of Kununurra, then Turkey Creek, Halls Creek and Fitzroy Crossing.

If you could travel this road without calling at Fitzroy Crossing it would be terrific. I have yet to see a place anywhere as awful and ugly as this.

We called at Willare and continued toward Broome. This we found the hardest day, as without a caravan, accommodation was non-existent.

In this part of Australia there is no twilight and we found ourselves in the dark with still 160kms to go. With no fences, and cattle and brumbies on the road, it was slow traveling and hard on the eyes. After calling at Derby, I was very pleased to reach Broome without incident.

St Marys - Plantation Town

Anybody living in St Marys who is concerned about being caught in chemical drift from aerial spraying, about respiratory problems from burn-offs following helicopter fire bombing, about their property values falling, about their water supply failing, about the slaughter of local wildlife by poison and shooting, about losing sight of your local scenery, about living in a town with a declining population because new settlers don't want to live among that sort of stuff, about failing businesses because tourists see nothing worth stopping for in the middle of nothing, about driving through miles of the same sort of tree set out row after row, seeing no sheep or cattle, no eagles flying high, property houses dozed up, roads ploughed up, fences ripped out so that the plantation owners pay only vacant block rates, should take out an hour of their life this Sunday to go to the Escape Café at St Marys at either 1pm or 3pm to see Filmmaker David Warth's film "Two Visions-a Future for Tasmania".

David Warth has documented the blueprint for the destruction of Tasmania's forests, and the effect on country communities- the 2020 Vision, a plan of the plantation timber industry and Federal and State governments with the stated aim of increasing the country's timber plantation resource from one million to more than three million hectares by 2020, implying the planting of some 90,000 ha per year. The strategy is based on removing plantations from planning schemes by fast track Private Timber Reserves, by removing meaningful objection processes, and financing plantations by tax schemes to write off establishment costs against investors other tax liabilities.

David travelled around Tasmania to talk with local communities about what was happening in the real world as a result of 2020. Through a series of interviews, a picture emerges of the effect that the push for plantations is having on communities.

Communities die! Local shops have closed and entire towns are now gone, Meuna and Preolenna totally converted to plantations, the plantation and investment companies have moved through the state buying up farm land at inflated prices financed by artificial tax breaks in the North West, and then to the east of Launceston at Lilydale, Scottsdale, Tullendenna, Branxholm, Derby, Ringarooma, Moorina, Weldborough, Pyengana, and now into our back yard.

Some 4 years back the plantations moved into Upper Esk past Mathinna, now they have spread into the Tyne, and down towards Fingal through Evercreech. The agents and the Acquisition Officers of the plantation companies have now moved into the Break O Day Plains and offers are being made for properties surrounding St Marys.

The threat to your present way of life is real and immediate. What is happening in the forests and on the farms is no longer something which happens to 'them', it is starting to happen to you. 45% of the Break O Day Municipality is State Forest, and all of the Fingal Valley is farm land. The plantation companies key targets are cleared farm land in highland water catchments near public roads, so that in addition to the tax break they have minimal clearing costs, and their operations are subsidised by free water and the use of public roads. The valley is a plum prize. This one hour film has more relevance to your life than anything that is on the television. This Sunday, the tip stays open until 5, and it will be too cold in the garden. Nobody in St Marys, or Fingal, can say "I didn't realise what was happening"

Almost 220 projects have now been approved in Tasmania since 1996, worth \$9.4 million.

Under Senator Barnett's chairmanship, Consultative Panel members represent various councils, the Local Government Association of Tasmania, the RACT and Federal and State Government officials.

Projects selected are forwarded to the Minister for Local Government, Territories and Roads Jim Lloyd, for final approval.

The Road Black Spot program has been extended until 2007-08 financial year.

It was originally due to close at the end of the 2005-06 year.






