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EDITORIAL

DECENTRALIZATION & THE MISSING LINK

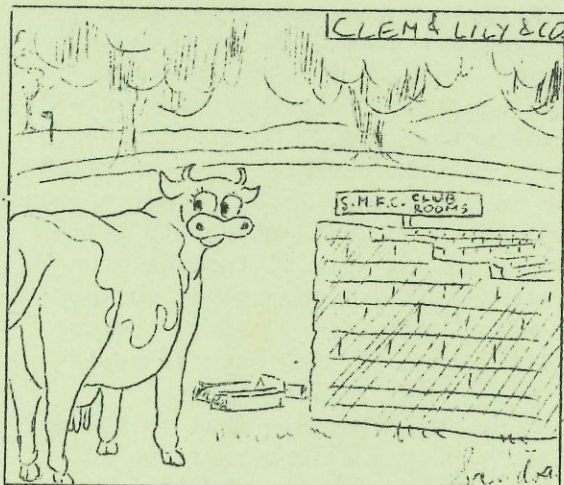
Now that the Bell Bay rail link is to go through, for the first time in history many parts of northern Tasmania will have a direct rail connection with a deep sea port.

This is a very significant fact, for now decentralization of industry along all connecting railway lines becomes an economic possibility. In the past the bugbear has always been the costs of off-loading and handling. With a direct rail connection and modern techniques of loading it will soon be a feasible proposition that products could be manufactured, even up to a hundred miles away from a deep sea northern port, and landed on the mainland at comparable costs with products manufactured in Hobart and shipped direct.

This applies equally as well to the Fingal Valley. Unfortunately decentralization is one of those things politicians often say a lot about in election campaigns and rarely do anything about in practise.

It will need plenty of government encouragement, especially financially, to entice manufacturers to set up out of the city zones. But it can be done and the ultimate benefits for both manufacturers and the country areas could be considerable.

However, if this is going to ever happen it will need continuous government lobbying from responsible bodies and individuals in our areas. No doubt the best way to accomplish this would be to have a true representative of this district elected to parliament. Because we haven't it will probably mean twice the effort, but surely for the sake of our future prosperity the effort will be worthwhile.

Dear Sir,

On behalf of the St Marys Football Club General Committee, we wish to express our appreciation to the members of the Fingal Council and in particular members of this Ward for their support in enabling the granting of the \$5000.00 loan required to complete the Clubrooms at present under construction on the Recreation ground. We are also very grateful for the generous support given us by the public in the two Queen Carnivals organised to assist in commencing these new Clubrooms, and from both Quests plus a repayable loan of \$200.00 from the Fingal District Football Association and a \$500.00 grant from the Government, this Club has been able to provide \$4600.00 for the Project. With the completed building being valued at approximately \$14000.00 it can be readily seen that our Club have supplied in cash and voluntary labour a sum approaching \$9000.00. We quite naturally felt that we could not prevail further upon the public for their support in further Fund-raising activities, and we had no alternative than to seek Council assistance.

We have been advised that this loan will necessitate a slight increase in the rates and we wish to make the rate-payers aware of the increase involved. Figures compiled by the Council show that increases for Householders only will be on an average 60 cents to \$1.00 per annum. In addition, with the maximum increase under this category \$1.36. Increases for rural holdings are naturally in excess of these figures.

When completed, these Clubrooms will be such that the District can be justly proud and will serve a most useful purpose for many years in the future.

IN THE EYE OF THE LAW

With the football season again in full swing the problem of patrons encroaching on the reserved area arises and the provisions of the relevant legislation designed to control such occurrences is brought to notice for the information of all concerned. Section 19A of the Police Offences Act:

"No person shall

- a) enter the reserved area of a sports ground without lawful excuse; or
- b) remain on the reserved area of a sportsground after having been requested to leave that area by a Police Officer or some person having authority to require him to leave."

This of course means that any person failing to comply with the lawful direction could render themselves liable to prosecution and while we do not desire that such drastic action become necessary we do urge all to be co-operative in this matter and keep clear of the playing areas and outside the boundary fence where such is provided. Instances have occurred where serious injury could have resulted to children encroaching onto the boundary line and being struck by the boot of a player. Adults could also sustain injury in similar manner. An important aspect to remember is that your favourite team could be penalised through your presence on or near the boundary line, should the umpires' view become impaired, and he perhaps give an incorrect decision. This was seen to happen at St. Marys recently, but unfortunately, the incorrect decision by the boundary umpire did not have any actual bearing on the eventual result.

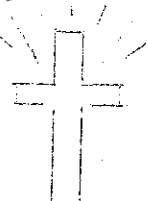

ST. MARYS DISTRICT SCHOOL PARENTS & FRIENDS

At the St. Marys District School's Parents & Friends meeting last month it was decided to go ahead with the building of a second tennis court for the school. In his report, the headmaster, Mr. D. Williams, said it was his opinion that until a first class court was built, tennis could not be taken seriously as a sport at the school.

He also reported some dramatic results in the swimming ability of the children since the learners pool had been opened. Almost twice as many children could now swim to some degree, he said, and this had been accomplished in under three weeks.

The meeting received a letter from the Minister for Education, Mr. Mather, stating that a full time physical education teacher was not available for the school at present.

The President of P. & F., Mr. R. Legge, posed the question that if some schools had four Phys. Ed. teachers and other schools no bigger than St. Marys had two, what was necessary for a school to qualify for just one physical training teacher. It was decided to draught a letter to the Minister pointing this out.

The evening ended with a film about irrigation in the drier regions of Australia and a talk on the teaching of art by the school's Art teacher, Elizabeth Avery.

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SOME FACTS ON SMOKING

★ According to Sir George Godber, Chief Medical Officer of the Department of Health and Social Security, cigarettes are now the biggest avoidable menace to health.

★ Lung cancer kills one in 25 who smoke 10 cigarettes a day and one in eight who smoke 25 a day.

★ In 1946, 8,000 people died from lung cancer; in 1969, nearly 30,000.

★ Because lung cancer takes a long time to develop, youngsters who start smoking today may not become victims for a least 20 years or more - if they continue to smoke.

★ But lung cancer accounts for as little as a third of the total mortality related to cigarette smoking. Chronic bronchitis and coronary thrombosis make up most of the rest. Altogether smoking-induced diseases account for nearly 100,000 premature deaths in the UK each year.

★ As the average 20-a-day man spends about \$200 a year on his addiction, is smoking worth it, healthwise or moneywise?

But for the addict, hope may still be in sight with this piece that comes from some latest studies in the U.S.A.....

Ever since the report of the United States Surgeon General's Office in 1964 proved there was a definite link between smoking and lung cancer, temporarily giving a smart uppercut to cigarette sales everywhere, tobacco manufacturers have been investing large sums of money in research, trying to find out the culprit-carcinogen in the cigarette packet. As one of the conclusions of the report was the fact that pipe and cigar smokers seemed to run no greater risk than non-smokers, the researchers wondered if the actual paper in which cigarettes are rolled - which contains additives to slow down combustion and glue to seal the edges - was not the actual cause of the trouble, rather than the tobacco itself. Experiments proved that paper causes tobacco to burn at greater heat, throwing off hotter tars and nicotine of a type which contains harmful carcinogens. The problem then

became one of finding a wrap for cigarettes made from tobacco instead of paper. This the firm of Rapaport International have done. By using Puerto Rican tobacco, fermented and cured at a very high temperature, then ground into a fine powder and reconstituted, they have produced a white tobacco which can be made into sheets one-thousandth of an inch thick and which, they claim, reduces the tar and nicotine content of cigarettes by as much as 40%. The New York firm of Stillwell and Gladding, who analysed the wrapper, says that it burns slowly and naturally, enhances the taste, reduces or eliminates the acrid odours and smoke which burn the eyes and irritate the nose and respiratory system, and makes smoking smoother and milder. Edward Rapaport, boss of Rapaport International, though happy at this discovery, emphasises that the white tobacco wrapper is not a panacea and won't solve every cigarette smoking problem, but he does think it offers the best hope of making smoking safer.
