The family created a memorial 'This is your Life' album of stories and photos, of which her daughter Val spoke of, and



# A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: by Jim Haas

The next time we drive down the highway on the nice, smooth bitumen in our quiet, air-conditioned, modern day motor car and slip into Launceston in a little over an hour, or down to Hobart in a shade over two, and listen to our six stack CD players as we lay back in cruise control, lets give a little thought to Lieutenant Laycock who, almost two hundred years ago, in 1807, was the first recorded white person to travel overland from Hobart to Launceston.

It's not entirely clear how long it took Laycock, but two years later Captain Fenhill loaded up a wagon hitched to a team of horses, and headed off to follow the route that Laycock had marked out with niches in the trees. It was eight days later, however, before Fenhill completed the route between Launceston and Hobart. But it was a wonderful achievement of the time and for the next couple of decades or so the route became well known, as settlers began moving inland from the major centres, and other roads, or tracks, including our own Fingal Valley track was formed.

The Government of the day began to see the benefits of a route through the midlands, and gangs of convicts were used to turn the track into a road that would be suitable for the safe and easy movement of horse drawn drays laden with goods, as well as coaches capable of transporting people. But it wasn't until 1832 that a small public mail cart began a regular service between Hobart and Launceston. In the same year the first coach was imported from England, but initially only ran between Hobart and New Norfolk.

This led to a number of other coaches being imported, and although they were used in the South and in the North between Launceston and Longford and Launceston and George Town, it wasn't until the early 1840s that a coach service between Launceston and Hobart began.

The distance, at that time, was 257 kilometers and took some fifteen hours to complete, using some twenty four horses, each covering around thirty five kilometers. This of course led to many staging stations being built along the way as well as overnight accommodation inns, some of which are still in use today.

But, possibly, the most significant land mark left today is the Ross Bridge. This magnificent piece of architecture, completed in 1836, leaves no doubt in anyone's mind that although Daniel Herbert might have been a highwayman, James Colbeck a burglar and Mary Witherington a mere maid of Lambeth and brought to Van Diemen's Land against their will, the skill and craftsmanship displayed in the sculptures of men, women, beasts and birds, were carved into this structure out of love, and in a way that would match any other work of art anywhere in the world.

For some three decades the stagecoaches, with their teams of fine horses, continued to pound through the midlands, and regardless of the danger of bushrangers and aborigines, the route became quite popular. The inns were doing a roaring trade, men were employed at the staging stations and as stage coach operators, in particular Samuel Page who had the mail contract, were all doing well. But alas, it all came to an abrupt end on the 31 October 1876. The railway, after four years in construction, was completed and the stagecoaches were deemed obsolete.

But despite the mail and most of the goods and passengers now using the new "Iron Horse", the midlands road still continued to have plenty of use, and upgrades were ongoing over the years. With the changing of the route from the Richmond, Colebrook route to the Kempton, Baghdad, Bridgewater route along with the bypassing of many towns, the distance between the two cities has been cut to less than 200 kilometers.


The evolution of the midlands highway has been nothing short of magnificent and has become, perhaps, the most important road in Tasmania, and imperative to the wellbeing of many including the people of the East Coast and Fingal Valley.

At the opening of the Ross Bridge on 21<sup>st</sup> October 1836 by Lieutenant Governor George Arthur, a prominent Ross settler, Benjamin Horne made a speech on behalf of the people, and in it he made comment of the wonderful progress of the Midlands he had seen in the thirteen years since settling there. He went on to say: "...... where we were once travelling on unmade roads, risking our lives fording swollen rivers and sleeping under the stars or our wagons, we now have solid roads, fine bridges and wonderful inns in which to rest our weary bones. We should be most grateful......".

Yes Mr. Horne, we all should be most grateful to all those strong, courageous men and women who shed blood, sweat and tears in pioneering our roads, and as we speed down them today, hell bent on getting to where we are going faster than the speed of sound, we should hesitate a moment and slow down, because what's our hurry? Captain Fenhill's journey took eight days.



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# Police report

In the past 6 weeks there have been a number of incidents in the St Marys area that have been of particular concern. A 3 metre x 3 metre garden shed has been stolen, along with a set of 4WD wheels and tyres. There was also an incident last week which involved a reconditioned Toyota 3Y head to suit a petrol Hilux being stolen in the early hours of the morning. I have also attended an incident in which logging machinery in the Griffin park area has been damaged during the night. Anyone having any information regarding these incidents or others can contact me at the St Marys police station or call Crimestoppers on 1800 005 555.

The past two months have seen several motor vehicle accidents on the roads in the area. I once again ask people to take extra care while driving on wet and icy roads and to ensure that their cars are in good working order. Poor weather conditions have seen trees across St Marys pass and rocks falling onto the road. Please take extra care when travelling on either the St Mars or Elephant passes.

Currentl, roadworks are being undertaken on the Esk Highway between Tullochgorum and Rostrevor. At present there is a 60km speed limit from the Tullochgorum gates to the Rostrevor bridge. This speed limit is imposed at all times and during works it may further be reduced. Please ensure that the speed limits are observed as police will be conducting speed checks in the area on a regular basis.

As you would all now be aware, Sergeant Mike Davis finished at St Marys at the end of June. Until Sergeant Davis' replacement arrives Senior Constable Dale Cook from St Helens police station will be filling in at St Marys. It's been fairly quiet of late around the old town, perhaps except for a bit of unscheduled painting at a local business. And the grass is growing again which means spring is around the corner.

Then a friend told me that the "Pigeon Loft" at the Recreation Ground has been declared a no-go zone for use at the moment. Apparently it's considered not as safe as it could be. For a few weeks though this will not occur, whilst all options are explored.

No-one would deny that this old building has seen better days, and requires tender loving care, so to speak. There is also a need for some structural requirements to be met, even though it's survived some incredible weather in its time.

I doubt if any decision has been made about if this building is to be renovated for future use, just taken out of use or, dare I say it, demolished. But before that last option is considered let's just stress to the engineers that this structure is a strong and vital link with St Marys as the home to agricultural shows and rural activities. It is fondly and affectionately remembered for some very happy times.

I'm not knocking the people who have concluded that this building should not be used at the moment. They would be making their decision on specific engineering and fire safety guidelines, as is their job, but let's just ask that every avenue is explored to allow the 'Pigeon Loft' to be rejuvenated to meet at least minimum requirements for ongoing use.

If this means, for a little period it's out of action, then I suggest most would accept that, to allow the work to be done.

Surely between Council and prospective users, an affordable plan can be designed to do the necessary duties. Remember Todd's Hall's transformation after not being used for years. Eventually it became an attraction. I suggest that this could also happen with the pigeon loft, and it could become part of the plans for a better utilisation of the recreation ground precinct, currently being considered. That would be a good thing.

#### OUT OF THE WOODWORK




We have completed the last of the internal walls. All we need to do is finish off the plumbing and add a couple of lights and power points. Our membership is now full; yes we are now 19 members strong.

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
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

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

# Heather Butler's introductory speech at the launch of Mr John Sutton's new book.

What a thrill to be asked to speak today in celebration of the life and contribution to our community of the very gentlemanly Mr Jack Sutton. This much respected octogenarian has freely given our community his time, his benevolence, his generosity of spirit and has added richness to the tapestry of our lives.

His outstanding models of Poimena, his miniature spinning wheels and gorgeous carousels, help us to respect the makers and users of the pieces of equipment. The carousel brings back happy memories for many of us, the colour and music adding to the pleasure of the movement give us a picture of what has been before us. We get a much improved appreciation of the past, not only the appearance of what used to be present on those sites, but also how the machinery was made and the difficulties experienced in the construction of those machine in rugged conditions.

Jack Sutton was born on Michaelmas Day in 1920 in a small village near Hereford, the Cathedral City in England. Like my father, Jack followed his secondary and elementary schooling with an apprenticeship in the developing electrical industry. Jack's training included fitting and turning, machines and mechanisms. The new field of electronics was a challenge Jack enjoyed meeting. His education was extended by a strong interest in classical and choral music, which has stayed with him as a recreational joy, enriching his life.

The years of World War 2, 1939-45, saw Jack's service in radar installation maintenance and calibration. He was serving with the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers and spent some of his deployment in Egypt teaching radar to military forces of the Turks, Egyptians, Sudanese and Greeks. We can only imagine the colourful stories that must have been produced during that time.

Following the war, Jack's hungry brain needed more stimulating content. He began studies for a science degree at Luton College of Technology. After marrying he also began his family of five children, a heavy load of responsibility in anyone's language or any time.

Project engineering took Jack's attention and he then moved through various management positions in the electronics industry. One of Jack's jobs was for English Electrics Co. and involved the development of guidance systems for weaponry. Obviously Jack had high levels of skills.

Jack's gentle smile hides a serious mind, love of a challenge and the ability to keep a secret. An extension of these attributes is the urge to start one's own business. The entrepreneur came to the fore, rose in Jack and he started his own company. This company designed, produced and exhibited a world-wide first, the successful design of electronic controls of patterns for textile knitting machines. So all those Pringle, John Crundle, Slade and Casaveen designs in beautiful knitwear all over the world over the last 60 years have been set in place thanks to the extraordinary mind of our friend Jack Sutton.

BBC television was the medium through which Dorothy first saw Jack's acclaimed innovation. She was a friend of his niece and was keen to meet the now divorced man whose clever development she had seen on television a few years beforehand. Their attraction was immediate and they married in 1969. Dorothy took over raising the family and Jack then worked on designing control systems for the Petro-chemical industry in various parts of the world.

During the 1970's Jack's grandson was unfortunately killed in South Australia. It took five years before the family was given permission to migrate to be closer to the family members here in Australia. Again the need for a change and a challenge for these two active minds of Jack and Dorothy saw another change in direction.

After developing specialised equipment for the production of their business of special pies in Adelaide, the couple managed a vineyard and cellar door sales in Coonawarra. Dorothy's renowned cooking skills came to the fore and she started a restaurant in the house.

A short holiday in Tasmania introduced Jack and Dorothy to the northern parts of our island. In 1986 they decided that it was time to retire. A small farm at Goshen became home. While Dorothy developed her cooking expertise Jack developed a hobby, which had started about a decade earlier, when they began collecting "Treen".

Treen is small items made in wood, often by wood working apprentices at the end of their training. Jack followed this interest in things wooden by making gifts for friends. He had been offered a lathe. Research for the most suitable island grown timbers led Jack to discover Dorrel or Native Olive, which has been his favourite ever since. Its close grain and availability means that it is ideal for the 1/12<sup>th</sup> scale miniature works that Jack is such an expert in.

The extraordinarily fine craftsmanship that Jack shows can be seen in the marvellous cups, saucers and plates and small tables and chairs. Wedgwood china was used as patterns for these items. Wine glasses and pestles and mortars are among the finest miniatures in Jack Sutton's wonderful collection, which is displayed on a miniature Welsh dresser. For twenty years Jack Sutton has enjoyed making miniatures, usually with an historic background. These include a sixteenth century cannon and spinning wheels of various designs.

Geoff and I first met Jack in the early 90's. He came to Queechy to discuss how his ideas of models might be helpful to tourism in the area. I don't think that he had finished the model of the stamper at that stage. We were enthralled after seeing Jack's work on display at the Portland Hall.

Peter Burns was the Curator of the St Helens History Room at that time, and he took Jack into the bush to the old Anchor Mine site. From photographs, measurements, notes, and working drawings the amazing models we see today were built with great precision and care. The models are of the water wheel for driving the crushers and the stampers, which still exist, in the bush shrine today. Interesting details of the construction of these models can be read in one of the books being launched today.

Some special features of the books, which grabbed my attention, are the photographs in the last two pages of the water wheel in action. It is remarkable to see the people in the photos to the scale of Jack's accurate model but it is also humanising. The construction looks relatively new and fresh and the ground littered with felled trees. The bush looks quite different, as the thick undergrowth we are accustomed to is not there.

The other point that grabbed my attention is the acknowledgement on the inside of the front cover to Denny's Walter. There is obviously mutual respect between these two stalwarts of the St Helens History Room, who have enriched the lives of all those who are connected with the history of the area and future generations. These are men of generous spirit, compassion and commitment to the greater whole.

"In My Own Words" by Jack Sutton, begins with and introduction by Dorothy Sutton and the back cover features a photograph of the happy couple in 1969. The same "look of love" type smile fleets between them today. Dorothy states that she was first impressed by Jacks height (6'3") his sense of humour and his humility. He is indeed a master craftsman, a gentleman, and has been a much respected member of our community.

His contribution to the St Helens History Room and Visitor Information Centre is great, and it will continue to be enjoyed and to educate and inform visitors for many, many years into the future. The books are a timely documentation of this marvellous contribution over twenty years, a time of much change for the committee and administration of our wonderful history room.

Jack was one of those members with great vision who could see that the future visitors and community members would appreciate having amazing models of specialised equipment from a past era for them to enjoy. We can all relate to the past local history in a more informed way thanks to the vision and efforts of Jack Sutton.

Ladies and gentlemen, it has been wonderful having the privilege of knowing Mr Jack Sutton. It is my very great pleasure to launch the book "In My Own Words" and the second edition of "The Anchor Wheel and Battery Models".

I sincerely wish both Dorothy and Jack good health, much happiness and the enjoyment of whatever challenges life may bring in their move to their new home. Thank you so much to the committee for allowing me to do so.



#### Beef & Baked Bean Pie

## **Ingredients**

1 tablesp oil, 1 onion, chopped,
1 lge carrot, chopped, 500g mince,
2 tablesp tomato paste,
400g can tomatoes, 1 teasp vegemite,
1 teasp dried mixed herbs,
1 teasp Worstershire sauce,
440g can baked beans in tomato sauce,
2 cup frozen peas,
440g can new potatoes, drained,
30g butter, melted,
3 cup grated tasty cheese.

#### Method

Heat oil in pan, add onion, cook, stirring until soft. Add carrot and mince, cook, stirring until mince is browned.

Stir in tomato paste, undrained crushed tomatoes, vegemite, sauce and herbs.

Bring to boil, simmer uncovered for 10 minutes. Stir in beans and peas, simmer uncovered for 5 minutes.

Pour mix into greased oven proof dish.

Slice potatoes thinly, place over mince mix, brush with butter, sprinkle with cheese.

Bake uncovered in moderately hot oven, about 20 minutes, or until topping is crisp and browned.
