
At the site Jim Haas showed photos of the mine when it was in operation and gave a talk on its colourful history.


The day ended with a visit to the Rubenach Family's museum and fossil display at Gray.





#### A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas

Scamander Bridges

The first three bridges of any note to be built in Tasmania were Richmond, (1825) Ross, (1836) and Campbell Town (1838). They were all built with stone or brick with convict labour and all three still stand today as National Heritage icons, reminding us of the wonderful talents our convicts were blessed with.

In 1865, however, when the first bridge was built over the Scamander River convict transportation had ended twelve years earlier and the Government contracted the construction to the Terry family of Falmouth. It took them twelve months to build what was said to be a frail structure with under-strength materials and piles no bigger than telegraph poles. It did on the other hand, last some twenty years and survived a number of floods. It finally collapsed under the weight of a mob of cattle.

The second bridge, built in 1887 by Wise, Tilly and Apted, was constructed with much larger local ironbark and blue gum with a causeway either side. But alas, only two years later the bridge collapsed from the might of the 1889 floods.

The Grubb Brothers, with a budget of £4,500 built the third bridge in 1894. Again local ironbark timber was used and this time the piles that were to be submerged were boiled in tar to repel underwater worms and help guard against rot. Although this bridge served the community for seventeen years it could not withstand the floods of 1911 and most of its structure ended up washed out to sea.

Following this bridge destruction, the first of three punts were introduced and were used until bridge number four was built in 1913. This bridge proved to be the most fragile as it lasted for less than a year. It was a fourteen span construction, but the piles were driven deep into the mud leaving the deck only nine inches above high water mark. In no time the bridge began to sink and soon ended up under water.


Before bridge number five was commenced in 1914 the site was drilled to 30 metres revealing that a layer of sand had been washed out under the first layer of sediment leaving only water. This was most likely the cause of the last bridge to sink. The new bridge was built with cast iron piles, but it still sustained major damage from the 1923 floods.

In 1923 bridge number six was built for £6,000. It was another timber construction, but this time 7 tons of copper and 2 tons of copper rivets were used to sheath the piles. But the 1929 floods, which took 22 lives and caused major damage throughout Tasmania, also washed another Scamander bridge into the Tasman Sea.

The Government had had enough; they allocated £12,000 for a bridge to be constructed from concrete and welded steel. Finally in 1936 Scamander had a bridge that would stand the test of time. Today that bridge still stands as an important part of engineering heritage as it is the only one of three that was built in this style still standing.

Bridge number eight was built in 1991 because the previous bridge was only single lane and unable to cope with the increasing amount of traffic in the area. This solid concrete bridge is 165 metres long by 12.5 metres wide, with 50 metre causeways on either end. The cost was 6.2 million dollars.

Given the history of the Scamander River, where eight bridges have been built over a 145 year period, one can only wonder if after the completion of the St Marys Pass in 1846 the convicts had have been moved to build a bridge over the Scamander River, we may well have another proud example of convict heritage, and like the Pass, still in use today.



At the risk of ticking off the State Government this time (been ticking off a few lately it seems) I think a general

comment regarding Service Tasmania is needed.

Why isn't there a lot more Service Tas outlets around our State, either directly or operating through another service provider.

This is brought home to us when the unavailability of normal office hours at the Police Station, due to staff leave entitlements or illness occurs.

Unfortunately in the case of a friend, considerable inconvenience was caused to her when she discovered that she couldn't transact her driver licence renewal, due to the Police Station office being closed for this purpose, necessitating a rather urgent awkward trip to St Helens so that she could legally travel to work, which is in another town, the next day.

We fully appreciate and understand that this is not a frequent occurrence at our Police Station, but given the ever increasing nature of statutory payments needing to be made in person these days, perhaps it's time to make provision for such things if and when the Police Station method is unavailable.

For all sorts of reasons not least work commitments and illness, many must find it difficult to go elsewhere to carry out various licencing matters.

During a talk with a very helpful Service Tasmania official, for this article, he told me that St Marys is one of the dwindling (very few) police stations that some of these transactions are still possible, at least for the moment. We are an exception here at present. It is really supposed to be done at Service Tasmania. He also mentioned that in several other States many duties can now be done online but not in Tassie yet of course.

So... Perhaps it's time to begin lobbying our local State Government politicians for provision at least, to conduct Licencing etc. payments at an appropriate outlet under the auspices of Service Tasmania and/or DPIWI/ Tasmania Police, and making it financially beneficial to the outlet to carry out services. It seems that this is a major stumbling block for privately run businesses.

I'm going to ask our local members, what about you? What do you think?

Lauren Quinn has spent the last four years in Hobart, studying a combined Bachelor of Arts/Law degree. Earlier this year she was given the opportunity to study a semester of Law abroad at the University of Lucerne in Switzerland. This is a brief description of a St Marys-raised girl's first time out of Australia.

#### 21 August 2010

There's a couple of things food-wise that frustrated me about Dubai. Their bread, for one, which tastes like scone dough (i.e. way too sweet and stodgy) and their bacon, which isn't made of pork, but beef or turkey! It's definitely interesting, but I'll be happy to get to England (my next stop) and have real bacon and bread!

We drove to Oman today, which is another Middle East country next to the United Arab Emirates. We didn't get to see much of it, as the road was very winding and the drive took forever. The scenery did remind me of the Great Ocean Road though, it was amazing. It was like the Middle East that you'd see on an SBS documentary - goats everywhere, rocky, dusty mountains, little dilapidated huts nestled in between, and more goats.

Our destination in Oman was the Golden Tulip resort, perched on a cliff top in the remote part of Oman. We went there

to have a few drinks basically (impossible to do in most places due to Ramadan), but even in this Westernised resort they refused to sell us alcohol until after Iftar (breaking of the fast, about 7pm). So we decided to drive the 4 hours back to Dubai.

We drove back to the UAE in the sunset, which was very beautiful. At the border crossing Vin got talking to the young Muslim guy on the counter, who happened to have studied in Launceston a few years earlier!


As we got back into the UAE into the outer, more rural emirates, Iftar was called. It was chaos - there were cars passing us on the 100km/h limited road at about 180km/h, presumably to get to their food. There were people driving down the wrong side of the road in order to get to their Iftar feasts.


A similar thing happens when the call to prayer is madepeople drop what they're doing to go to the nearest

mosque. In some smaller areas shopkeepers just leave their shops unattended and wide open while they go pray. The mosque near where I was staying was located next to a shopping centre, and there were cars double-parked, parking other cars in, some mounted on the nature strip with their hazard lights flashing (you can get away with anything if you have your hazards on), and no one seemed to mind.

After chatting with a lovely young Muslim guy about fasting during Ramadan, he said that he didn't mind, as "I am "bad" for 11 months of the year and then I get to prove that I am good, just for this month".

One thing that didn't seem quite right during Ramadan was the amount of advertising. I guess that if Christian events like Christmas and Easter can be commercialised, then so can Islamic events such as Ramadan. In a Dubai magazine I was reading, there were several ads for Philips kitchen appliances. One was a blender that was a "Ramadan special - save time this Ramadan by using this efficient blender, to spend more time with your family this Ramadan", followed by a recipe to make hommous in said blender. Ah, consumerism.





The Emirati (local) people in Dubai are very friendly, and most speak some English. Despite the Australian Government's Smart Traveller website claiming Dubai was a "high -risk" location, I did not feel unsafe in whilst in public. I'm sure perhaps in the poorer areas I mentioned earlier, you may be more at risk (especially as it becomes more Emirati and Western).


## Defence Force presentation

#### **CREATIVE WELL**


Is a body of work consisting of ten pieces created by people living with dementia.
