Family Food Educators Graduate in St Marys

Benefits are already apparent as eight new Family Food Educators completed their final day of nutrition and physical activity training at St Marys District Hospital on May 11 2010.

The volunteers have participated in the 25 hour interactive Family Food PATCH course, which trains people with an interest in children's nutrition and physical activity to become peer educators in their local community.

Project Officer Emily Shepherd said, "These new Family Food Educators will become part of a wide network of approximately 200 Family Food Educators around the state who continue to receive support, resources and information on a regular basis."

Project Dietitian Kacey Rubie said, "Family Food Educators bring their own experiences, as parents or people working with children, that enrich their ability to share what they learn through this course with others."

Family Food Educator Natasha Kelder said the training "made me remember to have fun with food!"

Providing a good variety of healthy foods, enjoying active play and keeping screen time to a minimum are keys to good health for all children.

The volunteers are already making a difference by doing things such as sharing their knowledge on fruit and vegetable intake and screen time with groups of parents and changing habits within their own family environment.



A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "Half a Century of Dedication"

After reading in last edition of Valley Voice that Eric Bean is not travelling all that well, I thought it time to once again touch on the heritage of the St Marys Races and the dedication Eric has given to ensuring the biggest event on the St Marys calendar continues year after year.

Very few communities in Tasmania, or indeed Australia, could boast holding a continuous sporting event, which has not only been a huge success, but has stood the test of time. Fewer still could boast having one man who has been the driving force for half a Century.

Horse racing has been a part of our community for 124 years and Eric Bean has been secretary of the St Marys Pacing Club for the past 51 years. Along



with his committee and band of volunteers, Eric has staged an annual event in St Marys that has proven to be equal to any country race meet in Tasmania. Some 2,000 plus patrons turn up each year, not only to enjoy the races, but experience the laid back atmosphere of St Marys. As well as having a bet they meet and picnic with family and friends on this one day of the year, all making the same statement: "Where else would you want to be on New Year's Day?"

It was 1886 in a paddock halfway between Cornwall and Mt. Nicholas on the property "Woodlawn" when the first recorded horse race was held in the district. For seventeen years football and cricket were played on the southern side of the railway line, whilst the races were held on the northern side.

1903, however, saw a new track built at St Marys. It was reported to be a rough track and ran north along Gray Road to the corner of Harefield Road, then south along Harefield Road to finally join up with Gray Road again near the current Sports Centre. It was quite a job for blokes like Harold Thomas and Tom Spencer to go along and cut the ferns off the track in preparation for race day.

The 1950s saw a new flatter, smoother, one mile track built, along with a grandstand and other infrastructure, all of which has been continually improved over the years and today makes for the perfect venue for the annual meet.

Whilst today's racing is strictly a pacing event, it hasn't always been that way. Indeed, the early racing at "Woodlawn" was hack and the name was "St Marys Amateur Turf Club". But soon after the move to St Marys in 1903, trotting and steeple racing became part of the event and the name was changed to "St Marys Hack and Trotting Club". In 1960 the last gallop was held and the name changed again in 1962 to: "St Marys Trotting club". 1989 saw another change to "St Marys Pacing Club", which it has remained ever since.

The first half of the twentieth century saw horse racing in the Fingal Valley and East Coast enjoy a fair degree of popularity, with St Marys holding its traditional New Year's Day meeting, with another regular meeting in March. As well, regular meets were held at Avoca, Fingal and St Helens. But by the end of the 1950's support had dropped off and all race clubs except St Marys had folded. They too, after an unsuccessful year in 1965, had to abandon their March event.

Keeping the tradition of the New Year's Day races alive at St Marys has not always been easy for the Pacing Club. Lack of good fields, inclement weather and pressure from above are but a few problems the club has

had to face and deal with over the years. But with a hard working committee and strong leadership they have come through and provided well over a century of entertainment to many thousands of horse lovers in that time.

We can only hope that the tradition lives on and wish Eric a speedy recovery so he can continue to play a significant role in the sport he loves.

It is with great interest I read of the Tiger's roaring again on the football field. It is unfortunate that an association wasn't viable which didn't involve extensive travel but I am very interested in the fact that an AFL: Masters team will be formed.

About 13 years ago I decided I would check out the master's football here in Darwin, at that stage not affiliated with the AFL.

To say that I have enjoyed it is a large understatement. I am now a life member of the AFL NT Masters and still hold a committee members position, enjoy the training although I don't play many games.

When I joined the Masters I was 45 years of age and had not played regular football since 1978 with SMFC Tigers (a forgettable year of 3 wins only) and apart from a couple of games in London in the early 80's that is a break of nearly 20 years!

I have attended many annual national carnivals in nearly all states and have played against several former VFL and AFL players including Rene Kink, John 'the rat' Platten and Michael Long and Bruno Zelesco formerly from City South/South Launceston. Peter Hudson also had a long and distinguished career as a Master.

When the national carnival was held here in Darwin in 2008 I was a major organiser and we entertained over 900 players in over 40 teams which was then the largest AFL carnival ever. The estimated expenditure by the players and partners and families was between \$2.5 and \$3.8 million dollars into the Darwin economy.

In 2010 in Cairns they attracted 46 teams and almost 1000 players and I had the satisfaction of attending the opening of the carnival by my sister Val, the present Mayor of Cairns.

We play annually in Bali against teams from all over the world in the Bali 9's. This is a nine a side competition played on a converted soccer field, hence only having space for 9 players with two 12 minute halves with 18 games over the 9 hours. It is great fun on and off the field. Former St Mary's teacher Jim McKenzie now living back in the area, still plays and I don't think he will mind me saying he is on the other side of 65! I hope you can get him out playing.

I have immensely enjoyed the camaraderie of the older guys where "footy is for fun", the abridged rules helping lessen the injuries. The motto is "the older we get the better we were" or "the older we get the faster we were" or in the case of the Darwin players, "Drinkers with a football problem"!

Good luck to Harry, Michael, Ricky and Speed, hoping you get everybody behind you.



The 12 finalists and winners work will continue to be on display at the Purple Possum Café and Gallery for the





The Say Cagerattler

I know I've touched on this subject before but...... I'm going to again. RUBBISH ARRANGEMENTS.

Why can't we get our trash picked up weekly instead of this inadequate fortnightly thing as is the case now. It's pretty ordinary isn't it. Other than school holidays we have to put up with this for the vast bulk of the year.

It wouldn't be so bad if we had daily access to the tip. This isn't the case either.

Perhaps if you are a single person with limited opportunities to do other things in this regard you can cope with a 14 day rubbish pick up. I'd strongly think though for the majority of our households this may well not be the case.

The additional issue here is that if you work normal hours Tuesday and Thursday tip access is basically a waste of time because by the time you get home it's shut. This then only leaves you Sunday to do your stuff so to speak. Too bad if you want to use your Sundays for something else without having to rush home to get to the tip before it closes.

There is a solution. It's simple. Do a weekly rubbish pick up all year round. This would mean that apart from an occasional need to get rid of green waste, like trees or white goods or car bodies or something, extra trips to the tip would

be kept to a minimum, I'd suggest.

I'd also suggest that this in turn would help reduce people taking it upon themselves to dump rubbish around some of our bushland areas. Believe me they do that because I've seen piles of rubbish in several locations left dumped. I expect this is probably linked in some way to either tip access or overflowing bins in many cases. It doesn't excuse them but makes it understandable to a point. Then you have the issues of feral cats accessing some of this rubbish, injury to native animals, and glass objects creating greater opportunities for radiant heat to start fires in warmer weather. Maybe a bit dramatic but certainly a possibility.

Is there other solutions? I'd like to hear them if there is.

Did anyone see and hear the street wash truck a few weeks back buzzing around town early one morning. On occasions this has been done in the evenings. What's the point of it? That morning recently it was in fact quite breezy as it happened. I was at work and saw the dirt and leaves going all over the place and surely soon finishing up again in the gutters and kerbs etc. I can understand cities doing this task, especially in high maintenance Central Business Districts and major shop fronts, but in country towns like ours why bother. Walking and talking their way through the understorey

On Sunday 16th May 2010, the Understorey Network invited members of the public to join them on a Walk and Talk at the South Sister, St Marys, with Ashley Mason a local horticulturalist and member of the Save our Sister group leading the activity! Funding for the Walk & Talk had been obtained through the NRM North Caring For Country small grant program under the auspices of the Understorey Network.

On a very cold and very misty Sunday morning about 26 people gathered outside the St Marys Town Hall at 9am to jump aboard the Yo-Yo bus, driven by Larry, for the trip up to the Sister. On climbing the road towards the South Sister the mist cleared and the Yo-Yo bus and a couple of tag along cars popped out of the mist into a glorious sunny morning where the South Sister stood beckening to the group.

The walk started with a brief introduction to the area by Ashley Mason who described the area as one which contained a unique biodiversity which included healthy pockets of both Wet and Dry Sclerophyll Forest and also Temperate Rainforest including sub-alpine plants around the 832m summit. The area was described as rich in natural history with flora and fauna dating back to ancient times including the threatened Velvet Worm.

Ashley took us along a gradually climbing bush track and we stopped at various intervals to discuss the changing landscapes around us and the way in which the bush is regenerating following the 2007 bushfires. Plants of interest were pointed out and many questions were asked by group members. Morning tea was catered by the Happy Belly Deli and provided a welcome break in the sunshine for all the group to discuss how they were so far enjoying the walk and what to expect as we approached the summit.

A search was made for Velvet Worm in what looked to be a likely spot but sadly on this day we did not find even one! As we returned along the track to the road, some members chose to walk back down to the Yo-Yo bus whilst others decided to climb to the summit and those who had never climbed the South Sister before were astounded by the natural beauty of the summit area and the wonderful views from the lookout tower, they say you can see the islands on a good day, and this REALLY was a good day, crystal clear blue skies and fantastic visibility.

The morning had been planned to finish at mid day however it was 1.30pm before we were climbing back onto the Yo-Yo bus for the drive to St Marys, everyone seemed very, very pleased with the morning even if a tad tired after a slightly strenuous walk in parts.

The Understorey Network is always looking for new members to undertake it's core activity of growing plants to assist local land owner/selves with regeneration work, alongside of information sessions and activities such as this Walk & Talk. 

7pm one night last week, saw the three services attend a 2 car vs school bus collision.

On arriving, the 3 teams were confronted by a major task that, in reality, could actually happen here.

Power lines down, 3 motor vehicles that were on fire.

As all services went to their jobs it was found that there were 4 occupants in cars and another 8 in the bus.

After being triaged, we had 9 category 2 patients with injuries ranging from neck and spinal injuries, broken shoulders and legs, chest pain and unconscious patients.

We had three walking wounded who received minor injuries.


This amount of patients would have seen back-up coming from ambulances from St Helens, Campbell Town, Launceston, Bicheno and Avoca.


Within an hour and a half with a great deal of co-operation between the three services, every patient was extracted from the vehicles.

'I am on the Commissioner for Children's Consultative Council and won a competition to be the Commissioner for a day.






