



A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas

"Hobart Trams"

For me the highlight in visiting Melbourne over the years is to ride on the wonderful tram system still operating in that city. Whilst all other cities in Australia have done away with their trams as public transport, Melbourne has done the opposite by upgraded their tram system to become an efficient and unique part of Australia.

My love for trams stems from my early teenage years back in the 1950s when I would spend holidays with my two aunties in Hobart. One lived in South Hobart, whilst the other lived in Moonah. My favourite past time, in those days, was to catch the tram at Cascade, ride down Macquarie Street to the Post office on the corner of Macquarie and Elizabeth Streets, then catch the second tram to Springfield Avenue in Moonah.



The Hobart tram system had some unique features as well, not only was it the first public, electric, tram system in the Southern Hemisphere, but was the only system in Australia to use double-decker trams. Indeed, in the early years of the system all trams were double-deckers, although the top deck was open.

There were a number of horse drawn tram systems operating around the country in the second half of the Ninetieth Century, but it was a group of British business men who lobbied the Tasmanian Government in the 1880s to gain support in building an electric powered system in Hobart. Initially the Government was extremely wary, saying that electricity was completely unproven as a power source and would not be suitable for driving trams.

By 1890 the Government was finally convinced that the British plan would work and construction on a tramway from the City Centre, up Macquarie Street, to the Cascade Brewery, along Elizabeth Street to North Hobart and a branch line off the Macquarie Street line to Sandy Bay, was approved. In 1893 the private consortium, Hobart Electric Tram Company, was formed and the first trams ran to Cascade, North Hobart and Sandy Bay on the 23rd September 1893.

The tram service proved to be a huge success and in no time the Elizabeth line was extended to Moonah with a branch line into Springfield Avenue. Later, branch lines were built on Augusta Road as far as Lenah Valley, up Liverpool Street to West Hobart and another line went off Macquarie Street into Proctors Road, servicing the Dynnyrne area.

The initial fleet comprised of twenty double-decked trams, but the top deck was open-sided with only a roof. These trams stayed in operation until 1928 when the fleet was replaced with the more modern single deck trams, the first of which was introduced in 1906.

Remarkably, the Hobart tram network, in its sixty seven year history, had very few accidents, although there were reports of several double-deckers rolling over, only minor injuries were recorded. The worse accident came almost at the end of the system's history when, on the 29th April 1960, tram number 131 was struck by a truck near the intersection of Elizabeth and Warwick Streets. The tram's brakes were damaged in the accident and it began to roll backwards down the gradient of Elizabeth Street during peak hour traffic. Some passengers managed to jump clear, whilst others sought refuge under their seats.

Despite being dazed by the collision, tram conductor, Raymond Donoghue, stayed on board and without any concern for his own safety guided the passengers to the front of the vehicle, as it was rolling backwards. He also warned motorists by continually ringing the tram's bell, whilst all the time trying to apply the emergency brakes. It was all to no avail, however, the tram had reached an estimated speed of 40 to 50 miles an hour when it finally collided with another tram. Sadly Conductor Donoghue, the hero of the day, was killed instantly.

By 1955 the Government owned Metropolitan Transport Trust had taken over the Hobart tram-ways and in 1950 a decision was made to replace the trams with electric powered trolley busses. But it was another ten years before the trams were completely replaced, with the last tram running on the 21st October 1960. Their successor, the trolley bus, was much less successful, only lasting another eight years and being

replaced with diesel powered busses in 1968.

There are few physical remains of the Hobart Tram-way still in existence today. The only remaining part of the rolling stock in original condition is one single deck, double bogie tram, Number 141, displayed at the Tasmanian Transport Museum at Glenorchy.

Whilst there have been a number of proposals put forward for tourists trams in Hobart over recent years, all have been rejected, which would indicate that Hobart trams will only ever be part of the City's history.

It was signed by the Manager Tenement Administration.

As the exploration site had included St Marys School and the Recreation Ground, surely we were not the only ones concerned.

We would like to see Break O'Day Council hold a public meeting or public workshop to fully explain Fee Simple in layman's terms, and the practical and relevant application of Fee Simple within this municipality.

POST OFFICE NEWS

We have just received advice from Australia Post that the maximum dimensions for Christmas cards being sent overseas are as follows:

Length: 240mm
Width: 130mm
Thickness 5mm
Weight: 20grams

Any cards exceeding these dimensions will be processed as Large Letters which will attract extra postage and may have extra charges levied at the receiving end.

In addition the minimum dimensions for overseas Christmas cards have been set at 138mm (L) by 88mm (W). Overseas postal authorities have advised that any cards under these dimensions may not be processed for delivery. Accordingly, while large cards may be impressive and small cards cute, they may attract additional charges or not be delivered at all.

Christmas Hours

St Marys Post Office will be closed on the following days over the Christmas/New Year period:

Monday 27 December Tuesday 28 December Friday 31 December Monday 3 January 2011

Australia Post mail sorting centres will also be closed on these days so there will not be any mail deliveries.

Tuesday Mail Deliveries

The circumstances that led to delayed mail deliveries on Tuesdays have, for the moment, passed so there will be normal mail deliveries for the foreseeable future. Further advice will be issued should this situation change.

Parcels to USA

We have been advised that due to enhanced security procedures in USA, parcels delivery times will be delayed by up to 48 hours and there will be a \$9.00 surcharge (imposed by US Postal Authorities) per parcel (for parcels over 450gms). Anyone planning to send parcels to USA in the future should be aware of these requirements.





The Society's final history walk for 2010 will be to the old coal mine workings at Cornwall.



I think they were born on the same day, sat together at school and grew up together.


Syd came to our house around the end of December for about the last 23 years. He loved the race meeting and would always go and have a talk to his old school chum.

The Say Cagerattler

I've commented already this year on a related subject. This time it's about the product. I refer to our water and it would be good to get some technical answers from Ben Lomond Water if they could help.

Just last week I was helping put down a renovated section of lawn at work. After we'd finished sowing the seed and fertilizer it was time to dampen the new soil. One of my workmates doesn't live in St.Marys and soon after we began using the hose he commented, "Gee there is a strong chlorine smell". He was of course referring to the water coming directly from the hose going onto the ground. He was right though, and the other two of us agreed it was very strong. I suppose that under normal circumstances we become a little desensitized to our water by using it every day, but here and there when it becomes particularly noticeable it makes you consider the long term effects of chlorinated/treated water on you.

I seem to have to replace my kettle frequently also, and you wonder what effect strongly treated water has on hot water cylinders and the like over time.

I appreciate that the authorities feel that additives are a must and I suppose they are, but there are questions we perhaps need to know in regard to how the water is tested and certified for general use. With all chemicals there are safe levels and for whatever of these are added to our water, is there a way we can easily find out what they are at any given time? This would be good to know because undoubtedly everyone's tolerances aren't the same. Is there anyone who can publicly answer these sorts of queries for us. That on it's own would be a good thing for everyone. For most it's the only water we have and the stuff we have to pay for so we should be able to get answers on these and other questions.

To the respondent last issue: I wish she read my final comment on the parking issue a few weeks back. No

further comment on this until something ever gets decided on parking. Otherwise her breath will be "baited" for a very long time.

Greetings from Lauren.


Lauren Quinn has spent the last four years in Hobart, studying a combined Bachelor of Arts/Law degree. Earlier this year she was given the opportunity to study a semester of Law abroad at the University of Lucerne in Switzerland. This is a brief description of a St Marys-raised girl's first time out of Australia.

After Paris, we caught a 5-hour train from the intimidating train station we arrived at previously, and crossed the French border into Switzerland. The scenery seems to change immediately - Switzerland is just as beautiful as the pictures. All the cows have cowbells, the rolling green hills that go for miles, the little Swiss chalets, with the snowy Alps in the distance. When we arrived in Lucerne/Luzern (English/German) we discovered hundreds of people's bicycles parked around the city - some of them weren't even chained up.

The next thing I noticed was that the buses and trains are very easy to fare-evade on - you don't buy a ticket on the bus, you just hop on. You're supposed to validate your ticket before you get on the bus, but with the signs being in German we didn't quite realise this. There are fines of 80 Swiss Francs (approx \$90) if you get caught, and my two friends Kim and Michael got caught by really intimidating ticket conductors wearing berets and guns, so none of us are ever fare evading again! After this, on a city train into Lucerne city I put my sore feet on the seat without thinking. The ticket conductor came along, and I thought I was about to cop a fine (as what seems to occur regularly on the Melbourne commuter trains). However, the conductor told me firmly that I shouldn't put my shoes on the seat - but if I wanted to put my feet up on the seat, I should take my shoes off or lay down newspaper before I do!

There are dogs everywhere. Not strays, but pets. None seem to be on leashes, they just wander around the city happily after their owners. No one minds when people bring their dogs onto buses, trains, even shopping centres. I saw a girl in H&M (similar to Sportsgirl) looking at clothes while her little Terrier trotted along behind her around the store. It's great! I commented about this to Kim's Swiss housemates, who were astounded that dogs usually have to be on leashes in Australia, and cannot go into shops and on public transport. They just looked surprised and commented that Australia has too many laws!

All the major supermarkets close at 6pm on weeknights and don't open on Sundays. Most services, such as post offices and banks close from 12pm-1.30pm for lunch every weekday, which is a little frustrating. When you can actually get to a supermarket, the groceries are reasonably priced, but meat is ridiculously expensive. Chicken breast is approx \$25 per kilo. Pork fillet is approx \$55 per kilo. I was too scared to look at the price of scotch fillet steak! It looks as though I'll be involuntarily turning vegetarian for the next few months... It was a bit difficult to find out which meat was which, as pork here is called "schwein" in German, chicken is "poulet" and beef is "rind". I kept seeing shelves of "rind" and dismissed it, thinking it was (really expensive) animal skin, as in the English translation, until I started noticing the cuts of meat looked very beef-ish. They also sell horse meat too (I didn't realise until I noticed a picture of a horse on the packet of steak!) I'm a bit too scared to try it, despite it being cheaper than beef...

Where I'm living in my student accommodation is quite alright, although the scenery isn't much. It's in an industrial area, just outside the city of Lucerne. I'm right across the road from (an expensive) McDonalds, and the bus stops and train stations are right outside my door. Even though it's not looking out onto the Swiss Alps or anything (if you walk 100m down the road, you can see them!), it's nice to be this close to amenities for once in my life.

You can also drink alcohol legally in the street here, which is an eye-opener. We met some lovely Swiss girls, who took us out nightclubbing the first weekend we were in Lucerne. We bought alcohol from Coop (one of the major supermarkets) and went and sat on some steps in the Old City of Lucerne (the historic, tourist part of Lucerne) to drink our flavoured vodka liqueur stuff. Kim and I freaked out when a police car stopped and talked to the Swiss girls in German, as we thought we were going to get into trouble for drinking in public. It turns out the police were just reminding us to clean up after ourselves, and telling us to have a good night!


Switzerland is apparently the safest country in the world, after Japan. I mean, there are the occasional creepy people, and the usual one or two drunken men in the bus mall during the middle of the day, but that's pretty common in most Western cities worldwide.

Switzerland is an amazingly clean, efficient country. There are both trains and buses that run every 10 minutes past my door, people voluntarily separate all their recyclables and take them in to the local recycling plant to be processed. Not just drop them all in the recycling bin, but actually separate all the cans from the boxes and cartons. The other day we were walking through the main Lucerne bus mall and saw two drunken men having an argument. One threw his can of beer on the ground and stormed off, only to come back 10 seconds later and pick up his beer can and put it in the bin!

A regular method of greeting here is kissing on the cheek. All the young people do it too, it's quite lovely! You air-kiss to the right, then to the left, then to the right again. I've never seen two guys doing it as a greeting, but guys do it to girls, and girls do it to each other too. It's a really lovely thing that I wish we had at home. Another thing I wish we had at home is intermissions for films at the cinema! It's quite nice to get a 5 minute break from a lengthy movie.

Another strange custom is the habit of knocking on the desks after a lecture. Apparently it's a "German" thing. If the class deems the teacher as taking a good class, they'll all rap their knuckles on the table in appreciation. It's like clapping, I guess, but more subtle. The Law school at the University of Lucerne, where I'm doing my exchange semester, is regarded as one of the best in Switzerland, Germany and Austria, which is maybe why the lecturers generate so much respect from their students. We're finding it a lot easier than our studies in Hobart though, and we only have classes for at least 2 days per week! Luckily Lucerne is in the heart of Europe and you can be in Milan, Italy in 3.5 hours, Paris in 5, Munich, Germany in 5 and Salzburg, Austria in 6 hours (by train).

I've settled in quite nicely to the Swiss way of life, and am really enjoying it. I am learning a little German, but luckily most people can speak a little English (but you have to convince most to speak it, as they are generally too shy to speak it because they are afraid of getting their words wrong!) The weather is turning colder and everyone is waiting for the first snow of the winter. It's going to be lovely to have a white Christmas for once. I return home at the end of January, and everyone tells me that Tasmania is still fairly the same as when I left in August! This experience is one that I'll always hold dear. I hope you've enjoyed reading my ramblings as much as I've enjoyed writing them, and I urge everyone to visit these spectacular places. It's a life-changing experience.

Councillor's Corner

This article by Cllr Johns

I have read, with interest the articles of Mr. Trollope about fee simple and his opinion of the legal standing of Councils.

In my opinion and through research the following facts have emerged. I will not quote the entire sections, Acts and laws but put it into simple language. As the Mayor is the spokesperson of the Council, and if you have any further questions I suggest that you contact him.

First: - What is a constitution?

The term refers specifically to a constitution defining the fundamental <u>political</u> principles, and establishing the structure, procedures, <u>powers</u> and <u>duties</u>, of a <u>government</u>.

Simple enough.

Constitution Act 1855 (Tas)

The State of Tasmania established its own constitution in 1855 and this was approved by Royal Assent, rather than being assented to by the Governor.

Fingal Municipal Council

Established 1 January 1863, under The Rural Municipalities Act 21 Vict. No.50 1858, Proclamation 5 Jan 1863 (HTG 6 Jan 1863) amalgamated with Portland Council 2nd April 1993. As part of the reorganisation of local government in Tasmania, part of Fingal was amalgamated with Portland to form the new municipality of Break O'Day and the remainder was amalgamated with other Councils. Please note **established 1863.**

The Constitution of Australia (1901)

This Constitution was approved in <u>referendums</u> held over 1898–1900 by the people of the <u>Australian colonies</u>, and the approved draft was enacted as a section of the Commonwealth of Australia Constitution Act 1900 (Imp), an <u>Act</u> of the <u>Parliament of the United Kingdom</u>.

Under the Australian Constitution, Tasmania gave certain legislative and judicial powers to the Commonwealth, but retained complete independence in all other areas.

Section

106:- of the Aust Consititution gave each State the right to continue to have their own constitution.

108:- Every law in force in a Colony which has become or becomes a State shall continue in force in that State.

To follow the logic of this it appears that Tasmanian Councils were ratified under a State Constitution 46 years before the Australian Constitution!!!!!!

Therefore totally legal..

Fee Simple

represents absolute ownership of real property but it is limited by the four basic government powers of <u>taxation</u>, compulsory purchase, <u>police power</u>, and if a person dies <u>intestate</u>. Could also be limited by certain <u>encumbrances</u> or a condition in the <u>deed</u>.

Planning Scheme

- Regulates use and development
- May seek to achieve protection and conservation of land
- Establishes objectives and rules under which use and development will be considered
- Ensures sustainable future development so that the economic, social and environmental needs of the municipal area will be equally considered

E.G would it be right to have a neighbour drain raw sewerage onto your land, or build a structure that blocked your sunlight, or carry out a business that was a danger to your health?

That is what a Planinng Scheme does. It gives the community a set of guidelines to determine the types of development that are considered appropriate. You can appeal any decision you feel is unjust.

The Land Use Planning & Approvals Act 1993

Is the primary planning legislation in Tasmania, and a central part of the Resource Management and Planning System. The basis of the RMPS is ecologically sustainable development. **Planning schemes are also subject to State Policies** and they should be working to protect and enhance Tasmania's resources for the benefit of future generations.

DELTBERATIONS

For many years there has been whispered talk of a "New World Order", a plan for "Centralised Control" through a "One World Government". As we approach the designated time for its inception (2012), people are starting to realize that all is not well in our society and that we are, by many acts of gradualism losing our "Constitutional Rights" that we assumed were safeguarded by Queen Elizabeth II in the "Coronation Oath".

We the people, have let the power slip from our grasp and if we want to get it back and have a fairer deal, it will take a lot of hard grunt to reverse the situation and bring matters back to the way that they used to be and were designed to be when our "Founding Fathers" put together our Constitution in 1901.

Government at all levels has become a branch of "Big Business" who set the agenda for what can be discussed and altered and what is not even allowed to be mentioned. I have personally found that I am restricted from expressing my views on Talk Back Radio or in Main Stream papers on a number of subjects. To name a few:- Medical cures that work, Government corruption, and what really happened at Port Arthur which is a very touchy subject!!!

Queensland was recently disenfranchised of its Constitutional Rights whilst the people were asleep or watching the footy. How strange that apparently nobody noticed! A number of inconspicuous changes over a number of years when seen together show a vivid picture of ongoing deceit and betrayal perpetrated by the various lawmakers and so called "Guardians of our Rights".

Here is the plan of deception so far:-

- 1. In 1973, the Whitlam Government brought in the "Queen of Australia" through the adoption of The Royal and Parliamentary Titles Act of 1927.
- 2. This removed Queen Elizabeth II, Her Heirs and Assigns as enshrined in the Commonwealth of Australia Constitution Act (UK) 1900 and replaced the Crown with the "Queen of Australia" as a Queen in title only.
- 3. On the 19 December 1973, the Whitlam Government also removed the Great Seal of Britain from use and replaced it with the Great Seal of Australia.
- 4. In 1986, Bob Hawke brought in the Australia Act. So we now have the Constitution of the new Parliament of Australia instead of the Commonwealth of Australia Constitution of 1900 of the People.
- 5. This act removed the ability of the UK Parliament to make laws for Australia, making Britain a Foreign Country. This was defined in the High Court in the case of Sue v Hill 1999. During the 1990s all important and relevant Acts were changed and framed, but were adjourned without a definite date of printing. In January 1998, the Queensland National Party documented a move to place the Queensland Governor in the Government as a Parliamentary Secretary under the Queensland Constitution 1867 (Parliamentary Secretaries) Act in the State of Queensland 1996 which became official on January 29 1999, the same day that the Queensland Constitution 1867 was reprinted. Thus The Governor was no longer a sworn representative of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, but a Public Servant of the Queensland Government. He was still using the Public Seal of the State on behalf of the Premier and Parliament of Queensland and maintained the appearance of the Governor to the Sovereign People of the State. In December 2001, the "Queensland Constitution 2001" came into being. On this day, this Act became the "Fundamental Law of Queensland". On the 7 June 2002, all of the framed Acts were reprinted and became law.

Queensland then became, at the completion of these matters, without the assent of any of the laws by The Crown or Her Representative, an "Independent Sovereign State" and fractured the Common Law and the Separation of Power in that state.

On 15 July 2002, The Corporations Act 1990 Reprint No 3 created in Queensland a "Corporate Government".

The State of Queensland Australia is now registered with the US Securities and Exchange Commissions under No 0001244818.

The Queensland Treasury Corporation is now registered under 0000852555.

The Old Crowns Land Act (Qld) was converted to the Land Act 1994 (Qld), and at section 4 (1) the Land Administration Commission was renamed "The Brigalow Corporation". The Land Act 1994- Reprint No 10C, Part 7A, Section 506C quite clearly states that the "Brigalow Corporation now represents Crown". Subsequently, the Beattie Government administrations had reworked backwards every piece of Federal and State legislation, removing any connection to or mention of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, British Law and the Royal Seal of England. These Acts were then reworked forwards, replacing the removed elements with the "Queen of Australia" (as created by the Whitlam Government in 1973) and the Great Seal of Queensland culminating in the legislation in those acts being "governed" by the Government of those Seals, and not the Government of the Commonwealth of Constitution of 1900.

The Australian Waste Lands Act of 1855 was reprinted in 1996 under the Seal of Queensland and because the "Queen of Australia" was now sealed with the Seal of Queensland, this effectively created a "Queensland Ownership" of all Crown land in Australia. And as the introduction of the Corporations Act 1900 Reprint No 3 had created a Corporate government, this effectively meant that all Crown land "ownership" was now under the control of the Queensland Corporation known as the Brigalow Corporation!!!

More on this subject to follow in the next issue.
