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EDITORIAL

COMMON CENSUS Last Wednesday, 30th June, 1971 was census night throughout Australia. Every household in the country received, or should have received a census form from one of the thousands of part-time collectors employed by the Commonwealth.

Unfortunately during this census, the collectors job has been made a little more difficult by a changing public attitude towards such fact finding enterprises. This change in attitude (last census apparently very little public resentment was noted) has mainly been due to adverse criticism by some politicians during the past few weeks.

Whether or not this criticism is completely justified is open to doubt and as one often suspects in these cases political capitol may be the main object of the criticism rather than genuine concern for the welfare of the Australian citizen.

The form itself, although seemingly formidable is in fact a rather innocuous document which deals mainly in ordinary mundane questions of houses, jobs, education and racial origins. The average person would doubt answer any of the questions voluntarily to anyone who happened to ask, officially or otherwise.

But in spite of this, giving such information to a faceless officialdom may hold certain terrors to some people who suspect they are vulnerable in one way or another.

Surely a simple way of overcoming this fear in future census collections would be to legislate for the deletion of personal names on census forms. The same factual data for official use would be available as before, but without a name to identify any individual form, all possibilities of mis-use would thus be removed.

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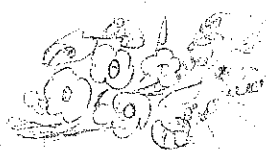

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Just yarnin'

This week, to Mr. H. Singline of St. Marys-----"I came to St. Marys from Four Mile Creek when I was 11 years old. When we lived at Four Mile Creek, we would go to school at Falmouth where the two Miss Brady's taught, and we would walk along the beach, or over the rocks back and forth to school each day. I started work in St. Marys and my first full-time job paid 2/6 per week. When I earned 5/- per week, I thought I was made! I used to work for Mr. Albert Doyle who had up to 15 blood horses and special jockeys for training. Mr. Doyle also had the butchery, the bakery and a small grocery business. We would pack supplies up and take them out to Mt. Nicholas, and Cornwall Mines, and I can remember driving two horses tandem style along the rough road to Upper Scamander Tin Mine. The last pull up to the Mine was very steep. Along the way, people would come and buy their supplies from the cart. Coming Good Friday, we would sit up at midnight making buns and then we would be out in the morning with a basketful, delivering them by horseback. When I was about 12 years old I got diphtheria, and Dr. Harris, who lived in the flats in Cameron Street, walked over to our place to see me. He took me to the Emergency Hospital which had been fixed up in a barn near the present High School, because there was an epidemic of the disease, and I can remember little Garth Napier riding his black pony and wearing a white hat, hanging the milk billy on the gate post, because he was not allowed to come near the Hospital. I can't remember who the nursing was done by, but it was a bad epidemic, and some children died. St. Marys Race Day held on New Year's Day, was a big day, and I used to train some of the horses. Come the day we would go to town to see the train come in, bringing horses and lots of visitors for the race meeting, and the dressing at the race meeting was always of interest, and very good. The old Race Course came down past the present Golf House, and past the present Sale Yards.

FINGAL defeats ST. MARYS.

Old rivals St. Marys and Fingal staged another one of their traditional hard and good games at Fingal last week. The first quarter was all Fingal as they fired away at goal. Unfortunately, they could only manage 3 goals & 8 behinds. In this quarter Fingal, with the use of the wind, finished up with what proved later to be a match winning lead. From the start of the second quarter the tigers got their tails up and played well to overhaul the Blue's lead. At the last change it appeared to be anybody's game, but the defence of both teams was excellent and while St. Marys kicked 4 points for the quarter Fingal scored only one. Best players for Fingal were D. Parker who played a great game, K. Cowie, J. Smith, Barnes, G. Sulzberger and McGee until injured. For St. Marys, Newman, Barnes, Dean, Birrell, Bye, Midson, and Richards were perhaps the best although it was a good team effort all round.

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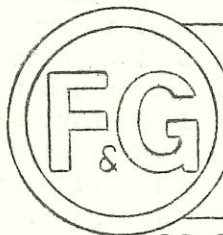
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
