

A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: by Jim Haas

A couple of years ago as I was walking past a house in Cornwall, I stopped dead in my tracks when I saw an elderly lady lying on the ground, clawing at the ground with her hands. Thinking she was in serious trouble, I raced to her aid, but she simply looked up at me with a big smile and bright eyes and asked, "What's the matter, Jim?"

"I thought you were in trouble, lying there like that." I replied.

"I'm fine, thank you," was her casual reply, "I'm just weeding my garden. I can't bend or kneel these days, but I'm okay lying down."

That was an example of the determination and will to achieve against any odds that led Una Camplin to be, not only a devoted wife and mother, but one of the greatest community leaders you would wish to know.



Una Herbert came to Cornwall as a young eighteen year old school teacher in 1933, and immediately became involved in raising money to build a new community hall to replace the one that was burnt down in 1930. The efforts of Una and her committee were soon rewarded, and work was started on the new hall in 1935.

But in the meantime Una had been swept off her feet by a young man from Yorkshire, England, who had come to Cornwall to work in the coal mine. He too was full of enthusiasm and dreams of marriage, home and family and by 1936 when the hall was completed "Yorky" had asked Una for her hand in marriage, making Una the first person to be given a kitchen tea in the new Cornwall Hall.

On the 28th December 1936 Ron Camplin and Una Herbert were married; hence the Camplin family of Cornwall began.

Ron and Una had five children but that did not stop them from working for their community; whether it was sport, raising money for their beloved Anglican Church, Red Cross Comfort fund during the Second World War, St.Marys Hospital and many other community projects.

But sadly, Ron died in 1965 leaving Una alone, but Una still loved her community and continued her involvement with positions such as Librarian, Sunday School teacher, Church organist, Secretary for Child Health, Chairperson for Fingal Valley Welfare Society and long time member of Mothers Union. She also worked on many committees including: establishing units for the elderly, Meals on Wheals, Golden Years, and indoor bowls and in 1993 she was recognized with an award for her services to the community and later received a Break O' Day Council citizen of the year award.

Una was almost eighty at that time and, you would have thought, ready to wind down. But no, she still had to fulfill her long time dream to build a wall that would recognize the pioneers of the coal industry and not only preserve the industry's heritage but enhance the town in which she had spent most of her life.

There was no other place in the world for Una but Cornwall. She loved the town, its people and its history; to be in her modest cottage in Alexander St. surrounded by her family and friends, cooking dinner in her humble kitchen for anyone who cared to join and tending to her beautiful garden was all the reward she asked for in life.

I wonder if John Herbert, in 1787, who at the age of seventeen found himself on board one of the First Fleet ships "Scarborough" on his way to Australia for seven years transportation for stealing a handkerchief, would have ever envisaged being the Great Grandfather of such a grand lady, who in her magnificent way gave a lifetime to, not only raring a family, but working, fighting and inspiring a community to achieve what many said was impossible.

The Fingal Valley has seen many of its wonderful community leaders move on in the last few years, but none greater than Una Camplin. But we must not mourn her passing; rather celebrate her life that was full of love, inspiration and a fighting spirit that enhanced our community and made it a richer place to live.

The opening of the Coalminers Heritage Wall at Cornwall on the 4th February 2006 was a fulfillment of her long time dream and whilst the wall will display some twelve hundred names of our brave, determined, hard working pioneers, one name, that of Una Camplin, will always stand out and the memory of "The Queen of Cornwall" will live on for ever and give encouragement to those who are left to never give up the fight for what you love and believe in. *Thanks to Darlene Wright for some of the information in this story*

Police report

Once again it is pleasing to report that during the last 2 weeks there has not been a reported crime in the Fingal Valley.

We are now well into the winter period with heavy frost and thick fogs. It has been quite noticeable in the number of vehicles still being driven on the road that do not have headlights illuminated in times of inclement weather and fog.

A more disturbing issue is to see the number of one headlight cars during the hours of darkness. It is an offence to have inadequate lighting on a vehicle, with a penalty of \$110, as well as the vehicle having a defect notice issued. So do yourself and all other road users a favour, and get them rectified if faulty.

On a some what sad note, this will be my final Police report for the Valley Voice. My 12 month tenure as Sergeant at St Marys Police Station has come to an end. I am transferring back to Launceston next week to be part of a new Public Order Response Team. This will be another challenge in my 34 year career and I can only expect some exciting time ahead.

This was the first time that I have had to perform police duties at a Country Station. I am pleased to say that from a policing point of view, this community is by far the safest, and most law abiding area in Northern Tasmania. As an 'old traffic officer' having attended over 500 fatal and serious injury crashes, speeding vehicles in the Valley were given special attention. The lack of serious crashes shows that attention to speed can have its benefits.

I have enjoyed my 12 months at St Marys, as it has given me the opportunity to re-acquaint with old school chums, friends, locals and family.

I thank the community for their support and it has been a privilege to represent Tasmania Police at St Marys. There will be a relief Sergeant at St Marys until the new one is appointed, so full police coverage will be maintained.



If your group, or even an individual have an idea for 2007, why not talk about it and see what happens. I'm sure there are still heaps of things that can be organised.





Our local Constable, Cameron TANNER, (pictured right) shows his art skills at the School Playgroup Session on Friday 2nd June.


He showed his skills by making a pair of glasses out of pipe cleaners - using 5 pipe cleaners which he thought was quite impressive and extremely comfortable.



ANNUAL PLAN, RATES AND CHARGES – 2006/2007

Break O'Day Council has announced its rates and charges for the coming 12 months, with an average increase in rates of approximately 6%.

This equates to \$1.58 per week increase per property, which includes the significant increase in the State Government Fire Levy.

Acting Mayor Margaret Osborne said that the budget provides for general rate revenue of \$3.1m which together with growth revenue and other income, will provide an operating expenditure budget of \$9.3m.

Acting Mayor Osborne said that the Council had also agreed not to pursue the information provided by the Valuer-General which would have lead to the introduction of rating tenure properties. This decision was made after significant consideration and discussion by the Council and input from the community.

The budget will provide funds of \$4.6m on its capital expenditure program, which includes \$1.4m for St Helens Treatment Plant. \$1.9m on road and bridge upgrades, over \$163,000 for community facilities and property projects, \$551,500 for water and water reuse infrastructure throughout the municipality and \$34,000 for waste management infrastructure at the Scamander Waste Disposal site. This program will help to facilitate further economic growth within the municipality as well as improving services for residents.

Acting Mayor Osborne stated that this was a responsible budget, which recognises the requirements of a developing community.

SOLDIERS MEMORIAL AVENUES by Jim Haas

Hobart's Soldiers Memorial Avenue winds through part of the Queen's Domain in Hobart. It starts at the Aquatic Centre and winds up over the hill, past the Tennis Centre, TCA Ground and Gunpowder Magazine and on through to the Athletic Centre and sports ground.

The avenue was initiated in 1918 by a group of Hobart people who decided to plant a tree for each soldier who did not return from World War One. By February 1919 some 512 cedar trees were planted and identified with each tree given a soldier's name, many of which represented the grave that family and friends could never visit because their loved ones had fallen in faraway countries.

Over the years some trees have died, others have been lost through development etc. and in 2002 the Friends of the Soldiers Walk Inc. was formed, and along with planting lost trees, the group is dedicated to the restoration and preservation of this wonderful avenue and the important significance of its original concept highlighted for all to see and enjoy.

Memorial avenues were quite common in many towns all over Tasmanian, and indeed Australia, to remember First World War soldiers, but sadly most communities planted pine trees, many of which have out grown themselves and deemed unsafe by councils and cut down and destroyed.

The Friends of the Soldiers movement, however, have identified this and are working with interested communities throughout Tasmania in the hope that many of these memorials, that were lovingly planted in remembrance of loved ones, are restored, and like the Soldiers Memorial Avenue in Hobart, this important part of our history can be brought back to life in a way that generation after generation can see and enjoy, a monument that represents a courageous, dedicated breed of men who gave their lives for their country and the loved ones they left behind.

On Monday the 17th July 2006 at 1.00 pm, Adrian Howard, Coordinator of Friends of the Soldiers Inc. will hold a meeting at Cornwall to discuss ways in which the Cornwall Soldiers Memorial Avenue, that once stood proud like giant sentries watching over our town can be restored, so that this piece of sacred ground, so treasured by the old hands of Cornwall, can once again display its original meaning and this vital part of our heritage can be restored and the names of our fallen miners from all wars can be set in bronze so their memory and the significance of their deed can live on for ever.

Anyone wishing to attend this meeting with Adrian is most welcome!!






