## St Marys Mainstreet Makeover


I apologise for not having provided any further public information regarding the Makeover since the community meeting in October. My fault. Now that visible works are underway, I hope this report will bring everyone up-to-date, answer any questions and indicate what is to happen next.

There are 4 programmes of works happening in St Marys at present, at the Recreation Ground, between Frank and Cameron Street, along Main Street, and in Memorial Park. These are variously funded through Council's Capital Works Budget, Works Department maintenance budget, and a Mainstreet Makeover Grant of \$150,000 from the State Government.

The shower and toilet facilities at the recreation ground should be completed within a week or two, and is funded from the Capital Works budget at a cost of about \$145,000. It provides 11 toilets and 3 showers, with disabled facilities, and is intended primarily as a tourist attraction! Together with camping facilities, power access and black water disposal it is intended as a facility to attract mobile home and campervan tourists to use St Marys as a short term stay base, for exploring the surrounding area.

The works currently under way between Frank and Cameron Street on the north side of Main Street are a mixture of capital works budget items and the Mainstreet Makeover Project. The capital works budget item is \$54,000 for a new footpath between Frank and Cameron Street and the development of a car park in the Memorial Hall grounds. The footpath will be a red concrete path 160m long and 1.8m wide, with the same stencil paving pattern as used on the other paths in Main Street, outside the pub and fire station for example. It will create a wide and continuous boulevard for locals and visitors to stroll along the main street under a canopy of trees, viewing the sesquicentenary bricks and the cenotaph, and generally watching the world go by, replacing the narrow hotch potch of gravel, bitumen, and pavers which is the current path. Weather allowing, this should be finished by the time the next Voice comes out. The footpath ends with an outstand at each end, providing an improved swept path for vehicles into and out of Frank and Cameron Streets, an improved line of sight of traffic along Main Street, and safer pedestrian crossing at the corners.

The footpath works ties in with the development of the car park and part of the Mainstreet makeover. Providing for car parking is an essential part of planning for the long term development of St Marys. So, as a first step, a car park is being developed beside the Memorial Hall, allowing for daily parking for owners and employees of the surrounding businesses and for overflow parking if the parking in Main Street is fully used at any time. There will be more than 20 spaces provided -if the average time parked by casual users and shoppers was (say) 30 mins, this will provide additional parking for 320 cars over an 8 hour day.

William Steel only spent a few short years in Van Diemens Land, but his impact on pioneering the East Coast was significant and should never be forgotten.

Despite efforts on calmer days, very little was salvaged from the hapless vessel, and after persistentounding by the force of the waves, the "Jane of Falmouth" eventually joined her Master at the bottom of the sea.

Captain Green and his crew worked tirelessly for two days to free the vessel, but finally they realised it was hopeless. They built a raft from timbers on board and made it to shore.

The "Jane" was stuck fast and in the height of the moment all but one crewman climbed into a dinghy and headed for shore. But the little boat was no match for the waves breaking on the bar and it was soon swamped, throwing all on board into the raging sea.

Bay. The tide was low and boating out of the bay, made even worse by a strong westerly wind, which in no time blew the ship onto the sand bar.

Everything was wrong, on the 5<sup>th</sup> September 1834, when the schooner began its entry into Georges Bay.

Governor George Arthur and his party led by John Helder Wedge, but they had recorded very little about the barway itself.

At that time very little was known about the Georges Bay barway.

It appears, however, that the further north they sailed the rougher the sea became and by the time

the vessel reached Falmouth the Captain deemed it too dangerous to anchor and unload the cargo into small boats to be taken ashore. But William was anxious to get his cargo to its destinations and ordered the Captain to continue up the coast and negotiate the barway into Georges Bay.

Along with the cargo, William, Captain Bill Green, three crewmen, the millwright and a Captain Margrave, late of the East Indian Service, who was going to the Georges River area to collect plants and seeds for the Botanic Gardens in Calcutta, the "Jane" set off from Hobart on her maiden commercial voyage.

Steghiltz of Killymoon and Magnus McLeod of Georges Bay, as well as a Mr Rankin, Dr Alexander Thompson, the man who had built William's villa, was also there with a load of building necessities and some advice for the ship's Captain to take care.

Parts for a corn mill for William were loaded, together with a millwright, Mr Dunn, who was producing and pick up his first load of cargo and passengers, which he hoped, would be the beginning of a lucrative coastal trading business.

William was rapt with his "Jane of Falmouth" and immediately headed off to Hobart to deliver his corn and potatoes from William's farm and floated out to sea.

By 1834, William had built himself a schooner on the banks of Devil's Creek, not far from his villa. After being begged by Charles Manly, it was eased into the waters of the creek, loaded with

then, St Patricks Head District. William Steel took up residence in a small villa built by Dr Alexander Thompson of "Logie" ("Harefield") in the Break O'Day Plains, who had used the villa as a holiday residence.

In 1829 John Henderson and William Steel were given land grants at Falmouth, or as it was known East Coast pioneer.

Another quote in the case of *Plenty v Dillon* was when Lord Denning M.R said in *Southam v Smout (1964)*, "The poor old man may in his cottage bid defiance to all the forces of the Crown. He may be frail, the storm may enter, the rain may enter, but the King of England dare not enter, all his force dares not cross the threshold of the enter, unless he has justification".

That means we have the right to carry on that activity whenever we want to. In the case of Plenty v Dillon (1991) 171 CLR 635 F.C. 91/004, it was quoted that "By the laws of England, every invasion of private property, be it ever so minute, is a trespass. No man can set foot upon my ground without my licence, but he is liable to an action,"

In the book by Quick & Garran reference was made to the Australian Constitution concerning our constitutional rights and the details of the meetings held between 1886 and 1900 when the constitution was being developed. It clearly states: "If the Australian Constitution does not give the Australian Government the right to make laws, and the State Government to make laws, then it remains dormant and invetered in us".

Take note you have no authority to enter this property without my prior expressed permission and I rely on the Australian High Court common law authorities *George v Lockett*, *Plenty v Dillon*, and *Halliday v Nevill* as case law. Print a copy and sign it in front of a JP and have a JP

If there is authority in exercising the warrant to destroy property, it can only be signed by a judge. If signed by a D.P. or a magistrate, then you can ask them to leave, as the warrant is defective. Another way of preventing anyone from entering your property is to put up a sign which states your property description and says: To individuals or entities entering this property without permission of the landholder for any reason without my express permission will result in immediate prosecution of the individual under common law and the invasion of the Privacy Act of 1971. This prosecution will occur whether or not you have been issued with a search warrant granting implied consent to enter this property.

If anybody should dare to enter your property to make mischief or to destroy anything, you have the right to keep them out! Should they have a warrant, it must have your name, your property description, (not just a postal address) and clear evidence of what they are actually looking for.







By July 2011 all schools with a 40km/h speed limit zone will be fitted with a set of electronic speed limit signs according to priority.


The signs will operate only at times when children are entering or leaving school and the speed limit is in place. When the school zone is not operating the sign will be blank.

The State Government has installed the signs to improve safety for students crossing the road outside their school.











## Grade 7 school sleepover
