EDITORIAL

A SPECIAL RATE - YES OR NO.

There have been many conflicting reports about the public opinion poll to be conducted by the Fingal Council on Saturday 12th of September.

This poll will, once the vote has been counted, decide once and for all whether or not a special rate will be struck in the St Marys Ward to help pay for new football pavilion being built on the Recreation ground.

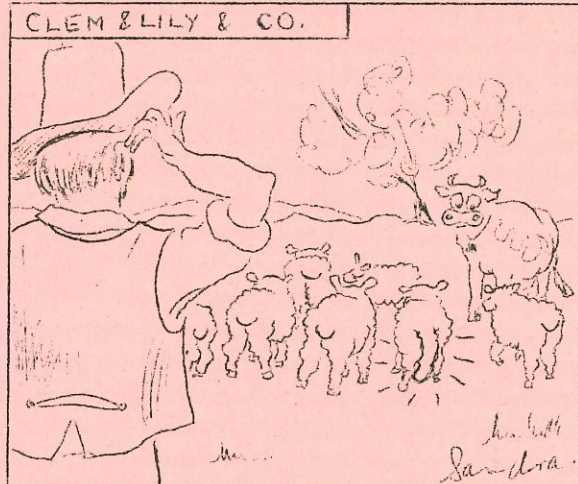
It has been asked recently by a writer to this paper because this year's rates have already been struck and the rate, struck will include the special football pavilion rate then the poll in fact is no longer necessary and should be cancelled forthwith.

Official information from the council however, indicate that this assumption is not entirely correct. Even though the rate level has been decided for this year, the special rate is not included. The Council apparently consider it necessary to know the opinion of the public for any future considerations about this matter.

This proposed special rate of 0.23 cents may or may not be imposed at a later date depending on future circumstances and even then 0.23 cents is the maximum proposed - it could in fact only be part there-of.

For instance it has been pointed out that because of the material from which this new pavilion is being constructed (i.e. mainly concrete brick), the maintenance in the future will be low. Also because the buildings already constructed have been recently renovated then it should be some time before these buildings will need expensive repairs. Again loans already outstanding in regard to this ground decrease from time to time.

However, as always, there may be other factors which at this time may not be evident but in the future will demand an increased expenditure. The Council seems fit to cover itself if such an occasion should arise and this

seems reasonable.

To put it as simply as possible what the poll will decide, is that in the event of a YES vote a rate of 0.23 cents in the dollar or part there-of may or may not be struck at a later date depending on future circumstances.


In the event of a NO vote - no special rate in relation to this issue will be struck at any time.

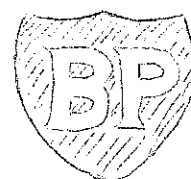

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GARDENING . . WATER-LILIES

Whether your "water-garden" consists of a lake a mile across or a small pond, water-lilies enhance its beauty. First of all, they must have growing conditions which they like. The water need not be deep, but they should be in full sun. Their roots should be planted in rich fibrous loam, and they appreciate a stimulant like bone-meal to start them off. This can be put in first, and the soil, well trodden down, on the top. The soil should cover the whole of the pool as this allows the roots to spread more quickly and take a good hold. It should also be at least six inches deep. Lilies can also be grown in baskets under the surface, but these need to be taken up every three years and re-planted. One thing all water-lilies dislike intensely is being too near a fountain: they are particular about having their petals splashed, and hate being rocked about.

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Just yarnin'

This weeks yarn comes from Mr Stephen Targett of Cornwall.

"I was born in Launceston in 1890, and was reared on a farm at Rosegarland. My father reared two families; seven in the first, and six in the second. I never went to school, but stayed at home to help my father on the farm, doing the ploughing and the milking. At the age of 15yrs., we couldn't make ends meet, so I went to work at the mines at Cornwall. Cornwall had a population of over 20 then but nowadays there are only 45 or 50. They had four shops there, and Ben Howe used to travel into St. Marys in his horse and cart to get supplies for his General Store. There was a Baker too, but a lot of the people used to make their own bread. We had a big hall, and during the war, there was something on for the soldiers every week. This hall was burnt down, but we were determined to build a new one, which still stands today.

Down in the mines where I worked for 45 years, all the work was done by hand. I think I picked more coal from the ground than any other man there. We used to use a pick and shovel to load the coal onto the wooden trucks which carted the coal to the surface. At one time, there was a fire in the mine, and it was shortly after this, that the Fingal mine got its washing plant. The coal was then carted to Fingal to be washed. A lot of the machinery from Cornwall was taken to Fingal and with the advent of the washing plant at Fingal, came the start of the decline of Cornwall to what it is today.

A.E.B. WEEKEND AT FALMOUTH

Amateur botanists are being offered the chance of studying the plants of Tasmania's East Coast by Adult Education.

A residential school at Falmouth has been organised for the weekend October 29 to November 1.

Leading the course will be Mrs. Mary Cameron and Mr. T.E. Burns.

Mrs. Cameron is a teacher of Biology at Launceston Broadland House School and is a member of the Royal Society, the Conservation Trust and The Field Naturalists.

Mr. Burns is a plant collector and co-author of the book "Wild Flowers of Tasmania."

The school will start at 8.30 p.m. on Friday October 29 and end at 11.30 a.m. on Monday, November 1.

During the weekend those at the school will hear lectures, watch slides and learn how to observe plants in the field.

They will also go on field trips, observing and recording plant life and conditions of growth, and will later classify the plants collected.

Enrolments are already being taken by Adult Education's Northern Regional office in Launceston and at Adult Education centres in Hobart and Burnie.

Visitors to the school will be accommodated in shacks and units at Falmouth Caravan Park, south of St Helens, but local people are also welcome.

Announcing the course today (Tuesday) Adult Education Northern Regional Officer (Mr. Gordon Goward) said the school has been organised essentially for amateur botanists.

No previous knowledge of botany would be required, he said.

Newman and Lynch, along with Tapp, Targett and Viney continued to give everything for St. Marys, but Fingal appeared to have all the answers. John Smith was outstanding and made 42 kicks for the match, which is a terrific effort.
