EDITORIAL

The recent confrontation between the Tasmanian Teacher's Federation and the Education Department over the lack of a teacher at St. Marys District School points out some significant facts about the roles of the two bodies involved.

The Tasmanian Teacher's Federation, or in this case the headmaster of St. Marys School who was acting under its constitutional ruling, has shown it is prepared to make a stand on a major issue.

A teacher has now, after many weeks of other teachers filling in, been appointed to take up the vacant position. The fact that to fill this position took a confrontation is nothing less than deplorable. It gives one the impression that country schools such as St. Marys, are at the bottom of the list when it comes to teacher allocations. It also makes one wonder just how many teachers this school could have lost without replacements if the headmaster had not acted on the T.T.F. ruling of rostering children when consistently understaffed.

The fact that this confrontation and the adverse publicity caused was the incentive for the Education Dept. to appoint a teacher in a day or two shows very poor motive and is also to be condemned.

The school headmaster expressed his views at the special Parents and Friends meeting last Monday in which he told the meeting that his main aim in rostering children was that he believed ultimately it would be for the good.

On the other hand the Education Dept. has indulged in a continuing round of procrastination and buckpassing which show up grave weaknesses in its structure.

Perhaps it is time the Minister, Mr. Mather, took a long hard look at the department he heads, especially with regard to rural schools, such as ours, which often suffer from second class status in his department's considerations.

Now that woodchips are going to put value on even the most doubtful tree, both the Hydro and the P.M.G. will have to review their past policies or pole lines and cable laying.

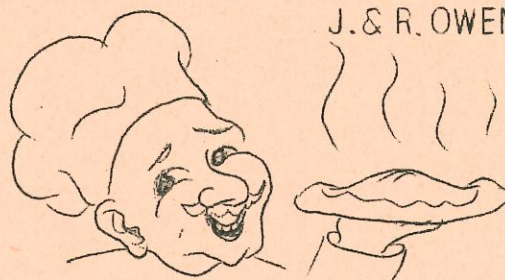

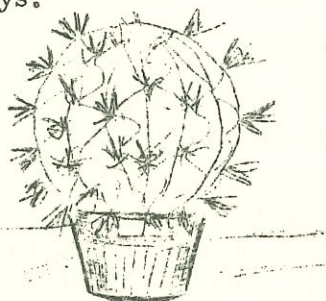

GROWING CACTI

For those who want a plant to keep going in the frosty weather. They are so easy-going and adaptable! They do splendidly on a sunny window ledge, in heat, in stuffy air, and can stand a good deal of cold. They will even put up with quite a lot of neglect. The sign of a healthy cactus is its colour - usually dark green or blue-green. When buying, pale or knocked about plants should be avoided. As for watering, when in doubt, - don't. Too much may cause rotting. In summer, once or twice a week; but in winter, once every four or six weeks is sufficient. Small cacti should be repotted each spring in a slightly larger pot. Pots should be well drained. When the plants are larger, they can be left in their pots for two or three years.

If you like, you can group together cacti of various shapes in a large bowl without drainage holes. Put in a layer of broken pot crocks at least 1 inch deep and fill with as deep a layer of soil as the bowl will allow. Be careful when watering. In this way, you can make quite an attractive group - much nicer than a lot of separate pots which need saucers or drip trays.

I have found that in times of disappointment of any kind there is great help in these words. There is this fact. Feelings may say what they will, but they cannot touch the eternal fact.

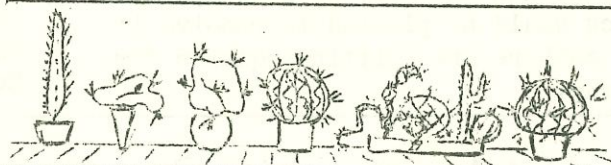

Just yarnin'

This week to Mr. Herbert Smith of Seymour.

I was born at Campbelltown - my mother says it was the first of August but my birth certificate shows 31st July 1888. I was born in the good old times, they were very hard times, but they were good times. There were eleven in our family and I only had about one weeks school. As a boy I would go out and gather a bundle of bark for 3d. and with this I would buy a loaf of bread. At 14 I worked at Eggleston on the Shearing Board for Mr. Headlam for 2/6d. and after one month I had 10/- which I spent on a pair of Blucher boots and a pair of dungarees.

I was married at 23 and I reared 5 sons on 30/- per week and I never got into debt. My wife was a wonderful woman and a wonderful manager.

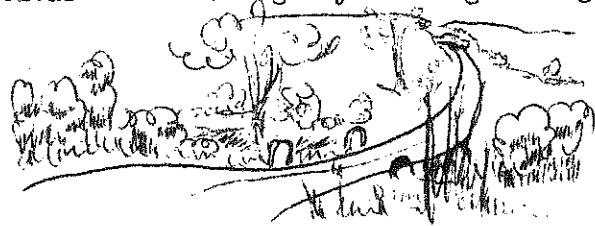
Campbelltown Hospital was very small when I was a boy and I can remember when four of us had the measles and we were bundled up on some straw in a pony cart and taken to the hospital. Dr. Toft the doctor did his rounds in a horse and cart and then he bought a Ford motor car, the first motor car in Campbelltown.

He would travel as far as Fingal and Swansea. There was a doctor at Oatlands and one at Evandale.

I can remember when there was only one car in Avoca - a steam car belonging to Mr. O'Connor.

When we lived at Avoca near the bridge I can remember one day - August 28th 1914 - during the floods. I was in bed with the 'flu and two pack carts coming from Storeys Creek collided sending one of the carts with the man into the swirling flood waters. My wife called for me and I was able to save him although it was quite a job - he was wearing two heavy overcoats and the flood waters were full of gorse - I was remembering the prickles for some time after. I was a strong swimmer and for this act I was awarded a medal and a certificate from the Royal Humane Society which I have now given to one of my grandchildren.

I then settled at Seymour and for 22 years I worked for the Public Works Department. When I first went to Seymour it was all bush and now it is cleared with a highway running through.

NEW TEACHER FOR DISTRICT SCHOOL

At the St. Marys District School Parents and Friends meeting last Monday night the Headmaster, Mr. Williams, outlined his reasons for the drastic action of rostering some of the high school classes to a four day week.

Mr. Williams told parents he took the action in the belief it would ultimately benefit the children. The fact that a teacher had then been appointed with great alacrity by the Education Dept. was the result he hoped to achieve.

President of the P. & F., Mr. Legge, also gave his version of the situation by describing his efforts to contact some person in the Education Department who would take responsibility for the appointment of a replacement teacher for St. Marys School. Mr. Legge said he had been astonished and appalled at the amount of buck passing he had encountered. In one session, he had spent nearly 30 minutes at the phone and had been advised to contact five different people. "I eventually contacted the man who does the hiring and firing" Mr. Legge said, "and he wasn't any help either".

But the most amazing thing about the whole business was that during all the weeks it had taken to arrange a replacement teacher no official from the Dept. had been made to Mr. Williams - certainly not to myself," he added.

PAKISTANI REFUGEE FUND TOPS \$50,000

Recent visitor to this district is Mr Andrew Lohrey, Tasmanian Director for Austcare and Freedom from Hunger. In a press statement for this paper he reports of a very satisfactory response throughout the State in fund raising for the Pakistani refugees.

Already the amount received totals over \$50,000. The fund is to be closed at the end of this month. Mr Lohrey said that perhaps the most gratifying result of the appeal was the generosity displayed by children. Children often gave all they had at the moment and gave it willingly. I hope this shows a newer and greater awareness in Australia for the plight of the less fortunate people in the world, Mr Lohrey said.

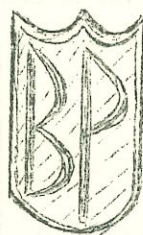

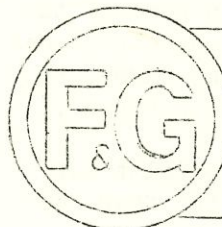
