"People's Choice Award to Rainbow Retreat

A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: by Jim Haas

"The Burning Mountain"

In 1843 a farmhand hunting rabbits on the side of the Mt. Nicholas Range, just above where the township of Cornwall now stands, made a most significant find when his dog tried to dig a badger out of a hole and instead dug up coal. It was about the time when coal was becoming what many called "Black Gold" because with the discovery and development of the steam engine in England the demand for this marvelous fossil fuel was increasing at an alarming rate.

The settlers of the Break O' day Plains knew this from the correspondence and newspapers they were receiving from the home country, and went about exploring the mountain from east to west, in every creek bed, land slip and anywhere that may expose their prized find, and they were ecstatic when some four or five seams of two to three metres in thickness were found.

But the coal had very limited use around Cullenswood in the mid Nineteenth Century and transportation with horse and dray to the Port of Falmouth, or down through the valley to Launceston, was simply not practical, and it wasn't until 1886 when the railway from Conara was completed that the viability of coal mining became a reality.

The settlers had done their homework prior to 1886, however, and driven a number of exploratory tunnels into the coal seams and found what was to be called the "Blue Seam", named because of its blue/black colour, was the best quality coal and had a good solid sandstone roof making it much safer and easier to mine. Consequently, this was the seam that started a new economic revelation to the Fingal Valley.

The Blue Seam was to move on from those humble beginnings to produce thousands of tonnes of black gold, provide much needed employment to the area and with other entrances opened to the east it was, for many years, the main production seam for Cornwall Coal Co.

It was one fine morning in 1956, however, that all this came to an abrupt end for the Blue Seam, when the first shift of the day entering the eastern entrance, ran into a wall of smoke. The mine was on fire.


A frantic effort was made to get to the fire, but it was impossible. It had been burning all night and had too much of a hold, and every attempt to enter the mine, carrying the life saving canary to test the air, would result in the canary toppling over just a few metres from the surface, leaving the miners no choice but to move quickly out of the tunnel.

The next effort to extinguish the fire was to block off all entrances in an attempt to starve it of air, but that too failed and the Blue Seam, with thousands of tonnes of good quality coal reserves, was closed for ever. Now fifty years later the coal still smoulders beneath the mountain sending its steam, smoke and strong sulphur smell to the surface with a message that the fire will take its course, despite the efforts of man.

The burning coal seam at Cornwall is by no means unique however. There are literally thousands throughout the world, particularly in India and China. In the United States where several hundred burn, one in particular in Centralia, Pennsylvania, which started in 1962 from a rubbish fire, has caused almost the whole town and part of Route 61 to be shifted and rebuilt because as the coal seam burned, the heat caused the ground above to crack open.

The oldest known burning coal seam in the world is called Burning Mountain, and is in New South Wales some 300km north of Sydney near Wingen. Scientists estimate this huge coal seam has been burning for some six thousand years, with the fire moving southward at a rate of about one metre per year.


Wingen, which is Aboriginal for fire, is rich in indigenous heritage and was first settled by Europeans in around 1857, but it wasn't until 1866 that it was realised their burning mountain, which they all thought was a volcano, in fact was a coal seam set alight by some ancient natural force.

In recent years the area has been declared a nature reserve with the National Parks and Wildlife Service maintaining walking tracks, information panels and viewing platforms where people can safely experience and learn the wonders of nature as the smoke and steam oozes from the ground.

The origin of our Blue Seam fire was never found, although the strong theory at the time was that a cigarette butt was thrown accidentally into a pile of papers in an underground crib room. But whatever the cause, the fire in our mountain is still alive and, perhaps, will continue to be for another fifty years and beyond. We can only hope that our authorities can take the lead from Wingen, and the heritage of our "Burning Mountain" can be preserved for all to see and learn from.





Council Listens

People Power was a major feature of the September meeting of the Break O'Day Council, as Council passed a quadrella of motions responding to petitions, letters and requests from residents and ratepayer groups from Fingal, St Marys, Binalong Bay and Weldborough, representing the inland, highland, coastal and nether regions of the municipality.

Councillors endorsed a proposal to install a 50km/h speed zone in Talbot Street Fingal, initiated by a petition from 85 Fingal residents that an appropriate value be placed on the lives of residents by comparison with ensuring the "mobility" of traffic passing through their town.

It rescinded a motion passed in 2005 to subdivide and sell land it owns on the river bank at Groom and Storey Streets, St Marys, and instead instructed that the land be entered on the Register of Public Land, responding to a letter from over 200 St Marys residents requesting that the river bank land be kept in public ownership and developed as a park.

Following a petition and questions at Public Question Time from Binalong Bay residents on issues of sewage and environmental sustainability at Binalong, Council adopted a formal process of community consultation to explore options to achieve a long-term solution to the problems. It was also moved that Council would liaise with an expert in community consultation to design a comprehensive survey process of Binalong Bay residents.

The voice of the far flung nether regions of the municipality was heard when a request from the Weldborough Progress Association was supported and Council moved to ask DIER to conduct a safety audit of the Tasman Highway between Weldborough and North George River.

There are 6000 people in the Break O'Day Municipality. If only 5% of the people put forward one idea a year to make life better in their bit of the Break O'Day, or an idea on how to do things in a better way, that would be 300 ideas, about 6 a week, one each working day.

If only 10% of those ideas were workable, achievable and affordable, that would represent 30 initiatives a year coming to Council from the people of the Break O'Day, equivalent to 3 resident initiated proposals each Council Meeting. That would be a partnership, that is how people can make a difference.





Re: Roadkill awareness:

Dear Editor,

I would like to remind the travelling public and locals of the ever increasing problem of roadkill of our wildlife on our main roads.

On Sunday the 17th of September I was confronted with a Bennett Wallaby that had been hit by a vehicle on the Esk Highway outside the Works Depot. This poor animal had been hit by a vehicle and suffered a broken back and was suffering on the middle of the highway.

Fortunately, and thankfully Dana Smith had also found this poor creature suffering in pain on the road and rendered assistance with the help of her son Lyle and his companion. It was very distressing for all of us to find this animal left on the road after being hit by a passing vehicle.

I would like to take this opportunity to ask anyone who witnesses or who is unfortunate enough to hit an animal, to stop and see if the animal is hurt or if there is a joey in the pouch.

If the situation is that the animal is injured, please do not hesitate in contacting the local police, who will in turn contact the local animal carers in the district. It is a slow and painful death when these poor creatures are hit and it is our obligation to end the suffering of the animal or rehabilitate them.

There are several animal carers in the area who are able to assist in these situations and will respond within moments of a phone call by the local authorities. So, please slow down and be aware of our wildlife as they will also cause expensive damage to your vehicle and distress to the persons who find them.

Once again, thank you, Dana & Lyle for your assistance in an awful and distressing situation.

I was once accused of sarcasm when asking questions in this column.


This is not being sarcastic. It is a genuine request for public answers on these matters so that all of us are fully aware of both ratepayer and council mowing maintenance requirements.





If you want to become one of the Tuesday crew, just come along and see Bob, Trev, Jim, Col and the gang any Tuesday morning.


On working bees, keep a look out for a few soon, on weekends, to do some big work to the course, green and clubhouse.
