





"ELECTRIC ERIC PAYS A VISIT"

Whilst we are talking about famous people visiting our valley, I came across an article in the 1968 August addition of the Valley Voice which tells of a visit by one of Tasmania's best known Premiers, Eric Reece.

Eric was a member of the Labour party and held portfolios in the State Government from 1946 to 1975. Fourteen of those years from 1946 to



1969 and again from 1972 to 1975 he was Premier.

Eric's achievements as Premier were many, but perhaps his greatest were the development of the hydro electric schemes in Tasmania and the push for Australia's first casino to be built in Hobart. Public opinion was very much divided on the casino, forcing Eric's Government to call a referendum in 1968 which came out with a small majority in favour of the casino. Eric opened Wrest Point Hotel Casino in 1973.

Eric's visit to St Marys on the 13th August 1968 was to address a public meeting in the Town Hall concerning the state of the St Marys area at that time. One of the main contentions put forward at the meeting was the lack of any worthwhile employment opportunities, particularly for the young. The meeting was told that in recent years, due mainly to the downturn in the coal industry, over 500 people had been forced to leave the district to seek employment.

Eric's response was that he was totally aware of the situation in St Marys, as well as many other country towns around Tasmania and his Government was doing all it could to address the problem. One industry that was on the drawing board for future development was the wood chip industry. This industry had the potential to create jobs all over the south, east coast and north east with forestry operations and planned ports at Triabunna and George Town. Eric urged voters to continue to support the Labour Government so that pressure could be kept up to ensure the wood chip industry and other industries were established in this State.

As we know, the wood chip industry did go ahead in the early 1970s and consequently created a wealth of employment for the people of the Fingal Valley. Two rail log yards were built at Fingal and one at St Marys. Plus the Fingal

Forestry offices were expanded and an office and store built at St Marys. Forest contractors like Aulichs, Walkers, Freeman and Wagner, to name a few, soon became the largest employers in the district.

Although the closure of the Aberfoyle tin and wolfram mine at Rossarden in 1982 was a blow to the Valley, the timber industry along with a rejuvenation of the coal industry saw employment relatively steady for quite a few years. We saw new businesses start up, new homes being built and the economy of the Valley relatively stable.

Someone once said, however, that all good things must come to an end and this was surely the case for the Fingal Valley. The timber industry is almost gone, many businesses have closed and young and old alike not only have to leave the Valley for work, but in many cases leave the State.

At the meeting with Eric Reece in 1968 he was able to come up with some answers to the employment problems of the Valley at that time. A meeting with Premier Giddings today would be quite different, I suspect. The problems facing us in 2011 are similar, but much more complex than those of 1968.

Dear editor, Re: Optus Tower, Gray Rd, St Marys.

I refer to an article of "Valley Voice: 16/12/10, titled "Councillor's Corner", by Clr Reon Johns.

In his second paragraph he states that "also this tower for standards Australian meets all the radiation." (E.M meaning electro-magnetic)

I now refer to an article, (V Voice 10/3/11) His reply to a letter from P. McDermott (V.V 24/2/11) It is not clear whether Clr Johns finds large erections ugly, or has now decided that the Australian Standards for E.M. radiation do not suit him, or both.

In the article "Councillor's Corner" of 16/12/10 he states that it took him from the closed meeting of 10/11/2008 until 14/9/2009 (10 months) to question the existence of 5 other considered sites. Surely, such questions would have been raised at the first meeting if they were relevant to the application for the tower. The processing of development applications consumes a certain amount of council time.

It is doubtful that Optus is in the business of wasting its own time and money or that of the B.O.D. Council. Therefore, I think that it is very unlikely that "Optus-Daly International" would submit 5 or 6 D.As when they only intended to build <u>1 tower</u>.

It is the company's business which site they choose to submit, for council consideration. A similar example would be if I owned four urban blocks of vacant land but wished to build on only one of them, what I did with the other three would not be relevant to the building application, and no one's business.

So the application to build the Optus tower in Gray Rd, described only that site.

"Clement Tower No1" in the midst of a group of 5 or 6 could be a significant sculptural installation. The ultimate

The "Clement Tower" is already an unofficial signpost to the caravan/camping facilities at the recreation ground. The first site for the tower was that of 54 Harefield Road, and the project was on display for 2 weeks - rejected.

As a neighbour I was invited to make comment. The council acknowledged my written submission and stated that there had only been one other.

In "Councillor's Corner" Clr Johns states that on 24/9/2009 under "Council Watch", David Clement said that only 2 submissions were received between Nov. 2008 and Sept, 2009, (10 months!) and that no petitions or other enquiries were made during that time. This means only 2 submissions for both sites.

Telstra have had a mobile phone installation behind the St Marys Post Office for some time. It is closer to the ground, and also conforms to the Australian Standard for E.M. radiation output. No one seems to have noticed that

Councillors Clement and Johns were the only ones to vote against the Gray Road facility. Did David Clement and Reon Johns favour Telstra in their decision regarding the Optus tower? If so, for what reason?

The "Clement Tower" seems to have faded to a state of unimportance after 24/9.2009.

The subject of council amalgamation had come to the fore. This was closely followed by the "hype" of the December 2009 council election.

"1 CLEMENT", I Gray Road was mentioned, but not "Clement Tower No 1". It was not an issue, as it had been passed by council. Is it now a new election issue for Reon Johns, seeking re-election?

The phrase "closing the gate after the horse has bolted" comes to mind, or maybe the one, "flogging a dead horse".

On the 17th of March I sent a letter to Council requesting that my demand: that Break O'Day Council hold a public meeting in St Marys, in the early evening (6-7pm) with adequate notice and advertisement to openly answer questions re parallel parking on the southern side of Main Street, before any works commence on the footpath, road surface or line markings, be placed on the agenda at the next Council meeting.

I have received the following from the Mayor, "Your letter will not be placed at the next Council Meeting owing to the fact that Council on the 15th of March, 2011, moved a motion that a public meeting be called as soon as all information is sought and a representative from DIER can attend in St Marys." (that meeting re this matter was a closed session)

I hope this is so and that all St Marys residents attend, including anyone else that drives through and or parks in St Marys any time, for this affects not only the businesses, it affects everyone.

In the same letter it was stated by the Mayor, " It is wearing a bit thin that the innuendos being canvassed are far from correct and are based on assumptions."

My questions (letters) to Council have been based on conversations with representatives of DIER. (questions raised by these conversations were put to Mayor and councillors)

I am currently awaiting reply to one letter (12 questions), others have not been directly addressed (7 questions and previous letter to the Valley Voice.

Due to the above, I will make the following comments with the information I have, the Mayor may like to respond to these publicly via a letter to the editor or wait until the public meeting.

Choices are:-

1) Council proceeds with works to the footpath on the southern side of Main Street St Marys and parking/road markings remain as they are. (Option proposed in the Council workshop dated 28th February 2011; (also closed to public) and position of Council adopted in December 2008, after community meeting of the St Marys Streetscape resulting in 72 votes to retain angle parking with 6 voting for parallel parking. Result;- Nice looking footpath. (Hopefully)

No changes to traffic or parking.

2) Council proceeds with works to footpath and (alleged) proposed parallel parking plan approved by DIER to the southern side of Main Street St Marys implemented.

Result;- Nice looking footpath.

A two (2) meter (6 feet 61/2" in imperial measurement for relics like myself) painted safety refuge in the middle of the road (which traffic is not allowed to cross). The loss of approximately 15 car spaces on the southern side of Main Street (this is from the plan for parallel parking, that was shown to Kim Chappell at Main Street Clothing by the Mayor on the 29th February; (this plan still has not been confirmed by council too exist). These losses in parking spaces are to be compensated by the "CAR PARK" (I am awaiting a response on its location).

A loading Zone in front of the Post Office (?Goods loading and pick up only; no parking).

Increases in traffic flow to Cameron, Groom, Story, Grant and Frank Streets, because anyone coming from Fingal side of town, who wishes to park on the southern side of Main Street, St Marys (the side where the majority of the businesses are located between Cameron and Story Streets) will have to go around the block legally to park. Anyone parked on the southern side of Main Street St Marys, who wishes to travel east will have to do the same (NO "U"TURNS) (The other possibility voiced is

Increase in safety due to changes to current practices (comment from DIER representative); information I have is that there have been NO traffic incidences, reported to police in the area this plan relates to.)

Hopefully the community WILL GET TO CHOOSE (again) and that decision will be carried out by council.





If implemented, the proposed National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) will fix the untenable disability system that was described as 'irretrievably broke and broke ... struggling against a vast tide of unmet need'.

Until you experience disability, do you realise how dysfunctional the current disability system actually is despite well intentioned governments. Australian's take for granted that they have a natural entitlement to service support if they are severely impaired by, for example: stroke, accidents, disease. But this is just not the case. Under the current system, you may find yourself having to lobby hard for basic needs, independence, and choice and there is no guarantee that you will receive such support. And if you do, you may experience bouts of guilt for being so 'lucky'.

Under the NDIS structure, you will have natural entitlement. And the stigma of disability becomes positive.

IRISHTOWN TO FOUR MILE CREEK HISTORICAL WALK

On Sunday the 20th March over thirty walkers turned up outside the Purple Possum in Story Street, St Marys, all keen to set off on a trek to the coast via Irishtown.

We car pooled and drove, first to the old Irishtown school site, where Barry Aulich, who spent most of his life living and working in the area, produced an old photo of the school taken in 1909. From there we continued the drive to the turn-off to the Jones property where the cars were parked and we set off on foot down the old road, which could well have been in existence in some form even before the St Marys Pass opened in 1846.

At a number of spots along the way Barry called the group together and produced more old photos and pointed out various places of interest, including where his great grandfather, Julius (Yuli) Aulich, set up the first mechanical sawmill at Mill Ridge. He also told us of the many families who had lived and reared large families on small 50 acre dairy farms around Irishtown.

Further down the mountain Barry told of the group of people who had worked their way up from the coast into the gullies know as Davis and Isis, where fertile soil up to several metres deep had been found. Here some of the best market gardens in the State were established.

A point of interest in the creek, only a kilometre upstream from Four Mile Creek, is a water hole known as the "Bottomless Hole". The story goes that back in the early days of settlement to the area, John King, who was known as the fittest and strongest swimmer in the whole district, had several unsuccessful attempts to reach the bottom of the hole. His onlookers finally had reason to cheer one day when, after he had disappeared down the hole for several minutes, came up with a handful of pebbles.

The final story Barry told was of three sailors who were said to be shipwrecked off Four Mile Creek in the mid 1800s.

At the time three convicts had escaped from Port Arthur and were believed to be in the area. Unfortunately the sailors were mistaken for the convicts and shot by troopers as they came ashore. They were buried on the point just south of the current township of Four Mile Creek. For years that piece of land was known as Burial Point.

The day ended at the Tasman Highway, with several of the younger, fitter members of the group walking back up the mountain, while those of us, who are a little less adventuress, brushed off the leeches and motored back to our vehicles at Irishtown.

The recent concern shown by some residents of St Marys over the parking issue in Main Street has highlighted some misconceptions with the operation of Council Meeting.

The Council meets on the second Monday of the Month, unless this is a public holiday then it meets on the Tuesday, and these meetings are open to the public.

Council also holds workshops on the 4th Monday of the Month. Workshops are used to improve communication between Councillors; discuss future plans, administration processes, team building, educational updates, actions to achieve particular organisational aims and the budget for the upcoming fiscal year.

If you wish to place a question on notice you can write, or hand deliver, to the General Manager and have this put on the agenda. However; you must have your letter into Council 7 working days before the Council Meeting. Then your question will be answered in the agenda. This also applies to a petition.

If you decide to attend the Council meeting you can hand your petition in at the Meeting and/or ask a question(s), but as these are regarded as questions without notice there is no requirement to have these answered immediately.

Generally you will get a written response at a later date, because the question must be researched.

Closed Council meetings are listed in the agenda and are held at the end of the meeting, as the name implies it is closed to the press, public and sometimes to all staff.

Closed Council meetings can be about staffing issues, commercial in confidence, Australia Day awards or grant applications etc.

A couple of nights ago I was watching an ABC current affairs program and one of the stories revolved around a new initiative by Inland Fisheries officials to encourage more people to take up the fabulous pastime of trout fishing. So far it has been introduced to North and North Western rivers whereby agreeing and co-operative land owners provide access to parts of rivers that transverse their property. Inland fisheries staff construct stiles, access points and signage that give novice and expert fishing enthusiasts alike the opportunity to fish that defined section of the river under conditions agreed by the landowner. I believe you must have a fully validated and current fishing licence to take part.

The story showed that the landowners involved at present were keen to be a part and spin offs were worthwhile. Likewise the anglers were thrilled to be able to fish areas not previously accessible. It is to be introduced down south soon also. I wonder have the Fingal Valley rivers been considered and I wonder equally if local landowners would consider this initiative if it were to become a reality. The South Esk, Break O'Day and other streams are fished and provide great times for those who love fly fishing in particular. I understand that the visiting anglers from interstate and overseas are the main targets and their feedback when fishing (mainly our lakes) is crucial to our fishery, hence this new project to focus more on river fishing in this instance. This area is primed to help regenerate interest in this terrific recreational pastime.

As a community we definitely need to consider a CRAFT FAIR sometime in the next few years. Just in the past few weeks a couple more incredible craftsmen living close by have been pointed out. Add them to the already great things happening at the Woodcraft Guild, Gone Rustic, sculpting, painting, knitting, music, modelling, photography, restorations, antiques etc ... and the biggest problem might be where to find a space big enough to do an exhibition. Just don't know where to start.

I thank Second Hand Rose for her response to a previous article on the contentious parking issues recently. I appreciate the strong views she and so many others obviously have on this important matter and exactly why I wrote what I did. Such overwhelming opinions cannot be ignored. Having said that though, I still would at least like to see some improvements made if angle parking is to stay. There must be conciliation and a little compromise as part of the process to make our Main Street the safest possible version of angle parking if it is to stay. It constantly amazes me how we manage to survive all of the nasty and unnatural substances that are forced on us in the name of health care. Were we told many years ago of the dangers of eating butter, and the health benefits of margarine?

So what is margarine, what is it made from and why should we not listen to the "experts" who tell us how good it is for us!

Margarine is only one molecule away from being plastic and shares 27 ingredients with paint. Here are the facts: A recent Harvard Medical Study showed that it can <u>increase</u> heart disease in women by 53% over eating the same amount of butter. It increases total cholesterol and LDL (bad cholesterol) and lowers HDL, the good cholesterol and increases the risk of cancer by up to five times.

Both butter and margarine have the same amount of calories, butter is slightly higher in saturated fats at 8 grams, compared with margarine at 5 grams. However, butter increases the absorption of many beneficial nutrients in other foods.

Margarine is very high in fatty acids, is hydrogenated which changes the molecular structure, it decreases immune response and also decreases insulin response.

Tibetans have traditionally always put salt as well as a pat of butter in their tea and were some of the oldest living and active people in the world before the Chinese destroyed their society, while Australia looked the other way.

Unfortunately, it is very difficult to avoid many of the harmful ingredients found in our foodstuffs today no matter how hard we try.

Where has the honesty gone, where we could rest assured that we were being looked after by the people who's job it is to do so?

We live in a pill popping society with a high proportion of sick people and the medical profession overworked and unable to cope, and the expense is enormous. Good nutrition is undoubtedly a major factor if one wants to maintain good health.

Perhaps we should study the lessons of history and go back to a few of the products that have been proven to benefit mankind over the centuries and avoid the products that are only thrust on to us for the benefit of large multinational corporations.

The ladies were already set for finals and a good run will see them very competitive again.


All players please do your best to get to practice this week so we can try to organise finals teams without too much drama.
