Although I didn't really broach the subject with her about advertising some of these activities through the tourist commission., I still wondered


how it would go if this occurred.

A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: by Jim Haas

"Paddy's Head"

For those of us who live in and around St.Marys, St. Patrick's Head is an everyday site and one we all take for granted, but wouldn't it be nice if, occasionally, we all just hesitated a moment and gazed up at our mighty icon, which stands like a giant, perpetual sentry guarding all that spreads before it, and not only admire the splendor of the mountain, but give a thought to the significance of its name and heritage.

The history of St. Patrick goes back to around AD 385 when a boy who was given the name of Maewyn Succat was born on the West Coast of England, most probably Wales or Scotland. Although it was said his parents were of Christian beliefs, Maewyn was a pagan until, at the age of sixteen, he was captured by a group of Irish raiders and taken to Ireland, where he was sold as a slave and sent into the mountains near Ballymena where he was left alone to tend sheep.

It was here that he found God, and after six years escaped and went to Gaul (France) where he adopted the Christian name Patrick and spent twelve years studying in a monastery to become a priest. His only ambition, however, was to return to Ireland and convert the native pagans to Christianity.

For some thirty years Patrick traveled the length and breadth of Ireland, successfully converting thousands to Christianity and not only setting the foundation for the Christian church, but much of the colourful Irish folk law stems from Patrick and his reign as Bishop. One such lore was that on one occasion, from a hilltop sermon, he drove all the snakes out of Ireland, but it appears unlikely, however, that snakes were ever in Ireland in the first place.

The shamrock, the green three-leafed clover, that has been a symbol of Ireland for centuries, was said to be used by St. Patrick to explain the Trinity. God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit all exist as separate elements of the same perfect entity, like the three shamrock leaves.

Patrick died at County Downs, Ireland, on the 17th March AD 461. That day has been commemorated as St. Patrick's Day ever since, and with what started out as a Catholic Holy Day has developed into the biggest day in the year for many Irish. The Irish, along with their descendants and friends throughout the world, celebrate this great day by singing and dancing, marching through the streets of their cities and towns, drinking toasts to their country and Patron Saint with the traditional green beer, all the while dressed in green and displaying the traditional shamrock icon as a sign of St. Patrick and their Christian faith.

It was some thirteen hundred years later that on St. Patrick's Day 1773 Captain Tobias Furneaux in his ship the "Adventurer", sailed up the East Coast of Van Diemen's Land before turning east towards New Zealand, and gave the first Irish name to a land mark in Australia. Before that Abel Tasman in 1642 noted it in his journal as a high round hill for which it resembles, when viewing the mountain from the sea.

Lumera Genena Wuggelina, meaning a molar tooth, was the aboriginal name for our adopted icon. For thousands of years some nine tribes of aborigines, the largest of which was the Oyster Bay tribe, roamed freely along the coast in winter where they collected shellfish for food, and used the shells to made necklaces and other ornaments. In summer they would head up into the hills and hunt snakes, kangaroos and other animals along the Fingal Valley, following the Break O'Day and South Esk Rivers as far as Ben Lomond. Lumera Genena Wuggelina would be a major land mark when it was time to move back to the Coast. Sadly, however, when the infamous "Black Line" was established in the 1830s, the Eastern starting point was St. Patrick's Head.

So now as we head towards the Back to St.Marys Sesquicentenary celebrations scheduled for St. Patrick's Day next year, let us take a moment to reflect on the heritage of our most notable icon. And for those who are lucky enough to climb the 694 metre high mountain, as John Wedge did, the first white man to do so, on the 7th December 1825, let us not only take in the fulfillment of the climb and the stunning splendor of the views that open up to every point of the compass, but take a moment to look down the Valley to remember the aborigines as they got their bearings from the great molar tooth, then seaward and think of Tasman and Furneaux in their tall ships.

Then we can thank God for the thousands of years of heritage that adds to the character of our wonderful symbol that is the backdrop to St.Marys and the Break O' Day Plains and takes its name from one of history's most eminent Saints, and shares that name with some of the world's most holy places including the famous Dublin and New York Cathedrals, as well as one of the most celebrated days in the Western World.


The time has come for the AGM on the 30 September 2006 and I am looking forward to it.



Community Artspace at the Garage

Hopefully most people will know that I am in the process of converting the garage at 2 Storey St into a Community Artspace and Youth Annexe.

At this point, the paper chase rages on, with the Certificate of Likely Compliance from the Licensed Surveyor 'in the works' - this will enable me to apply for a building permit, so that I may proceed with the changes necessary to open the building up to the community, and get some things happening.

The most amazing news I can offer is that the floorboards for the dance floor are now actually stacked in the building, waiting to be installed! The other amazing news is that a temporary occupancy permit for Sept 8th to Sept 10th will allow a film making workshop to be held in the building, for young emerging film makers!

Casi Male, the Break O'Day Youth Worker, has obtained funding for Craig Cooper, a film maker from Launceston, to come out and hold the workshop which will be a wonderful opportunity for our young people to explore the art of film making.

Meanwhile, all lanterns from the Winter Solstice will be going aloft, to sleep in the rafters until next year – if you want your lantern, please come and get it soon!! I would also like to announce that Storey Street Studio's Artists and Makers Co-operative has got a website up and running, with 5 local artists so far on the site. There is room for 45 more so if you, or anyone you know would like to get their artwork onto the global market, here is an opportunity to do so at very little cost. Please come and see me, or talk to Greg Cruse at the St Marys Online Centre – we are hoping to include as many artists from North-East Tasmania as we can.

The actual Gallery space (in the building) is still in developmental stages, but I do have Studio space to let at \$40 a week plus electricity. This includes use of all facilities in a prime CBD location. Think about it!

And the loom - a beautiful and serviceable floor loom has been donated the to Artspace - if there is a weaver out there interested in a place to weave and a retail outlet for their work, I am offering use of the loom as an

incentive -who knows?

Last but not least, the puppets! Recreation Ground Advisory Committee Update by Rod McGiveron

A report on what's been happening over the past few weeks since the public meeting, called by the Mayor, on the Recreation Ground usage. It was thought the Valley Voice a great avenue to keep everyone informed on any progress.

Our facilitator Julia Weston, was keen to push for, initially, an on - site walk around, early in the piece to familiarise the group as to what's actually available.

This meeting was very productive, and gave grounds for optimism on the whole project. There were seven attending, and a basic concept was discussed as we wandered around the area.

Last week, with the fabulous input already of the newly appointed planner, Mr Peter Troode, there was even more grounds for optimism that a sensible, affordable and attractive redevelopment can be a possibility over coming years. Peter has obtained plans, photographs and assistance from Council, his own resources, and by talking to people, and his enthusiasm to help was very uplifting indeed.

Julia found a desire for genuine consensus from the group at the meeting, and for us to approach a couple of the ideas, including involving buildings usage, with solutions to put to Council in a few weeks time.

A draft plan will be constructed by the Advisory Group and the planner, to be submitted to Council, and with any sort of luck, after public scrutiny, some of the work might be able to commence in the not too distant future.

Regular updates will come through the Valley Voice pages, as developments occur.

All those who represented their school did so with passion and conviction. Congratulations not only to the award winners but to all those who wore their school colours with pride.






Congratulations to the award winners and all the girls for their participation.
