WE ARE NOT IMPRESSED MR. BETHUNE.

At times the ways of Government are very difficult to follow and Mr. Bethune's recent trade stamping jaunt along the West Coast of the U.S.A. is an example of this condition.

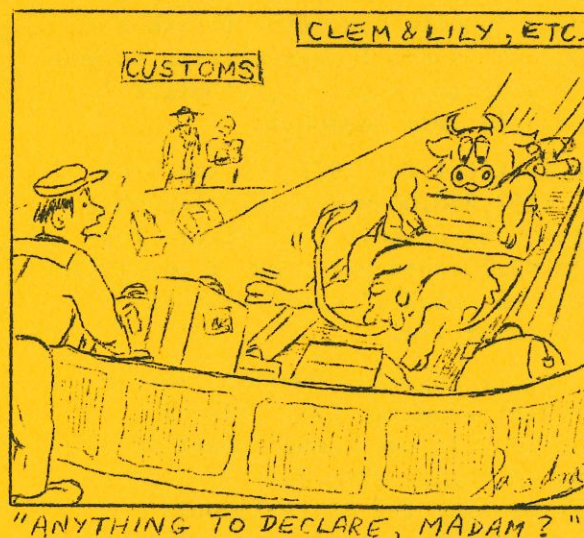
Contained in press releases since his return are the reasons for his trip. Mr. Bethune has secured (almost) two new industries for Tasmania. Industries that is, if the term is used loosely. In fact what Mr. Bethune has secured is the prospect of an American winery setting up a subsidiary branch on 300 acres of Northern Tasmania.

It has been known for several years now that wine grapes would grow in the Tamar regions and such an enterprise has already been contemplated. The difference now will be, that instead of a slow start with Tasmanian, or at least Australian money, we can possibly expect a quicker start with capital from the U.S.A. The amount envisaged is \$1,000,000 plus. This is not a large figure by today's standards and because of this we wonder about two things.

Firstly, how much will such an industry benefit the state rather than benefit the foreign company which owns it, and secondly, why was it necessary to go outside Australia to get such meagre capital anyway. Surely with State and Federal Government encouragement, financially or otherwise, this industry could be home financed and run equally efficiently.

The second foreign industry contemplated is with a fishing firm interested in taking tuna, abalone and oysters, from our waters. This industry will also involve processing factories etc. Again we wonder about actual benefits to this state. Especially in view of the fact our own local fishermen have been battling for years for Government consideration regarding port facilities and canneries.

For instance Mr. Bethune's revelations are not going to be very exciting to St. Helens fishermen and factory processors who will be out of a job

if St. Helens barway continues to be dangerous. A few thousand dollars spent on these essentials could go a long way to encourage our own fishing industry.

How long is it going to be before we upgrade our own ability and enterprise and do things ourselves rather than let others show us how and reap most of the benefits in doing so?

No Mr. Bethune, second raters or not, we are NOT impressed.

Dear Sir,

The total amount of funds raised for overseas aid from the Pinal area in 1971 was \$1,052.87. This amount came to us by way of our Annual Appeal in Sept. and also from the two special relief appeals held for the refugees from Bangla Desh. In 1970 the total from your municipality was \$326.00.

I would like to express the thanks of the State Appeals Committee together with my own personal appreciation to you all for your important contribution to overseas aid from Tasmania.

The State total for 1971 was the best ever; \$167,288.00 was raised together with 1,400 blankets. This figure represents 42.7 cents per head of population as compared with 26.6 cents with the rest of Australia.

At the State Appeals Committee meeting on the 21st January, 1972, it was decided to hold the Annual General Meeting on Friday 28th July in Hobart. At this meeting the State Appeals Committee will be elected, and then that body will decide upon the policy of overseas aid in Tasmania for the next twelve months.

At the meeting on the 21st January, it was also decided to have our Annual Appeal on the last Sunday in September (24th). This will be the only planned appeal for 1972. Because of some unforeseen crisis, however, we may have to extend the number of appeals.

HEALTH NOTES:

Seasonal Hazards - Stings & Bites

1. Bees often leave their sting in the skin and, rarely, so can wasps. If you can see the sting, ease out very carefully with a pair of tweezers.

Do not squeeze the sting too hard or you may push more poison into the skin.

2. For bees and ants, whose stings are due to an acid venom, a paste of bicarbonate of soda or diluted ammonia may be dabbed on the site.

For wasps, whose sting is due to an alkaline venom, vinegar or lemon juice may be dabbed on the site.

3. Another remedy for stings is to apply a cold compress made by wringing out a cloth in cold water. Dry the skin, dab on soothing calamine lotion.

If there is a great deal of swelling which persists despite any of the above treatments, then it is wise to take your child to the doctor.

Stings in the Mouth:

These should always be treated seriously and the child taken promptly to a doctor. A considerable degree of swelling of the tongue or tissues of the throat can obstruct the child's breathing. Should you suspect this, take him at once to a doctor.

Animal Bites:

1. Mild abrasions should be washed gently with soap and water, dried, and an anti-septic ointment applied.

2. Deep ragged lacerations should have the surrounding skin gently cleaned with soap and water. Cover the wound with a dry sterile dry sterile dressing. The child should then be taken to your doctor.

3. If your child has not been immunised against tetanus (Lockjaw) or has not received his booster shots at the appropriate times, then with any animal bite that penetrates the skin you should consult your doctor. He may recommend that your child be given an anti-tetanus injection.

Just Yarnin'

Continuing an account of St Marys District from the Illustrated Tasmanian Mail - 1926

" In the early days of St Marys when settlers were few and houses not many, there came to the district a young man accompanied by his wife and mother-in-law. It was the opinion of the old settlers that the advent of this young man to the district was the result of influence exercised by his wife's mother who did not consider him of a sufficiently steady temperament for localities where drinking facilities abounded, and who believed that in the more remote locality of St Marys there was hope for the irrelative individual. The party landed at Falmouth from a ketch from Melbourne, and proceeded to St Marys in bullock dray, which was then the favourite method of transport. Falmouth is about eight miles distant from St Marys and was, and is yet to that place what the Launceston residents expect Bell Bay to be to the Northern City. During the journey from Falmouth the bullock dray proved too rough for the new arrivals, so they decided to walk the distance and allow their goods to go on in advance. When they reached the Break-of-Day stream, which runs through St Marys, they missed the fording place in the dark. The young man who had a bottle of whiskey concealed in his pocket, managed to cross the stream and allowed the two women to remain on the other side. During the long hours of the night the two women kept vigil, while their companion across the stream sat on a log and consumed the whiskey. Despite pleading of his wife, and peremptory commands from his mother-in-law he declined to return over the river and when a couple of settlers appeared at daybreak he was still seated on the log lustily singing 'I fear no foe'. This party of new arrivals did not remain long in the district, but soon wandered on to some other part of Tasmania."

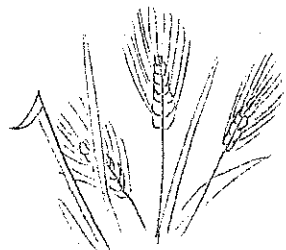

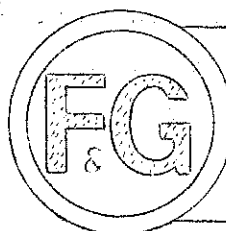

Beef Cattle Performance Recording provides a means by which cattle men can select from all the bulls available in each herd, the ones which will most reliably pass on the highly heritable factors of weight gain to their progeny. Recording the performance of beef cows takes into consideration, fertility, ease of calving, and temperament as well as each cow's ability to produce calves with a high rate of weight gain. The meeting at 'Belmont' on February 24th will commence at 1.00pm. and finish at 4.00pm.
