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EDITORIAL

LEAVE ME AT HOME

To introduce my topic this issue I have used an extract from a recent conversation between a domiciliary sister and an old man.

"No I don't want to go, as a matter of fact I ain't going." "You see that green paddock up there at the foot of the mountain, well you can bury me up there beside me old horse," stated the wirey old man firmly.

"I've got no intentions of taking you away from here, I called in to see you and ask if you would like a hot meal brought to you each day", said the domiciliary nursing sister. "It will only cost you 25c per meal", she explained.

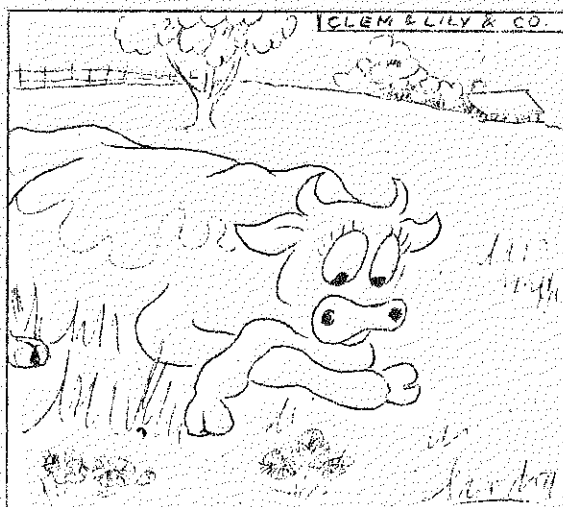
"No I don't want none of your charity either", said the old fellow.

No wonder the old fellow didn't want to go. He lives in one of the most beautiful spots in Tasmania, in a small house nearly at the foot of a steeply rising mountain. The kind of setting you would see on a calendar.

The government has come to recognise the fact that old people are happier and better off in their own familiar, well loved surroundings. It's cheaper to provide a domiciliary nursing sister and subsidies for a Meals on Wheels service than to provide beds in hospitals and old people's institutions.

We have a domiciliary service in the Valley and shortly through the generosity of Hobart Meals on Wheels, we will have a Meals on Wheels service too. Just these two services will enable many of our old people to stay at home. But at the same time make daily contact with somebody, have a hot meal each day and a watching brief kept on their needs and health. This means they can remain in their own homes with a good deal of independence and security.

Meals on Wheels is not strictly a charity that will have to be supported year after year. The meals are paid

for by the people receiving them, at 25c each, which doesn't touch much of their pension. A government subsidy of 10 cents on each meal ensures the continued financial stability of the organisation serving them.

All the people of the Valley are asked to do, is drive their own cars two or three times a year to deliver the meals. To this, there has been a very good response, but the more people who are willing to help the better for all concerned. So you're not asked to put your hand in your pocket again, just take a little drive around your own district.

The people who are to receive the meals will be assessed on their need and ability, by the district nurse and the doctor only, from recommendations made to them.

Dear Sir,

As a member of the St. Marys Football Club Building Fund Committee, I strongly oppose Cr. Davis with his suggestion at the end of his letter to the Valley Voice on the 4/6/71 with regards building costs and especially the last paragraph which I quote:- "I fail to see where the extra cost is involved unless it is to cover the cost of the so called voluntary labour".

I do not dispute his right to oppose the building but I take his remarks as a personal insult on my own integrity and honesty and an insult to all other wonderful voluntary support that we have received to date.

The original estimate for the completed building was about \$14,000 and as previously stated by Mr. R. Costain and Mr. G.H. Napier the club will have supplied in cash and voluntary labour a sum approaching \$9,000, for a project that will surely benefit not only members of the St. Marys Football Club but other sporting bodies and the community in general.

This building does not only include change rooms, toilets and showers but a spacious kitchen-kiosk area at the front which will be used by our ladies who have worked for years under shocking conditions in old delapidated sheds which could have been condemned as a health hazard years ago although I will admit they have been improved after a considerable sum of money was spent on improvements during the last 12 months.

If any of the general public and St. Marys ward ratepayers wish to know any details as to how our present funds have been spent or a detailed inspection of the building as it stands at present I will be happy to assist in any way.

SEE

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Just yarnin'

This week we drop in to listen to three 'Old Mining Pals' recalling the Good Old Days in Cornwall-- Cyril French, Bas Blair, and Chas. Mitchell. All agree that they worked with one of the best crowd of work-mates. There were 150 men employed, and a very friendly group of people. "I started work at the Cornwall screens in 1914" said Bas Blair. "At that time the mine was managed by Mr. T. Hall and the Mine Overseer was Mr. Hill who joined the A.L.F. and was killed in France. At that time, the coal was lowered to the screens in rakes of one dozen skips, the full skips being used to pull the empty skips up to the mine where they were controlled by a brake wheel at the bank top. The skips used to go down on a single line with a loop line half-way down the hill, where they would pass. In later years, the single line was done away with, and a double line and Endles rope installed. -the full skip going down one line, and the empty skips coming up the other line where they were conveyed into the mine after getting to the mine flat. They were taken into the mines by the pit ponies, of which about 20 were kept, and it was a sad time when a coal truck would get away, crashing into one of the ponies, and it would have to be destroyed." "I came to the mine in 1923, and there were about 140 men there at that time," said Cyril French. "As blacksmith, it was my job to shoe the pit ponies, and my right-hand man was Charlie Mitchell, a great man to work with. As I had to inspect all the ponies at the end of the day, I could not catch the bus, and rode backwards and forwards to Cornwall by bicycle. When the road was flooded, I had to walk, following the railway line and then the tramway. Yes, they were very happy days. We all worked together very happily. It was a pity when the mine had to close."

TASMANIAN A.L.P. RURAL COMMITTEE

At the June meeting of the Tasmanian A.L.P. Rural Committee which met in Launceston last week-end, the Committee analyzed the recently passed \$100 million Rural Reconstruction Scheme and agreed its main shortcomings were:-

- (a) the amount was hopelessly inadequate to revitalise languishing primary industry.
- (b) the interest rate was too high.
- (c) the Federal Government was to receive from the States 6% interest on \$75 million of the total amount, thus they will recoup \$10 million total interest charges over four years of the Loan. The Commonwealth stand to make a colossal profit out of farmers tribulations!

This means that actually only \$25 million is being given as a non-repayable grant over four years under this legislation, which is an insult to the industry!

- (d) The Tasmanian share was \$3.3 million over four years. This was a disgrace alongside:-

N.S.W.	\$32 million
Vic.	\$22,070,000
Q'ld.	\$16 million
S.A.	\$12 million
W.A.	\$14,630,000

and, as the States met together to decide these allocations, Tasmania's arguments must have been very weak!

- (e) there were too many imponderables as to "reasonable interest" - "farm viability" - "farmers as business propositions" for State Authorities to decide.
- (f) a subtle move to kill the small farmer/family unit.

ST. HELENS IMPROVE AGAINST FINGAL!!

St. Helens and Fingal played a most entertaining game at Fingal last week with the Blue's winning by 21pts. After the first quarter Fingal got a good break mainly through the efforts of Smith and Barnes. The "Bay" boys got into it for the rest of the game and were equal to the powerful Fingal side. New players, Berwick and Anthony were very effective players for the Bay. Anthony kicked three goals at full forward.

St. Marys and Rossarden game although a very poor standard, kept the crowd interested because of close scoring. The Tigers had most of the play all day but couldn't score goals, kicking only 8-20 compared to the 15-4 the week before. A bad blow for St. Marys were the injuries received by Tapp in the first quarter. Let's hope the Tigers aren't in for another bad run like last year. It was only the week before Ricky Freeman broke his arm. Best players for St. Marys were A. Lynch, Dean, Rawnsley, McCarter, Targett and D. Birroll. For Rossarden: Housego, Lewtas, Parish, Tony Hawkins, Conray, Sheehan, L. Lowe and J. Lowe. It amazes me, that A. Lynch and Tony Rawnsley aren't selected in a combined game as Lynch has been unbeaten in recent games and Rawnsley has been playing well week after week. It seems the selectors must have a hard job and would rather pick name players than select players on form.

Swansea appear to be the unlucky side this season, once again being beaten by less than a goal against Avoca. This is the third time this season. Things should improve with McGowan and Amos back. They could give all the teams a shake up as the season progresses. Cusick has the "Bulldogs" really keen, let's hope they can crack a win before long.

Avoca, although not playing well, should get into gear as players recover from injuries, competition looks like getting pretty keen with Rossarden only one game out of the four behind St. Helens.

The combined game this week against the Midlands should be good. Form reports have it that the Midlands side is the worst for years and our side is the worst I've seen selected ever!

One pleasing thing about it is to see "Cactus" Freeman get his chance in a combined side and I feel sure that he will acquit himself well against Denis Irwin. But I feel a panel of three or five selectors independent of any club would be a better deal all round.

Next week's games will see the long awaited clash between Fingal and St. Marys at Fingal. Although I would like to pick the Tigers I am going for Fingal to win by a narrow margin in a hard fought game on their home ground. This will mean the first defeat for the Tigers.

St. Helens play Avoca at the "Bay", I will have to be careful here as their last clash was my only wrong selection this year. I picked St. Helens last time and I'm going to stick with them again.

Rossarden playing full of confidence should prove a little too strong for Swansea - this season's unlucky side.

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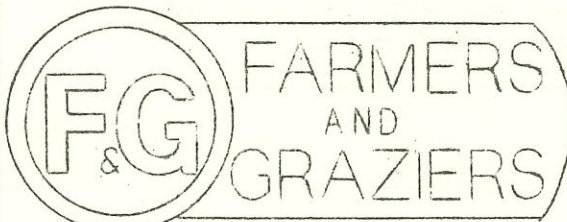
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
