EDITORIAL

A BACKWARD STEP... The latest decline in consideration for the east coast is shown in the new bus services time table that purports to serve the east coast.

In fact the new time-table only serves half of the east coast - the bottom half. Anyone who lives north of Swansea, it seems, is to suffer further isolation.

In the new time-table the Swansea bus is now timed to leave for Hobart and return at hours only suitable for anyone south of Swansea. Residents from Coles Bay and Bicheno have not been considered, for if they are to make the trip to Hobart it will involve a night stopover at Swansea and needless to say at considerable extra expense. Neither can they go to Launceston for the day because there is no bus connection at St. Marys either.

This is a ridiculous and unfair situation and certainly not justified in an island as small as Tasmania. And as one irate Bicheno resident recently asked in 'The Examiner', 'Why can't the mail coach be licenced to carry passengers so a connection can be made with the St. Marys bus'. We ask the same question.

The same writer asks how the Minister for Tourists (Mr. Lyons) came to approve this new bus time table for the Tasmanian Bus Lines. We don't really know whether or not he did have to approve it, or whether or not he even knows about it, but as Bicheno is in the heart of the east coast tourist trade we hope it is possible he can do something.

For - as the writer again points out - this new time-table destroys the possibility of tourists - especially the droves of younger people who have in the past used these buses to travel from Launceston to Hobart via the east coast at a moderate rate. To do this trip now will incorporate two expensive stop-overs.

This means simply that the connections of one of the most picturesque local bus runs in Australia no longer exists.





Cr. R.J. Hinds claims that his statements in the press 13/5/71 are true. I say he is misinformed. As a representative of the Trotting Club on the Ground Committee I opposed the site of the building because it is inside the race track and therefore is of no use to other sporting bodies using the ground. As these buildings are maintained by the ratepayers I consider they should be situated so as to be of benefit to all other sporting bodies, not just one.

As a Councillor representing the ratepayers I strongly oppose a rate to liquidate the Grant (plus interest) to complete the building as I consider it is not for essential services. It is the ratepayers right to ask for a poll to ascertain if they are in favour of the proposed rate, hence the petition to which Cr. Hinds now says he is not opposed after speaking out very strongly against in the press 13/5/71.

I would remind Cr. Hinds that support given to the Ambulance Service, the Domiciliary Service, etc. is voluntary and not imposed on the people by a rate and I would take this opportunity to congratulate the public on their very fine support of these very worthy services.

Building costs:-On 15/3/71 the estimated cost of the dressing sheds was \$9,902.49 complete with all material, fittings and labour. At that date the Club had raised \$4,555.48. Balance required to finish the project - \$5,314.01. On the 13/5/71 it was stated in the Examiner that the Club had now raised \$9,000 and the cost of the building was \$14,000. I fail to see where the extra cost is involved unless it is to cover the cost of the socalled voluntary labour.



Over the oven was a shingle roof covered with pink climbing roses and along side stood the wooden bread paddle and the long handled rake.

The wood was collected in the bush and the oven fired. The coals were raked out and the cook would test the air in the oven with her hand to determine the correct heat. Then the bread went in on the wooden paddles and the door was dampened down with a hessian cloth to exclude all draughts. There was the delightful smell of home baked bread and the crock full of proofing dough.

Xmas time brought all the neighbours to bake their Christmas Cakes and what fun that was. They arrived with all the ingredients and evey one helped with the mixing, the older children breaking the eggs and the younger ones pinching the currants when their elders were not looking. The cakes were placed in the oven and as they baked the children played and the elders gossiped and planned their Christmas fare.

The in was home in Bewglass' Motors to St. Marys or Jack Hill's to Bicheno. The old oven has also been used for a sucking pig that was too big for the ordinary oven and it would be cooked to perfection.

As the family went away and there was less cooking the oven fell into disuse and became an ideal place for snakes to hide. This sounded its doom and it had to be pulled down but there are still the memories of happy days and the memories of all those wholesome cooking smells mingling with the bush perfumes.

IN THE EVE OF THE LAW

We are now into the winter season, with consequent minimum daylight hours, and more hazardous driving conditions.

If you have not already checked your car or vehicle tyres, you are ad ised to do so, in the interest of your own safety, at well as that of other road users. Your or defective tyres at the best of times are a risk, but in an emergency could be the cause of a serie is accident, with perhaps even fatal result.

Traffic regulations have been designed to eliminate this defective eso, and are quoted for general information:

"No person shall drive or use a motor vehicle or trailer, or perhit them to be driven or used, on a public street; unless every tyre litted there to complies with the following requirements:

- (a) The type shall be free from any apprent defect that is likely to render the two of the vehicle or trailer unsafe;
- (b) The tyre shall have a clearly visible tread pattern on every part that normally comes into contact with the road surfaces:

Size such defects have some under notice during the course of patrols and checks, and those respectible render themselves liable to prosecution.

Alk motorists are unged to give this aspect of their motoring strict attention, and by doing so, will greatly increase their chance of avoiding either of the all vementioned happenings.
