EDITORIAL

OUT WITH THE OLD - IN WITH THE NEW

Many predicaments have been offered from various quarters about Saturday's State Elections and perhaps brashly we intend to continue in this vein.

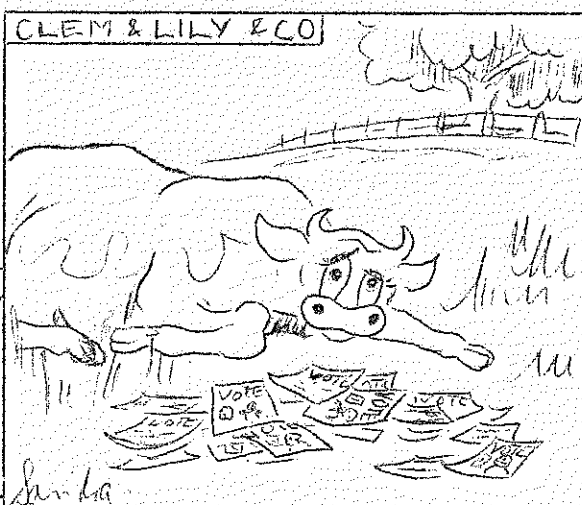
Firstly perhaps we should point out that last state elections we predicted correctly. The balance of power was eventually held by a third party. Such a situation arising again of course, is impossible as there is no third party only groups and independent candidates. That a group or independent could hold the balance of power seems remote. An independent needs a massive amount of primary votes to succeed; a loyal following is not enough.

The only independent who could foil this situation is Dr. Abbott, but he is standing in a sophisticated electorate and although he will no doubt appeal to the 'swingers' and some disenchanted Liberals he won't appeal much to Labor voters.

But in spite of all this, it promises to be an exciting election mainly due to the construction of the major parties. The Liberals are relying more or less on already sitting members, whereas Labor, especially in Wilmot, are tending to go for new and younger candidates. It is our prediction that this electorate will be the thorn in the Liberals side.

We expect Labor to win four of the Wilmot seats. Not only that, at this point it looks as though at least two of those seats will be won by younger candidates. In Batt, Lawson, Lohrey and Polley, Labor has four younger men who have concentrated almost solidly on a 'grass roots' policy and that is by going out to the electors and knocking on nearly every door. The Liberals have not.

Electors, especially Labor electors, appreciate this youthful vigor and nearly everywhere one goes in Wilmot the catch cry is heard 'out with the old in with the young!' Of these younger candidates the one who seems most to have caught the public imagination in Andrew Lohrey who appears to have hit it off with both old and young. Polley and Batt also have appealed very favourably and because of this we predict that two of

these new candidates will win their seats to the detriment of Anderson or Cashion.


On Saturday it will be the electors who prove us right or wrong. Can we be right twice in a row?

Last month we wrote an item on Labor candidate Mr. Andrew Lohrey. This week we received a letter from Mr. R.J. Williams of Launceston, a retired editor of the Examiner who asks us to do the same for a Liberal candidate whom he considers to be a 'good bloke' and in need of a 'fair go' public wise.

Fair enough; here goes:

Nearly everywhere he goes electioneering in Wilmot Reg Chopping meets people who recall that he was the man who organised the desperately needed fodder supplies for farmers burnt out in the 1967 fire disaster.

But Reg never raises the subject himself. It was his determination not to make, or seem to be making, political capital out of his voluntary relief work that caused him to refuse to be a Liberal candidate in 1969.

Reg tells me he is standing this time because he now feels free to give all his time to working for the betterment of Tasmania, particularly the farmers. He feels strongly that Tasmania needs more men in government who understand the importance of getting things done about the declining profitability of rural industries. One of the factors behind his Liberalism is his memory of the way he had to fight to get the State Labor Government to put urgent pressure on the Federal Government for money to rehabilitate the burnt out farmers in 1967.

Recently we printed some old time cures for ailments. This issue we have a cure for the common cold and though somewhat drastic, we are assured it works.

"Firstly, dig a pit about three feet deep and the length of the person who is to be cured. Next, fill with wood and light a fire. It is important that the fire should be hot and leave plenty of coals. Allow the fire to die down and when nearly out, scrape the coals from the pit.

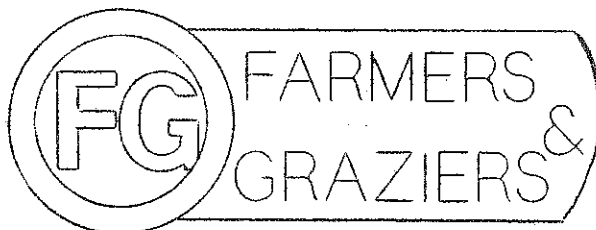

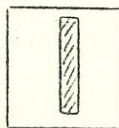
