Thanks is a small word, but it means so much to so many people, and I'm sure there are residents who are still in their homes because of the efforts put in by all these crews.

To ALL emergency personnel in whatever capacity your services were utilised, congratulations on the magnificent job you have done. You all, without exception deserve medals.

As this paper goes to print, the fires are still burning, people are still at risk, and the emergency services are still working tirelessly. Let us hope that the dangers will soon be over, and families will have their loved ones home with them for Christmas.


Raffle consisting of four prizes, the first being a decorated fibre optic Xmas "Money tree" valued at \$150, will be conducted between now and Xmas eve.



For others though, through bad luck and fate of the winds, no amount of preparation could help on Monday and Thursday afternoons in Scamander and Four Mile Creek respectively.


Our hearts go out to those individuals and families who have

earthmoving contractors and so on who have, and continue to work around the clock to protect persons and property as best they can. Also a special mention to ABC radio who kept us informed at those crucial times. All these people deserve our consideration, support and thanks, for what is a tough uncompromising battle, that could go on for some days and weeks yet.

The Tas Fire Service both full time and at the local brigade level have shown just how important their work is, and the mind boggles as to how many other properties and, dare I say, lives would have been lost if they weren't as good as they are. All emergency services are exactly the same.

What really makes me proud though, is everyone almost without exception in this community who have done their bit to help, something acknowledged by the career fire officers on a number of occasions. Others have volunteered their time to help out in other ways. As old Mr Grace would say, "You've all done very well."

No doubt in the coming weeks and months, some of the happenings and close calls by fire crews and locals alike, will come out, proving what the human spirit is capable of, and with the ferocity of these unique fires it's a truly genuine relief that only one person to date has been seriously injured.

Another benefit is the technology that enables fires such as these to be fought and monitored.

The helicopters with water bombing capabilities work in unison with fire-spotting and GPS equipment, which in turn helps limit damage as best is possible.

Meteorological information is also a tool to allow the crews to be in the most dangerous places. It sort of restores your faith in the weather predictions, doesn't it?

The next few days leading up to Christmas will probably determine what happens with this fire, but let's hope that by then many of the crews can at least enjoy a few hours respite with their families, as they take part in the holiday period.

No one knows for sure how long some roads, most notably the St Marys Pass will be out of action, but just remember this; these road crews will be doing their utmost to get traffic flowing again, but only in a safe and hazard free situation. As much as we are irked by delays and detours, just remember the displaced families either burnt out or partially burnt out, and thank your lucky stars that your only problem is delays. If that is all there is to worry about then you are indeed lucky.

As this is the last Valley Voice for 2006 may I, Cagerattler, thank you all for your ideas for some of the topics, and to the Valley Voice which allows the column. It's genuinely appreciated.

Have a very safe and happy holiday and we will pick up the pen again in 2007.

However, with a creative touch, enough paintings, flowers and decorations, these "flaws" did not show. Most rooms were filled with the soft glow of Christmas lights and candle light that evening, to create a feeling of peace, for we were celebrating the birth of Jesus – the Prince of Peace.

Tomorrow's Christmas dinner preparations were well organised, beautiful Christmas carols were playing softly on the CD player, to remind us that this was the season of forgiveness, unity and love. All the family were home; all was perfect.

Currently, each family member was off doing something special each wanted to do for Christmas – wrapping presents most likely. I was alone, letting my heart be filled with that Christmas spirit, as a I gazed on the dimly lit nativity scene, and prayed that I would be like Jesus to my family and those around me – one who brought love, peace and unity.

The thunderstorm and heavy rain that had occurred during the St Marys Christmas Parade had passed, and was replaced by a gentle rain. How appropriate to have a gentle rain refreshing everything. It reminded me of God's love refreshing the world. I went outside to feel the outdoor beauty and peace that matched the indoor feeling.

Again I personally knew families who were not together because of any one of these things. I prayed for them. "You realise that you could have caused your family to be one of those split apart, hurting families," God's voice gently challenged me.

Yes, I knew. Andrew loves his family, and would have forgiven my outburst of anger and indignation. But where would the true love, joy and peace of Christmas be? Where would my prayer to be like Jesus be? What was the use of 'perfection' of our surroundings if our hearts were in turmoil?

Everything I treasured and worked so hard to create was worthless if relationships were not right. After all, that is the Christmas message — God the Father sent his beloved son Jesus, to restore relationships. I quietly retreated to the dining room and the wet clothes hanging on the chairs. Oh I didn't like the décor any better, but I thanked God for it.


Epilogue

A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: From Jim Haas

In generations to come when people look back on our heritage, December 2006 will surely feature as one of the most significant months in the history of the St. Patricks Head District.

From a quiet Sunday afternoon we were thrown into a drama that, although many have worried about, nobody expected it to happen with such velocity and create the devastation it did at German town, Scamander and Four Mile Creek and continue to be threatening some ten days later.

Last Thursday at Cornwall, I fought the fire as it came towards my house, with two Forestry workers who travelled all the way from Smithton to lend a hand. All around the town Forestry and Tas Fire units from Hobart, Launceston, St. Patricks River, Legana and Mathinna stood alongside Cornwall residents and together a town was saved.

But this is only one little story in the week that will be compared with the Hobart fires of 1967. A week where we received the most press coverage ever for all the wrong reasons. It will be a week where, some time soon, we can all sit down over a beer or a fine red and tell our stories, pat ourselves on the back for the effort shown by the community and wonder at the courage shown by all who stood and fought.

Whilst at the time of writing, the fires are still a threat as they work their way though the hills around us, we must pay tribute to Forestry, Parks and Wildlife, bulldozer drivers and the helicopter pilots all of whom played a major role in the fight to save our lives and our possessions.

Special thanks, however, must go to Tas Fire Service and their wonderful bunch of volunteers. They came to our humble town from all over the state, to stand alongside our local boys and work on the fire ground for up to twelve hours a day to protect properties, back burn, put in containment lines and supervise an operation that has been, to say the least, a mammoth task.

Last but certainly not least, another special mention must go to the property owners who showed tremendous courage and commitment to stay with their homes when, at times, the fire came at them like a roaring freight train.

Possessions have been lost this week, some irreplaceable, but we are all still here and because of this we will recover. The community spirit of the Break O' Day Plains, which has taken on many a fight in the past, will grow stronger from the experience of the last ten days and prepare us all for the next challenge.





Northeast Wildlife Carers would like to bring to the communities' attention the devastating effect and situation of domestic dog attacks on the local wildlife.

Over the last few weeks local carers have been given injured and orphaned-wildlife that have been attacked by dogs in people's yards.

We would like to advise people who bring these poor creatures for rehabilitation to the carers, that as the animal has been affected on their property it is their responsibility, and it would be appreciated if they could donate some money to the carers that they are handing the animal to for rehabilitation.

The cost per animal rehabilitated is approximately \$400 a year, and is paid by the carer from their own pockets; we do not receive any form of funding to help with the cost of raising these animals.

As we are suffering a major drought, the wildlife are coming out of the bush and into the suburban areas for food and water, so please be aware of the wildlife that may be entering your property and please check before letting your dog out as they cause irreparable damage and cause a lot of grief for all who are involved.

We have had instances of dogs entering people's properties and attacking wildlife. When we care for these animals after an attack we cannot be sure the orphan will survive, as they suffer post traumatic shock and die after a few days.



Handbags - a potential Health risk!

This is of interest!

Have you ever noticed girls who sit their handbags on public toilet floors - then go directly to their dining tables and set it on the table? Happens a lot!

It's not always the 'restaurant food' that causes stomach distress.

Sometimes "what you don't know 'will' hurt you"!

Read on...

Mum got so upset when guests came in the door and plopped their handbags down on the counter where she was cooking or setting up food. She always said that handbags are really dirty, because of where they have been. Smart Mum!!!

It's something just about every woman carries with them. While we may know what's inside our handbags, do you have any idea what's on the outside?

Shauna Lake put handbags to the test - for bacteria - with surprising results. You may think twice about where you put your handbag.

Women carry handbags everywhere; from the office to public toilets. To the floor of the car. Most women won't be caught without their handbags, but did you ever stop to think about where your handbag goes during the day?

"I drive a school bus, so my handbag has been on the floor of the bus a lot," says one woman.

"On the floor of my car, and in toilets."

"I put my handbag in grocery shopping carts, on the floor of the toilet while changing a nappy," says another woman "and of course in my home which should be clean."

We decided to find out if handbags harbour a lot of bacteria. We learned how to test them at Nelson Laboratories in Salt Lake City, and then we set out to test the average woman's handbag.

Most women told us they didn't stop to think about what was on the bottom of their handbag.

Most said at home they usually set their handbags on top of kitchen tables and counters where food is prepared.

Most of the ladies we talked to told us they wouldn't be surprised if their handbags were at least a little bit dirty. It turns out handbags are so surprisingly dirty, even the microbiologist who tested them was shocked.

Microbiologist Amy Karen of Nelson Labs says nearly all of the handbags tested were not only high in bacteria, but high in harmful kinds of bacteria. Pseudomonas can cause eye infections, staphylococcus Aurous can cause serious skin infections, and salmonella and e-coli found on the handbags could make people very sick.

In one sampling, four of five handbags tested positive for salmonella, and that's not the worst of it. "There is fecal contamination on the handbags," says Amy. Leather or vinyl handbags tended to be cleaner than cloth handbags, and lifestyle seemed to play a role.

People with kids tended to have dirtier handbags than those without. With one exception. The handbag of one single woman who frequented nightclubs had one of the worst contaminations of all. "Some type of faeces, or possibly vomit" says Amy.

So the moral of this story - your handbag won't kill you, but it does have the potential to make you very sick if you keep it on places where you eat.

Use hooks to hang your handbag at home and in toilets, and don't put it on your desk, a restaurant table, or on your kitchen countertop.

Experts say you should think of your handbag the same way you would a pair of shoes. "If you think about putting a pair of shoes onto your countertops, that's the same thing you're doing when you put your handbag on the countertops" - your handbag has gone where individuals before you have sneezed, coughed, spat, urinated, emptied bowels, etc!

Do you really want to bring that home with you? The microbiologists at Nelson also said cleaning a handbag will help.

Wash cloth handbags and use leather cleaner to clean the bottom of leather handbags.

We hope to officially recognise their contribution very soon, along with Rita, Shan and Charmaine. Sorry about that.


