
A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: by Jim Haas

"The Brady Bunch"

For the first one hundred years or so of colonization in Australia, the settlers were continually weighted down by bushrangers, a term given to convicts who escaped from custody and "ranged the bush", stealing and plundering in order to survive.

The first recorded bushranger was John (Black) Caesar, a Negro thought to have been born in Jamaica, West Indies in 1764. He was transported with the First Fleet in 1788, as a pickpocket, and escaped in 1790 where he proved to be a nuisance around Sydney until he was shot and killed by a free settler in 1796.

After Caesar, it is estimated some two thousand bushrangers were active in Australia with Ned Kelly and his gang being the most publicised, leaving many others like John Fuller (alias Dan Morgan), Frank McCollum (Captain Melville), Andrew Scott (Captain Moonlight), Thomas Smith (Captain Midnight) and Fred Ward (Captain Thunderbolt), to fade into the background. But they were perhaps, as notorious as Ned.



In Tasmania there are some 115 recorded bushrangers with convicts such as Alexander Pearce, Thomas Jefferies, Matthew MacAvoy and Edward Broughton being some of the most tarnished, all of whom were hung for murder and suspicion of cannibalism.

The most interesting of our Tasmanian bushrangers, however, and one who was reported to have spent some time in the Fingal Valley, was Matthew Brady. Some evidence of his time in the Valley is a bald rock high on the hill above the Esk Highway near "Henbury" some five or six kilometers east of Avoca, which has been known for generations as "Brady's Lookout".

Matthew Brady was born of middle class Irish parents in Manchester, England in 1799. He grew up to become a handsome man, and received a good education, but while working as a groom, he forged his master's signature on a cheque to pay off a debt, and on the 17th April 1820 was sentenced to seven years transportation. He arrived in Van Diemen's Land on board the ship "Juliana"; but he strongly resented his punishment and continually tried to escape and be abusive towards his guards and officers. For this he received regular floggings of 25 to 50 lashes and was finally sent to the so called "Hell on Earth" prison at Sarah Island in Macquarie Harbor, on the West coast of Van Diemen's Land.

But Brady's persistence to escape was finally rewarded in June 1824 when he, along with 13 fellow convicts, stole a whale boat, and against all odds sailed through the hazardous Hell's Gates, the entrance to Macquarie Harbor, battled the huge seas of the west coast and made it to the mouth of the Derwent River where they came ashore, robbed a settler of his guns and provisions and hence the Brady gang began their days of ranging the bush.

Brady was a smart man and became somewhat of a Robin Hood, stealing only from the rich and giving enough to the poor to keep them on his side and help protect him from the troopers. As well, he was a huge hit with the women and enhanced this by making sure none of his men harmed a woman when they were carrying out a robbery. In fact when James McCabe, his right hand man, did harm to a woman, he shot him in the hand and threw him out of the gang where he was soon captured and hung.

For almost two years Brady and his gang ranged through the Van Diemen's Land bush from Launceston, east to the Fingal Valley and down though the midlands to Hobart Town and settlements around the south, all the while building a network of supporters from convicts and the poorer class people, all of whom loved and looked up to Brady as a hero.

But it was after he held up the jail at Sorell and released all the prisoners and locked up the guards that Lieutenant-Governor Sir George Arthur had had enough and posted a reward of 20 gallons of rum or a free pardon for any convict who gave information that led to the capture of Brady.

Brady responded to Arthur's reward by riding up to the Royal Oak Hotel and placing his own poster on the front door, it read: "It has caused Matthew Brady much concern that such a person known as Sir George Arthur is at large. Twenty gallons of rum will be given to any person who will deliver this person to me." Governor Arthur's reward finally worked, however, with one of Brady's men turning traitor, leading to him and most of his gang being captured in early 1826.

This was carried out near Launceston by free settler, John Batman, the man who eventually founded Melbourne in May 1835. On May the 4th 1826, in front of a huge crowd of supporters, Matthew Brady stood on the gallows in Hobart Town; his only protest was that he shared the platform with noted cannibal Thomas Jefferies. But as the trapdoor opened men groaned in pure anguish and the women cried as their hero fell to his death, leaving many to wonder what this handsome, intelligent, young Irishman could have achieved in his homeland if only he had not been caught up in the mayhem of transportation. The remaining five gang members captured with Brady were hanged the next day.





- * Council also agreed to a request from the Lymphoedema Centre to utilise one of the rooms in the St Marys Hall.

Wildlife of Tasmania Caring for Wildlife Caring for Orphaned Wildlife

Due to an overwhelming response to my letter in the last Valley Voice, I have written the following advice for people who may find an orphaned or injured native animal.

Most native animals brought to the Northeast Wildlife Carers by members of the public, are victims of vehicle or window collisions, dog or cat attack, trapping, shooting or electrocution. Our goal is to relieve the stress of these unfortunate animals and ideally, rehabilitate them back to the wild in a fit condition. These notes have been designed to give the animal a better chance of survival during short term care or in an emergency. Long term care requires greater knowledge of an animal's requirements.

If you find a distressed native animal, there are several important steps to follow which will reduce the stress of capture and help prevent further injury to the animal.

Before capture

Before attempting capture, observe the animal for any signs of illness or injury. Information can then be passed on to an expert to help identify the animal's problem. For example, a broken wing will hang, and an inclined head may suggest concussion or a damaged ear. Look for wounds, unusual behaviour, movements or posture such as lopsidedness.

Capture and transport

Prepare a suitable transport box for the animal before attempting capture. Cardboard boxes will need airholes punched into them and can be slippery for birds. Line the bottom of the box with newspaper, old towels or an old blanket.

The capture and handling of wild animals can be very stressful (for both animal and handler). Animals can become aggressive and difficult to handle when scared or injured. They may try to defend themselves with wings, teeth, beak or claws. Wear gloves for protection.

A confident yet gentle approach is best. At least two people are needed for the capture of larger animals such as an adult wallaby. If you are inexperienced at handling wildlife or do not have any rescue gear please do not attempt to capture the animal, instead seek expert help.

Most animals can be captured by throwing an old towel or blanket over them. Nets can cause more injuries. Wrap the animal securely or place it in a clean hessian sack or pillowslip and tie off the open end. Do not try and comfort it. Next place the animal and bag into the prepared box. Reptiles and echidnas are best scooped into and transported in large plastic garbage bins.

Keep the animal warm and quiet until you can get it home or get advice on its care. Do not allow the animal to be continually disturbed by people wishing to look at it.

Seeking advice

Seek expert advice, either by phone or in person, from a veterinarian or the Parks and Wildlife Service, or members of Northeast Wildlife Carers. The very fact that you managed to catch the animal usually indicates that something is wrong with it. The Parks and Wildlife Service has few funds available for treating injured wildlife, and these are generally reserved for rare species. Therefore, if you have an animal treated by a vet, you may be responsible for the cost (please ask your vet first), fortunately our local vet will not charge if you bring the animal for a check up first thing.

If you are unable to take on or continue in the carer's role, please contact the Northeast Wildlife Carers. They have dedicated wildlife carers available to care for wildlife. Phone 0417 107 105 or 6372 2973 (Submitted by Peter Power)



DEVILS AT SOUTH SISTER! Logging Plans Must Be Halted

The Tasmanian Greens last week called for the proposed plans for logging at South Sister at St Marys to be immediately suspended, with the recent discovery of Tasmanian devil scats and dens within the boundaries of a Forestry Tasmania coupe until:

- (a) The recovery plan for Tasmanian Devils is completed;
- (b) A detailed assessment of the identified Tasmanian devil population is undertaken; and
- (c) The management prescriptions for the species are developed and approved.



Greens Shadow Native Forests spokesperson and Member for Lyons Tim Morris MHA said that the State Government needed to take charge of the Forest Practices Authority who recently informed his office that the "The Forest Practices Authority will not be rescinding this FPP [Forest Practices Plan] on the basis of the occurrence of the Tasmanian Devil within the South Sister area," despite such an action contradicting the Threatened Species Act 1995 as well as the Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Policy Statement 3.6 for the Tasmania Devil.

"The EPBC Act Policy Statement 3.6 contains significant impacts criteria, which is supposed to provide guidance to land managers as to how they can assist in survival and recovery of the Tasmanian Devil." The Greens assert that the logging of South Sister may have a significant impact on the species and cite the following statement within the EPBC Act impact criteria:

- · Lead to the long term decrease size of an important population of the species
- Adversely affect habitat critical to the survival of the species
- · Modify, destroy, remove, isolate or decrease the availability or quality of habitat to the extent the species may decline
- · Reduce the area of occupancy of an important population

"How can this Lennon Labour Government possibly allow logging to take place in an area where the devils are shown to live, without having a recovery plan in place?" Mr Morris said.

"It is completely unacceptable that the Forest Practices Authority will not rescind the Forest Practices Plan for South Sister in light of the discovery of devil scats and dens - is it not enough proof of the existence of the devils in this area?" "What is the point of introducing protection legislation such as the Threatened Species Act 1995 and the Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 if they simply can be allowed to be overridden?"

"The State Government needs to come out strongly in defence of the iconic Tasmanian devil, and call for a halt to any logging plans for South Sister until a recovery plan for Tasmanian Devils is completed, and until a detailed assessment of the identified Tasmanian devil population is undertaken, and the management prescriptions for the species are developed and approved," Mr Morris said.
