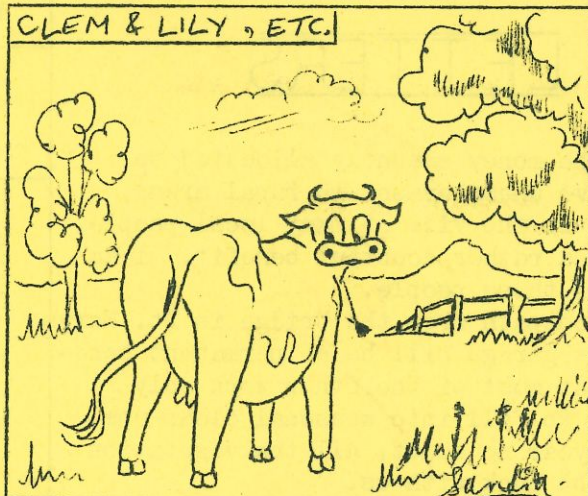
HOW TO SINK A SANDBAR

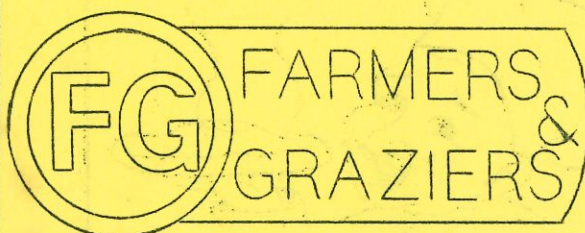

HEALTH NOTES

ASTHMA: The allergic substance causes the lining of the bronchial tubes to swell and the muscle layer to contract. Breathing becomes difficult. Attacks vary in length from one to seven days or more. Although distressing, an attack of asthma is rarely as serious as it seems. Sit the child up in bed to make his breathing easier.

Reassure him, don't fuss. The room should be warm and moist - boiling a kettle in the room helps. A change of climate may help or your doctor may prescribe a course of desensitisation.

Finishing the article from Illustrated Tasmanian Mail 12/5/26

"As is usual in new districts, strangers had difficulty in getting accommodation, and one of the first hotels erected was known as St Marys Hotel. This building was burned down about twenty years ago, and the present structure erected. The first storekeeper in the town was a Mr Wm. Lade, since dead, who used to cart his supplies from Hobart by waggon. There was no medical man in the district in the early days of settlement, and the nearest doctor was at Avoca, where Dr Pilgrim practised, and he was succeeded by Dr Lever. Shortly afterwards, Dr Hodgkins settled at Fingal, and visited St Marys twice a week. Some years later Dr Walker established a practice at St Marys, and the ailments of the local residents were set at rest.

Public meetings and other functions were frequently held in the Sunday School, erected by Mr Legge, and it was not until the line of railway was extended to the district that Mr Jacob Mory built the first Hall in the township. Approximately 58 years ago, the first school building, consisting of two rooms, was built, and when opened, there was an attendance of between 40 and 50 scholars.

St Marys of the present day, with its banks, post office, and public buildings, is very different to the place just described, and there are now rail and motor facilities to reach all parts of the State. For the past thirty years, the prosperity of the place has been added to by the large output of coal from the Cornwall, Mt Nicholas and Jubilee mines. The last named has only recently begun operations, but the first two have been sending out large quantities of coal for many years and this output contributes in very materially to the financial success of the railway from Conara to St Marys. A large number of men are employed at these mines which are close to St Marys, and the aggregate pay sheets each fortnight represents between £2000 and £3000. The dairying industry seems to have languished of late years, as the local butter factory has been closed but farmers still continue to make large quantities of cheese.

More attention is being given to potato growing and quantities of tubers are annually sent away. The prominent growers are Messrs. Lohrey, G.F. Salter and G Oliver. The district is a well known wool producer Messrs. Wardlaw B.W. Legge, L.J. Steele & C.J. Hanson have large flocks. As a tourist centre St Marys is also becoming well known.

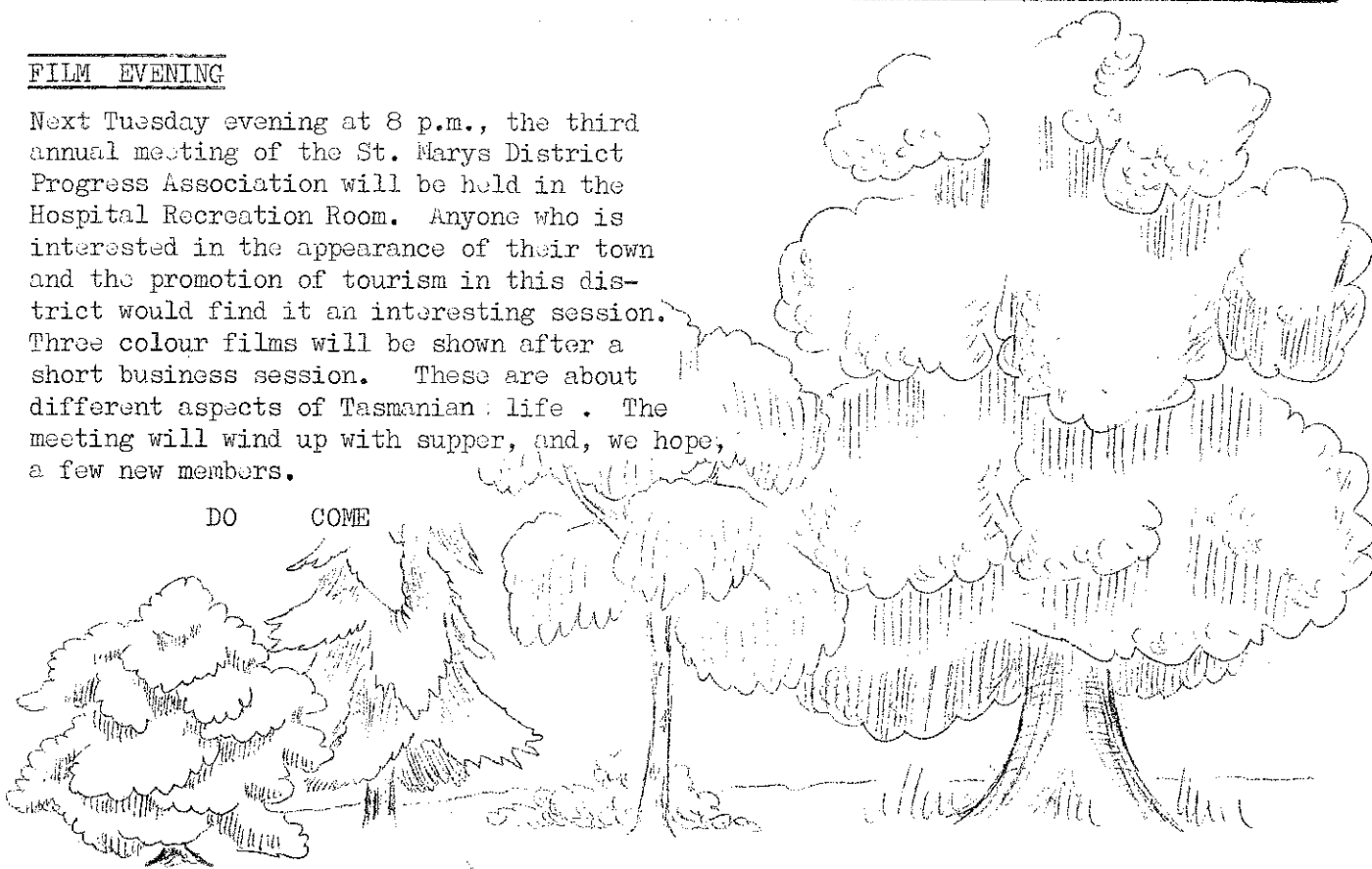

William McMahon, the Australian P.M. arrived back in Sydney last week to reflect on the successes of his much-publicised world tour in which he met Nixon, shook hands with Heath, and lunched with the Queen. His political opponents regard the whole thing as an attempt at image-building with next year's elections in mind, and there is some glee in the accounts of the tour which are circulating.

He is vastly concerned about his image, reports an Australian writer: "He has, as the advertising men put it, a low profile. We call him the bald Beatle." He has also been described as a Volkswagen with its doors open, a reference to the sweeping bald bonnet of his pate, and the jutting ears which he tries to conceal behind fluffy sidesboards. If his profile on the tour improved it must have been mainly due to his attractive wife Sonia, who appeared in slit dresses, flashing gracious smiles at grateful photographers.

In America McMahon set out to make friends with Nixon. He made a speech at the White House and described the President as a brother-in-trust leading the world
