



A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: by Jim Haas.

John Batman

One of the most well known of our early settlers was John Batman. His fame came mainly because on the 10th May 1835, he left Launceston on the sloop "Rebecca" and sailed across Bass Strait and into Port Phillip Bay where, after exploring the area, he finally landed on the banks of the Yarra River on the 9th June 1835. This was the site that was to eventually become the city of Melbourne. He negotiated with the local aboriginal chiefs with knifes, tomahawks and blankets to rent 600,000 acres of land which spread from the Yarra to Geelong.

Before this, however, Batman had played a prominent part in the development of Van Diemens Land. He was born at Rosehill near Sydney on the 21st January 1801, to a mother who had paid her own fare out from Yorkshire, England, to be with her husband after he was transported for receiving stolen goods.

In December 1821, Batman, now a young man of twenty, came to Van Diemens Land where, in Hobart Town, he met Elizabeth Callaghan, a convict girl, who was under sentence for passing a counterfeit bank note in London. By 1824 Batman had established himself and won a contract to supply meat to the Government, which led to him receiving a land grant of 600 acres in the foothills of Ben Lomond. He was soon joined by Elizabeth Callaghan who had now changed her name to Eliza Thompson. Batman and Thompson went on to have eight children, only one of which was a son. But sadly, as a young lad, he was drowned on a fishing trip on the Yarra River.

In early 1826 Batman earned official recognition from Governor Arthur by capturing notorious bushranger Matthew Brady, as well as pursuing other bushrangers. He also had a huge respect for the Aboriginals and tried desperately to influence them in stopping their harassment of settlers, by showing kindness. He learnt their language and even brought Aboriginals from Sydney to help. But this method of negotiation obviously failed, as Batman was a prominent member of Arthur's Black Line of the 1830s.

New Years Eve 1834 saw Batman become perhaps, one of the first white men to climb Ben Lomond. He spent the night on the mountain with a number of friends, including surveyor John Helter Wedge, so they could watch the sun rise on the New Year. This was the year he was to set up a settlement on the banks of the Yarra River. Despite John Fawkner, a Launceston publican, moving in on the opposite bank of the Yarra and taking a huge chunk of Batman's intended land; he soon sold his Van Diemens land property for ten thousand pounds and moved his family along with his livestock to his new found lease around Port Philip Bay.

But this was the beginning of the end for Batman; his health soon began to fail as he was diagnosed with syphilis. To make matters worse Eliza Thomson left him and his only son was drowned.

The disease gradually progressed over the next few years eating away parts of his body and causing him to lose the use of his legs. He became a sorry sight, and was eventually cared for by a group of aboriginals until his death on the 5th May 1839.

Like many of our early settlers, Batman's life was rather short lived but evidently busy. His dream of becoming the largest land owner in Australia was shattered by his illness. He did, however, end up with the title of the founder of Melbourne and be the only Australian born person to found an Australian capital city. Although he is recognised with a number of monuments around Melbourne, the original name given to the settlement in 1835, "Batmania", survived for less than two years. The area was renamed in 1837 in honour of the then British Prime Minister William Lamb who resided in the Derbyshire village of Melbourne.


I find it hard to believe that no mention has been made in the Valley voice with regards to the visit by the Premier to St Marys some time ago.

One night last week, just on dark, I watched a young bike rider carry out what could only be described as a crazy move, at the Cenotaph area. I was parked on the Fingal side of the steps, when this child came quickly over the flight of steps to the cenotaph, across the footpath, and then down the step to the tarmac in a continuous movement, without really being sure traffic wasn't going past my vehicle.

The rider kept going, across the street, and then along the kerb near the Art shop. This all took place in probably 15-20 seconds. It was well after 6pm, there were no visible lights evident to me on his bike, and, had he needed to stop quickly to avoid colliding with a moving vehicle, I doubt whether that would have been possible. It might have been fun for that rider, and he may well think that nothing bad will happen, as many kids do, but we all know that's definitely not true. I wish these dare devils would consider others sometimes.


Can they imagine what it would be like if there had been a car coming, in low light conditions, and obscured by my vehicle. That poor unfortunate driver would have to live with the consequences of a potential or actual collision, as well as the injured, or worse, rider. It's a scary thought, particularly when it need not happen.

To top off the week, on Saturday, two small children decided to ride virtually side by side on the wrong side of the road on the tarmac near the bridge on the way to the school, near the turn-off to Harefield road. The silver guard-railing would have prevented them from easily reaching the footpath. I had to take a wide berth to be clear of them, but what if two vehicles, particularly large ones, had met at that same time, whilst they were riding like this? All sorts of things could happen. Once again, these children seemed oblivious to what effect their actions could have. On the positive side, all the riders were wearing helmets.

A few years ago, the Lions Club, Tasmania Police, and Road Safety, held a terrific bike safety active seminar at the school, which was well attended and supported. Perhaps it's time for another one. With so many new riders using the roads, they are too young to remember any of the training from a few year's back.

Maybe it might also be good to mention concerns to our local police, so they can be aware of particular behaviour of some of these junior Evil Knievel's before anything tragic happens.



As an indication of this standard, every photograph in the competition received many votes for people's choice, and it was a close finish.


Congratulations to Stuart Harwood for taking out the people's choice award. Stuart will receive as advertised, two bottles of wine and \$100 dollars for his winning photo.

Also thanks to the generosity of Fujifilm Australia, he will also receive an enlargement of the photograph.


Congratulations again to Andrew Rubenach for taking out the judged award. It's fantastic to see two young emerging talents take out the awards this year.



FOREST BURN-OFF IMPACT COMPLAINTS MUST BE SENT TO PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTOR

As Environment Department Can't Act

The Tasmanian Greens today have said that it is important that the community understands that if they feel that they are suffering negative impacts due to the so-called forestry regeneration burns currently underway, that those complaints need to be directed to the Director of Public Health, as the Environment Tasmanta Department is not empowered to take action on complaints that relate to air pollution concerns associated with burn-off smoke plumes due to exemptions applying to these forestry operations.

Greens Shadow Native Forests spokesperson Tim Morris MHA, said that his office has received numerous complaints from members of the public who are outraged at the degree of pollution they are having to live through and breathe in, with instances of health concerns being raised that include aggravated asthma concerns, sore and irritated eyes and throats, headaches, as well as visual safety concerns.

Mr Morris was responding to reports of Emergency Services and Councils in affected areas directing public complaints to either Forestry Tasmania or the Environment Department,

"While it is definitely worthwhile to have the forest industry made aware of the impact their activities are having on the community's health and safety, and it is also logical for people to submit complaints about air pollution to the Environment Department, my concern is that if people are expecting any action to be taken by those bodies, they will be sorely disappointed," Mr Morris said.

"The Environment Department cannot act on air pollution concerns associated with so-called forestry regeneration burns that occur within the permit season, as those burns are exempt under that system, and therefore there is little impetus for the forestry industry to change their operations."

"The Greens think it is outrageous that the Environment Department are not empowered to police these smoky fires as a form of obnoxious pollution."

"However, if people are suffering impacts upon their health, or are concerned that the pollution coming from these burn-offs could do so, then they need to send in a complaint to the Director of Public Health as the Director is required to investigate such complaints.'

"So continue letting Forestry Tasmania, the company responsible, the Environment Department and your local elected representative know how these burn-offs are affecting you, your safety and your business, but also add the Director of Public Health to your list if you also have associated health concerns," Mr Morris said.

WATER TESTING NOT ADEQUATE

Urgent Need for Statewide Risk Assessment

The Tasmanian Greens yesterday welcomed the release of a community organised report into the risks of chemical use in the St Helens water catchment, undertaken by the Break O'Day Catchment Risk Group, and has called on the Lennon government to act on its key recommendations.

Greens Shadow Water spokesperson Tim Morris MHA, and Member for Lyons, said that this report highlighted a key failure of the government's water testing regime in that when chemical contaminants are identified there is no investigation to identify the source of those contaminants or attempts to stop them getting into the waterways in the future.

Mr Morris also said that while the St Helens community must be congratulated for investing so much of their own time, energy and resources into this report, it is an indictment on the State government that such essential water quality work has been left to the community to undertake.

"The Greens congratulate Dr Alison Bleaney and the St Helens community for the important work they have undertaken over two years to investigate the risks of chemical use in their water catchment, and we will now see whether the Lennon government is up to meeting the challenges posed by this report by acting on its recommendations," Mr Morris said.


"A key area where the government must act swiftly is to address the current ludicrous situation where the water monitoring regime identifies chemical contaminants, reassures itself that they are apparently below 'approved standards', and then does absolutely nothing about identifying the source of the chemicals let alone then putting steps into place to prevent the contamination from happening again."

"The Minister for Water, David Llewellyn, should also ensure that all Local Councils have up to date risk assessments completed for all town water catchments following the release of this report."

"Tasmanians have a right to know what chemicals are in the water they are drinking, at what concentrations those chemicals are at, where they have come from and what is going to be done about them, and it is the councils' responsibility to ensure that testing is appropriate to the risk that exists in the catchment."

"It is known that several water supplies are not being tested at all for chemical contamination and that many more have not been assessed for the risk in the catchment that would lead to an appropriate testing regime."

"The recommendations in the report by the Break O' Day Catchment Risk Group must be taken seriously by the Lennon Government in order to reduce the risk of our water supplies being found with dangerous levels of chemical contamination," Mr Morris said.


