


Melbourne Cup Luncheon



# A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "Railway"

Seeing the photo of Neil Capill walking along the old St Marys-Fingal Rail Track in the last issue of the Valley Voice shows that nature has almost taken over and covered up what was once the life line to St Marys.

For around a hundred years almost everything that came in or out of the Fingal Valley was carried by rail. Indeed, it was the building of the Conara-St Marys railway, or Fingal Line as it became known, in the 1880s that sparked the development of the coal industry and made other industries like dairy and timber competitive enough to compete on the national markets.

What a wonderful day our ancestors would have had on the 29<sup>th</sup> June 1886 when the first train loaded with dignitaries, huffed and puffed its way into the newly built St Marys Station. Finally, St Marys was on the map and no



longer an isolated backdrop. To top it off, the newly elected Honourable Premier, Doctor James Wilson Agnew, and most of his Parliamentary Ministers were on board. They had left Hobart early that morning, arriving just in time for the civic reception put on in honour of this auspicious occasion.

The VIP's stay was short lived however, after a few speeches and a bite to eat, they were back on the train heading back to the city, but they had left a lot of smiling faces behind. The people of the Break O'Day Plains now had much closer contact with the outside world which would bring a newfound way of life and economic development opportunities not seen before.

There are few people left in St Marys today who would remember the streams trains or the "camel car" that carried passengers to Launceston every day, with a shopping special every second Thursday.


How many remember 1954? The "camel car" was loaded with school children from St Marys to Conara and taken to Launceston, then on to York Park to join thousands of other Northern Tasmanian children to see Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Phillip do a lap of the oval, standing in the back of an open Land Rover.

How many are left who went off to High School in Launceston and travelled in on the train? They would head off on a special Sunday evening train and returned home on Friday night. There would be even less who could remember when the train brought the circus to town, complete with elephants and lions.

One can only sit and wonder why we all stood back and allowed the Government of the day to dismantle this significant piece of our heritage in the 1980s. What a wonderful tourist asset it would be if we had one of the old restored steam engines huffing, puffing and whistling its way up and down the valley today. It could be complete with carriages and, perhaps, a wooden "C" wagon loaded with coal as a show piece.

A few years back Bob Hersey led a committee who conducted a feasibility study into the rebuilding of the St Marys-Fingal rail line as a tourist attraction. But with years of deterioration, coupled with the removal of bridges, including a large section of the main bridge over the Break O'Day River at Frodsley, the project ran into millions of dollars and it was eventually deemed unviable.

The current proposal put forward by St Marys Association for Community Development Inc to develop the old rail line into a recreational trail, however, would be much less cost effective. Although it would not bring the steam engines back, it would preserve the heritage of this important link to our past and add a valuable asset to the community.



Every State in Australia, through the Rail Trails Program, has developed old railway lines into walking, cycling and horse riding trails. In Tasmania, it appears, most of the Government monies spent on these projects has been in the more populated centres and it's high time some of that money was channelled into the country regions.

We may never again hear the sounds of the steam trains as they shunt the coal wagons at Jubilee, Cullenswood and Mt Nicholas Sidelings, or see their smoke bellowing though the Valley.

But let's hope there is a chance that the land on which they travelled can be restored in some form and the vital role rail played in our history will not be forgotten.

A big thank you to the St Marys fire brigade for saving the house. And Derrick Singline, St Marys Police, for his ongoing investigation.



# Letter to the Editor

The Editor Valley and East Coast Voice Dear Editor,

The proposed amalgamation of the Break O'Day and Glamorgan-Spring Bay Municipalities is dead in the water. "It doesn't make sense-it will not make the East Coast of Tasmania better off, and the residents will not get a better deal by merging", stated the Mayor of Glamorgan-Spring Bay in the Examiner (Oct 31) when commenting on the local Government Board report recommending against the proposal.

The Minister for Local Government announced that "The findings (of the Local Government Board) were that these two Councils were not ideally suited (for amalgamation)", but that the exercise had been valuable as "it would give a set of guidelines for future mergers".

Despite the decision, the Examiner stated the next day (Nov 1) "Break O'Day Mayor Robert Legge said in a submission to the Board "that the two Councils had a 95 percent compatibility rate,"

Among the most vocal opponents of the proposal to amalgamate were the residents of Mathinna, echoing a widespread belief of residents in smaller towns of the BOD, particularly those far distant from the Council Offices, that they get a raw deal in terms of services and infrastructure. This belief is supported by the Council Submission to the local Government Board in a review of its operations in 2005 "There are a number of smaller communities such as Weldborough and Pyengana which receive minimum services from Council".

In 2009, supporting the proposed amalgamation, the submission by Robert Legge stated "the opportunity exists to prove that a properly run organization can produce the benefits over a large area that the community require".

Unfortunately he was unable to provide evidence that this has been the case in the Break O'Day under his leadership; as an example of how the smaller outlying towns would benefit under amalgamation, he ignored Mathinna, Weldborough, Pyengana, Ansons Bay, Four Mile Creek, Lottah, and other nether regions of his own municipality and stated "the towns that will benefit more will be the towns on the fringe eg opportunities will open up for Bicheno, this will probably be through a sense of wellbeing as they will not be known as a fringe town anymore".

Using the amalgamation of the Fingal and Portland Councils into the Break O'Day Council in 1993 as a measure of the success of amalgamation his submission further stated that the areas have "socially adjusted", and "there is some evidence that people in the Fingal Valley shop in St Helens".

Thank heaven we are not going to be amalgamated, otherwise I would have to shop in Swansea. We can now get down to providing a fair distribution of resources to our own fringe towns, if the gang of 6 address the facts and stop shooting the messenger.

# FOOTBALL CLUB NEWS

As the posters placed around town indicate, because of a number of unforseen issues raised by the Break O'Day Council, we have had to cancel the scratch match scheduled for 6 November. This is a great shame because this match was looming as one of the most popular community events for some time. Actually "cancel" is a little harsh; "postpone" is probably a more appropriate description.

It needs to be said, however, that at no time has Council been unreasonable, they are simply exercising their duty of care in relation to the people using Council facilities and preserving the rights of groups that have formally entered into arrangements with Council over the use of the football ground and clubrooms. Similarly the Football Club has a duty of care to ensure that all participants and spectators at Football Club events are adequately protected.

Furthermore, as sad as it might sound, when the Football Club folded in 2002 it effectively relinquished any rights "the Club" had in relation to access to and use of, the football ground and clubrooms.

We will be meeting with Council shortly and it may well be the case that these matters have largely been resolved by the time this issue of the Valley Voice is out. The Club will attempt to formalise arrangements with Council in relation to future use of and access to the football ground and clubrooms and we are already negotiating adequate insurance cover.

This whole episode is a further reminder that the new entity that is the St Marys Tigers Football Club is starting "from scratch" and that we can't afford to take anything for granted.

We are extremely confident that we will be able to stage a vibrant spring/summer football competition with a small proviso that we may be required to seek perhaps a gold coin donation from spectators to cover upfront insurance costs. We know that the players are as keen as mustard and will put on a good show!

From all reports Sunday was very busy with local support, plus lots of tourists.


The opening of the fudge shop means the end of the St Marys Yoga room which has held classes since the fire at Todds Hall.

# Pyramid Hill. Bob Oates (Story and photos)

Further to Jim Haas article on the Pyramid Hill mine. I thought that some of your readers who don't like spiders, twin engined mosquitoes, tiger snakes and falling rocks, might like to see some pictures of the inside of the old mine.

As Jim observed, the mine is a real work of art being drilled through hard rock for about 50metres where it takes a 20 degree turn to the right and then runs for another 50 meters to a dead end.

For those who like the colour black you can go to the end, turn out the torch and see the blackest black imaginable. The copper ore body seen in the walls and roof is a real copper colour, funnily enough.

# The Say Cagerattler

I understand that the Local Government Board has recommended that there be no Council merger at this time, in a report just completed.

Someone accused me the other day of being against such a merger. Believe it or not this wasn't necessarily the case. I just wanted the facts about why we should or shouldn't merge, made available to all those interested in the outcome and allowing extensive consultation as part of the process, which I felt couldn't happen without open public meetings. None of us can afford to have change just for changes sake.

More recently someone else with fairly extensive knowledge of Council/Local Government operations suggested that perhaps a resource sharing arrangement with other councils might be a practical way to help with efficiency gains into the future. Who knows?

This then leads to the much bigger question which will one day inevitably come. It seems that State Government talks often about further reducing councils and may even force mergers one day like that occurred some time back. Our own experience was the joining of Fingal and Portland. This process was part of the reduction from 45 or so Councils to 29, if memory serves me correctly. Quite a few of us to this day probably still wonder if we have gained a great deal with the forming of Break O'Day.

As has obviously just been revealed, there would need to be overwhelming evidence to suggest that a merger anywhere within the State was really needed for it to take place, and I trust that the main player in such decisions would be the Local Government Board and most importantly the actual ratepayers in which the outcomes directly affect.

Perhaps one of the first things our Local Government Minister needs to initiate is a good old tidy up of how the system works and meaningful consultation across the board might be a great place to start. I expect conferences already take place but as mentioned before, maybe a red hot go of resource sharing arrangements might be worth a try under the Ministers overseeing before there is ever real need to carry out radical surgery because quite often wholesale changes don't necessarily achieve a whole lot.

What do you think?






Thank you to **Wendy Fowler** for her interesting and enlightening talk on the history of **Coogans Furniture**.

Although, like many in our club I have always admired the workmanship produced by this iconic company it was interesting to learn about its founder and how it all started.

William Coogan founded his firm in 1876 in Launceston, with the production of a single upholstered armchair and then went on to build the largest furniture factory in Australia, exporting to the mainland states and selling direct to the consumer through his many retails stores.

Coogans had factories in Forster and Frank Street, Invermay, Collins and Elizabeth Street Hobart, Brisbane Street Launceston, and Wilson Street Burnie.

William Coogan put his furniture within the reach of all, with his "Purchase Plan" which was an innovative idea for the period.



Furniture was labelled at the back with a number which identified whose workmanship was responsible for that particular piece. Therefore, any faults could be directed back to the artisan responsible. If only we had that simple system today. Unfortunately, mass production has overtaken in some cases and this is why we strive at the Woodcraft Guild to keep these old techniques alive to pass onto the next generation, how furniture was once made assiduously and with pride.

Lastly, all the animal lovers from the Guild hope that time will heal the pain **Karl** and **Robina** are feeling at present on the loss of their furry mate and much loved companion "Shiva".

The Guild meets on the last Saturday of the month at the Old Railway Goods Shed at 2.00 pm.

In case you have not heard the Minister has decided that the possible merger between the Break O'Day and Glamorgan Spring Bay councils "is not in the best interest".

I find this outcome very satisfying, and all the time spent by myself and Clir Clement justified in taking this issue to the community at large. This forced the issue into the public domain and allowed some public debate.

Cllr Johns moved a motion seeking information from the State agencies on what preventative measures they have planned for the management of fire breaks.

Cllr Clement moved that the standing orders be set aside and this matter be treated as urgent. This was successful.

Passed unanimously

Cllr Johns moved a motion that Council draft a cat management policy to manage domestic cats while allowing the humane removal of feral and stray cats.

Passed unanimously

Rate remissions were granted for the Union Church at Gould Country, the Church at Lottah Road and at a property at North Ansons Bay Road.

Rate remission for a jetty at Casurina Lane was refused.

The Community Development Officer presented the Break O'Day Youth Policy and Strategy for adoption by Council. This was passed 6 to 1 with one abstaining.

I declined to vote because I felt that the wording of the policy was more a motherhood statement and not a clear set of goals or direction. I feel that more research is needed. I fully support a well thought out achievable Youth Policy and Strategy.

Council accepted the NRM North's offer and participate with its St Helens Aerodrome land in Jock's Lagoon. Moved

Cllr Clement and seconded by Cllr Johns

NRM North has obtained Federal Funding for a Property Planning project at Jock's Lagoon. The Plan provides a sound basis for on-going sustainable management of the land and enterprises. Well done Mr Polly Buchhorn.

Council endorsed the Falmouth and Henderson Lagoon Management Plan. The issue will act as a base document for shared stewardship of the Falmouth and Henderson Lagoon by the community and other stakeholders.

Council appointed Mr Phillip Bingley as the Environmental Health Officer.

Council granted a remission of a lease payment, \$1000,00 for the financial year 2009/2010 to a property at Main Road Binalong Bay.

Council gave its support in principle to the St Marys Association for Community Development to develop and promote

recreation trails in the Fingal Valley.

Moved Cllr Johns and seconded by Cllr Clement.

The following is a report found in the Hobart

Mercury on Monday the 23rd April 1888

Saturday, 14th April was a red-letter day at Cornwall, and one which will be remembered for some time to come. The miners, after spending so much time underground, thoroughly appreciated a day's amusement.

An idea conceived of having a treat was soon brought to a reality. About 1 o'clock in the afternoon troops of children could be seen coming from all quarters of the township. Judging from the number of children present we should imagine Mr. Ross, the State School teacher, will soon require an assistant.

But to return to my subject. Tables were laid in a booth on the "flat", and fairly groaned from the weight of eatables which would satisfy the daintiest of folk. After all present had partaken of refreshments, the usual merry games, dancing and other social pastimes were indulged in. All classes and creeds mingled together in perfect harmony, a lesson others might profitably ponder over. Later on the tables were again laid for tea, to which ample justice was done.

The expenses were met by liberal subscriptions from the miners, ably assisted by the energetic manager Mr. Astley. Dames Morgan, Brough, Menear, Morgan and Simpson worked assiduously in making preparations for the treat.

The attendance was about 120 all told and about 5 o'clock the party broke up, with everyone thoroughly pleased with the day's outing. The only complaint was that the day was not long enough.



# St Marys Police Report

Since my last report Police within the St Helens Division have been kept busy with attendances at road crashes, crime scenes and reports of damage to property. Police believe some of these incidents relating to damage or minor incidents of crime have been caused by young persons who are either bored or have been left unsupervised for long periods. To the parents of these young persons I would ask the question, "Do you know what your child is doing now?"

#### CRIME REPORT

St Marys Police recently attended the scene of a house fire in St Marys where a shed and car port at the rear of a house were totally destroyed. Fortunately the owner of the property was away

staying with friends at the time and no person was injured. As the home was not insured, the cause of the fire was considered suspicious and as a result Police Forensic personnel together with the Tas Fire Service Fire Scene Investigator attended the scene. Investigations into the cause of the fire are continuing. If any person has any knowledge as to the cause of the fire or the person responsible they can contact Crimestoppers on 1800 333 000 and provide any information they may have anonymously or confidentially to the Crimestoppers operator. Any worthwhile information may result in a reward to the caller.

A report was received that four "pin poles and flags" had been removed from the greens at the northern end of the St Marys Golf Club overnight between 2-3 November. The club is run by volunteers who are hoping the flags were removed as a joke. They would appreciate the return of the flags as soon as possible otherwise the matter will be referred to police for investigation.

# TRAFFIC REPORT

Over the November long weekend police conducted a number of high visibility traffic operations on the coast and in the Fingal Valley. No drink drivers were detected, however far too many drivers were detected exceeding the speed limit, with one thoughtless driver being detected at 136km/h in a 100 zone. A number of defect notices were issued to unworthy vehicles. I remind the motoring public that police will remain vigilant in detecting offending drivers, so exercise patience, courtesy and common sense, otherwise an unexpected introduction to your local police officer will be guaranteed. Since our last report, a 20 year old Bridport driver was arrested, charged and bailed to appear in the Scottsdale Court after he was detected hooning in Story Street, St Marys. The vehicle being driven by the offender was confiscated for seven days.

#### MARINE SAFETY

Holiday periods for the Break O'Day Municipality not only brings an increase of traffic to our roads but also the increase usage of our waters. With the opening of the rock lobster season for recreational fishers starting a week later than usual there no doubt will be an influx of visitors to the east coast. If you plan on using your vessel over the period please ensure you do so responsibly and with consideration for others. You should also ensure that you are carrying the required minimum safety equipment. Random checks of vessels, including safety equipment carried will be conducted at ramps and at sea. Tasmania police can also random breath test vessel owner and operators with a 0.05 limit applying on the water just like the road. Additionally, one person on your motor boat must possess a speed boat licence and the boat is required to be registered. Please find below a list of safety equipment for your motor boat.

- All passengers in a vessel under 6m must wear an approved life jacket whilst the boat is under way
- Children under 12 in any vessel must wear an approved life jacket whilst the boat is under way
- Carry an auxiliary method of propulsion (i.e. oars or second motor)
- A fire extinguisher
- A bailing bucket
- Anchor and chain
- Flare kit (not required for smooth waters) consisting of a minimum of 2 x orange smoke flares and 2 x red flares (sheltered waters). You will also need 2 x parachute flares if you are going more than 3 nautical miles to sea.
- A marine radio if you are going more than 3 nautical miles to sea
   An EPIRB if you are going more than 3 nautical miles to sea

# Reported Crime in Tasmania Continues to Fall

Tasmania continues to be the safest state in the nation, recording a reduction in crime for the third consecutive year.

The Department of Police and Emergency Management Annual Report shows the number of offences recorded in 2008 - 09 fell by six per cent.

The Minister for Police and Emergency Management, Jim Cox, said Tasmania Police is to be congratulated for its significant achievement in crime reduction.

"Not only is reported crime continuing to trend down, following a fall of seven per cent the previous year, but the solid performance in clearance rates has been maintained at 46%," Mr Cox said,

The number of offences against the person (this includes Assaults, Sexual Assault and Robbery etc) has fallen by six per cent, consolidating a reduction from last year of seven per cent.

Mr Cox said it was reassuring for the community to note that 94% of such incidents were cleared.

Significant crime reduction has also been achieved in other areas;

- 3% decrease in burglary of motor vehicles
- 5% decrease in offences against property
- 20% decrease in fraud and similar offences
- 14% decrease in stealing (not associated with burglary)
- 9% decrease in robberies.

"These results are not achieved by chance, but through intelligence-led policing, determination and hard work," the Acting Commissioner of Police, Darren Hine, said.

"The reduction in reported crime is reflected in the high level of satisfaction with Tasmania Police," Mr Hine said.

Tasmanians continue to feel safer than in any other State or Territory in Australia. The National Survey of Community Satisfaction with Policing 2008 – 09 (Roy Morgan Research) found Tasmanians feel the safest in the nation in public places and at home, during both the day and at night.

"The work of Tasmania Police is valued by the community. Tasmanians are justified in feeling more satisfied with their Police Service than people in any other state or territory jurisdiction," Mr Cox said.

After several years of trending downwards, the number of fatal and serious injury crashes rose during the reporting year.

"This indicates that a small number of Tasmanian drivers continue to disregard traffic laws and the safety of other road users, which is of great concern to the Tasmanian community," Mr Cox said.

Tasmania Police has responded to this trend, by introducing a trial of highly visible police vehicles to patrol major arterial roads. Targeted traffic operations and deployment of road safety cameras have also focused on excessive speed, one of the main causes of fatal and serious injury crashes.

"There are encouraging signs of improvement in general driver attitudes towards speeding. The percentage of vehicles detected speeding past a road safety camera has fallen by 25% over the reporting period," Mr Hine said.

Other highlights from 2008–09 include; significant upgrading of radio communications, national recognition of the Safe at Home Program, and the establishment of a new State-based emergency call centre capability which was operational during the H1N1 influenza pandemic.

#### Housing Tasmania Rent Holiday Extended

The rent holiday for pensioners renting Housing Tasmania properties will be extended indefinitely, says the Minister for Human Services, Lin Thorp.

Ms Thorp said the Tasmanian Government had decided that it would be mean-spirited to whittle away the boost for pensioners through Housing Tasmania rent increases.

"The \$30 increase to single pensioners and \$10.14 to couples was to be quarantined for at least a 12 month period

"Today I'm pleased to announce that we will extend this rent holiday indefinitely. The effect for pensioners in Housing Tasmania properties is that the boost to their payment will go directly into their pockets taking pressure off their fortnightly budgets.

"This is a \$2 million a year commitment to pensioners renting Housing Tasmania properties. It is on top of the nearly \$40 million we contribute to subsidise Housing Tasmania rents."

Ms Thorp said the Tasmanian Government was committed to doing everything it possibly could to assist people on low incomes who are doing it tough in challenging economic times.

"We know it is not an easy initiative to administer, but have assurances that as long as the Federal Government continues to separate this pension increase out from other assessable incomes that we will pass on the savings.

"Normal CPI increases to the Commonwealth payments will still be calculated and rents adjusted accordingly.

"This means on average rents for pensioners have increased just \$1 a week five weeks after the Commonwealth increase took effect.

"The Tasmanian Government understands the challenges those doing it tough face and are the only party that has this State's people front and centre in all its decision making.

"It is the Bartlett Labor Government that has delivered this rent holiday for the almost 8000 pensioners who live in Housing Tasmania properties.

"It is not an easy decision to forego the \$2 million per annum in income to Housing Tasmania's books when we know the system is under considerable pressure but it is the right thing to do. It's the right thing to do because for too long, those on the lowest rungs of the economic ladder have struggled the most.

"They deserve this extra support and it's great that, even in tough economic times, the Bartlett Labor Government has been able to finally make it happen and provide some relief."






On Wednesday 7th October 35 students from grades 6-8 participated in a cooking competition.




the best of times so any assistance is greatly appreciated by them.
