

#### A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "Scamander Copper"

When we look back over the mining history of the Fingal Valley and East Coast of Tasmania, minerals like gold, tin, wolfram and coal are all well documented. But how many people know that a couple of small copper operations have taken place in the Scamander area, the first of which, at Upper Scamander, can be traced back to the 1890s. Later, another small claim was worked near the River, just a few hundred metres up from the barway.

Evidence of these operations is sparse these days and in most cases only a few mounds of dirt remain as proof to the hard work the men would have endured to earn a pound. There are a couple of places, however, at what is known as Pyramid Hill on Eastern Creek Road, Upper Scamander, where a number of shafts and tunnels can still be found. Most of the shafts have fallen in and the tunnels have been blocked off, but one tunnel, which must be over a hundred years old, is still in almost perfect condition.




The entrance to the old copper mine on Pyramid Hill, Upper Scamander.

Armed with a couple of torches, Bob Oates and I visited this tunnel a while back and after weaving our way through the cobwebs, entered what can only be described as an amazing feat of workmanship by men with no more than a pick and shovel. They had followed the load of copper through sheer rock to make a perfect oval tunnel that has stood the test of

time with just a stone or two coming loose here and there.

After a thorough inspection of the tunnel, Bob and I were so fascinated we decided to do more research and our next step was a visit to Claude Parker at Scamander whom, it appears, was the last man to work in extracting copper from the area back in the 1960s. Claude's mine was further down the hill on Eastern Creek Road and a larger, more modern operation than the mine we explored.

Claude told us how they cemented the tunnel entrance and filled the mine with water and then drained it out into settling ponds littered with tin cans. The idea was the water would bring the copper with it and attach itself to the tin cans. Apparently, the copper eats the cans away and leaves a copper residue that settles at the bottom of the ponds. Quite a bit of money was spent on the operation, but Claude reckons the owners would have




The old settling ponds on Eastern Creek Road, Upper Scamander, which were used to extract copper in the 1960s.

been lucky to make much out of it.

One of their big drawbacks was the copper had to be transported to Queenstown on the other side of the State to be smelted. This would be a major factor why a number of companies, including Aberfoyle, who have done some exploratory work in the Pyramid Hill area, would have concluded that the amount of minerals found inadequate to make the operation viable.

Transport was also a huge problem for the early miners. It is said that they carried the copper down the Scamander River by barge, loaded it on to a bullock drawn cart and hauled it all way to the smelter at Queenstown.

No wonder, then, that the copper mining operations of Scamander have been short lived. But when you explore these old mine sites, one can only wonder at the skills of the old hands and the hard work they had to endure to make a living.

#### Letters to the Editor

Editor.

I refer to the anonymous writer (Voice October 8) who was concerned that "on the few times that I have parked on the southern side (of Main Street) I have nearly been smashed into...I have also witnessed two smashes and many near misses". The writer appears to be a disturbing influence on drivers, and should possibly always park on the north side of the road to minimize his stress levels. However, he has attested to witnessing two "smashes", so ,after reading his letter , I fulfilled my Councillor Code of Conduct which requires me "to adequately research issues", and asked Tasmania Police as follows:

"Could you please advise me of the number of accidents reported over the past 5 years occurring on the south side of Main Street St Marys between the junction with Story Street and Cameron St, as a result of collision between cars reversing back into the Main Street, with a passing vehicle, and of that number how many involved personal injury.

The reply from Tasmania Police confirms that over the past 5 years there have indeed been two accidents reported at that location, but none, none, involving and passing reversing vehicles

I have perused the last 5 years of available accident data. One accident was reported on 25/11/05, but the vehicle was not reversing at the time, an on-coming car collided with the rear of the parked vehicle. There is only one reported 'reversing' accident, (23/7/07).

A vehicle was reversing from the angle parking and collided with a vehicle parked on the opposite side of the road. Over the past 5 years, there are NO accidents reported where vehicles were reversing out and collided with passing vehicles. Both reported accidents were with parked vehicles, and there were no personal injuries in either event.

I believe the 2005 incident involved a driver who fell asleep at the wheel, while the 2007 event would have been equally possible in a parallel parked situation. There is always danger when a parked vehicle moves out into the traffic lane, whether from an angle or parallel parked position. The above evidence seems to indicate that drivers take into account the circumstances involved and exercise the appropriate degree of care - in other words, we know the risk and are that much more careful when reversing out.

Near misses and might-have-beens are inherent in any moving vehicle situation, and minor pings anywhere are not usually reported to the Police.

However, there has not been a single reported accident in 5 years due to reverse angle parking at St Marys, reverse angle parking is legal, the community asked for angle parking to be introduced in the early 1980s, the community on 4 occasions during 2008 was consulted and overwhelmingly indicated that it wished to retain angle parking on the south side of the road, drivers who are concerned have a choice- they may park on the other side of the road or in the Hall car park or further down the road, and DIER have been requested to further increase the reversing buffer zone by moving the centre line a metre or so to the north.

Should at some future time particular circumstances arise which would justify a change to parallel parking, the 10 Year Reference Plan for the Main Streets of St Marys adopted By Council in October 2008 allows for this.

In the meantime the priority is for DIER to approve the recommended projects submitted to it- the outstands at the pub intersection, the footpath opposite the Library and the footpath works outside the Supermarket.



#### Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

The Break O'Day and Glamorgan Spring Bay Councils when initiating a Local Government Board review of the potential consequences of an amalgamation of the two Councils both stipulated "This process must include extensive community consultation".

This has not occurred. Electors are in the dark as to why this matter has arisen, what are the benefits to them, how they can get answers, and how can they make their views known to their Councillors.

Less than 30 written submissions were made to the Board (over 80% opposed to an amalgamation), only one verbal submission was made at the Public Meeting at St Helens, meetings were held for short periods during the day when working electors could not attend, and the General Manager of the Break O'Day writes in the current Council Newsletter "this suggests that the Councils involved and the Local Government Branch have failed to adequately publicise the consultation phase of the review, or community members are not that interested".

The minutes of the Glamorgan Spring Bay Council show that this matter was initiated by the Mayor of the Break O' Day Council, and the Hansard of the House of Assembly shows that it was welcomed by The Minister for Local Government, who hailed Cllrs Legge and Cadart as visionaries.

As part of the extensive community consultation process, the same Minister has postponed elections for Councillors in the Break O'Day and Glamorgan municipalities until a decision is made on amalgamation: he believes it would be inappropriate for it to be an election issue! A submission by Robert Legge to the Board, posted on the Board's website as a public document states his belief in an amalgamation, that it can provide what the existing Councils cannot provide "the opportunity exists to prove that a properly run organization can produce the benefits over a large area that the community require", while apparently indicating a belief that there is no need for further consultation: "I am of the opinion that a practical outlook with a timely outcome for this venture can be achieved fairly quickly rather than a laborious navel searching exercise with unnecessary time being wasted on trivial matters and what if scenarios that only delay the same end result" (my emphasis)

Electors have believed that the review process by the Board was intended to provide a report that would be the subject of the extensive community consultation process on the issues raised by the report- the report was understood to be the <u>end of the review process</u> and the <u>start of the consultation process</u>.


But Mayor Legge refused to accept a Notice of Motion submitted by me for the Council meeting on 12<sup>th</sup> October, a motion to request the Minister to release the report of the Board to electors and for Council to establish a public extensive consultation process to allow electors to consider the matters raised in that report and advise their elected representative of their informed views, before they made a decision. Councillors do not have a mandate to dissolve this municipality without the electors having every opportunity to take part in an informed decision making process.

The Mayor refused to accept the motion, claiming it was illegal; illegal to make a request to a Minister to make a report available to the electors, illegal to establish a consultation process between a Council and its electors?

The issue is simple-there are 8 elected Councillors, your elected representatives- they are the ones who will vote whether to advise the Minister to proceed to an amalgamation or will vote not to proceed. Their contact details are available on Council's website (www.bodc.tas.gov.au) or by ringing the Council (6376 7900).

If you don't care one way or another, forget about it. If you care, if you believe that amalgamation would benefit you, or you don't think that an amalgamation would be in your interests or the best interests of the community, don't leave it to me, don't sit there whining about how awful the Council is, or how it looks like a done deal, speak up, and say what you think to your elected representatives- be a part of the process, make a difference, demand an extensive community consultation process before Council makes a decision on your behalf, don't just moan after the decision is made without your input- it is your Council area!

# Community set to ride for '350' on international day of climate action

The people of St Helens and districts can ride bicycles to the wharf area at St Helens at 2.00 PM on Saturday October 24 to show their concern for climate change and carbon levels in the atmosphere.

The gathering is part of the largest global day of climate action ever — one of more than 2,000 rallies expected in more than 140 nations.

The international day of action is being coordinated by '350.org' to urge world leaders to take fast and effective action on global warming. This is the first global campaign ever organised around a scientific data point: 350 parts per million of CO2 — the safe upper limit for the world's atmosphere according to the latest scientific data.

The St Helens 350 event was initiated by local artist Robert Barnes. Robert says that by participating, mums and dads can show how much they care for their children's future and kids can let their parents know they understand the world's biggest problem. Seniors have a chance to let everyone see something can be done about the problem and teenagers can make a commitment to keep the planet alive.

350 is the number that leading scientists say is the safe upper limit for carbon dioxide—measured in "parts per million" (ppm) in our atmosphere. Current levels are already at 390 ppm. But if we put a high enough price on carbon that we stop using so much, while also ensuring poor countries have fair opportunity to develop, we will be able to reverse course, develop a clean and equitable energy economy and prevent serious long-term damage to the planet.

In a matter of weeks from now governments will be convening in Copenhagen, Denmark, for the United Nations Climate Change Conference, in order to create a new climate treaty. The international Day of Climate Action on October 24th will influence the treaty before negotiating positions solidify.

Simply get on your bike and ride as far as you like around or into St Helens on whatever route you choose. This is a self-managed event for all ages and cycling abilities. People can participate simply by ending their bike ride at the Wharf area at St Helens at 2.00 PM for a group photo for the 350.org event website. (You don't even have to ride a bike there to be part of the action.)

Take a family ride on the pathway around Georges Bay, meet friends for a café lunch beforehand or just drop by from home or while hanging out in St Helens. Fit riders could ride from Binalong Bay, Priory, Scamander or even St Marys to show the long haul to '350' can be done.

Bicyclists are asked to be safe. Make sure you and your bike are fit for your ride, wear a helmet, be visible and courteous and follow the road rules.

Participants are encouraged to spread the word by letting everyone know what you are doing and why and by wearing bright clothes and displaying '350' on the day.

Simultaneously, people in every corner of the world will be taking similar action, from climbers with 350 banners high on the melting slopes of Mount Everest to government officials in the Maldive Islands holding an underwater cabinet meeting to demand action on climate change before their nation disappears.

WHEN: Saturday October 24, 2009, ending with a gathering of bicycles at 2 in the afternoon.

WHERE: St Helens wharf and marina, Georges Bay Esplanade, St Helens.

ABOUT: 350.ORG

Founded by author and environmentalist Bill McKibben, 350.org is a major grassroots global campaign against climate change. Its supporters include leading scientists, the governments of 89 countries, and a huge variety of environmental, health, development and religious NGOs. All agree that current atmospheric levels of CO2 — 390 parts per million — are causing damage to the planet and to its most vulnerable people, and that governments must act at the Copenhagen climate conference to bring the earth's carbon level swiftly down.

#### St Marys Police Report

Daylight saving is now with us and recently some decent spells of warmer weather has been appreciated, especially those of us that live in the Valley! With the longer twilight hours more people are out and about enjoying the extra daylight, so take care on the roads, be thoughtful of your neighbour and have a good time, but not to the detriment of others.

#### TRAFFIC REPORT

In previous editions of The Valley & East Coast Voice there have been readers queries concerning the wearing of seat belts and the reversing situation in the Main Street of St Mays.

To clarify the seat belt query I have provided an extract from the Road Rules as follows:

#### 264. Wearing of seatbelts by drivers

(1) The driver of a motor vehicle that is moving, or is stationary but not parked, must comply with this rule if the driver's seating position is fitted with a seatbelt.

Penalty: Fine not exceeding 10 penalty units.

Note: Driver is defined in rule 16, and motor vehicle and park are defined in the dictionary.

- (2) The driver must wear the seatbelt properly adjusted and fastened unless the driver is -
- (a) reversing the vehicle; or
- (b) exempt from wearing a seatbelt under <u>rule 267</u>.

Note: Rule 267 provides exemptions from wearing seatbelts.

With regard to the reversing, the onus is on the driver to ensure that any reversing manoeuvre is performed with due care, is not over an excessive distance and does not interrupt the normal flow of traffic. If the manoeuvre involves crossing the centre line on the roadway, the line markings should be such that allow the vehicle to cross (i.e. if the line on your side is a solid one you cannot cross it.)






# WEW GENERALISON







Anyway, until next time, good hitting and rolling.




#### Here is an actual sign, posted at a golf club in Scotland.
