

A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: by Jim Haas

The Second Church

Last year in the Valley Voice I talked about Christ Church Cullenswood being the first church to be built in the Break O'Day Plains in 1847. The second church was a little more modest than the Anglican Church, however. It was built by the Roman Catholics, under the guidance of Father John Fitzgerald, just a ten minute walk west on one acre of land donated by Mrs Thomas Ransom of "Millbrook".

Father Fitzgerald, it appears, was a dynamic man and one of Tasmania's greatest pioneers of the Catholic ministry. Indeed in 1854, he was the first Australian born Priest to be ordained in Rome. He was born in Hobart in 1830, then as a young man went to England and attended the St Mary's College in Oscott, before going to the English College in Rome.

For seven years from 1855 to 1862 he served his people on horseback from Campbell Town to St Helens and down to Swansea. We can only imagine the difficulties Father Fitzgerald would have faced each time he set out on his demanding trek over virtually unmade roads and, at times, flooded rivers to serve the needs of his parishioners.

Soon after beginning his ministry to the Break O'Day Plains he supervised the fund raising and then the building of their first Catholic church. It was described as a simple style timber building, some 40 feet long by 20 feet wide, with a beautiful bell tower at one end and a fine Gothic window over the altar. Although it was completed in 1858, it was not until the 30th January 1859 that the Lord Bishop of Hobart Town travelled to Cullenswood and with the assistance of Father Fitzgerald, held a Divine Service to consecrate the humble little building.

What a memorable day it must have been for the Catholics of the district when some 300 persons filled the new church to capacity, all of whom appeared to give His Lordship their undivided attention as he gave his sermon on the evils of intemperance. This, he said, was unfortunately too prevalent in this constituency.

After the sermon the collection plate was handed around and the magnificent sum of over 70 pounds was collected. The Bishop was more than pleased with this creditable amount and praised the Catholics of the district for their generosity. He said it was a sign of their appreciation for the zealous endeavours of their Pastor who, during the past three years, had labored most intensely for this project.

The little Church of St Mary at Cullenswood was rather short lived, however. Less than ten years after its completion a new town was surveyed three miles further east. The new town, which was eventually named St Marys after St Marys Pass, soon began to grow rapidly and by the 1890's had taken over from Cullenswood as the main service centre for the Break O'Day Plains. The people of St Marys were like the majority of English speaking people in the colonies, they had a deep love of the Christian faith and a house of worship was an essential part of the community, hence churches began to spring up.

The Wesleyans were the first to build their little chapel in Storey Street in 1884, followed by the Anglicans in Main Street in 1895. Finally the Catholics chose a high spot on the eastern end of town and built a fine church which was dedicated on the 9^{th} November 1899.

The dedication of the Mary of the Assumption Catholic Church at St Marys, however, saw the end of the modest little building at Cullenswood that had served the community for forty years. It was moved to St Marys and forms part of a house in Newman Street.

The ministry of Father Fitzgerald too was short lived. It seems he took ill and returned to England in 1862 and died at Plymouth in 1864 at the young age of 34. The only reminder of his momentous part in our heritage is the old graveyard, which like the Cullenswood Church grounds, is the resting place for many of our early settlers. Names like Davern, McIntee, Bullock, Leech, Strochnetter and King are but a few that were dominant in pioneering the district. But John Fitzgerald and the significance of his contribution to the Break O'Day Plains appears sadly forgotten.




Old Graveyard at Cullenswood where the first Catholic Church in the Break O' Day Plains once stood.



Lohrey's Road Fire.

On Sunday Dec 10, 2006, at around 14.30, a call was received about a fire in the Lohrey's Rd/Cato's Rd area. Upon investigation a large vegetation fire was discovered.

Given the current weather conditions, which were very similar to Ash Wednesday, things were looking grim. Outside crews and aerial support were called in immediately, with the decision being made to go into 'property protection mode'.

This meant protecting property only, any attempts to try and stop the fire would have to wait until later when conditions were more favourable. The fire was too severe to try and control at this time.

While waiting in Lohrey's Road for trucks to arrive, a phone call was received from a Gardiners Creek road resident to say a fire had started in that area, (this was a spot fire from the original fire, spotting a distance of 6kms) meaning a re-deployment of a truck and a need for further resources.

The fire spread rapidly over the next few hours, leaving a wave of destruction behind it. At this stage there were eight Tas Fire Service fire fighting appliances, one helicopter, numerous Forestry fire fighting appliances and machinery on location.

As the night drew in, crews could start to be stood down for rest, leaving only minimal personnel on the fire ground, as it had become obvious by now that this fire was going to take considerable time and many resources would end up being involved.

The fire then turned into the worst fire the state had seen since Black Tuesday, 1967.

The cause of the fire was accidental, and started from a camp fire in the Cato's Road area, showing just how careful one must be when using fire outside. Without the support of the helicopters and dozers, this fire would have been much larger, and caused far more devastation. The helicopters in particular were an extremely valuable resource.

The St Marys Fire Brigade would like to thank everyone for their support during and after the fire. The generosity of everyone will be remembered for a long time to come.

I am not going to mention names, for fear of missing someone. The support from individuals, groups and businesses, with donations of much needed food, supplies, replacement fridges, refreshments, money and clothing, (for those from away who didn't have a change) was overwhelming.

I would also like to take this opportunity to personally thank all TFS, Forestry and Parks personnel from close and afar with a special mention to the St Marys Brigade members for their dedication and assistance in fighting this fire.

RED CROSS APPEAL FUNDS

The Mayor of Break O'Day Council, Robert Legge, announced recently that a further \$70,000 will be directed to help 19 families who have been affected by the December 2006 fires.



This is on top of over \$280.000 in cash assistance that has already been distributed to families, businesses, farmers and other organizations in the area.

"We are committed to getting real financial and other support to families as quickly as possible," Mayor Legge said. "I understand that this is a very difficult time for our community, so it is critical that we get it right, from the start. There has already been some support for those affected by the fires, but there is more to do." said Mayor Legge.

The assistance recently agreed to is the phase of assistance to be made available from funds raised in the Red Cross Appeal. These grants are to be paid directly to families affected by the fires, and represent some of the most urgent cases. The Council and Red Cross will continue to consider applications over the next 3 weeks.

Over \$1 million is now available for recovery assistance to the community affected by the recent fires. This includes the \$700,00 made available from the State and Commonwealth Governments and around \$350,000 which has been donated through the Red Cross Appeal.

Applications for funding from the Red Cross Appeal can be lodges with the Council up until 2 March 2007, and assistance will be directed to those most in need as soon as possible after this date. Urgent cases will also be considered as applications are received.

Mayor Legge welcomes the appointment of Susan Powell to assist Chris Hughes and other members of the Break O'Day Council to work with the community and affected families on priorities for assistance.

Mayor Legge encourages everyone affected by these fires to contact Susan and Chris, to make sure that the Council directs assistance to those most in need.

"We want to know what families need to recover from these fires," Mayor Legge said. "I urge everyone who wants to understand what is going on, to contact the Council. We will also be actively talking to families affected by the fires over the coming weeks. Recovery from these events is a long haul, but we will be here for the community at every stage," said the Mayor.

The recreation ground is being improved by the Break O'Day Council working with the community to develop an action plan. Many events are organized to help celebrate the Sesquicentenary. With congratulations to the Pacing Club for kicking off our year.

Bothwell is the place to be from March 2—4, 2007, when thousands of textiles lovers from across Australia and the world will descend on this historic town in central Tasmania for the Bothwell International Highland Spin-in to show, develop and celebrate their skills with yarn and the friendship that is such an important part of this famous fibre festival.



A key feature of the spin-in, begun in 1978 by Barbara Fowler, is that visitors have the opportunity to try their hand at spinning, weaving, felting, dyeing and much more.

There are many competitions and displays, from the Longest Thread, where the aim is to spin the greatest length of 2-ply yarn from 10 grams of sheep's wool, to classes for stoles, scarves and freeform knitting.

There will be two international guests. Nilda Callanaupa from Peru in South America will give workshops in weaving and traditional Inca textile crafts, and Margaret Stove from New Zealand will run workshops in lace knitting and fine spinning.

Aboriginal basket weavers from Central Australia will demonstrate their skills and Grietje van Randen and Sonja Hindrum of Tasmania will showcase their felt sculptures and wearable art.

For 2007 the idea for friendship is being further developed. Everyone in the world is invited to collect one metre of thread from their friends and families, knot them together and send them to be wound on to a special "friendship ball". When complete, it will weigh two tonnes and the thread will be long enough to extend around the world at the equator, linking everyone for peace.

When complete, Bothwell will have its own "Big Thing" which will eventually be put on permanent display in the town.


