
FINGAL VALLEY TO RECEIVE \$1 950,000 TO SUPPORT LOCAL PRIMARY SCHOOLS

Dick Adams, Member for Lyons, was very pleased to announce that Avoca and Fingal Primary and St Marys District High will receive \$1, 950,000 for new infrastructure projects under the Primary Schools for the 21st Century (P21) Round Two funding.


This will bring total funding for primary schools in Lyons under P21 to over \$38 Million in Round Two, with over 30 schools in Lyons benefiting in this round.

"This is part of the largest school modernisation program in Australia's history, and will support local jobs, schools and communities.

"Teachers and students in our local schools should be teaching and learning in 21st Century facilities," Mr Adams said.

St Marys District High will receive \$850,000 to construct new classrooms. Avoca Primary has been granted \$250,000 to upgrade sports facilities and Fingal Primary will receive \$850,000 to provide new Early Childhood Education and Birth to 4 year old facilities.

The \$12.4 Billion P21 element of the Education Revolution will deliver much needed funding for major infrastructure projects, including libraries, multipurpose halls and covered outdoor learning centres.

Dick Adams encouraged those schools that have not already done so to make an application for Round Three which closes on 10 July and will see remaining eligible primary schools receive funding.

"Funding for schools is a key element to the Rudd Government's \$42 Billion Nation Building and economic Stimulus Plan to support jobs, stimulate economies and invest in important

Cllr Cato says (Voice 4 June) the Local Government Board will determine whether an amalgamation of the Glamorgan-Spring Bay and Break O'Day Councils (into the Broken Spring Council?) will be in the best interests of residents after "extensive" community consultation

However, the Local Government Act only requires the Board to provide a "<u>reasonable</u>" opportunity for public consultation. Readers of the Hitch Hikers Guide to the Galaxy will be well aware of the extent and nature of the consultation that is likely to occur under that definition.

The Minister of Local Government has not asked the Council what it means by "extensive" consultation', although this was a key requirement of the motion passed by Council when surrendering its duty to the Local Government Board; the terms of reference of that consultation process should be determined by the full Council in open meeting before the Board even starts to look at the map.

This is our back yard; all who live in it should have the maximum chance to fully express and form their views over a reasonable time on whether we want to move in with the neighbours, before we find ourselves sharing the bathroom with them because a consultant asserts it will lead to a more intensive utilization of infrastructure and other economies of scale.

The Mayor, in secret meetings between October 2008 to February 2009 with the Mayor of Glamorgan -Spring Bay and the Minister for Local Government, has instigated and driven this process, claiming it is better to jump than be pushed, and that it will provide "massive" benefits to ratepayers; when asked what these benefits will be, he has replied that it will be up to the Board to decide!

What will be the benefits to the people of Weldborough of joining with the people of Buckland, or of Fingal with Orford, or Pyengana with Swansea? How big is the gap between "extensive' and " reasonable' consultation? David Clement.

Firstly I am not anti-forestry or anti fuel reduction burn-offs, I was clearly stating my concerns.

I take offence that Paul is trying to use the 2006 fires and the Victorian fires as a wedge in this debate, I find this in extremely bad taste. My business and property were affected by the 2006 fires and I do understand and appreciate the need for managed fuel reduction burn-offs, I have done many on my own property and I encourage everyone to do so.

I would not stoop as low to compare the Victorian bushfires in this debate, I lost friends in the Victorian fires, so I do share Paul's concerns regarding fuel reduction and the need to have our properties prepared for future bush fires. *Paul how can I forget such a tragedy.* I was notified by several members of the St Helens community complaining about the burn-offs that week in May, many complained of respiratory problems and they were concerned about the lack of communications regarding these burn-offs, may I suggest that Forestry Tasmania place ads in the Valley Voice and the Coastal Column next time they plan a burn-off and have more consideration regarding our communities health, these burn-offs are creating health problems statewide, you only have to pick up the daily newspapers and read the complaints.

There were complaints made to Forestry Tasmania during the week of the fires by the public and no one has had a response to date.

I know and understand that Forestry Tasmania does not use 1080 however it is common knowledge that it is used in forestry operations and farming around the state, I did not state that Forestry Tasmania uses these chemicals, it is also known that triazines are used locally and have had an effect on our community.

My claims regarding the use of triazines is backed by doctors who see the ill effects that these insidious chemicals cause, so I am not that ill informed.

It is common knowledge that the forestry industry is dying out and that logging contractors have been affected by private companies ending contracts etc, the Greens have a package that has been tabled in parliament for retraining and payouts for the forestry industry.

It should be noted that tourism is the fastest growing industry in our region and that forestry is not the only industry that supports our community and economy.

My suggestion regarding the Tasmanian Devil and the use of 1080 is supported by scientific reports conducted by qualified eminent scientists such as Dr David Obendorf.

I still ask the community to question "is it worth letting the use of these chemicals for the gain of a handful of companies and their profit margins, to the detriment of our community?" Recently, whilst staying with family, I happened to read the Central Coast Courier dated 4.6.2009.

I will not be entering into any future correspondence regarding the above issues in the Valley Voice, I can be contacted directly.



A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "Isles of Scilly"

It has long been a mystery to historians how the St Marys Pass received the name St Marys way back in 1842. We know the township nearby, although originally named Armagh, adopted the name St Marys because it was continually referred to as "Near St Marys Pass". But "St Marys" appears to have no connection whatsoever to the area, or its early inhabitants.

Most towns, mountains, rivers, bays, roads etc. which were named in Van Diemens Land were after high ranking aristocrats from the homelands, or in Able Tasman's case he gave his ship's names, Heemskerck and Zeehaen, to the first two mountain peaks he saw after crossing the Southern Ocean in 1642.



The French, too, were dominant in naming many early land marks, in particular Baudin in 1802 who named hundreds of locations around Australia, some 240 of which still hold the names today. But as with Tasman, Furneaux, Baudin and other early explorers and settlers, the names they gave all have a source.

One theory going around was James Grant of "Tullochgorum", the main instigator to lobby Lieutenant-Colonel Snodgrass, the Lieutenant-Governor at the time, to allocate a convict contingent to build the Pass, had a family member named Mary. If that was the case, where did the "Saint" come from?

Another theory, and the one I like the best, is it was named after the Island of St Marys which is the largest island in the Isles of Scilly. These islands are situated just off the coast of Cornwall in the British Isles and would have been the last English land mark many of the ships leaving ports in the Thames River, or Dover, Plymouth and Liverpool would have seen before their long journey to the other side of the world.

St Marys Island, however, is a vastly different place than the St Marys we know. But like our St Marys it has a natural untouched beauty where people can live and visit in a tranquil peace rarely found on their respective mainlands.

On the front cover of the St Marys Island tourist brochure it reads: "Escape to a place nature cannot hide. To a wild archipelago that basks in a mild climate. To a place where the views flicker from sunshine glinting on the vast canvas of the Atlantic, to eerie fog and dramatic storm clouds thundering across the sea. To a place where ships have floundered on

granite reefs, lashed by ocean swells. To a place where the rugged coast is punctuated by soft pearly beaches. It is a place that lies just 28 miles off the western toe of Cornwall."

With a few geographical changes, this description could well describe Tasmania.

St Marys Island on the other hand is much smaller. It is only 1,554 acres in size and today has a permanent population of around 1,590. The main hub of the island has air and sea links to the mainland, a cluster of shops, restaurants, arts and crafts galleries, banks, three churches, a museum, bike hire, golf course, water sports and a range of accommodation from classic hotels to B&Bs and campsites.

The history of the Scilly Islands can be traced back to around 384 AD when Emperor Maxinus exiled two Spanish bishops, Tiberianus and Inatantius, to the islands for heresy.

Christianity flourished on the islands after that and they became home to Abbots and Monks, who built tombs and churches. Many ruins of these ancient buildings can still be found scattered around the islands. The most significant ancient landmark is the ruins of the Castle of Ennor, built in 1244 and taken over by the Duchy of Cornwall in 1337.

Whether St Marys in the Isles of Scilly has any connection to our St Marys is hypothetical, but with prominent citizens on the island with the name Legg and place names like St Helens, Falmouth and Cornwall nearby, one can only wonder.

Whatever the case, however, it sounds good to me that our early pioneers would name our Pass after such a beautiful part of their homeland.

Consultants could be commissioned to develop Strategies, Partnerships, Vision Statements and Plans, logos and signage to market the new area brands, and build new Visitor Information facilities.



In our last article I made the mistake of saying that a chair was part of our raffle.



ST MARYS WORLD WAR TWO VICTORY BALL Article taken from the Examiner Newspaper 23rd March 1946

F. Salter, Mr and Mrs G. H. Napier, Mr and Mrs H. L. Swift and Mr and Mrs N. T. Dawson. The debutantes were presented Mrs J. D. McGeachie.

A flower girl, Barbara Wardlaw, daintily frocked in pale blue organdie, presented a bouquet of red gladioli and autumn leaves to Mrs Cosgrove, who was wearing a smartly cut frock of black. Mrs McGeachie's petunia crepe frock was finished at the square neckline and sleeves with gold brocade, and she carried a bouquet of pink gladioli and autumn leaves. Mrs C. F. Salter wore black georgette with lace sleeves and panels in the skirt, and Mrs Napier also wore black. Her crepe frock was trimmed with gold and silver beading on the square neckline. Mrs Swift's frock was floral satin in red, green and black toning and Mrs N. Dawson topped her slim-fitting black skirt with a white satin jacket.

The white frocked debutantes presented a graceful picture as they entered the hall. They were: Colleen Elliot, Hilda Fitzgerald, Betty Causby, Norma Brough, Betty Gray, Dawn and Dorothy Bushing, Joyce Bomford, Nita Peters, Shirley Lohrey, Betty Hayes and Edith Cooke. Strange weather patterns.

Another hailstorm of significance recently occurred. The Mt Elephant area seems to have its own unique weather pattern, and influences weather conditions in the region—hailstorms, firestorms, floods etc.

Many people are still unaware of the hailstorms and the damage and danger they incurred.

On Saturday 31st January, shortly before 6pm, an unexpected severe hailstorm occurred in the Gray, Mt Elephant and Little Beach areas.

It began with a thunderstorm that caused several dry lightening strikes in surrounding areas. The hailstorm was of 5 to 20 minutes duration (depending on location).

While the average hailstones were of golf ball size, there were stones of tennis ball size. Ground cover was about 10cm deep, with ½ metre drifts remaining for several days. It was deposited in a narrow strip about 3 kms wide and covered approximately 30 sq/kms.

The hailstorm was accompanied by winds estimated at 179 to 250 kms/hr, which uprooted or smashed about 20 large trees near Mt Elephant road only 150 meters from homes.

Insurance companies made payouts of thousands of dollars for the reroofing of homes, repairing of sheds, replacing broken windows and repairs to damaged vehicles and cars and caravans that were declared write-offs.

Many residents are still experiencing the long-term damage sustained to gardens and businesses.

The large deposits of fine fuel litter in the region remains a grave concern (it will still be there for this summer's bushfire season.

On Monday the 8th of June, and unexpected hailstorm occurred late in the afternoon in the vicinity of St Marys Pass/ Falmouth. It appears to have fallen in a narrow strip 200 to 300 metres wide. While hailstones were only pea size, roads were considered dangerous for about 2 hours.

One significant car accident occurred, and at least 3 other cars skidded off the icy roads. This hailstorm was preceded by a thunderstorm.

A report on the January hailstorm was compiled, and copies provided to people in positions of authority etc. Consequently, people in government, emergency services and the weather bureau etc. expressed interest.

Perhaps the Mt Elephant region could become a significant place for studying unusual and extreme weather patterns and weather conditions.

Maybe this area is a "key" to help in the better understanding of possible climate change.



Police Report

A report has been taken involving destroy property, at a house in St Marys. Persons unknown have smashed two windows to the house which is used by the owners as a weekender; it is not known whether entry was gained to the house. Any information about this matter can be given to the station

or through crime stoppers.

Of concern to police is the number of persons detected on the radar for traveling through the Valley at high speeds. Vehicles have been checked at 128, 133, 140 and 154km/h in 100km/hr zone. There has also been speeds of up to 80km/hr in a 50km/hr zone. The irresponsibility shown by these drivers should be of great concern to all road users. The potential of fatal and serious accidents involving high speeds is greatly increased. Be assured any person found doing these speeds have been given infringement notices, including automatic disqualification of their license.

There are also a number of local residents who have lost their license through court disqualification. Over the last two months a number of these drivers have been found driving on the road. Each offender has been arrested and will appear in court. Statistical analysis from DIER show that suspended and disqualified drivers are grossly over represented in the number of serious and fatal crashed.

Driving is a privilege not a right. The majority of licensed road users drive in a sensible manner and should not have to contend with those who disregard the law and court orders.

We urge all drivers to exercise caution especially during winter months. All drivers should drive to the road conditions not necessarily the road speed limits.

This weekend also sees the running of the Annual Winter Solstice at St Marys. We would like all patrons to enjoy themselves however we would urge caution to road users driving in the area due to the expected large volume of pedestrian movements.







Council Watch

The following motion was moved at the Break O'Day Council Meeting of 9th June by Cllr David Clement, seconded by Cllr Raoul Harper

- "I a discount be applied to the appropriate site fee applicable to lawn cemeteries, graveyard land, columbarium walls and rose gardens within the municipality specified in Council's Schedule of Fees and Charges current at the time of application for a site for a deceased person, such discount to be based on the number of completed years of permanent residence in the municipality of the deceased at the time of death, at the rate of 5% per year of residence to a maximum of 100% after 20 years residence, with proof of permanent residence provided by a Statutory Declaration by the next of kin or an executor accompanied by a single piece of appropriate documentary evidence.
- 2 In the case of a reserved site, a refund be made to the estate of the deceased on application in accordance with 1 above."

Submission in support of motion

- 1 The motion refers to site fees only, and not to Grave digging charges.
- 2 The proposal is for a progressive discount over 20 years permanent residence, to avoid opposition to the proposal based on a view that a policy based on a simple reduction in fees irrespective of time of residence would be ridiculed as "Come to Break O'Day and Die".
- 3 The discounted site fee is a recognition of the contribution to the community by the deceased as a resident and member of the community over a period of time
- 4 The amount involved is minimal, and is income foregone on a shared basis by the community as a whole as a mark of respect for the deceased and compassion for the family of the deceased, and a recognition of "send not to ask for whom the bell tolls, it tolls for thee".
- 5 The discount is a symbolic gesture that the community wishes to provide a resting place for the deceased within the community without seeking to maximise a financial contribution from the deceased even unto death.
- 6 Cemeteries should be maintained by the community as a whole rather than on a user pays basis, as they represent the history of the community, the commemoration of the people who have lived in the community and contributed to its development and activities over their lifetimes.

The motion was moved, seconded and immediately rejected 6 -2, without any discussion. There was no declaration of pecuniary interest by any Councillor owning a cemetery.



Copy of letter to the Editor which appeared in the Central Coast Courier, June 4th 2009. (as referred to by Lynne Dawes in her letter this issue.)

Most readers of the Central Coast Courier will be aware that the Glamorgan Spring Bay Council passed a recommendation to request the Minister for Local Government to instruct the Local Government Board to investigate a potential merger with the Break O'Day Council.

The process that the Local Government Board must follow is set out in the Constitution Act (1934) The following is a summary of the relevant sections of that Act. Potential Scope of Local Government Board Review.

- The act states no municipal area is to be altered without the recommendation of the Local Government Board.
- The local Government Board is an independent board which may determine how it carries out a review, it develops its own guidelines.
- Matters, that may be considered by the Board in its review include:

Potential benefits (generally) of a voluntary merger. Merits of a specific council merger proposal

Adequacy of community representation in a merged Council.

Staff and transitional arrangements for a voluntary Merger

Other impacts.

- The Board is to provide reasonable opportunity for public consultation. The Board is required to publish, in a daily newspaper, a statement specifying that a review is to be carried out and to invite submissions in relation to the matter under review.
- Board hearings are generally open to the public.

Local Government Board Review Process

The Board review is initiated by the Minister for Local Government.

The Board carries out its review.

The Board determines whether the merger is in the interests of the affected communities and submits a written report (including recommendations) to the Minister.

The Minister provides the report to affected councils, inviting them to make submissions on any matter covered by the report.

The Minister is required to consider the council's submission and either:

accept any or all of the Board's recommendations reject any or all of the Board's recommendations request the Board to reconsider ant or all of its recommendations.

refer to the Board any alterations to its report requested by a council.

The Minister then decides whether to proceed with the recommendation/s.

A decision to proceed with the merger proposal requires the Minister to make a recommendation to the Governor. If the Minister has rejected a Board recommendation, he cannot make a recommendation to the Governor on that matter.

The Governor, acting on the recommendation of the Minister, may, create or abolish a council, alter and define the boundaries of a municipal area, combine 2 or more municipal areas to form one municipal area, name or change the name of a municipal area.

For any of the above to occur, there must first be a positive recommendation for a merger from the Board. Put simply, the outcome of this review has the potential to be the biggest change to our municipal area since the 1993 amalgamation. It will affect you, but you do have a voice, so whatever your view, when the Board advertises for contributions, please attend the public hearings and/ or put in a submission.

Copy of letter to the Editor which appeared in the Central Coast Courier, June 4th 2009. (as referred to by Lynne Dawes in her letter this issue.)

I have huge concerns about water and sewer rates to be raised by the new Bulk Water Authorities, and Council's abilities to increase rates for 09/10 year.

First the pain about to be inflected onto the residents and ratepayers of Glamorgan Spring Bay have not been fully explained.

Over and above rate increases announced by Council Management and supported by Councillors, together with the increased water and sewer charges to be imposed by the new Bulk Water and Sewer Authority have not had any explanation of the costs (Nodal) accepted by Councillors Fama, Parker, Bacon, Cadart, Johnson and Whitton while being rejected by Councillors Arnol, Crawford and Stanley of the \$8.5 million debt agreed by the above Councillors, unless the State Government has accepted this charge.

This community of approximately 4500 have been inflicted with an "estimated \$8.5million" Nodal for Swansea Water dam and filtration—not a grant. This deal has been arranged between Councillors, Treasury and Hobart Water to borrow money for an Authority which did not exist at that time, and the repayment costs are then to be isolated to Glamorgan Spring Bay Ratepayers and residents over future years, although the infrastructure will be owned and operated by the new Authority!

This borrowing is far higher than a Council is allowed by Government, although by borrowing to, or through another Authority has been allowed.

The Councillors voting for this huge debt have taken Council from a credit position, to the largest debt EVER, in the history of this Council.

I question if Council has made Ratepayers and Residents of the Glamorgan Spring bay aware of this impost over and above of any increase to Council rates and over and above the increases to Water and Sewer charges for many years to come?

Remembering the infrastructure will be owned by the new Authority debt free, while the \$8.5 million debt is being paid for by Residents and Ratepayers of Glamorgan Spring Bay for years to come.

Over and above the financial debacle above, Councillors Cadart, Bacon, Johnson, Fama, and Whitton have voted without any consultation with the ratepayers or residents to hold amalgamation discussions with the Break O'Day Council and State Government.

Are we as a Community being communicated with, or DICTATED to??







