"THE MAN WITH THE DONKEY" 1892 –1915 JOHN SIMPSON KIRKPATRICK

John Simpson Kirkpatrick was a hero. A war hero. A very special type of war hero.

He killed no-one, and he led no great charges, but with a stray donkey he named Murphy, saved many lives.

Again and again he ferried wounded ANZAC soldiers to safety from the front line trenches to the beach-head at Gallipoli.

He died at the age of 22, leading his donkey and a wounded soldier down Shrapnel Gully.

Private Simpson seems to have shown essential Australian qualities: courage, physical strength, independence, singlemindedness, comradeship, compassion and a dislike of authority.

A bravery that sought and received no awards.

John Simpson Kirkpatrick died an Australian.

But he was born a South Shieldsman of a poor, immigrant Scottish family.

His life before Gallipoli was typical of so many of the period. He was born at No.10 South Eldon Street, in the densely populated Laygate area of South Shields (England), where row after row of two up, two down terraced houses were inhabited by working-class people, their livelihoods totally dependent on heavy engineering, the ship-yards, docks and coal mines.

The family moved to 14 Bertram Street, a few hundred yards from where he was born and it was there that John was brought up. His three brother and a sister all died in childhood, and his father was crippled at work.

Young John attended Barnes Road Primary School and St Marys Sunday School. His education was cut short by the need to support his parents and youngest surviving sister. He worked as a milk boy until his father died in 1909.

A week later he left South Shields for a life at sea. He was never to return to South Shields. He jumped ship in Australia in 1910, hoping to find his fortune in the Queensland canefields, the coal mines of New South Wales, and the gold fields of Western Australia.

John found no fortune and few friends. He returned to sea in 1911 as a steward and then as a stoker, working out of Fremantle on a number of small coasters.

His ships called into Hobart on several occasions during that period.

At the outbreak of the Great War, Kirkpatrick joined the 3rd Field Ambulance in the Australian Army Medical corps.

John was missing his beloved mother terribly, and believed the army would take him to France, and eventually to England and his mother. Instead, the army took him to Gallipoli. He was one of the first ANZACS to land on 25th April, 1915.

In the 24 days that followed, Kirkpatrick was to achieve a greatness and fame that had previously been denied him, and the comradeship and admiration of his fellow soldiers.

He was buried at Queensland Point at Gallipoli.

A bronze statue of "The Man With the Donkey" was erected at the Shrine of Remembrance in Melbourne.

Another statue was unveiled in Canberra in 1988.



A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: by Jim Haas The Fingal Line

When we look back over history there are significant events, happenings or inventions that changed the World. Perhaps the most innovating was the discovery and development of the power of steam by James Watt in 1776. What happened from then onwards needs no explanation.

Arguably the most significant day in the history of St Marys and indeed the Fingal Valley, has a direct link to Watt's invention. It was the opening of the railway from The Main Line at The Corners (Conara) to St Marys on the 29th June 1886.

We can only imagine what it would have been like on that historic day when many of our ancestors stood on the platform of the newly built station and welcomed the special steam train full of dignitaries as it huffed, puffed and hissed its way into the railyards of St Marys. One can only wonder if they realised how much their lives would change from that day on.

St Marys could now go forward as an industrial centre. The abundance of coal found in the Mt Nicholas Range could now be mined and transported cheaply and safely to Tasmanian industries. Our farm produce, in particular the award winning cheeses that was being made here, could reach the markets of Hobart, Launceston, or Sydney and beyond much more quickly. Our timber industry that Julius Aulich had just started at Mill Ridge, east of St Patricks Head, could now expand beyond the Break O'Day Plains.

The opening of the Fingal Line was overshadowed the same evening, however, when the special train, which left Hobart on the 28th June 1886, loaded with some 100 dignities, many of whom were government ministers, which included the Premier, The Honourable Doctor Agnew, left the rails on a five chain curve just twenty miles from Hobart. The train itself was extensively damaged and all persons on board were injured in some way, with the driver, Mr Bradshaw killed instantly, and the stoker, Joseph Rogers, dieing the following day. All other passengers, although many had broken bones and scalds, made full recoveries.

The Fingal Line itself has a good safety record. The only major disaster was on Saturday the 16th August 1946 when, after heavy rain which was compared to the 1929 floods, an embankment a mile east of Ormley at Rosstrevor, collapsed. This caused a "Q" class steam locomotive and the twenty trucks of coal and timber it was hauling to leave the tracks killing the driver, Eric Britton. The train and its carriages were extensively wrecked and it was a miracle that the firemen Fred Guy, guard R. Causley, and passengers Mr and Mrs Athol Bean and their baby daughter,r were uninjured.


For almost a hundred years the Fingal Line was the most important link with the outside world. It carried our coal, timber and farm produce to market. It provided a passenger service to the city and it carried our goods into the valley. But as the motor car developed and roads were upgraded, more and more freight and passengers preferred road travel to rail and the "Camel Car" passenger service, as it was known, ended in 1957.

Now fifty years on, although the majority of our coal and a small amount of timber are still carted out of the valley by rail, we have seen a gradual shift of all freight towards road transport. Today when we drive down the Esk Main Road and pass the many trucks carting both timber and coal, one can only wonder if our rail system will survive for much longer. Or will it too be abandoned and pulled up like the St Marys to Fingal line was in the 1980s?

I guess now in hindsight we should not have stood back and allowed this to happen, but instead ran a campaign similar to our hospital, doctor and environmental protests, and fought to have this significant part of our history preserved. What a wonderful tourist attraction we could have now with a regular steam train running up and down the Break O'Day Plains as a living memory of that important time in our heritage.

I have fond memories as a young boy waking up to the sound of the morning stream train as it huff, puffed, clickety clacked and whistled its way from Cullenswood station up into the Cornwall screens with the daily supply of coal wagons. I remember looking down from Cornwall and seeing the stream train hauling its long line of coal wagons as it headed off down the valley. The plume of white smoke and steam would trail a mile or so behind, before it disappeared into the atmosphere.

Sadly our train line and the sounds of a steam train may have been lost for ever. But thanks to Darlene and Michael Wright, who have taken an interest in the wonderful old station building, which dates back to 1886, and lovingly restored it to what you see today, St Marys still has a significant icon that will continue to stand for generations as a living reminder of our rail history, as well as providing a place to relax and learn the heritage of our valley and its people.


The winner of the raffle drawn 5th April, with proceeds to the "Heart Monitor" purchase, was Kath Blair of St Marys, Congratulations Kath.

Fire regeneration funding

A very respected media outlet is about to revisit our area to say thank you to the communities for help in broadcasting and other assistance given during the December bushfire crisis.

It has been called 'Back to St Helens', according to the written information in the newspapers. Let it be said that this is a terrific thing to happen, and a great concept.

Without being too controversial though, I'd strongly suggest to the producers of this event (April 21st) that it include quite a bit of input from Scamander, Four Mile Creek, Cornwall, Fingal, Mathinna and St Marys, where, just like St Helens, support from the businesses and the community was amazing over those weeks late last year.

In some instances, we had people out there providing their expertise, fighting/managing the fires, servicing the crews AND running businesses, all at the same time. Some of these people weren't even sure if their own properties were safe. For Scamander and Four Mile Creek, homes were lost, others lost infrastructure, directly affecting their livelihoods, and others still lost access, causing hardship and trepidation. Perhaps some of these people will be included, to see how they have moved on.

I'd expect that the incredible local volunteer firey's, volunteer firey's from around the state, Tas Fire Service crews, SES, Parks and Wildlife and Tasmania Police will get a special recognition, as should the hospitals, paramedics and volunteer ambulance crews.

What about the local and statewide Aurora crews who were literally replacing poles in the hundreds, while the fires were still burning, so that power supplies could be restored as quickly as possible? And Telstra Technicians worked similarly to repair vital communication links. I'd expect they will also get a mention or two during the day, as would Break O'Day Council for their excellent efforts informing the community.

Works Tasmania road crews, local council road crews and associated transport authorities similarly deserve recognition during the show, you'd anticipate, for getting roads safe so quickly.

In the aftermath of the fires, all this coincided with the conclusion of the school year, and the efforts of all our local schools, but particularly St Marys District High School, with many students directly affected due to pass closures (etc) were tremendous. I understand that children from St Marys and St Helens schools will be part of the wonderful music performances on the day. That's great.

As mentioned above, to have this through radio the week after next in St Helens is fantastic, and thanks must go to the conveners, but perhaps it should be called "Back to Break O'Day", just to remind people that this affected so many communities, and there are thousands of people to thank right across our state, not just here.

I'm sure we will turn our radios on, or be there to take it in.

Letter to the Editor - April 2007

Given his recent comments, (The Mercury, 29 March) Federal Forest Minister, Eric Abetz has again demonstrated that he has no real knowledge about Forestry Tasmania's fire programs and to cover his ignorance he deliberately tries to confuse the issue, when he persists in talking about fuel reduction burns and the so-called regeneration burns as if they are one and the same.

The mushroom like clouds of smoke we have just started to see again around the state are what Forestry Tasmania refers to as regeneration burns. These are fires that are conducted after a forest coupe has been clear-felled and the vast quantity of wood and debris that is not removed is either burnt in high intensity burns and then sown with native eucalypts or is piled into rows and then burnt in preparation for plantations.

Fuel reduction burns on the other hand are undertaken when it is ascertained that forest material lying on the forest floor is in such quantities that it will exacerbate a wildfire. This material is removed with low intensity burning. Sometimes this is after selective logging and often it has no relationship to logging activity at all.

The Greens are not opposed to well planned and managed fuel reduction burning to protect property. Good fuel reduction burning programs mean less property damage, greater protection for forests and native animals as well as less carbon emissions by reducing the extent and severity of summer bushfires.

Senator Abetz is also wrong when he says that the massive regeneration burns are not bad for climate change. The facts are that forests accumulate large stores of carbon, not only in the wood but also in the soils. Much of this carbon is released to the atmosphere when a forest is logged and burnt. Then, because over 80% of the wood goes to woodchip and is made into ephemeral things like disposable paper products, these also release their carbon within a short timeframe. Only a small proportion of what is logged traps carbon as solid wood.

A new forest can gradually replace the lost carbon, but forests managed for regular 80 year logging rotations never catch up to undisturbed forests and capture only about a third of the carbon found in mature forests.

It is wrong to claim that the Greens refuse to acknowledge that bushfires also contribute significantly to Tasmania's carbon emissions – of course they do. We have acknowledged that for decades, and our policy is, and has always been, almed at minimising the risk of catastrophic bushfires by careful and well-managed fuel-reduction burning and other manual techniques such as slashing.

The two types of burns have absolutely nothing to do with each other, and for Senator Abetz to suggest they do is mischlevous to say the very least, and only shows his ignorance about what happens in the forests and his illogical hatred for the Greens and wish to bag us at any opportunity, even if it means misleading the public in the process.

I am available for to take Senator Abetz out in the forests anytime he would like to improve his understanding of what is actually going on out there.



On Wednesday 4th April 2007 the St Marys Day Centre went to view an amazing collection of fossils out on the Gray near St Marys. The collected fossils are found in a local family's personal collection and have been sought from around Gray and Royal George areas.

Some of the fossils on display are natural rocks that when split in half display an amazing crystal formation inside.

Whilst others have very distinct shell and leaf shapes
